EDITORIAL

Next month (April) will be the time which we, of the Church of Christ, look forward to, from one year to another. It is the month in which we hold our Conference.

It, throughout the years, has been given different names; but regardless of what name we give it, then is the time we meet together to perform business for the general Church. It is, therefore, a general conference.

Many times in the past quarter of a century there has been talk of doing away with legislation. Without taking up discussion on the merits or the demerits of this proposition we are reminded that Article Nineteen of our Articles of Faith would have to be revised if legislation was to be done away with.

There may be some of you who will attend conference for the first time, this year. If so there are a few rules to follow if you want to get the most out of your time spent there:

First, be sure you have made arrangements for your lodging. If you do this you have a good start for an enjoyable time.

Next, read the rules or law covering the kind of conference the business will be conducted by this year. This will avoid some confusion of mind.

At the beginning of conference a program will be tend. Be on time if possible at every meeting you atannounced. Decide which meetings you wish to attend, just as much as you would expect to be on time if you were working for a company, in a factory, or in an office.

When a bill is before the house, try to understand it. If you do not understand it, ask a question or two to try to get it clear in your mind. Do not attempt to speak on the bill either for or against, until you understand it. Acquaint yourself with Robert's Rules of Order. It is the "Rules of Order" adopted by the Church.

If every one would observe these few simple rules much good could be accomplished. For instance: if everyone was on time at a meeting there would be no confusion of seat finding during the meeting. God is not the author of confusion. If we, through our tardiness, cause confusion in a meeting habitually, we should examine ourselves before God.

The conference is where we meet to do business for God. We should prepare ourselves spiritually ahead of time for this work, so we might be able to conduct ourselves in a way that would be pleasing and acceptable to Him.

We are reprinting, for the reader's benefit, the rules for The People's Conference as published in the Zion's Advocate for May, 1939 on pages 78 and 79.

THE PEOPLE'S CONFERENCE

1. The legislative power of the Church of Christ shall be vested in the local churches, in harmony with the instruction: "therefore this shall ye observe, and make it your law to do your business by the voice of the people." Book of Mosiah 13:36.

- 2. Each local church shall meet the third week in June, which shall be known as General Conference Week to consider all matters recommended to them from the conference of the ministry of the Church of Christ.
- 3. The acts of the minister's conference of the Church of Christ shall be reported to the local churches in the form of a supplement to the May issue of Zion's Advocate, and shall be so arranged as to provide a ballot on all measures submitted to the people's conference.
- 4. No discussion of the bills, and no matter other than that pertaining to the bills, shall be permitted in the supplement in which the ballots appear.
- 5. Local churches may initiate legislation by drafting measures to be presented to the minister's conference; and when so drafted said measures shall be presented to the conference in their original form; but after becoming the property of the conference they become subject to the same parliamentary rules that apply to all other measures. Local churches may also submit any other matter of general church interest, together with their recommendations, to the Council of Twelve, prior to the convening of the ministers' conference on April 6th of each year.
- 6. The Council of Twelve shall, at a convenient date, meet before the convening of the conference of the ministry to consider all matters presented to them, and to provide a tentative program for the conference of the ministry.
- 7. The conference of the ministry shall not be legislative; and while composed primarily of men holding the priesthood, all other members present shall be privileged to participate in the discussion of all measures, and to initiate legislation. The right to vote shall also be extended to them on all measures exempt from referendum by paragraph 8. All other acts of said conference shall be recommendations to the local churches.
- 8. All measures of church business adopted by the conference of the ministry shall be put to a referendum vote except matters of routine connected with the conference, appointment of missionaries by the Council of Twelve, filling of vacancies in quorums of the general ministry, either by selection or ordination, standing committees, and mere votes of sentiment.
- 9. All measures defeated in the conference of the ministry shall go to referendum vote if ten members of the conference of the ministry who are present when the action is taken request it of the conference.
- 10. No act of the conference of the ministry shall be binding upon the church until ratified by the people's conference composed of all the local churches, except as provided in paragraph 8.
- 11. Ballots shall be printed in such form as to provide for the individual vote, as well as the collective vote of the locals, the name and address of each voter to appear on, or to accompany the ballot supplement.
- 12. Scattered members may obtain ballots from the General Office, and may send their votes to their local churches, or to the General Church Recorder. Scattered members not belonging to locals should register their names with the General Recorder. Members of

- locals not voting with the People's Conference may forward their ballots the same as scattered members.
- 13. All votes must be reported to the General Recorder not later than July 31st. No vote received after that date shall be counted.
- 14. The compiling and publishing of referendum bills shall be under the control of a committee of three known as the referendum committee, except that all measures submitted to the ministers' conference in writing shall be sent as adopted by the conference, including all preambles and introductory clauses not eliminated by the conference.
- 15. Free and proper discussion of all measures to be proposed to the ministers' conference, and of all measures adopted by the conference and submitted to the people's conference, shall be permissable in any issue of the Advocate, subject to the discretion of the Editor, or editors.
- 16. Measures sent out to referendum may not be altered or amended. The vote must be a straight "yes" or "no" upon any bill or measure as it appears upon the ballot form.
- 17. The referendum committee in conjunction with the General Recorder shall, as soon as practicable after the close of the polls on July 31st, check the count of votes, tabulate the vote according to the returns and announce the vote in the next Advocate.

Phoenix, Arizona February 1, 1954

Apostle Arthur M. Smith, Secretary Council of Twelve Apostles Church of Christ (Temple Lot), Independence, Missouri

Dear Brother Smith:

Whereas, the rules and regulations governing the procedures of the Council of Twelve provide that, when an emergency arises, three members of the Council may call them together in emergency session, to consider the matter, therefore,

We, the undersigned, being convinced that an emergency so great confronts the whole Church, that makes it of paramount necessity for us to come together in fasting and prayer, to consider such matters as pertain to the gathering of the saints and the redemption of Zion, and a more complete setting in order of the affairs of the Church in harmony with God's holy will, that we, as the leading Council of the Church shall through this means seek to so unify ourselves before the Lord and the Church, as to present to the April conference such recommendations as may be deemed necessary in the premise.

In this regard, we cite the following commandment given to the Church as of Femruary, 1831, to-wit:

"Hearken, O ye elders of my church whom I have called: Behold I give unto you a commandment, that ye shall assemble yourselves together to agree upon my word, and by the prayer of your faith ye shall receive my law, that ye may know how to govern my church, and have all things right before me."—Book of Commandments, 43:3-4.

During this period of fasting and prayer before the Lord, we would that the whole Church be notified through the Advocate of such deliberations, and set this same period apart as a time of fasting and prayer with us, in their homes and local churches, . . "only let thy food be prepared in singleness of heart, that thy fasting may be perfect, or in other words, that thy joy may be full. Verily this is fasting and prayer; or, in other words, rejoicing and prayer." (Book of Commandments 60:22-23).

For this period, we recommend to all that as a church we refrain from all worldly activities which are not conducive to spiritual preparation for receiving the blessing of the Lord we thus seek.

In harmony with the above call, we hereby set the time as March 22nd to April 3rd, 1954; said meetings to convene in the quorum room of the Council of Twelve, on the Temple Lot, Independence, Missouri; and further, that on April 1st the General Bishops be invited to meet with us in joint session for deliberations affecting their work; and that on April 2nd and 3rd the Seventies be invited to join this council to consider jointly the extension of missionary work in their office and calling.

YE SHALL KNOW THE TRUTH AND THE TRUTH SHALL MAKE YOU FREE

Considering that the author of this statement, "ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free", is our Saviour, we have every reason to believe that all who want freedom should explore everything pertaining to the Master, that we may purchase our freedom. One writer puts it this way, "buy the truth and sell it not."

Our history holds up as one of the famous statements of our time, "Give me liberty or give me death," by Patrick Henry. To have liberty taken from a nation or a person does in effect render at least a partial death. However great we may consider Patrick Henry's heroic cry it can only be considered a faint murmur compared to "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." St. John 8:32.

There is only one way you or I can become free and that is to have from within a desire to know the truth. It has often been said, "There is no way to lift the top of your head and pour this wisdom in; you must get it yourself."

Countless thousands of efforts have been made to create a desire in the minds of all people to want to know the truth. As far as the whole is concerned these efforts have been fruitless, for it is true that most people are more content to have others think for them, and so long as this contentment shall continue there will be no true freedom.

The ability of the body to move about unrestrained, to act, or to refrain from acting, is not the meaning of freedom. I am sure this is not the understanding the Saviour wanted us to obtain.

The truth that shall set us free is that plan for which Christ gave His life to insure its testimony unto us, that which shall form Christ in us. This truth can only be received through much effort and sacrifice. Paul says in Galatians 4:19, "My little children, of whom I travail in birth again until Christ be formed in you." Webster says that travail means, "labor with pain, serve toil." If it was necessary for Paul to labor with severe toil, then need those who serve God today think they shall have the truth without effort?

We are very much aware that for every word of truth contained in the Gospel of Christ there have been many additions and subtractions cunningly applied to deceive the easy going, the more fearful, the "wishful thinker", the "I am in favor of the crowd" kind, just to name a few of the type who will have an opportunity to know the truth and become free, but will pass it by.

The Church of Christ is an "oasis" in a world without life. Those who really know her value have become aware of their hunger and thirst, and of the prison without walls in which they had existed. Picture in your mind, the traveler on a great desert out of water and very thirsty. He has been told that at a certain

point of the campo is a green, cool place with lots of fresh, cool water. He has been told that it will take lots of careful thinking, lots of courage, and most of all faith in the promise of salvation, if he is to reach the life-giving water. (It is written, Rev. 22:17, "Whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely.") Along the way of his toil and tribulation there appears the unreal or what is called the "mirage", just over the hill, or what seems to be only a little way of that which would appear to be much easier to attain. Now if he is wise, if he has set his conrse, made his election sure, this imitation will not cause him to lose his life. Should he lack the courage and desire to know the true way, his bones would soon bleach on the burning sands. The "mirage" of Christianity, of which there are many today, gives the hungry and thirsty who will not follow completely the instructions in the Bible and the added witness, the Book of Mormon, the feeling of reality. There are thousands of just such people in the socalled Restoration movement today. By the precepts of men they have built an "oasis" which they feel sure outshines the lowly Church of Christ. How appallingly true is the prophecy, that in the last days there shall be a famine in the land, not for food and water, but for hearing the word of the Lord. Amos 8:11-12. It is because of this famine that countless millions of people are in bondage, rushing here and there chasing the "mirage".

It has been said in latter day revelation that the Church of Christ is to be as Joseph. Joseph was the means the Lord used to save His people to whom he had made a promise. The Church of Christ is the means the Lord has made available to all who will come in and be numbered with the house of Jacob, to be heirs of that promise. Joseph made known to his family beyond all shadow of a doubt that he was fulfilling the will of the Lord. Just so it must be also with the Church of Christ in the last days.

To every member of the Church of Christ is laid the responsibility of good news bearer, to spread abroad the fact that stored up in its granaries is the spiritual food to bring about everlasting life. The means of spreading this news is available to all through tracts which may be had by writing to the Office Manager, Church of Christ (Temple Lot), box 472, Independence, Missouri. Let us think not of ourselves to be anything, for we were lost and never could have found our way back to God but for the Grace of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

SERMON BY BROTHER WILLIAM SHELDON

November 22, 1953

I wish to refer to a reading from Psalms, chapter 107, as a lesson, and I believe that it can be considered a lesson to us. We normally look upon the Psalms as perhaps not being so much in the way of a scripture lesson; but if we will read those things and get the beauty that is there, it can be a very wonderful lesson, to each of us. I will cite portions of it because it is a bit lengthy and I do not want to take up too much space in quotations.

"O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good; for his mercy endureth forever. Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, whom he hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy: And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west, from the north, and from the south. They wandered in the wilderness in a solitary way; they found no city to dwell in. Hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted in them. Then they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, and he delivered them out of their distresses. And he led them forth by the right way, that they might go to a city of habitation. Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! For he satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness.

"Fools because of their transgression, and because of their iniquities, are afflicted. Their soul abhorreth all manner of meat; and they draw near unto the gates of death. Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble,

and he saveth them out of their distresses. He sent his word, and healed them, and delivered them from their destructions.

"Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! Let them exalt him also in the congregation of the people, and praise him in the assembly of the elders. He turneth rivers into a wilderness, and the watersprings into dry ground; A fruitful land into barrenness, for the wickedness of them that dwell therein. He turneth the wilderness into a standing water, and dry ground into watersprings. And there he maketh the hungry to dwell, that they may prepare a city for habitation; And sow the fields, and plant vineyards, which may yield fruits of increase. He blesseth them also, so that they are multiplied greatly; and suffereth not their cattle to decrease. Again, they are minished and brought low through oppression, affliction, and sorrow. He poureth contempt upon princes and causeth them to wander in the wilderness, where there is no way. Yet setteth he the poor on high from affliction, and maketh him families like a flock. The righteous shall see it, and rejoice; and all iniquity shall stop her mouth. Whoso is wise, and will observe these things, even they shall understand the loving-kindness of the Lord.'

When this country has set aside a season to give thanks to our heavenly Father for the abundance of his mercies and temporal blessings that he gives to us in this land, I believe it is quite fitting that we should meet in such a capacity, for services.

I believe that it is fitting, more particularly, when we will look into the scriptures, which we hope to do today, and see the promises, the multitude of blessings, both temporal and spiritual, that God has promised to the people who inhabit this land. I want to emphasize particularly the spiritual blessings to which we may fall heir as a result of the goodness, the loving kindness of God toward us.

We are too often prone, as human beings, to look upon the things that we receive at the hand of God in the way of physical blessings, and forget the blessings of God that can come to us in far greater measure as a result of our obedience to those commandments that He has given, and thus be raised up and given spiritual life as well as to have that temporal life because of those blessings. I say, we are too prone to look upon those physical things, and consider them as being the paramount thing in our life; Yet, when we understand the scriptures, and recognize life as we see it around us today and see the shortness thereof, we can begin to understand, to some extent at least, just how important it is that we seek to submerge those things which are of a temporal nature, or those temporal desires, beneath the spiritual desires.

Now, I mention the blessings of God as pertaining to this land, and we hope to go into that to some extent in the scripture which has been given to us in these last days. I refer particularly to Ether, chapter one, where we find some very interesting facts that have been recorded for our profit and learning.

To most of us, this is familiar, but nevertheless it is good that we go over these things and perhaps we may come to an even greater understanding. Through diligent study of the scriptures, we can gain every time we read those scriptures, when we seek in the proper way.

There was a people, who had assembled themselves together and built the tower of Babel, as we find it recorded in the Bible. And they were all of one language; they were all the same people at that time. But because of the hardness of their hearts, and because of the increase of wickedness amongst them, the Lord saw fit to scatter them. To do that he confounded their language, as the Bible informs us, and he scattered them upon all the face of the land. We find in the Book of Mormon, a record of those people who were scattered, or of a portion of those people who were scattered. They were brought to this land, by the direction of God, because they had importuned God that he might not confound their language, and that he might bless them; though they recognized that they would also have to be scattered, as would all those who were with them in that place. And so, according to their faith and the goodness of God, He led this group of people to this land, and established them upon this continent. In the words of the prophet Ether, of that people, we find these words, beginning in verse

"And the Lord would not suffer that they should stop beyond the sea in the wilderness, but he would that they should come forth even unto the land of promise, which was choice above all other lands," that is this land of ours; a land of promise; choice above all other lands, "which the Lord God had preserved for a righteous people;

"And he had sworn in his wrath unto the brother of Jared, that whoso should possess this land of promise, from that time henceforth and forever, should serve him, the true and only God, or they should be swept off when the fullness of his wrath should come upon them."

They must serve the God of the land, or be swept off when the fullness of his wrath should come upon them. And I want us to understand that applies to whatsoever nation should possess this land. Let us keep that thought in mind.

"And now we can behold the decrees of God concerning this land, that it is a land of promise, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall serve God, or they shall be swept off when the fullness of his wrath shall come upon them.

"And the fullness of his wrath cometh upon them when they are ripened in iniquity; for behold, this is a land which is choice above all other lands; wherefore he that doth possess it shall serve God, or shall be swept off; for it is the everlasting decree of God.

"And it is not until the fullness of iniquity among the children of the land, that they are swept off.

"And this cometh unto you, O ye Gentiles, that ye may know the decrees of God, that ye may repent, and not continue in your iniquities until the fullness come, that ye may not bring down the fullness of the wrath of God upon you, as the inhabitants of the land have hitherto done.

"Behold, this is a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven." (But there is a qualification) "if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things which we have written."

The qualifications are there for the blessings of God upon the people; whatsoever people shall inherit this land. If they will serve the God of the land who is Jesus Christ, they will be kept from captivity, and from all other people. This pertains to us today, because we as a nation are afraid. Are there any who will dispute that fact? We are afraid of the other nations of the ear'h today, and well we might, because of the facts that we have not adhered to this admonition which is contained in both the Bible and the Book of Mormon: we must serve God, or suffer his wrath to come upon us.

This nation is not serving the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ, though its people say within their hearts, and confess with their mouth, that they believe upon the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

They go to their churches and their synagogues and make a pretense of worshiping God. When I say "they", I don't believe we can exclude everyone of the Church of Christ, and say that everyone else must receive that condemnation; that we ourselves are holy and pure in the sight of God, in every respect, and that it does not apply to us. I do not believe we can say that.

"In every nation he that feareth God, is accepted with him."

That is what the scripture says: "He that feareth God"; And, so it is with us today. Do we fear God? If we do, we are accepted of God, and if not, we are not accepted of Him. It does not make any difference if our names are upon the records of the Church of Christ.

Let me go on to another thought, which the scripture, as we find it in the Bible, brings to our attention. We hope to tie it in with those thoughts already presented, concerning the blessings of those who would inherit this land. In the days of the patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, God caused a special blessing to come upon them because of the faith that was manifested by Abraham. The Lord made a promise to Abraham, which was repeated to Isaac and Jacob; and the promise was, that in them and their seed should all nations of the earth be blessed. It gives us to understand that it was given because of the faith that was there manifested, and the yielding of obedience to the will of God. They were to receive this special recognition from God; they would become a multitude of nations. This blessing came down through the sons of Jacob, whom God had named Israel, which means chosen of God, or prince of God. Through Israel, then, we find that blessing coming to his twelve sons. In particular, it was given to Joseph and his seed.

In Genesis, chapter 48 we see Jacob, who was Israel, had been brought down into the land of Egypt, and there, as an old man, he blessed the sons of Joseph, his son. These sons of Joseph were Ephraim and Manasseh. And we find this language:

"And he blessed Joseph, and said, God, before whom my fathers Abraham and Isaac did walk."

There is the thought, "Before whom they did walk."

"The God which fed me all my life long unto this day . . ." We are desiring to give thanks unto God because we have been fed temporally; and shall we not give thanks to God because we are being fed spiritually, too? But let us read on:

"... the angel which redeemed me from all evil, bless the lads; and let my name be named on them, and the name of my fathers Abraham and Isaac; and let them grow into a multitude in the midst of the earth."

I am calling attention to those temporal blessings that were to come upon the children of Israel. We recognize that, because of their righteousness, God would bless according to the blessing that Jacob gave to the children of Israel, or his sons. God recognized that blessing, and the history of the world proves it. And history will yet prove the blessings of God to be upon them, and that too, because of their faith and their righteousness.

But let us refer to Deuteronomy chapter 33, and find there an additional blessing given by Moses to the children of Israel, and this blessing is to the whole house of Joseph.

"And of Joseph he said, Blessed of the Lord be **his** land, for the precious things of heaven, for the dew, and for the deep that coucheth beneath,

"And for the precious fruits brought forth by the sun, and for the precious things put forth by the moon,

"And for the chief things of the ancient mountains, and the precious things of the lasting hills, And for the precious things of the earth and fullness thereof

What a blessing! Incidentally, I could go on and read all of the blessings that were given to the children of Israel but you will not find one, to the other sons of Israel, which compares to that given Joseph, and consequently, to his sons, Ephraim and Manasseh. But let us go on:

"... and for the good will of him that dwelt in the bush: let the blessing come upon the head of Joseph, and upon the top of the head of him that separated from his brethren.

"His glory is like the firstling of his bullock, and his horns are like the horns of unicorns: with them he shall push the people together to the ends of the earth: and they are the ten thousands of Ephraim, and they are the thousands of Manazseh."

An old and well worn scriptural statement; but yet, what a promise. When we stop and consider who these people are, that are here represented as Ephraim and Manasseh; and take into account that they were to be blessed insomuch that they would become a multitude of people in the midst of the earth, then we can truly see the workings of God's hand, as far as this people upon this land is concerned. I believe it could be very well proved that the land spoken of is this land and we might refer to it once again. "Blessed of the Lord be his land," or Joseph's land; and it says, "for the precious things of heaven," etc.

When we consider the blessings that have been poured out upon this land in mineral wealth, and in every way, we know there is no nation upon the face of the earth that has been blessed like this country has or as this land has been. We can not just limit it to these United States of America, but this whole land has been blessed because it is Joseph's land; and being Joseph's land, it is the land of Ephraim and Manasseh. Ephraim is inhabiting this continent right now, and Manasseh also; the blessings were to come upon the

head of Joseph and upon the head of him that was separated from his brethren.

The Book of Mormon is primarily a record of a people who were descendants of Manasseh. This people were known as the people of Nephi. They came upon this continent many hundreds of years after the people of Jared had inhabited this continent.

Incidentally, just in passing, and in referring to the Jardites, I want to point out this thought in regard to that people: inasmuch as they served God they were blessed, but when the time came that they turned from their service to God, and began to worship idols, they became lifted up in the pride of their hearts and became ripened in their iniquity. And when that time came, they were swept off, just as the word of the Lord said they would be. They were swept off when the fullness of his wrath came upon them. They were destroyed by their own evil ways. Brother killed brother, insomuch that there was just one left from that great destruction of people.

Let us go back again to our consideration of the people of Nephi. Nephi was the son of Lehi who had been warned of God to flee from Jerusalem, because of the destruction that was to come upon that city, and upon that people. On page 6 of the Book of Mormon, we find these words that were given to Nephi through the operation of the Holy Spirit of God:

"And it came to pass that the Lord spake unto me, saying, Blessed art thou Nephi, because of thy faith, for thou hast sought me diligently," (thou hast sought me diligently) "with lowliness of heart.

"And inasmuch as ye shall keep my commandments...." Do you get the lesson there?

"And inasmuch as ye shall keep my commandments, ye shall prosper, and shall be led to a land of promise; yea, even a land which I have prepared for you; yea, a land which is choice above all other lands.

"And inasmuch as thy brethren shall rebel against thee, they shall be cut off from the presence of the Lord."

Yes, his brethren were led here too, just the same as Nephi, though the record tells us that they did not have the faith and the righteousness that Lehi and Nephi had. They were led here by the hand of God. And I wonder if there was not a purpose in that. God knew what kind of people they would be-these people of the brethren of Nephi. He knew they would be a wicked people, but he led them here for the selfsame purpose—that they might be blessed upon the land—if they would but worship him, who was Jesus Christ. But he knew, full well, that they would not worship him; that they would become a wicked and idolatrous people; that they would become loathsome, lazy and indolent. And I wonder, when I think upon these things, if God did not also have a purpose there. We are told in the scriptures that when we serve God and keep his commandments, that he blesses us, but when we begin to forget God; when we begin to be lax in our ways, in our worship, in our diligence, in our faith, in our desires toward him; then it becomes necessary that He chastise us. It becomes necessary for us to be afflicted, that we might begin to realize more fully that we must seek him, to walk in his ways.

And so it was with this people of the brethren of Nephi.

"And inasmuch as thy brethren shal rebel against thee, they shall be cut off from the presence of the Lord.

"And inasmuch as thou shalt keep my commandments, thou shalt be made a ruler and a teacher over thy brethren.

"For behold, in that day that they shall rebel against me, I will curse them even with a sore curse, and they shall have no power over thy seed, except they shall rebel against me also."

There is the thought. When the people of Nephi, who were the seed of Nephi, should rebel again God, then those who were wicked should have power over them.

"And if it so be that they rebel against me, they shall be a scourge unto thy seed, to stir them up in the ways of remembrance."

That is the way God works. He brings one people against another, that he might bring them to a remembrance of the ways of righteousness. And then the Lord will turn around and use that people whom he has used as a lash or a whip, and he will chastise and whip that nation whom he used. But why? Not because he would not do otherwise; not because he desires to give greater glory, greater blessings, greater honor unto one people than another—no, not because of that, but because they turn their hearts from him. Then it becomes necessary that he bring these chastisements upon them for their rebellion.

We find another example of the workings of God's power; He will bring a people upon a promised land, or upon a choice land, and will pour out blessings upon them inasmuch as they seek his face and seek to become submissive to all his commandments. And so it was with the children of Nephi.

Let us go over a little bit further in the scripture where we find that the Lord's spirit has come to Nephi once more, and he makes him to understand many things that would come to pass upon this land. He gives him an understanding of the blessings, and persecutions, and tribulations of his own seed; that is Nephi's seed. He also tells him concerning a people who would subsequently, or thereafter, inherit this land. On page 34, verse 145, we find the things that he saw:

"And it came to pass that I looked and beheld many waters; and they divided the Gentiles from the seed of my brethren."

Now, we would like to point out, in passing, that whereas the descendants of Nephi had previously been blessed, temporally and spiritually, upon this land, because of their righteousness; yet, in process of time, the very thing we referred to a while ago—that if they forgot the Lord their God they would be rebuked, and He would bring destruction upon them—we find that thing did happen. And so, they were destroyed as a people. And there was left upon the land, then for the most part at least, only those of the brethren of Nephi, that is, their seed. So, that is who is referred to when, because of their wickedness it says, "Behold the wrath of God is upon the seed of thy brethren."

"And I looked and beheld a man among the Gentiles, who was separated from the seed of my brethren by the many waters; and I beheld the Spirit of God, that it came down and wrought upon the man; and he went forth upon the many waters, even unto the seed of my brethren, who were in the promised land."

This has reference to Christopher Columbus, who came to this land; and it says that because of the workings of the Spirit of God upon him, he came from across the waters, among the Gentiles, to this promised land; to the seed of the brethren of Nephi.

"And it came to pass that I beheld the Spirit of God, that it wrought upon other Gentiles; and they went forth out of captivity, upon the many waters."

Get the thought: "Out of captivity".

"And it came to pass that I beheld many multitudes of the Gentiles upon the land of promise;

"And I beheld the wrath of God that it was upon the seed of my brethren; and they were scattered before the Gentiles; and were smitten."

That is plain history. All we have to do is go back into our history of these United States and see the fulfillment of that very thing; that the Lamanites, or the seed of the brethren of Nephi, would be scattered and smitten and destroyed.

"And I beheld the Spirit of the Lord, that it was upon the Gentiles; that they did prosper, and obtain the land for their inheritance; and I beheld that they were white, and exceeding fair and beautiful, like unto my people before they were slain.

"And it came to pass that I, Nephi, beheld the Gentiles who had gone forth out of captivity did humble themselves before the Lord, and the power of the Lord was with them."

I want to emphasize the thought in our minds, that those people did humble themselves before the Lord and thus the power of God was with them.

"And I beheld that their mother Gentiles were gathered together upon the waters and upon the land also, to battle against them."

"And I beheld that the power of $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$ was with them;"

And God was with this people of the Gentiles upon this land for it says,

"And I beheld that the power of $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$ was with them;"

"And also that the wrath of God was upon all those that were gathered together against them in battle.

"And I, Nephi, beheld that the Gentiles that had gone out of captivity were delivered by the power of God out of the hands of all other nations."

Now, I want to refer back to the statement from the Book of Ether, that whatsoever nation should possess this land, if they served God, they would be kept from captivity and from all other nations. And that comes right down just as surely today, as it applied to the people of Ether, and just as it applied to the people of Nephi, and of Laman, and all of their brethren. That promise is the same. Because God is the same yesterday, today and forever, and changes not,

only according to the desires of the children of men toward him, If their desires are toward him, then is his face toward them, but if they turn their hearts from him, then does he turn from them also. And so we find that there came upon this land a people whom God led out of captivity, and they scattered their enemies before them; any power that was brought against them was smitten, or, it had no effect upon our forefathers who came upon this continent, insomuch that there was established, upon this land, a free and independent government; blessed of God because He led the people here and they humbled themselves in such a way that his blessings could rest upon them. When we think back into our history and consider these early men who had part in the formation of this government, and even before the formation of this government; they began to see it was necessary that they should separate themselves from the parent countries.

There has come to my mind a thought that was presented in the Declaration of Independence. If I may, I would like to quote some of the opening thought, and it is the basis upon which they were going to es-

tablish their government:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal."

Is that not the way God would have it to be?

"That they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights. That among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Those were the thoughts which inspired our forefathers in the inception of this country; that they might be able to raise up a nation unto this land, which would serve God, and be able to obtain unto themselves those blessings of life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness; as well as the temporal things God would give them because of this land being a choice land. I believe we can say that certainly God's power and Spirit was upon them, that they were able to so ordain and establish a constitution and a government upon this land in such a manner that it would be instituted upon principles of righteousness and in belief toward God. Any nation that is founded upon any other principles must fail; they cannot long endure. And so, I believe that we are a blessed people above any nation upon the face of the earth, today, because of the fact that there has been that faithfulness manifested by our forefathers; and inasmuch as we ourselves have manifested faith toward God we have received the bounties of the goodness of God, insomuch that we enjoy the blessings of life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness that we do today. But I greatly fear because of things that we see in the nation, and among all of the nations of the earth. But we are primarily concerned because of conditions that exist here in this country. We do not want to dwell to extensively upon that, because as you may well see by reading your newspapers, and what you hear upon your radios, and what you see in every day life round about you, concerning the spiritual condition of the people in this country. We do not want to dwell too extensively upon worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." And their hearts are far from God. We find that condition existing today. We find a people turning from the true worship of God, and having only a form of godliness. That condition does exist, and yet, we are confident that inasmuch as there is a people, be they great or small, who will serve the Lord their God,

who will keep his commandments, who will flee from all evil, that the Lord's blessing is, yet, and will be, upon them just to that extent. But, if the time comes that his nation becomes too steeped in iniquity, and the Book of Mormon refers very specifically to some of the conditions that would be raised up amongst the people and gain a great hold upon them, then this nation is ripening for destruction.

We might just refer to that thought as it is recorded in the book of Ether, in chapter 3:

"And now I, Moroni, do not write the manner of their oaths and combinations. . . ."

He is speaking concerning the oaths and combinations of that ancient people which first inhabited this

"... for it hath been made known unto me that they are had among all people, and they are had among the Lamanites, and they have caused the destruction of this people of whom I am now speaking, and also the destruction of the people of Nephi:

"And whatsoever nation shall uphold such secret combinations, to get power and gain until they shall spread over the nation, behold, they shall be destroyed, for the Lord will not suffer that the blood of his saints which shall be shed by them, shall always cry unto him from the ground for vengeance upon them, and yet he avenge them not;

"Wherefore, O ye Gentiles," Now this is for us, "it is wisdom in God that these things should be shewn unto you, that thereby ye may repent of your sins, and suffer not that these murderous combinations shall get above you, which are built up to get power and gain, and the work, yea, even the work of destruction come upon you;

"Yea, even the sword of the justice of the eternal God, shall fall upon you, to your overflow and destruction, if ye shall suffer these things to be;

"Wherefore the Lord commandeth you, when ye shall see these things come among you...."

And do we see these things come among us? We certainly can, if we are not blind.

".... that ye shall awake to a sense of your awful situation, because of this secret combination which shall be among you, or wo be unto it, because of the blood of them who have been slain; for they cry from the dust for vengeance upon it, and also upon those who build it up.

"For it cometh to pass that whose buildeth it up, seeketh to overthrow the freedom of all lands, nations and countries:

"And it bringeth to pass the destruction of all people, for it is built up by the devil, who is the father of all lies; even that the same liar who beguiled our first parents;

"Yea, even that same liar who hath caused man to commit murder from the beginning; who hath hardened the hearts of men, that they have murdered the prophets, and stoned them, and cast them out from the beginning.

"Wherefore I, Moroni, am commanded to write these things, that evil may be done away, and that the time may come that Satan may have no power upon the hearts of the children of men, but that they may be persuaded to do good continually, that they may come unto the fountain of all righteousness and be saved." So, we see these things in the land, today, and perhaps we should begin to wonder at these things. I mean to wonder just how long we can expect the judgments of God be withheld from this nation. Just as surely as we go on in wickedness and permit these things to come to pass, and to grow within this country, just that surely can we expect the judgments of God to come upon this nation.

I do not want us to get the idea that we should become downcast, or less thankful, or in any degree discouraged because of conditions that we see. But rather, inasmuch as we, ourselves, can become that peculiar people that the scripture says we should be and walk according to the light that has been given in the scriptures by the Master of men, we can expect that God's blessing will be upon us. We can expect to find $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ hiding place in Christ where we can be preserved from those judgments of God that are coming upon this nation and upon all of the nations of the Gentiles, due to their disobedience. I believe we can lift up our heads and, yes, rejoice, because of the mercies of God toward us. We are made aware of those things, and have been given the gospel of Christ, which, to us, is greater food than the food we need for our bodies. We can rejoice because we have been given that bread from heaven, which is Christ, and which is the indwelling of the Holy Spirit through who we are strengthened and nourished unto life eternal.

For that we are thankful, but yet, we must realize that we ought, from this day to put on that soberness of thought, and faith toward God, and to develop righteousness within ourselves whereby we can let the world and the nation, this nation, go its way, as far as evil is concerned. Yes, we can pray for the nation and we ought to pray that God's Spirit would continue with it as long as possible. But we ought to pray for ourselves that we might be able to overcome evil, and to keep ourselves clean and unspotted from the world. The scripture says that we should come out of Babylon and be separated from her, that we might be able to escape the fiery darts which will be brought to bear against all evil.

We look forward to the time when this land will become an even more choice land in the sight of God; when there will be established that Zion of God, and righteous principles in the hearts of the children of men; where God himself can come down and be our God, as the scripture says He will.

So, let us lift up our heads, and rejoice in these things, and go forth in all soberness and thankfulness and desire toward God; that day by day we will look within ourselves and say, "Lord, help me this day that I may not be a partaker of evil ways, that I may not partake of the destruction that will come because of it.

From the Sunday School Quarterly Committee

How do you think and study?

Perhaps this may seem like a foolish question, but think for one moment and analyze its possibilities. Just what does the question mean?

First of all, let us break this question into parts and make two instead of one. No. 1. How do you think? No. 2. How do you study? They are two separate and distinct questions, although they are related very much as we shall see.

Question No. 1. "How do you think?" or stated anotaher way, "In what manner do you control and manage your mental processes?" The power to reason is a God-given ability allowed only to humans. This fact, in itself, confers a great deal of responsibility. It gives us the advantage of being able to understand our condition, and to plan and calculate measures to change those same conditions. Not only does the power to reason give us a command of our lives but also of the world around us, the animals and vegetation that happen to dwell in our sphere. This power and responsibility are God-given; consequently, we should remember how much we influence, and how many.

In order for one to think, or carry mental processes, in a logical and constructive manner, there must be an object for such activity. This object may be the needs of the body, such as food, clothing and shelter; self-esteem or admiration by the people with whom

one lives; or the salvation of the soul. The latter goal is the one we, as Christian people, should be very, very interested in.

After the object or goal has been established, a pattern of thinking must be laid out, very much in the same manner as a blue print. If a pattern is not developed, then a great deal of energy will be spent in the resulting confusion. Futile effort will be used on unimportant facts that become useless or errorful conclusions. To use a hackneyed expression "one will not able to see the forest for the trees".

Now let us look at the second question. How do you study? The study means the mental process of obtaining knowledge about a subject or art. In other words the process of examining, with the mind, in order to understand all of the intimate details of a subject or art.

So we see that in many cases the process of thinking or studying will be one and the same.

To us, as Christians, the gospel of Christ is the most important subject we study. The subject we study, first by reading, or hearing, then by thinking about it. By what pattern do you think? Study? One cannot wander aimlessly through the Bible and Book of Mormon. Aimless wandering yields an abundance of disconnected facts that form as many disconnected conclusions.

The question in the title is uppermost in the minds of the Sunday School Quarterly Committee. How do you think and study? Everyone has a pattern which they use for themselves or as a guide for their children. Take a few minutes of your time and write us a letter. Tell us how you go about your study, or how you guide your children. Perhaps from your letters, we on the committee, will be able to construct patterns of study that will help others.

To use another overworked expression, "United we stand, divided we fall." Perhaps we might put it another way, "United we find salvation, divided we wander in confusion."
