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EDITORIAL

-BEHIND GOD'S BACK-

"Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Gal. 6:7.

Ever since Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit in the Garden of Eden, mankind has been trying to "get away" with something—hoping God would be too busy watching someone else to find them out.

It is a very human trait and we find it in little (and some not so little) children who do things, behind their parent's back—things they wouldn't think of doing in their presence. We find it in grown-ups who evade moral and legal obligations if no one is present to enforce compliance; from failing to put a nickle in the parking meter to the keeping of sacred vows to both man and God.

Our man made laws have officers to enforce them, and if we break the law behind the officer's back, there is no penalty—there is no penalty unless caught. God's laws have no enforcing officers and there is no escape from the penalty of breaking them, even though we sometimes think we are "getting away" with something, behind God's back!

"Thou hast set our iniquities before thee, our secret sins in the light of thy countenance." Psa. 90:8.

"For mine eyes are upon all their ways: they are not hid from my face, neither is their iniquity hid from mine eyes." Jer. 16:17.

"Can any hide himself in secret places that I shall not see him? saith the Lord. Do not I fill heaven and earth? saith the Lord?" Jer. 23:24.

All of this life is preparation for the life to come, but we sometimes forget this fact and try to "get by" with only that part of our life that is spent in church or before people we wish to impress. We are like children who act like imps when alone and are little angels when in the company of their elders.

Paul admonishes us to "be no more children, tossed to and fro, but speaking the truth in love . . . grow

up into him even Christ:" The adult Christian realizes that human character is made up from all of life's "little" moments and as such there are no unimportant moments in life.

There are many reasons why we should strive for maturity in Christian growth and development. Our lives will be richer, fuller and happier. There will be no lurking fear of being caught, no secret dread that our sins will find us out—and because of this we will have more balance and poise in our thoughts and actions. There will be no shame in the example we set, for those whose lives we cught, and hope to influence will find stability and reason in our actions.

How it pains us to hear, "Well you were no angel when you were young", and to know the words are true. We realize then that the little seemingly unimportant things do have big life values. For as Rev. Roy L. Smith has said:

"It is while you are doing little things well that you get ready for big ones.

It is while you are resisting small temptations that you grow equal to big ones.

It is while you are careful about trifles that you are making perfection possible.

It is while you are doing your day's work that you are building your character."

Some of life's great marvels come from tiny things. The Redwood tree bears a small cone the size of a hen egg, which contains about 280 seeds, yet one of those tiny seeds has grown into a tree large enough to provide lumber to build forty, five-room houses! And some of those trees have stood for 4,000 years! We must never minimize the little everyday actions which help to make us what we are. Even the opinions we express, reveal our real self to others, and will be an influence for either good or bad. In this respect we are our brother's keeper.

The company we keep because of this power of influence is greatly important—we do not gather figs of thistles, nor do we hear sermons in Road Houses.

The books we read influence thought beyond all calculation, Charles Kingsley wrote: "Except a living man there is nothing more wonderful than a book! A message to us from the dead—from human souls we never saw, who lived, perhaps, thousands of miles away. And yet these, speak to us, arouse us, terrify us, teach us, comfort us, open their hearts to us as brothers".

A good book can not be acquired too early. A bad book can not be disposed of too soon. John Quincy Adams said: "The Bible is the book of all others to be read at all ages and in all conditions of human life. I speak as a man of the world to men of the world, and I say "Search the Scriptures". And G. W. Curtis said; "Books are the ever-burning lamps of accumulated wisdom".

We sing the song "Moment by Moment" and truly it is what we do with our time that time does to us.

How futile it is to even think of escaping God's

attention. Christ said: "Are not five Sparrows sold for two farthings, and not one of them is forgotten before God? But even the very hairs of your your head are all numbered. Fear not therefore: ye are of more value than many sparrows." Luke 12:6-7.

Many wrongs done under the name of Christianity are hoped to have been done behind God's back. Those who use these deeds as an excuse to avoid Christian life, are blind with an unexcusable blindness, for Christ said of such—"If I had not come and spoken unto them, they had not had sin: but now they have no cloak for their sin." John 15:22.

Many good meaning people who serve God at their own convenience and assure themselves they are good Christians because of the things they have not done—will be surprised how unacceptable their service is to God who demands—"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." Duet. 6:5. And Christ reaffirmed this law in Matt. 22:37.

It is the day by day living of a Christian life that makes us really Christians, not some church name, nor loud protestations of our virtue. There is no day too late, nor hour too short to be unimportant in any man's life.

Henery Van Dyke said: "There is only one way to get ready for immortality and that is to love this life and live it as bravely and faithfully and cheerfully as we can".

At the reguest of your Auditing Committee, consisting of Mr. Denver G. Chapman, Mr. Leslie P. Case and Mr. Harvey Seibel, I have made an examination of the books of account of the Church of Christ (Temple Lot), maintained by Mr. Vance H. Harris, Business Manager for the fiscal year ended February 28, 1963 and present herewith my report including the following statements:

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures for the year ended February 28, 1963.

EXHIBIT B

Statement of General Fund Expenditures for the year ended February 28, 1963.

These statements are subject to the following comments:

Cash Receipts and Expenditures Exhibits A and B

The verification of cash receipts was confined to comparing data on the copies of the receipts issued by the Business Manager with the corresponding entries in the cash book and comparing the totals of these entries with the total deposits made to the bank accounts.

All disbursements were by checks which contain information regarding the nature of the disbursements. Thus each check, when endorsed by the payee, constituted a receipt for the purpose indicated thereon. The checks were signed jointly by the Business Manager and the Secretary of the Bishopric. Verification consisted of examining the checks paid by the bank and comparing them with the cash book entries. The balances in the banks at the close of the year were confirmed by certificates received from its depositories.

The new office equipment purchased as shown under General Office Expenses consisted of the following items:

The Business Manager stated that the Bishopric authorized the transfer of the Yucatan Building Fund of \$93.80 and the Agency Funds of \$15.00 to the General Fund. Including these items, the General Fund receipts exceeded the expenditures by \$1,415.41.

In addition to the cash balances shown, the only other assets recorded on the books are real estate and equipment at nominal values.

The books are kept on a cash basis. We were informed by the Business Manager that there were no unpaid bills at the close of the year.

The cash balances shown on exhibit A as of February 28, 1963, are equivalent to the fund equities (excluding real estate and equipment).

General

Fire and extended coverage insurance is carried in the amount of \$20,000.00 on the church building and \$5,000.00 on the contents. The policy contains a 90% co-insurance clause. A fidelity bond is carried on the Business Manager.

The books were well kept and full cooperation was extended to me in connection with the examination.

I Cor. 12:31

July 4th is the anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence in 1776, an act which makes July one of the most important months to Americans. We are reminded each year of the great sacrifices Americans of past generations have made that we might have the liberty to live as free men.

Has this date also reminded us of the grave responsibility this freedom has placed upon us? Paul said, "... where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty." II Cor. 3:17.

It is a definite thing, we cannot learn to live with Christ unless we learn to live with each other first. Therein lies our responsibility.

One of the greatest and most important tasks before us is to conduct our lives in a manner which is pleasing to God. By properly conducing our own lives we become examples of good Christian living that will influence the lives of those with whom we are associated, and this is especially true of our children. There is no better way of teaching them to live a happy, Godly life together than for parents to practice living such a life at home.

If we are to influence our children toward God, and away from Communism, we should have a creed to live by. There are some things spoken of in the Book of Mosiah, chapter 2, pages 220 and 221 which, if they are adhered to, will give us a firm foundation upon which to build our creed. "Believe in God; believe that he is, and that he created all things, both in heaven and in earth;

Believe that he has all wisdom, and all power, both in heaven and in earth;

Believe that man doth not comprehend all things which the Lord can comprehend.

. . . . Believe that ye must repent of your sins and forsake them, and humble yourselves before God; and ask in sincerity of heart that he would forgive you: And now, if you believe all these things, see that ye do them, . . . as ye have come to the knowledge of the glory of God and have tasted of his love and have received a remission of your sins that ye should remember . . . the greatness of God and your own nothingness, and his goodness and long suffering towards you unworthy creatures, and humble yourselves even in the depths of humility, calling on the name of the Lord daily, . . . and behold, I say unto you, that if ye do this, ye shall always rejoice, and be filled with the love of God, . . . and ye shall grow . . . in the knowledge of that which is just and true, and ye will not have a mind to injure one another, but live peaceably, and to render to every man according to that which is his due."

These are things which we are parents, as mature citizens of God's Kingdom, and as citizens of free countries of the world should make an effort to live by. These are things which should rule our every action toward our fellowmen, regardless of nationality or creed. If all men were to do this, there would be no fear in the hearts of men. People would not be threat-

ened with annihiliation and there would be no need to hide in an underground shelter to escape nuclear warfare.

We can hardly expect a generation which has been weaned away from the love of God by the desire for power, to want peaceful co-existence. Those who live behind the iron curtain are taught to hate, and to worship power.

Former Vice-President Nixon said, "When Mr. Krushchev says our grandchildren will live under Communism, let us say his grandchildren will live in freedom."

Freedom is something we lose through complacent living. In this day and age a complacent relationship between parents and children could easily cause our grandchildren to live under Communism. On the other hand a consistantly alert relationship between parents and children in good Christian homes could help Krushechev's grandhcildren to live in freedom.

God has charged us, as believers, with the grave responsibility of teaching our children to walk in the ways of truth and righteousness. We must not rationalize that responsibility by refering to the failure of past generations to adhere to God's admonition.

I wish to quote three more very important verses from the Book of Mosiah. They are important because today we live, the past is dead, but tomorrow the responsibility of church and government will be in the hands of our children. Therefore it is important that the children of today be trained in the ways of truth and righteousness.

"... ye will not suffer your children, that they go hunrgy, or naked; neither will ye suffer that they transgress the laws of God, and fight and quarrel one with another, and serve the devil, who is the master of sin, ... he being an enemy to all righteousness. But ye will teach them to love one another, and to serve one another; ..." Mosiah 2:25-27.

That is the responsibility we are charged with. It is not an easy task if it is properly done. God never promised us an easy life, but He did promise us a reward of peace and comfort if we fulfilled our purpose.

We were put here for a purpose. To be fruitful and replenish the earth. .To help establish the cause of Zion and help work out the salvation of man and to be co-creators with God.

Being given the task, first, of creating within ourselves a humble heart filled with the pure love of God, that we might be able to build or create, the capacity and desire to love and serve one another in the hearts of our children.

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover wrote, "The only answer to juvenile delinquency is to make better parents. The way to reestablish the greatness of the American Republic is simply to renew the practice of saying grace at meals, family prayers in the morning, and family prayers at night. To set before the children a decent and righteous Christian life. This is all simple, but if we do not maintain these institutions of faith and

morality this free nation will slowly but surely crumble beneath our feet."

The front page stories on our newspapers say: In Rome students rioted, killing people and doing damaged to property. In Turkey students rioted with the same results. In Japan students rioted in an effort to destroy free government. In our own country students rioted over political and racial issues.

Students rioting. Young people still dependent upon their parents, being swayed by mob psychology, Communism in many cases, killing and injuring their fellowmen, damaging property and homes.

One of the principles of Communism is to eliminate all religion from the world. There is no place in Communism for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Students in many colleges of the world are led into disbelief and worldiness, mainly because they were not influenced to love and serve God in the homes of their parents. Are you willing to have your children face such problems unprepared?

The best insurance we can give our children against such evil influences is a firm frundation in the Gospel of Christ. If they are thoroughly taught to live by the principles of the Gospel, in the home and in the church they are insured for life, and the policy will not expire, for the Gospel is eternal.

Parents are repaid in either joy or sorrow. Joy, if they build in their children a Godly character that will withstand sin and wrong living. Sorrow, if by neglect and over indulgence their children are morally weak, not being able to withstand the temptations of life.

Paul said, "... be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity... give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine, neglect not the gift that is in thee... for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee." I Tim. 4:11-16.

Is it too much for us to set as our goal a more perfect Christ-like life? That through our living others might find the joy and happiness that comes through friendship with God.

Beginning to day and every day of our lives, let us be mindful of this important date in the history of our country, the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, and what it means to us. Let us unite with people everywhere who are dedicated to keeping freedom alive in the world. We can do this by teaching and living by the principles of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

TO THE ADVOCATE AND ITS READERS

May 9th, 1963

Dear Brethren:—

Just a few moments ago, my companion and I bid farewell to Brothers C. L. Wheaton and E. L. Yates and watched them drive down the road to continue their journey to the Yucatan. There they shall labor with our brethren of that area to strengthen the church and the faith of the membership. Striving, not only to convert souls, but to bring the good news of the Master, the gospel of Jesus Christ to those that have yet unheard of it. I must testify that, though the challenge is great, we can rely on the abilities of the men the church has assigned to this task.

I say, the challenge is great, and yet, I look around and see that the field is ripe. Only yesterday in the local newspaper statistics on a recent census were given. While I don't remember the exact figures, the figures I do give are close. This census pertained to the religious divisions in this country. Some seventy-eight thousand people claim membership in Protestant churches (this includes all of the Protestant churches and our group in Yucatan). Some 131,000 persons claim to be athiests, almost double of the total Protestant membership. The remaining 34 million-plus are Catholics. For emphasis, I'll repeat; the field is ripe, but the challenge is great, there is much work to be done, but we are hampered by the laws of this land.

Three days ago, Brothers Wheaton and Yates, though Brothers in Christ with me and my family, were complete strangers to us. I came home from the market Tuesday afternoon and found them in the living room visiting with my wife and children. While I had ofttimes heard their names, their faces were unfamiliar to me. But having been isolated in Mexico for the past nine months, it was good to visit with brethren of like faith. We invited them to stay at our home and that evening, were richly rewarded in a communion, prayer and testimony service.

Wednesday night, we enjoyed viewing the slides of the Maya Ruins in the Yuctan that Brother Wheaton showed us. We invited some friends in to view them with us. They, too, expressed much interest in the slides and in hearing the story.

About a week before our brethren stopped here,

my two young sons expressed their desire to be baptized. This morning, we had the privilege of witnessing another ordinance in the church as my sons were laid under the water and brought up out of the water by Brother Yates. We used the pool of a nearby motel for this ordinance. The manager, who is a good friend of ours, graciously consented to allow us to use the pool. We then returned home for the confirmation, a good meal and a farewell prayer. And thus it was that Brothers Wheaton and Yates continued on their way, leaving behind them lasting memories of rich spiritual experiences, and many friends. Truly the power of God is evident in the ministry of these men, but they need our prayers, too. Please remember them.

The heart is not visible to the human eye, and sometimes human patience would fail at the slowness of the bud to open. But any ultra force will produce only an unnatural, twisted flower, as dead as though it had never lived at all.

How good, if we could become like a little child, thinking from our hearts, seeing beneath the sophisticated surface shell of others, remembering that God always works from within-with marigolds, and with men.
