THE DYNAMICS OF SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

Text: "And Jesus increased in wisdom, and stature, and in favor with God and man." Luke 2:52.

Other versions:



And as Jesus grew older He gained both in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man.—Weymouth.

As Jesus grew up he advanced in wisdom and in favour with God and men.—The New English Bible.

Introduction:

From the scripture, as above quoted as a text, we find that Jesus passed through four stages of development; intellectual, physical, spiritual and social.

Therefore, when we speak of the "dynamics of spiritual development," we refer to that system of spiritual forces which produces within us the highest degree of righteousness and godliness, and inspires in our hearts and souls an adherence to the truth revealed of God through His Son, Jesus Christ.

Statement of Principle

"God has stamped the principle of increase on every object of His animate creation. Look where we will, the most intelligent and highest of all of God's creation, seems to profit the least by the operation of that law."—John R. Haldeman.

This priciple, therefore, can be, with propriety designated as the "divine law of increase," and as the disciples of Jesus Christ, we fail to grasp the meaning of His example, when we fail to apply this dynamic force that impells us to exemplify Him in our lives.

From the texts, which we quoted from the three

versions of the Holy Scriptures, we learn that "as Jesus grew older" He gained, He advanced, He increased in acquiring those dynamic forces of growth which made Him the outstanding "manifestation of God" that the world has ever known.

Why?

Because, as He grew older, He demonstrated in His life the "divine law of increase."

First Principle of the Dynamics of Spiritual Development:

He gained, He advanced, He increased in wisdom.

What is Wisdom?

It is knowledge practically applied to the best advantage. It is natural sagacity; prudence; skill; and piety.

The wise man has truly said, "Happy is the man that findeth wisdom, and the man that getteth understanding." (Proverbs 3:13, see also 14-20).

But we must not over look the fact that there exists two forms of wisdom, spiritual wisdom and worldly wisdom, between which we must choose by discernment and care, if **we** shall gain ground from a righteous stand point.

How We Shall Acquire Wisdom:

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed." (James 1:5-6)

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; α good understanding have all they that do his commandments: his praise endureth for ever." (Psa. 111:10)

Why We Should Have Wisdom:

Because the "Heart of the wise teacheth his mouth, and addeth learning to his lips." (Proverbs 16:23)

Thus we see that to acquire godly wisdom is essential to spiritual growth, as it is stated in the scripture, "How much better is it to get wisdom than gold! and to get understanding rather to be chosen than silver." (Prov. 16:16)

Second Principle of the Dynamics of Spiritual Development:

He gained, He advanced, He increased in stature.

What Is Stature?

It is the height of a man. We can with propriety make a double application of this principle, for we find that Christ not only grew in physical stature or health, but He also grew in spiritual stature, thus demonstrating to us that this dynamic force of increase was manifested.

As an example of such growth we take the case of Zacchaeus who was of small stature physically. By effort and the application of wisdom he had the genius

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to overcome his handicap, and thus to grow spiritually as well:

"And Jesus entered and passed through Jericho. And behold there was a man named Zacchaeus, which was the chief among the publicans, and he was rich.

And he sought to see Jesus who he was; and could not for the press, because **he was small of stature.**

And he ran before, and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him: for he was passing that way.

And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and saw him and said unto him, Zacchaeus, make haste, and come down; for today I must abide in thy house.

And he made haste, and came down, and rereceived him joyfully.

And when they saw it, they all murmured, saying, That he was gone to be guest with a man that is a sinner.

And Zacchaeus stood, and said unto the Lord: Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor, and if I have taken any thing from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold. And Jesus said unto him, This day is salvation come to this house, forsomuch as he also is a son of Abraham.

For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." (Luke 19:1-10)

Thus while Zacchaeus was not able to take thought and add one cubit to his physical height, yet by fore-thought and wisdom he was able to overcome the handicap of being little of stature, and as the result "salvation" or spiritual height came to his house, and as one that was lost he was saved by the power of Christ.

And here we give a quotation from the Weymouth version of the Bible to show in plain and simple words that the measure of a man of God is guaged by his spiritual stature:

"And He Himself appointed some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, some to be pastors and teachers, in order fully to equip His people for the work of serving—for the building of Christ's body—till we all of us arrive at oneness in faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God, and at mature manhood and the stature of full-grown men in Christ." (Ephesians 4:13)

Spiritual development is further expressed in terms of stature as being:

"Dependent on Him the whole body—its various parts closely fitting and firmly adhering to one another—grow by aid of every contributing link, with power

proportioned to the need of each individual part, so as to build itself up in a spirit of love." (Ibid verse 16)

Thus we see that the secret of this dynamic force or power of spiritual development resolves itself into being of mature manhood and the stature of full-grown men in Christ in which we grow, or increase in spiritual power, so that each member or contributing link builds its self up in a power house of love in Christ.

Third Principle of the Dynamics of Spiritual Development:

Christ gained in Favor, Christ advanced in favor, Christ increased in favor with God.

This then, is an important feature of spiritual increase or development, to grow, mature as full-grown men in Christ, that we might increase in favor with God.

How We Do This.

First: by faith in God, for "without faith it is impossible to please him." (Hebr. 11:6)

Second: by obedience; for "to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams." (I Saml. 15:22)

Third: by example, for Christ exemplified God in the flesh, therefore, He gained in favor with His Father in heaven, He drew men to God demonstrating the power of love in action among the children of men; He brought about the redemption of mankind; he intervened for them and justified them through righteouness; He gave them courage to overcome the transgressions which separated them from God; He brought salvation to all mankind that would accept it; He called men to godly service; He shared with them the secret of spiritual growth; and demonstrated the benefits of righteousness by manifesting the gifts of the gospel in His associations with man. Thus He gained favor with God.

To be like Him, and gain the same stature, we must emulate Him in our lives.

Fourth: Christ grew in favor with God because He developed within Himself the character and conduct of godliness; He was true to His purpose in life; He was honourable in His conduct toward others; He sustained the righteous that accepted Him as their spiritual leader and guide; He was God manifest in the flesh; He was one with God, in spirit and purpose and dedicated His life to that end and prayed for us thus, "Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are." (John 17:11). Thus we see the unity of God and His Christ, and His desire that we might share and be partakers of that oneness.

Fourth Principle of the Dynamics of Spiritual Development:

He gained, He advanced, He increased in favor with men.

Why? Because He had grown in wisdom; in spiritual stature; in favor with God, thus manifesting a noble personality that inspired men to accept Him as a friend and a leader.

He was a man!

He did not live to Himself; He was not a hermit nor a recluse; He mingled with men; He met them socially: He discussed their problems; He healed their sick; He had compassion even for His enemies; He displayed the milk of human kindness.

He was a man of God!

SPOTLIGHTS OF OUR HISTORY

LEARNING THE GOSPEL THE HARD WAY

How much does the Gospel of Jesus Christ mean to you, that gospel which He brought to the children of men both at Jerusalem and to the inhabitants on this land, revealing himself to them as the very Son of God? Do you really believe that the children of men, after having received such a personal visit and service from their Creator, wandered so far from Him, on both continents, that they brought upon the whole world a drought of the word of God? Do you believe that after many generations, called the Dark Ages, the Gospel was restored in these latter days by means of an Angel appearing to an unlearned young man and directing him in his part in that great event as the prophets had foretold? Just how much does that mean to you? Does it mean enough to you that you could change your whole way of life?

I knew a man, now passed on to his reward, to whom at one time it meant nothing. He was born in Ohio in 1834 and lived his earlier years in Illinois assisting his father, from earliest childhood, in running a ferry on the Mississippi River. That man was my maternal grandfather, George P. Frisbey. He grew up at a time when there was a lot of discussion in all circles, both for and against the Book of Mormon, which had so recently made its appearance. Some claiming the coming forth of that book was in fulfillment of prophecy; an added witness for Jesus Christ and the truthfullness of the Bible; and others trying to move heaven and earth in an effort to discredit it. The Latter Day Saints had been driven out of Missouri and into Illinois where he lived.

So my grandfather had heard a great deal about this new book, pro and con; but since his family was not at that time interested in religion of any kind, and being a large family which must be fed, the children as well as adults worked hard and lived pretty much the rough life of the river worker of that day. The men of his family and even the boys used tobacco, drank when they felt inclined and thought nothing of

taking the name of the Lord in vain. As would be true of most boys, the things he heard the adults discussing remained in his memory even though he was not particularly concerned or interested. Time went on and he married, and had three or four little children when he got interested in the California gold rush. He had bought a farm in Illinois and had some stock.

So he left his young wife to run the farm and take care of the young family and he set out to win his fortune (he hoped, as many another man did) in order to provide a better living for them. River life had been rough but gold-rush life was rougher. He worked and panned gold in several different places, zealously hoarding all he could save. They usually found a partner or sometimes three or four would be partners. They bunked in cabins which they built of whatever material was to be had, doing their own cooking mostly and washing out their own clothes in the streams. They would trade gold for sugar, flour, beans, tobacco, etc.

Sometimes their partners were honest, sometimes they were not. Often the men hid their gold in bags, cans or bottles under the rough board floors of their cabins, sometimes they buried them in the ground outside. Sometimes a man would come home to find his "trusted" partner had absconded with all the gold they had between them, leaving no trace of where he could be found. All these things had happened to my grandfather at one time or another but at the particular time I want to tell you about, he had two partners who were honest and trustworthy. They had accumulated a sizable amount of gold when they heard of a new, rich strike, and they decided to "pull up stakes" and get to this new place before the rush began. (I can't remember just where Grandpa said it was.) They divided their gold so that if something happened to one, the others would still have theirs. Each hiding his portion on his person, they began their journey.

Most of their traveling in those days was on foot. In order to reach their destination they had to cross a large river. There had been heavy rains and the river (I can't remember what river he said) was a raging torrent, but they must cross without unnecessary delay if they were to get ahead of the mad rush for gold. So they decided to build a raft to get them across. They built it good and sturdy. With their supplies on board, they started across, but that wild mountain stream was too much for it and the raft was soon battered to pieces. Though my grandfather was an old river man and had weathered many floods, he was helpless this time. He saw his partners both drown and all their supplies, including all the gold, go down the river. He clung to a piece of the raft, but felt sure it was useless.

In his desperation he turned to that God whom he had heard about; but had given little thought to. He remembered "that book" which "Joe Smith" was sup-

posed to have translated by the power of God. He instinctively knew, that experienced on rivers or not, he would drown as his buddies had unless God came to his rescue. So he prayed to God with all the earnestness of the soul within him. With the hungry river grabbing at him to such him into its whirling angry maelstrom, he made a vow to that Great God who made us all.

His vow was this: "If you will save my life and help me get home to my wife and family, I will investigate 'that book' (meaning the Book of Mormon)." He said he never really knew how he got to shore but soon he was on solid ground, all his supplies and all his gold gone, but his life was spared and he lost no time in heading for home.

God had done what he had asked of Him, now it was up to him to fulfill his part of the vow. How was he to seriously, earnestly, honestly investigate a book without reading it? How could he read it? He had never gone to school in his life. He could neither read nor write. He had to just make a mark when he was required to sign his name. (That seemed strange to me when I was a child, but since I have been grown and in missionary work, I have known many people in many places who made a cross mark or some other mark for their name because they too, could neither read nor write.) But that was quite a common thing in Grandpa's day. There were no free schools as we have and few people could afford tutors or to send their children to a pay school. Even pay schools were in session only in the season when the farm work was slack and closed through the harvest and other busy seasons because every child and every adult had to help during the busy seasons to save the crops for that was their living for both man and beast.

My grandfather pondered the problem of how he was going to learn to read. The wealth in gold which he had hoped to have on returning home, was somewhere in the bottom of that raging river. It is a long way from those California mountains clear back to Illinois and he had lots of time to ponder as he trudged along, most of the way on foot. I wish I could remember more of the details of his travels out there as well as the trip back, but it is too sketchy in my memory to recall if he was able to travel with the wagon trains part of the way, but part of the time was absolutely solo. There were skirmishes with the Indians but he didn't talk about that much as I remember, but spoke more of his religious experiences. At least that was what made the most lasting impression on me.

He had left his young wife with a new baby just a few months old and when he returned, she was four years old. As I recall, they had not heard from each other in all that time. There was no such thing then as U.S. Mail and even if there had been, California was not yet a part of the United States. Mail was carried by stage coach and by wagon train, even

that was very uncertain and meager. He may have been able to send a word to her by someone (a verbal message for he could not write), though I doubt it. She could not send word to him for she could not have known where he was. They moved from one digging to another.

An idea began to take form in his mind as he traveled along toward home, and I am sure, as was he, that the Lord inspired it—for He helps those who make an effort to help themselves. He would find some boy or young man who would like to go to school; he would give him a home with his family, board him, clothe him, pay his tuition and buy his books; the boy could help with the chores, go to school and teach Grandpa each night what he had learned that day. He knew it was an opportunity that any boy would be happy to get in those days.

So he finally arrived in Illinois and was making his way up the old lane with his little pack on his back to his farm home. He could make out the form of his wife in the yard with the baby daughter (now four years old) in her arms, or rather up on her shoulder, watching to see who this unshaven, disheveled, dirty stranger was who dared trespass upon her property. As he drew near enough for her to recognize him, she forgot everything else except that he was back home. The "over-sized baby" dropped in the dust at her feet as she ran with open arms to welcome her husband home.

She acquiesced in his plan to get an education and he had no trouble finding a bright, dependable young lad of 14 years who was anxious to learn and co-operate and the process of education began and developed switfly and before too long my grand-father was reading and studying the Book of Mormon, a thing which he never ceased to do as long as he lived after that (which was to a ripe old age of 84). However this type of formal education was through the fourth grade only.

He received, as the promise is given in the Book of Mormon, a testimony of it's truthfulness. He turned from the use of tobacco and all the other habits of his younger days. Never in my life did I ever hear him use even a "mild swear word." The gospel of Jesus Christ had first place in his life from then on. Many of his family came into the Church through his efforts. I have many fond memories of staying with my grandparents and never did we retire at night without his reading a passage of scripture or have one of us read, and having prayer together.

After his first wife died shortly after the Church's return to Missouri in 1867, he married Evaline Angela Bradley, my mother's mother, who was the daughter of James and Nancy Bradley of Bloomington, Ill. Nancy Bradley had been baptized by Joseph Smith in July 1831, as he and others were on their way to Independence to dedicate the Temple Lot. Joseph Smith was later staying at their home (the Bradley's) when

the officers of the law came and arrested him and placed him in jail just before he was killed.

My grandmother was of a family who were more education conscious, or at least had more means for it, she herself had taught school some in her younger years and no doubt was a great help to my grandfather in that respect. I have been made to marvel, when I have read his articles published in our early Church papers, at his ability to express himself. But I have marveled most at his ability to completely change his life and outlook on life and I am sure that it was his earnest desire to be in complete subjection to his Heavenly Father which enabled him to become master of himself and to so completely change himself. I do not mean to minimize the power of God but God will not take hold of us and change us into what we should be unless we ourselves sincerely desire that change sufficiently to put forth the effort ourselves to bring about the change in us. He will help us but He will not do it for us.

The crucifying of the flesh and bringing it into subjection to God's will is a task He has placed upon us individually. Does the Gospel of Jesus Christ mean enough to you to cause you to bring about the changes in your own nature that are necessary to bring you into complete subjection to God's will?

Now let us look into this gospel mirror, or this perfect law of liberty. We are begotten or born into the family of God with the word of truth or this perfect law of liberty. What do we see as we look into that mirror, first the only begotten Son of God who became a servant, reaching out to those who were in need, healing the sick, making the lame to walk, cleansing the souls of the sinful. When he was reviled he reviled not again, when he was smitten he did not smite back. He showed love and mercy to all. Luke 6:27-30, "But I say unto you which hear, love your enemies, do good to them which hate you, Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you. And unto him that smitteth thee on the one cheek offer also the other; and him that taketh away thy cloak forbid not to take thy coat also. Give to every man that asketh of thee; and of him that taketh away thy goods ask them not again." For if we love them only that love us what doth it profit for he says that sinners will do the same. In John's gospel 13:15-17. Jesus says, "... For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you. . . . If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them.

IN THE LIKENESS OF HIS IMAGE

To sum up my previous discourses on the theme of Discrimination, I wish to submit the following story. My earnest prayer is that each of the Advocate readers, whether you are members of the Church of Christ or not, will then evaluate the information I have presented and seeking guidance from the Lord come closer to aligning your desires with the will of God.

There was an artist once, who had a great deal of talent. He was not great—as we recognize greatness. He was not famous—I don't even know his name. But he was good. He had captured the feeling of life, of beauty, of joy and sorrow, and his pictures were true illustrations of such. He did not clutter us his canvas with flattened eggs, or misplaced eyes, or irregular patterns of gaudy color. You could look at his work and recognize it as an emotion or experience of your own life.

When he painted a picture of a tree, he didn't need a "gimmick" to sell that picture or to catch the eye of the average looker. In his picture you saw the towering majesty of the tree; the strength of its branches as they stretched toward heaven; the seeking roots which gave it life. You looked upon his tree and echoed Joyce Kilmer's words: "only God can make a tree"

He knew beauty; he knew emotion; he knew life. Because he was good in his profession, one day he was commisioned to paint a picture to be hung in the chancel of a great church. It was to be a picture of Mary and the Baby Jesus; it was to be the Madonna and Child.

The artist set to work on his painting. He spent long hours with his brushes and paints. He painted with feeling. He was aware of the inequality of men; of the injustice of the world. He felt the pressures of bigotted people about him. And he felt the beauty of the story of Mary and her Son. He recognized the Divinity of Christ, and he recognized the spirituality of man. For God had created man in His image and in His creation each man was given a part of God himself. For He had breathed into man, the breath of life.

All of this the artist thought of many times as the days passed by and his commission was nearly finished. At last he was satisfied with his work, just in time for the dedication of the chancel. The artist requested that no man look upon his painting until it was hung and unveiled for **all** to see.

WHY GAMBLE WITH GOD'S WORD

Book of Commandments 1-3, "... and the day cometh, that they who will not hear the voice of the Lord, neither the voice of his servants, neither give heed to the words of the prophets, and apostles, shall be cut off from among the people. For they have strayed from mine ordinances, and have broken mine everlasting covenant. They seek not the Lord to establish his righteousness, but every man walketh in his own way."

II Peter 3:1-3, "I stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance, that ye may be mindful of the words which were spoken before by the holy prophets, and of the commandments of us the apostles of the Lord and Saviour."

Mosiah 8:56 tells us, all those that believed in their words shall come forth in the first resurrection—the words of the prophets. Mosioh 1:77-78, ". . . concerning the records which contain the prophecies which have been spoken by the holy prophets," 78 says, "And behold, also, they spake that which was commanded them of the Lord; therefore, they are just and true."

Now we see even Peter tells us not to forget the teaching of the holy prophets.

II Peter 1:21, "For the prophecy came not in old times by the will of man; but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." II Timothy 3:16 says, "... all scripture is given by the inspiration of God,". III Nephi 13:3, "And behold all things are written by the father. Therefore out of the books which shall be written shall the world be judged." And the books are the Bible and the Book of Mormon and the books that harmonize with the teachings in those books. Now we will see what the same things are that God tells us as he spoke by the mouth of the Holy Prophets.

Ezekiel 18:8, "He that hath not given forth upon usury," 18:13, "Hath given forth upon usury, and hath taken increase: shall he then live? he shall not live: he hath done all these abominations: he shall surely die." 18:17, "That hath taken off his hand from the poor, that hath not received usury nor increase, hath executed my judgments, hath walked in my statues: he shall not die for the iniquity of his father, he shall surely live."

Psalm 15, "Lord, who shall abide in thy tabernacles? who shall dwell in thy holy hill? He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart. He that backbiteth not with his tongue, nor doeth evil in his neighbour, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbor. In whose eyes a vile person is contemned; but he honoureth them that fear the Lord. He that sweareth to his own hurt, and changeth not. He that putteth not out his money to usury, nor taketh reward against the innocent. He

that doeth these things shall never be moved." So if we want to dwell in that holy hill we can't do these things.

Proverbs 28:8-9, "He that by usury and unjust gain increaseth his substance, he shall gather it for him that will pity the poor. He that turneth away his ear from hearing the law, even his prayer shall be abomination."

Jeremiah 15:10, "I have neither lent on usury, nor men have lent to me on usury; yet every one of them doth curse me." 15:20-21 verse says, "And I will make thee unto this people a fenced brasen wall: and they shall fight against thee, but they shall not prevail against thee: for I am with thee to save thee and to deliver thee, saith the Lord. And I will deliver thee out of the hand of the wicked, and I will redeem thee out of the hand of the terrible."

Isaiah 24:2-3, "... as with the taker of usury, so with the giver of usury to him. The land shall be utterly emptied, and utterly spoiled: for the Lord hath spoken this word."

I Nephi 1:79, "For behold, they have rejected the words of the prophets." 1:83 says, "And also that we may preserve unto them the words which have been spoken by the mouth of all the holy prophets, which have been delivered unto them by the Spirit and power of God, since the world began, even down unto this present time."

II Peter 3:2-3 tells us to, "... be mindful of the words which were spoken before by the holy prophets, and of the commandment of us the apostles of the Lord and Saviour: Knowing this first, and there shall come in the last days scoffers, walking after their own lusts,". So we see in the last days the words of the prophets and the commandments of the apostles won't mean anything to the people. But it has been given to me to know that the good times are about to come to a stop and the borrowers and takers of usury are going to come to sorrow.

The borrowers of usury are going to lose all they have that isn't paid for. And the takers of usury are going to go for their money and it will be tied up so they cannot get it.

What does the Lord say to us in Malachi 3:7-9, "Even from the days of your fathers ye are gone away from mine ordinances, and have not kept them. Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of hosts. But ye said, Wherein shall we return? Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation."

Il Peter 3 tells us to be mindful of the words of the Holy Prophets, in other words, obey the words of the prophets.

Book of Commandments, page 127:37 says, "Behold

it is said in my laws, or forbidden to get in debt to thine enemies,".

In the 1962 Eleventh Hour, page 2, it says the Lord told us not to go into debt didn't he? We have disobeyed. Can the Lord use a disobedient people, and the answer is no.

It would be well if you would read page 2, 1962 Eleventh Hour. The Bible says owe no man.

Thus it was that the prayers were offered; the speeches were made; the chancel was dedicated and the moment of unveiling arrived. And when the curtain was drawn aside, a gasp went through the entire assemblage. For the Negro artist had painted a Negro Madonna and Child.

After much prayer and thought, the minister of the great church said, "We'll keep this picture, for it could have been this way. Scripture tells us that our Lord was fair and comely, yet He could have had a colored skin had God so willed it. It was not His coloring that determined the life He lived; it was not His coloring that determined the pain He suffered; it

was not His coloring that controlled His resurrection. We will keep the picture of the Black Madonna to remind us that we are not the only children of God. We will keep it to remind us that when God created man in His image, He did not limit this creation to the white man. We will keep it to remind us that our darker neighbors too, have hopes and fears; that they too, love God and count on His sacrifice for their salvation."

It is not too far-fetched to think that a colored person might interpret the Bible as being a colored man's Bible too. "Green Pastures" is a play which revolves around Biblical incidents, with God the controlling factor. The play was written for, and is always portrayed by an All-Negro cast. It is a humerous play; it is a serious play, too. We don't interpret all of the incidents in exactly the same light as the author, but we must recognize the black man's desire to associate God with himself. As such, "Green Pastures" is good.

Have you ever seen an exhibition of Oriental paintings? The Oriental artist paints landscapes and still life and portraits, just as our more famous artists of the past and present do. Yes, the Christian Oriental paints Biblical scenes too, embracing all phases of art. Look at his work sometime and you will see that his characters have slanting eyes and delicate features, for the Oriental Christian associates Christ with himself.

The pictures of Christ revealed in sculptures and picto-graphs, which have been uncovered in the South and Central American ruins of the ancient Americans, show our Lord to have an elongated nose of distinct Hebrew characteristics. The pictures with which we are most familiar of Jesus, including the famous "Head of Christ" shows Him to have Jewish features.

There are people in all races who have recognized Jesus to be the Saviour of all men. To all who believe in Him, He is woven into their lives and He takes on Him the appearance of that which is most familiar to them, in all instances representing Light, and Truth and Love. For God did in truth, create all men in His image.

While here, we visited two daughters of Sr. Richards, one of whom was Sr. Briggs, already mentioned, and the other, Mrs. Clark, whom we feel to be not far from "the kingdom."

At the home of Sr. Briggs, we met four very fine young girls, as well as the husband and son, who later came from the harvest fields. The sacrament was administered to Srs. Richards and Briggs, after which we talked on gospel subjects, also with the young daughters. We trust this will bring forth good fruit in the future.

The evening meal with them was pleasant, but we left soon after, as we expected to leave early the next day.

The trip to Spokane, Washington was over 650 miles, and some through winding, montain roads, so it was two tired missionaries who arrived at the home of Sr. Nadean Kuehl and husband, Klaus.

Here, the first signs of a week-long seige of what seemed to be the "flu," appeared to myself. Nevertheless, by resting where possible and through administration, we were enabled to continue our ministry.

The fellowing day, we went several miles north to visit Sr. Floyd Mallow, the mother of Sr. Nadean, who had only recently moved from the old ranch home into a trailer at the home of a neighbor lady. Bro. Mallow being away on a construction job, we were unable to see him.

A nearly 200 mile trip the next afternoon, brought us to the home of Bro. Vernon Mallow, Sr. Mallow's son, who was expecting us. We stayed overnight, being well received, and trust our conversation there may have helped to unite that couple in the gospel sometime in the future. Before leaving there, Sunday morning, we blessed the three children, two boys and a girl.

Coming back to the Kuehl home, we held a sacrament service for the benefit of the two sister, Sr. Mallow having come to the home, according to previous arrangement. The little service was further enhanced by the prayers and testimonies offered, and by the blessing of Sr. Kuehl's two little daughters.

Two or three good, gospel discussions, in which the young husband took part, was worthwhile. Here, too, we hope and pray for a future unity in the faith of this family. The kindness exhibited by this young couple will long be remembered.

Leaving this area, we took the relatively short trip to Sand Point, Idaho, where we stopped at the home of Sr. Evans, and her sons, who are engaged in smoking fish, which is shipped around the country.

This sister suffers from partial paralysis, resulting

from a stroke, but is regaining the use of her limbs to some extent.

Having a desire to press onward to see others in the Columbia Falls, Montana area before heading "home," we did not linger long here, though we tried, without success, to locate others for a few moments visit

Before going on, we visited awhile with a fine lady, a Sr. Price of the Reorganization. She gives "Swedish" massages, and finding that I was suffering some from the "flu," ministered after this fashion to both of us, which gave us relief. We found, here, a sister longing for the consolation and unity of latter-day Israel.

These two sisters, with perhaps one or two others, engage in a study of scripture from time to time. Such desire to continue steadfast, despite isolation, is certainly admirable.

Crossing another mountainous area, we came to the home of Bro. and Sr. Fred Winegar, in Columbia Falls.

It has been the custom of Sr. Stella and daughter to attend the R.L.D.S. prayer services, and others, because of lack of Church of Christ service, So, it being Wednesday night on our arrival, Bro. Jordan went with them.

Remaining home with Bro. Winegar, because of my physical condition, we nevertheless had a good talk about the Church.

They, at the church, all enjoyed Bro. Jordan's testimony, and kept him talking some time after the service

The next morning, we visited a cousin of Sr. Winegar, of the R.L.D.S. church, and enjoyed the little talk. From there, we visited the Jim Winegars, finding him still concerned about spiritual matters, though isolated for years from the Church. We also found their young tee-nage son concerned with obedience to the gospel plan. A short, but serious talk with the father and son, and attentively listened to by the mother, was heartening and, we believe, fruitful. Here we found promise for increase to the kingdom of God.
