THE MIGHTY ACT OF THE AGES

One True God, Versus Many False Gods

Let us begin our study by reading the inspired words of the great prophet Isaiah. "To whom will ye liken me, and make me equal, and compare me, that we may be like? They lavish gold out of the bag, and weigh silver in the balonce, and hire a goldsmith; and he maketh it a god: they fall down, yea, they worship. They bear him upon the shoulder, they carry him, and set him in his place, and he standeth; from his place shall he not remove: yea, one shall cry unto him, yet can he not answer, nor save him out of his trouble. Remember this, and shew yourselves men: bring it again to mind, O ye transgressors. Remember the former things of old: for I am God, and there is none else; I am God, and there is none like me, Declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times the things that are not yet done, saying, My counsel shall stand, and I will do all my pleasure;" (Isaiah 46:5-10)

Now let us read from the Psalms, 145:3, 4. "Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; and his greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall praise thy works to another, and shall declare thy mighty acts." And from verse 7, "They shall abundantly utter the memory of thy great goodness, and shall sing of thy righteousness." We continue with verses 10-13. "All thy works shall praise thee, O Lord; and thy saints shall bless thee. They shall speak of the glory of thy kingdom, and talk of thy power; To make known to the sons of men his mighty acts, and the glorious majesty of his kingdom. Thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and thy dominion endureth throughout all generations."

Christ Builds a Church And Calls His Ministry

Men of God have, through all the ages, stood forth and have declared His glory and wonders to the people, but the eternity of time is not sufficient for man to declare all of God's wonders. Because Holy men of old have, through the power and might of the spirit, declared His mighty acts, the sons of men in our day and age have been able to determine that Christ formed a church.

Most of the Christian religions of the day are agreed as to the organization of the Church of Christ in His day and also that the doctrine He taught was faith, repentance, baptism, laying on of hands, resurrection of the dead, and eternal judgment. Today, however, the Christian world is not agreed as to the organization or the doctrine of Christ's Church.

Paul was one of the great men of old who declared some of God's mighty acts, and he claims that he received the Gospel by revelation. "But I certify you, May 31, 1966

brethren, that the gospel which was preached to me is not after man. For I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ." (Gal. 1:11-12)

Most all Christians today will quote this great man as one of authority on things divine. Indeed he can be quoted as one having authority because he was called by Jesus Christ and was taught the gospel by revelation, that same power that revealed to Peter that "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." So, we quote this apostle, Paul, with confidence. He has this to say in speaking to the saints as members of the church. "But now God hath set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him." (1 Cor. 12:18) In declaring further the mighty acts of God he has this to say in verses 27 and 28: "Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular. And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healings, helps, governments, diversities of tongues."

This is declared to be God's great act and not that of man. We ask this question: If it is God's act, will He ever at any time change that form of organization? Let Ecclesiastes, (The Preacher) give answer. "I know that, whatsoever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it: and God doeth it, that men should fear before him" (Ecc. 3:14)

Paul declares the purpose of the offices that God hath set in the church, and how long they should remain, in the following language: "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ; Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God. unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ: That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ: From whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love." (Eph. 4:11-16)

By the scriptures that declare His mighty acts we find that Christ chose the apostles and sent them into the world, and in John 17:18 we find these words of Christ's: "As thou hast sent me into world even so have I also sent them into the world." Now, to find the purpose for which Christ was sent into the world we turn to the words of Isaiah, that great prophet who, by the power of God, was able to look down through the vista of unborn time and tell of events that would transpire hundreds of years in the future.

"The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me; because the Lord hath anointed me to preach good tiding unto the meek; he hath sent me to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all that mourn:" (Isaiah 61:1-2)

The above statement of Isaiah was penned 798 years before Christ, but when Christ "went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up for to read," he left no doubt that the words of Isaiah referred to Him as we shall see by the following scrip-"And there was delivered unto him the book ture: of the prophet Esaias. And when he had opened the book, he found the place where it was written, The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, To preach the acceptable year of the Lord. And he closed the book, and he gave it again to the minister, and sat down. And the eyes of all them that were in the synagogue were fastened on him. And he began to say unto them, This day is the scripture fulfilled in your ears." (Luke 4:17-21)

I am sure that this leaves no doubt in anyone's mind as to the purpose for which Christ was sent into the world, and when Christ Himself says of His chosen ministry, "As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world," then there should be no doubt as to the reason for which they were sent. We should take note of the fact that Christ chose them and he also sent them. This is an established fact that no man can properly represent Christ as a minister unless he be called of God and sent of God. Quoting again from the Apostle Paul, that great man who received the gospel by revelation from Christ, "And no man taketh this honor unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron." (Hebrews 5:4) And from Romans 10:14 and 15 hear this: "How shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of wnom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent? . . . "

So, as we study some of the great acts of God that have been declared from one generation to another, we find.

1. The church is the body of Christ and members in particular.

2. God placed them there as it pleased Him.

3. It pleased Him to set some in the church, first apostles.

4. Christ chose the apostles.

5. As God sent Christ into the world, so also Christ sent them into the world.

6. No man takes the honor of a minister for Christ unless he be called as was Aaron.

The Unchangeable God Establishes His Church Anew In The Americas

God is unchangeable, the same yesterday, today and forever, without variableness or shadow of turning. In John 10:6 we read: "And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd."

The Book of Mormon is a history of some of those other sheep, and when we make a study of those sheep and the way in which Christ ministered to them, we find a parallel in church organization and doctrine. We turn first to the account of the arrival of Christ upon this continent. "And they were also conversing about this Jesus Christ, of whom the sign had been given, concerning his death. And it came to pass that while they were thus conversing one with another, they heard a voice, as if it came out of heaven; and they cast their eyes round about, for they understood not the voice which they heard; . . . And their eyes were towards the sound thereof; and they did look steadfastly towards heaven, from whence the sound came; and behold, the third time they did understand the voice which they heard; And it said unto them, Behold, my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased, in whom I have glorified my name, hear ye him." 3 Nephi 5:3, 4, 7, 8)

And so here we find the Master of men ready to teach this people the way of eternal life, ready to teach them that there is only one Shepherd, and that through obedience to Him they can all be baptized into one body, into the sheepfold of God.

Again Apostles Chosen and Endowed With Authority

The first thing that Christ did on this occasion was to choose twelve disciples and to give unto them power to baptize, and He sent them to declare his words unto the ends of the earth. I quote from 3 Nephi 5:18-22. "And it came to pass that he spoke unto Nephi, (for Nephi was among the multitude,) and he commanded him that he should come forth. And Nephi arose and went forth, and bowed himself before the Lord, and he did kiss his feet. And the Lord commanded him that he should arise. And he arose and stood before him. And the Lord said unto him, I give unto you power that ye shall baptize this people, when I am again ascended into heaven. And again the Lord called others, and said unto them likewise; and he gave unto them power to baptize." In verses 43 and 44 we find that He sent them, and they were twelve in number. "Therefore go forth unto this people, and declare the words which I have spoken, unto the ends of the earth. And it came to pass that when Jesus had spoken these words unto Nephi, and to those who had been called, (now the number of them who had been called and received power and authority to baptize were twelve.") The fact that Christ called these twelve men "disciples," rather than apostles, seems to bother some people, but it seems to me that this is no problem. We find that in the Bible the twelve were called **both disciples and** apostles. We read in Luke 6:13, "And when it was day, he called unto him his disciples, and of them he chose twelve, whom also he named apostles;"

And from the Book of Mormon: "The words of Christ, which he spake unto his disciples, the twelve whom he had chosen, as he laid his hands upon them. And he called them by name, saying, Ye shall call on the Father in my name, in mighty prayer; and after ve have done this, ye shall have power that on him whom ye shall lay your hands, ye shall give the Holy Ghost; and in my name shall ye give it, for thus do mine apostles." (Moroni 2:1, 2) Some say that He was referring to the apostles at Jerusalem. Perhaps so, but He also was referring to these apostles as being given at that moment the powers and duties that He had given His apostles at Jerusalem. We read in Moroni 2:3, "Now Christ spake these words unto them at the time of his first appearing; and the multitude heard it not, but the disciples heard it, and on as many as they laid their hands, fell the Holy Ghost."

Now we find that Christ did not give them another doctrine, but He gave the same plan and doctrine as He gave at Jerusalem. We will read some scriptures to prove this point.

"And now it came to pass that when Jesus had ended these sayings, he cast his eyes round about on the multitude,, and said unto them, Behold, ye have heard the things which I have taught before I ascended to my Father." (3 Nephi 7:1) Could we expect anything different than the same words that He had spoken in the Jerusalem days when He said, "the words I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life."?

God The Creator of All Brings His Word to All

Now from 2 Nephi 12:56-63 we read a positive statement from a changeless God. "Know ye not that I, the Lord God, have created all men, and that I remember those who are upon the isles of the sea; and that I rule in the heavens above, and in the earth beneath; And I bring forth my word unto the children of men, yea, even upon all the nations of the earth? Wherefore murmur ye, because that ye shall receive more of my word? Know ye not that the testimony of two nations is a witness unto you that I am God, that I remember one nation like unto another? Wherefore, I speak the same words unto one nation like unto another. And when the two nations shall run together, the testimony of the two nations shall run together also. And I do this that I may prove unto many, that I am the same vesterday, today, and forever; and that I speak forth my words according to mine own pleasure. And because I have spoken one word, ye need not suppose that I can

not speak another; for my work is not yet finished; neither shall it be, until the end of man; neither from that time henceforth and for ever."

The important thing is that He speaks the same words unto one nation like unto another and when He calls His ministry in any nation He demands of them that they speak the same words that He gives unto them. "And now it came to pass that when Jesus had expounded all the scriptures in one, which they had written, he commanded them that they should teach the things which he had expounded unto them" (3 Nephi 11:1) "And the twelve did teach the multitude, and behold, they did cause that the multitude should kneel down upon the face of the earth, and should pray unto the Father, in the name of Jesus. And the disciples did pray unto the Father also, in the name of Jesus. And it came to pass that they arose and ministered unto the people. And when they had ministered those same words which Jesus had spoken, "... behold, they knelt again, and prayed unto the Father in the name of Jesus, " (3 Nephi 9:7-10)

Repentance and Baptism

After the people were ministered to by the twelve whom Christ had chosen, many were converted and were baptized and they became members of the Church of Christ. "... Neither did they receive any unto baptism, save they came forth with a broken heart and a contrite spirit, and witnessed unto the church that they truly repented of all their sins. And none were received unto baptism, save they took upon them the name of Christ, having a determination to serve him to the end. And after they had been received unto baptism, and were wrought upon and cleansed by the power of the Holy Ghost, they were numbered among the people of the church of Christ." (Moroni 6:2-4)

Yes, the Bible and the Book of Mormon, the testimonies of two nations have run together, and we find that each testimony portrays the gospel of the Kingdom as being one in exactness regardless of time or place.

"A Falling Away," A Restoration And The End of The World

Inasmuch as the scripture is plain that there would be a falling away and that the gospel would be taken from the earth for a period of time and that an angel would fly through the midst of heaven "... having the everlasting gospel to preach unto them that dwell on the earth, and to every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people," (Rev. 14:6) we can be sure that at the appointed time it was restored in all its beauty and exactness.

On one occasion the disciples came to Jesus privately and asked certain questions about the end of the world and among the things that Christ told them, two seem to be outstanding. "... Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ; and shall deceive many." (Matt. 24:4, 5) And in the 14th verse, "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness

unto all nations; and then shall the end come." This would indicate that at that time, many would be preaching in the name of Christ, saying that Jesus was the Christ, and yet would be deceiving many in other ways. Also at that same time the genuine gospel of the kingdom would be preached as a witness to the nations. This is exactly what is being done today. Many ministers not called, as was Aaron, are preaching in the name of Jesus and are declaring that Jesus is the Christ, but because they are not called as was Aaron, and because they do not understand the gospel, they are deceiving many. For this very reason we need that which will protect us from every wind of doctrine. So we quote again Ephesians 4:11-14: "And he gave some, apostles, and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ: That we henceforth be no more children tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive."

If we are without the above mentioned structure of the church today, then we are at the mercy of every wind of doctrine and there is no hope from being tossed to and fro by every wind of doctrine. Thank God that we are living in the days that have seen the fulfillment of the restoration of the gospel of the Kingdom. No longer are we in the spirit of deep sleep; no longer are the eyes of the prophets and seers covered, "And the vision of all is come unto you as the words of a book that is sealed, which men deliver to one that is learned, saying, Read this I pray thee: and he saith, I cannot; for it is sealed; And the book is delivered to him that is not learned, saying, Read this, I pray thee: and he saith, I am not learned, Wherefore the Lord said, Forasmuch as this people draw near me with their mouth, and with their lips do honour me, but have removed their heart far from me, and their fear toward me is taught by the precept of men: Therefore, behold, I will proceed to do a marvellous work among this people, even a mervellous work and a wonder: for the wisdom of their wise men shall perish, and the understanding of their prudent men shall be hid." (Isaiah 29:11-14)

Ah, yes, this great act that has been proclaimed down through the ages from one generation to another has had its fulfillment. The vision of all has come unto us as the words of a book that was sealed. (Book of Mormon) It was delivered unto one that was learned, and he said, "I cannot read a sealed book." (See outline History of the Church of Christ, page 25.)

Modern Day Revelation From A Changeless God

The marvellous work was about to begin when Joseph Smith went into the woods to pray. As he prayed, two personages appeared to him. One said

of the other, "This is my beloved Son, hear him." So, through the spirit of revelation we give ear to His beloved Son. Book of Commandments, page 26, chapter 15:1-4: "A Revelation to Joseph, Oliver and David, making known the calling of twelve disciples in these last days, and also, instructions relative to building up the church of Christ, according to the fulness of the gospel: Given in Fayette,, New York, June, 1829. Now behold, because of the thing which you have desired to know of me, I give unto you these words: Behold I have manifested unto you by my Spirit in many instances, that the things which you have written are true: (Note: This refers to The Book of Mormon. E. L. Y.) Wherefore you know that they are true; and if you know that they are true, behold I give unto you a commandment, that you rely upon the things which are written; for in them are all things written, concerning my church, my gospel, and my rock. Wherefore if you shall build up my church, and my gospel, and my rock, the gates of hell shall not prevail against you." And now verses 10 and 11: "And now Oliver, I speak unto you, and also unto David, by the way of commandment: For behold I command all men everywhere to repent, and I speak unto you, even as unto Paul mine apostle, for you are called even with the same calling with which he was called."

Here we find that once again as Christ begins to set up His church He takes the first step first — that is, the calling of twelve apostles. Note this: "I speak unto you, even as unto Paul mine apostle, for you are called even with the same calling with which he was called."

In verses 27 and 28 we find these words: "And now behold, there are others which are caled to declare my gospel, both unto Gentile and unto Jew: Yea, even unto twelve: And the twelve shall be my disciples, and they shall take upon them my name:" We continue with verses 35 and 36: "And behold you are they which are ordained of me to ordain priests and teachers to declare my gospel, according to the power of the Holy Ghost which is in you, and according to the callings and gifts of God unto men: And I Jesus Christ, your Lord and your God, have spoken it."

So we see that Christ was building His church, not another church, but the same one as in the days of old." (Book of Commandments, 23:4) If it were not "even as in days of old," it could not be His church, or the Church of Christ. "I know that, whatsoever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it: and God doeth it, that men should fear before him." (Ecc. 3:14)

We testify to one and all that the gospel of Jesus Christ, the gospel of the Kingdom, has, by the power of a changeless God, been restored to earth in its unchangelessness, as a standard and a witness to the people "That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine." (Eph. 4:14) In the words of the Psalmist, "One generation shall praise thy works to another, and shall declare thy mighty acts.... They shall speak of the glory of thy kingdom, and talk of thy power; to make known to the sons of men his mighty acts, and the glorious majesty of his kingdom. Thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and thy dominion endureth throughout all generations." (Psalms 145:4, 11-13)

The Restored Gospel, Here, And Now

The mighty act of the ages is this: The angel has flown through the midst of heaven. The church and the gospel have been restored as in days of old. It came into being by direct revelation — that same power that revealed to Peter that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God. There are at this very moment men called of God as was Aaron, and who have been sent by Christ himself and given authority "... to preach good tidings unto the meek; ... to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound: To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengance of our God; to comfort all that mourn;" (Isaiah 61:1, 2)

Those who will hear and believe will be free from bondage of sin and will be henceforth no more "tossed to and fro by every wind of doctrine" that is fostered by those who come in the name of Christ, saying that Jesus is the Christ and deceiving many because they teach the fear of the Lord by the precepts of men, and not by the spirit of revelation, as do His called ministry.

From the spirit of revelation comes the word of peace and comfort as found in the Book of Commandments, 53:38-43: "Fear not, little children, for you are mine, and I have overcome the world, and you are of them that my Father hath given me; And none of them which my Father hath given me shall be lost: And the Father and I are one; I am in the Father and the Father in me; And inasmuch as ye have received me, ye are in me, and I in you: wherefore I am in your midst; and I am the good shepherd; And the day cometh that you shall hear my voice and see me, and know that I am. Watch, therefore, that ye may be ready; even so: Amen."

THE STORY TELLER

The Treasure Ella Engle

One of the stories the prince told about his kingdom was that it was like a treasure hid in a field. A man was walking through this field and found the treasure, he said. We'll pretend the treasure was in a chest so we can imagine it better. The man looked at the treasure in that chest and he thought, "I can use this to make things so much nicer for us. I'll buy presents for my family. We'll have a party and have something fancy to eat. We'll really celebrate!"

But the field didn't belong to him. So the treasure wasn't really his either. What could he do? It was worth more than everything else he had. He wanted that treasure very much. What do you think that man did?

The Story-teller said the man hid it. He pushed it back under a bush so nobody else would notice. Then he went and sold everything he had: his home, his business, his flocks and herds, all his property. Then he went and bought the field and the treasure. Can you imagine how happy he was then when he went and looked at that treasure and knew that it was really his?

Since the Story-teller's stories are part riddles we'll really have to do some thinking on this one, won't we. What in the kingdom of heaven could be like a treasure hid in a field?

We usually think of a treasure as silver and gold and jewels and such stuff. That's becacuse these things cost a lot of money and we can use money to buy a lot of things. Really, when you stop to think about it, a treasure is something we need, and plenty of it. If we were starving, food would be a treasure. If we were in the desert, a good supply of water would be a treasure. If we were lost in the woods, a compass or something that would tell us where to go would be a treasure. We could starve to death with our pockets full of jewels. Silver wouldn't help our thirst a bit. And gold would just weigh us down and make us tired.

If we were to go into a new country, like we plan to go into the kingdom of heaven, what would we need? We always need food and something to drink, don't we? Would a knapsack of food be enough treasure? We would need clothing like they wear there. It would help if we knew the language spoken there. And a little bit of their history wouldn't hurt. We would need to know the law if we intended to stay. We would need a map if we intended to go anyplace, and surely if we got into the kingdom of heaven we wouldn't want to just sit down on the border and not know what was going on inside. So, we would need a map. That's a lot of things for one treasure chest. Is there anything else we'd need?

Is there anything in the kingdom of heaven that could provide all these things? The king could. But the story sounds like the treasure is a thing, not a person. What thing is there that could do it? There is one thing. You see if you agree. It is called the gospel. This is going to be hard to imagine because we usually think of the gospel as things that are written, not things to be touched. The gospel is really more than written things, but that is a good place to start. Gospel means good news. So we'll just pretend that each thing in this treasure chest is wrapped in a piece of old newspaper, and we'll read a bit of the written gospel with every piece of treasure in the chest.

And while we're pretending, we can do it up grand and pretend a whole family for the man who bought the treasure. In that family we'll pretend a boy about your size. That afternoon, let's pretend, the afternoon after he had bought the field with the treasure in it, the man came home and told his family, "Come on. I want to show you something."

So they all started out. They walked quite a ways before they got to the new field. It really didn't look like so much. Just a field like a lot of others. There were some rocks and hard places where it would be hard to get anything to grow. There were some briars and brambles that would have to be avoided or cut down. Part of the field was so steep it was hard to climb, and some was nice and easy to walk through. And there was a spring of water running right through it.

They stopped at a nice spot and the mother spread out a blanket and began to set out supper from a basket she had carried along. The others gathered wood for a fire and the father went down to the spring and brought back a jug of cold water. By the time the fire was going good it was nearly dark. They asked a blessing on the food, and then the man went and got the treasure chest from the bushes where he had hidden it.

This treasure, like the gospel, was in a plain looking box. It was when you looked inside that you found all the pretty things. The first thing they saw when they opened it up was a plain white piece of paper. On it, printed in gold, were the words, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want."

Now that was something any boy in that country could understand. Most of them had helped the shepherds or had even taken the sheep out by themselves. They knew that the shepherd led the sheep to food in the pastures, saw to it that they had water they could drink, and protected them from wild animals. The shepherd tried to keep the silly things from falling and breaking their necks or legs or something. He untangled them from brush and thorns when they bleated for help. He looked for them when they strayed away. And finally he led them to a safe place at night. The boy was big enough to know that a shepherd would be a nice thing for a boy to have sometimes, too. He looked in the fire and thought about having the Lord for his shepherd. The idea seemed kind of nice.

After awhile the man took out another package. He unwrapped the newspapers from it and showed them a shining bar of gold. They held their breath as they looked at it. It was worth more money than they had ever seen at one time before. The boy tried to imagine what it would buy. He wanted a new pair of shoes, but it was worth more than one pair of shoes. Worth more than shoes for the whole family. A whole outfit for the entire family? Oh, yes. Maybe it was worth all the clothes they'd ever need all their lives.

The man had been smoothing out the papers that had been wrapped around the gold bar and now he read, "My soul shall be joyful in my God; for he hath clothed me with the garments of salvation, he hath covered me with the robe of righteousness."

The other paper said, "Put on the armor of righteousness." Armor? Wow! He hadn't even thought of armor. He looked at his father and tried to imagine him in armor. What a great idea! Just think how it would catch and reflect the light. He could imagine his mother in the soft robe he thought righteousness would be. But there were things to be done out there. Big things. He thought he'd choose the armor for himself.

The man unwrapped another package. It was a tray, all shiny in the firelight. As he tipped it one way and then another, something sparkled here and there on it. There was some carving on it too, but the boy couldn't tell if it was writing or a picture. His father read from the paper, "Come unto me and ye shall partake of the fruit of the tree of life: yea, ye shall eat and drink of the bread and the waters of life freely."

The boy took a big bite of the bread he held in his hand. It was tough and he chewed it a long time. The longer he chewed it, the sweeter it tasted. It was good bread. It was wheat bread. What about this bread of life? He'd like to taste some. Now that they had this treasure he supposed he could have some if he wanted it.

The next package changed shape and made a noise as the man picked it up.. It was heavy and, as he unwrapped it, it spilled out of the paper like silver liquid. It was tiny chains, handfuls and handfuls of them. The man read the paper, "Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but it shall be a well of water springing up into everlasting life." The boy was glad he didn't have to understand that. It sounded good, but he just didn't know what it meant. His father seemed so pleased with it; he'd ask him about it tomorrow.

The next package rattled and, as the paper was taken off, it spilled out among the supper things on the blanket. They were bright jewels shaped like fruit. There were more treasurers still in the chest, as there are more treasurers yet in the gospel. But this boy had all he needed for one day, and enough to think about for several days to come.

I sat through the followng testimonies, alive to The Spirit as it rested first on one, then on another as they rose to their feet; - and thought "O! we people", - we feel ourselves the poorest "potter's clay" pots, --- we feel ourselves to be the simple olive-glasses or pickling-glass; - cut by our mistakes, failures, scarred by life's tribulations - broken, chipped, unlovely; - yet here before me was the touching of God's Spirit bringing to sparkle in 'rainbow colors', --by our repentent souls and God's forgiveness, - He, touching these scars, cuts, chips, wove a shimmering beauty that radiated in our hearts and I could visualize that one day we may wear with joy unto God these deep scars and abrasions as things overcome unto His Glory. OBITUARY

Henry Jensen

Henry Jensen was born in Council Bluffs, Iowa September 5, 1882, and passed away early in his 95th year on the Lord's Day, September 26, 1976. He leaves to mourn his passing, his loving and beloved wife of 56 years, Opal; one son, Apostle Robert Jensen of Bellevue, Nebraska; one daughter, Helen Dewaele of Crescent, Iowa; five grandchildren, four great-grandchildren; also his loving daughter-in-law, Doris, and his son-in-law, Raymond; as well as many nieces, nephews, cousins, friends and neighbors.

Brother Jensen was a life-long resident of the area in and around Council Bluffs and Honey Creek, Iowa, He farmed in his youth, then worked for a number of years as a carpenter, as did the Lord Jesus. His last career as an iron and steel worker for the Omaha and Council Bluffs Street Railway Company spanned 33 years, ending in 1952 when he was required by law to retire at the age of 70. Following that he worked on a farm from time to time for his son-in-law and gardened until his mid-eighties. Opal, his wife, had to move to the Indian Hills Nursing Center in Council Bluffs in August 1974 because of an accident and accompanying disabilities. He also moved there to be with and help care for her. He remained in good health and keen intellect until three months before his passing, when his strength and general health started a sharp decline.

Brother Jensen was loved by every person who ever knew him during his exceptionally long life. He was a quiet, strong, kind, hard-working man who was never too tired or too busy to help someone in need. If any person ever lived a life totally filled with love for his fellow-man, good-deeds, and a love of the Almighty God, he was among the foremost. He was never heard to utter a profane word, and never touche tobacco or liquor or the other things to which so many men are addicted. He merited and received the greatest respect from his employers and fellow-workers.

Brother Jensen was devoted to living the Gospel of Christ to the best of his ability. He guided his family in love through the many years, some of which were extremely difficult during the great depression and drought of the 1930's, with a firm never-erring judgment that surely was given to him in large measure by a kind and loving Heavenly Father.

Brother Jensen was a member of the Church of Christ (Temple Lot), Independence, Missouri. He was devoted to a study of the Holy Scriptures, and was particularly comforted and strengthened spiritually by such verses as these:

When we become skilled in the use of this heavenly stitch our loving circle becomes a joy to each link and a radiance in the eye of the beholder (those who see with the eye of the spirit, at least).

Sometimes strangers come among us. This is good. This is opportunity, such as we often pray for. Some of these stay awhile — waiting — then go away again, still strangers. This is not good.

Some of us find it easy to be outgoing, to make friends. For such, feeling and showing love is easy. This is good. Tragically, though, there are personalities — souls! afraid or proud or shy, who find it almost impossible to open up, to reach out, to give and receive charity's human sister, demonstrated affection. They can only stand quietly, aching with the need to feel human warmth (the highest manifestation of which is the healing warmth that comes only from God).

Sadly, too, we can have estrangement even in our own family-like ranks. Don't be afraid to show your

love. Like any other strength this one grows with exercise. You'll find that you are no longer saying anxiously to yourself, "Does this person really like me? I'm afraid not." Instead your almost unconscious thought will be, "Do I really like him? I do! How can I make sure that my love is felt?" Because the One called "Wonderful, Counselor, Almighty God, the everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace" created us He understands us and knows our needs. He wants us to have the joy of loving and being loved. There is no greater earthly joy, perhaps no greater heavenly one!

Don't be afraid! He will take away your fear for yourself in direct proportion to the concern He helps you feel for others. This is a mathematically perfect equation. You'll see!

Please, dear ones, don't equate concern with worry. The concern of which I speak is part of that charity which is the pure love of Christ. Thus its exercise can only bring results in kind.

A poor friar on an island named "Assizi", centuries
