Editorial . . .

WHOSE CHOICE IS IT?

One of the very important teachings of the restored gospel is that this is our day of probation. This is our time to choose between good and evil which ultimately is our choice between life and death. In doing this we must choose between God and Satan — we must keep the commandments of God or we must follow the ways of the devil. Because we are inclined to become lax in this choice, we need to be reminded of it continually.

To appreciate our opportunity of choice better, it might be well for us to see this from another view—the Lord's view. We should realize that not all the choices are ours; the Lord makes choices too. The day is close at hand when He will make some choices that will have a great effect upon each one of us, for good or for bad. He will choose out His people.

We may think that just because we have made our choice that that is sufficient, that God is totally committed to our commitment. God is committed to us through His promises if we have made the right commitment and if we keep that commitment. If we start slipping in our commitment, however, His promises become ineffectual to us.

This brings us right to the question — what kind of people does God choose? Does He choose a people who are only half committed to Him? Does He choose

a dull, unresponsive blase' people? a lukewarm people?

You know the answer to the question; God has said that He will spew such a people out of His mouth. He is not looking for a people that respond half-heartedly to Him. Rather He is looking for a people who can convince Him that they are ready for His every command. He is searching the hearts to find those who love good and hate evil, who truly rejoice in the blessings of God and who have a genuine abhorrence of sin and evil.

Christ asked the question, "When the Son of Man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?" The time is near when He will return and this question becomes greater as deception and unbelief increase in the world. It is a question we personally cannot afford to take lightly. It is time that we search our own hearts and minds to know not only what kind of faith we have, but also to know what our total attributes of righteousness are. It is time for us to place more value on the things that keep us from being a part of the world.

Do we have a true sense of distinction between good and evil, right and wrong, love and hate, joy and sorrow? Can we rightly discern between that which is of God and that which is of the devil? Is our understanding based upon the written word of God wherein there are distinct whites and blacks of right and wrong? Or does the philosophy of man spoil us with its many shades of gray.

It is time for us to seek to know what God's will is toward us individually. It is also time for us to seek to know what God's will is toward us as a people and as a church. Are we the true Church of Christ because we know the truth or because our lives give evidence of the truth we know?

Knowing what is true is important, but how well do we know a thing if we are not committed to it? Being committed to the truth is not just the ability to argue over it, it is the ability to prove it by the quality of the life that we live. It is the tipping of the scales to the right and putting all our weights of good on that side forever. If our weaknesses and wrong doings outweigh our good qualities, we live a lie; we are not sufficiently committed to the truth.

It has often been said that we should live as righteously away from church as we do in church, but perhaps the greatest evidence of our choice of good is seen right in church. What are we willing to do for the church? Are we reluctant to give time and effort toward the work of the church? Are we choosy, seeking certain jobs and declining others according to our own likes and dislikes to favor our prestige? Or are we hesitant about taking a job because we don't feel we can do it?

We should give the Lord a chance to prove Himself in us. No one is necessarily able to do a job perfectly unless he strives to develop his talents. The Lord can bless a person beyond his own imagination if he asks the Lord's help and seeks to know His will in all things. The Lord has promised to strengthen the weak; if a person humbles himself before God, the strength of the Lord can be realized in that person.

The Lord wants a people who are not afraid of work, a people who will dedicate themselves to a cause and will stay with it until it is accomplished. The Lord wants a people who are not afraid of opposition, a people who are not turned by a threat or easily intimidated. He wants a people who are not wishy-washy or indecisive. He wants a people who, first seek to know His will, and after receiving an answer, will be resolved in doing His will.

The Lord wants a people who take His work seriously — and that means the work of His church. He is choosing His people now. Those who commit themselves totally to His purposes are His people.

Are you His choice?

TO SCATTERED MEMBERS AND FRIENDS

This is one of the most precious things with which we have to learn to manage in our lifetimes. In the 25th chapter of St. Matthew we have given to us a parable of the five wise virgins and the five foolish virgins. There was according to this story a time of preparation for a wedding that was delayed by the bridegroom who tarried. At an unexpected hour he appeared and the cry was made, "Behold, the bridegroom cometh; go ye out to meet him."

All the virgins arose and made ready to answer the call, but only the wise had provided to make ready and had oil in their lamps. In the scramble to purchase oil at that last minute the five foolish virgins were too late for the wedding, and while the wise virgins went in to the wedding, the others were denied the same privilege. They had wasted time and had not prepared themselves to make ready.

Jesus then pointed to the value of time, and the necessity of preparation in the 13th verse, "Watch therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of Man cometh."

We all know that the signs of our times point to the end of times, most Bible scholars look for the coming of our Lord in these days to be very near at hand. With all the knowledge and enlightment of these times, the day and the hour is still a mystery, only the certainty is stronger as we look into the word of God for assurance of the truth.

It is then to this end that we press upon your minds the real urgency to be faithful to our convictions and promises we have made to our Lord. We could be counted as the foolish virgins as being unworthy to meet Jesus when He comes.

This task becomes most trying and difficult when we find ourselves separated from the Church of Christ fellowship, when we are unable to follow the admonition to "meet together often one with another." Time and distance can separate us from worshiping together and being able to minister to each other, to comfort one another, to encourage those who are down-hearted and rejoice with those who have found a victory over the evil about us, to give thanks together for our many blessings.

The burdens of temptation can be very heavy and we find strange paths more attractive. We have the tendency to "go along with the crowd" and accept the world and its ways with less care that it may not be pleasing to our Lord. A strong faith may be weakened as we find our position under attack from those about us who do not love truth, or who err in their understanding, many of whom are not willing to be tolerant and kindly dispositioned of others beliefs.

It may seem easier to take the view, "If you can't lick them, join them." But we are to be faithful stewards of the truths we are entrusted with as well as the tangible things of this world. It is a real pleasure to find one humble, faithful friend of the Gospel testify of their blessings in spite of afflictions and isolation.

We urge you therefore to visit the closest local congregation at every opportunity. This is difficult and time consuming but very rewarding experience for you and them together. We need each other and an expression of love one for another.

We do hold some unique beliefs in the story of the restoration of the Gospel in these latter days, the establishment of the priesthood authority by divine revelation, and the call to a return to the primitive church pattern of government of the church. These are not commonly held beliefs and they are under great pressure today because of the ecumenical movements in the churches around us.

We do hold to some common beliefs that embrace the divine teachings of the Bible as it relates to Jesus, the Son of God, the ministry of the Holy Ghost, and the gospel of salvation. May God bless every effort to hold to the faith "... once delivered to the saints" which we hold dear and precious. We hope to hold high the banner of righteousness and ever be found to be ready to give an answer to the hope within our hearts, to be found pleasing to God in all that we say and do.

May God bless you mightily and find your faith strong and your heart yearning to meet our Lord at His coming.

Have we allowed the God of the Millennium to enter our soul's depths, to change our hearts, our tongues, our emotions, our habits and thoughts and actions? Is He welcomed to so enter our lives that His way is written in the fleshly tables of our hearts? (2 Cor. 3:3)

The fire of His baptism will burn out pride, selfishness, selfpity, the holy-me of selfrighteousness, etc. Then His fire-baptsim will bring us to the depths of humility even as He was meek and lowly.

We could really appreciate the hardships of those early pioneers while standing in an unheated log cabin. A TESTIMONY OF JOINING THE CHURCH

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

My family and I are new members of this Church of Christ and we would like to share our testimony with the church members. We had been members of the Reorganization and both my wife, Barbara, and myself come from a long heritage in the Reorganized Church. We both have always been active in the Lord's work and believed without a doubt that Christ's Church had been restored to earth.

In 1974 we attended the RLDS World Conference. As I was walking to one of the early sessions a man by the name of William Sheldon introduced himself and walked with me. He briefly explained some of the differences in our beliefs, then we parted to our different organizations. Later, I obtained some pamphlets but due to my lack of interest I did not read them.

In 1975 I began serious prayer and study because I had been disturbed with the attitude and direction of the General Church leadership. My question before the Lord was, "If this is truly your church, why are our own leaders confusing, hurting and, as I felt, misleading the people?" I believed strongly in the church, however, I couldn't understand the changing direction in the leadership

One evening during my prayers and study I had exhausted my reading and prepared for bed when I came across one of the pamphlets I obtained from the Church of Christ the previous year. I sat down and read it discovering it explained the church's beliefs on a First Presidency and the Apostles. I was moved to question the church further and wrote Apostle

Sheldon. When receiving his response, I excitedly showed my wife. Barbara became defensive and exclaimed, "You sound like you want to join another church!" I really didn't and I also did not want my family divided so I dropped the issue.

A couple of months later I was sitting at my desk at work when the Spirit called me by name saying I should continue my search into the Church of Christ. I responded saying I would be all alone and the Spirit then stated, "But you would be free to do my work!" Later while I was walking home from work. I prayed to the Lord. I asked that if it was his Spirit that had spoken to me, then he should convince my wife. Knowing how she felt on the subject, I would say nothing. After choir practice that same evening, Barb approached me with something she was anxious to share. She asked me if I remembered when I spoke with her concerning the Church of Christ. I told her yes and she said while she was singing one of the old hymns, it was like a light was turned on for her and she now understood what I had meant concerning the order of Priesthood. Then she said, "I feel you should continue your search into the Church of Christ."

Well, we both studied and came very close to uniting with the Church of Christ, but when Wallace B. Smith was called to prepare himself in 1976, I thought we should remain with the Reorganization.

Finally, last October 1979, the Spirit approached me at work again on a Monday. I was thinking of the multitude of divisions found in the Reorganized Church - not just liberal and conservative, but many more, of many natures. The Spirit told me to ask

Bill Sheldon about the divisions within his church. I knew there were some differences of opinions by his own admission. However, I didn't feel the question was the importance of the Spirit's approach. This time I knew he was calling me into the Church of Christ.

On Wednesday of that week I was speaking at prayer service on "Truth, Christ the Light." After my talk I prayed silently to the Lord. I wanted to know how we should explain to our daughter, whom had been baptized the previous year, that we were changing churches. The Spirit responded immediately asking me to look at the whole restoration movement in degrees of light. The Spirit said the Mormon Church held the least light of all because of the many doctrines they held to that had been introduced by the will of men in the early movement of the church. The Spirit then said the Reorganization held much more light. However, they still held to some of the things introduced by men, causing their problems today (more specifically speaking, some of the Priesthood offices held in the RLDS was what the Spirit was indicating when speaking of things introduced by men). The Spirit then said that by keeping the Church of Christ humble he had been able to preserve his ancient order to minister to the world by the Power of God and no other power - I believe meaning the will of men.

After receiving that explanation I rushed to tell Barb and we spoke with Debra and our son, John, thus agreeing to unite with the Church of Christ. A Letter From the "Elder's Journal"

Tere Haute, In. October 13, 1837

Brother Don C. Smith Dear Sir:

Having arrived here last evening in a heavy shower of rain, and calculating to pursue our journey on the morrow, I thought I would occupy part of the day, in writing a few lines to you for the Journal.

This place is about five hundred miles from Kirtland, and about half way from Kirtland to the city of Far West; which makes the distance from Kirtland to Far West, one thousand miles.

Part of the way the roads were exceedingly good, and part of the way, were as bad as they could well be. The immence travel on the national road is incredible, and this composed of all classes, and descriptions of character. Here indeed you may see the rich and the poor,the noble, the ignoble, all traveling together along the same way; just like they have to the grave, the common lot of all.

I observed as I passed through Ohio, that there was quite a diversity of both soil and timber, some parts of Ohio through which we passed, I think is not surpassed in any part of the country, for fertility of soil, beauty of attraction, and splendor of improvements. I have not, as yet, to this point seen anything to equal it.

Through Indiana, there is a much greater uniformity of soil, timber, and surface, than in Ohio, I mean in the parts through which we passed. From the time we crossed the state line, until say within 12 or 15 miles from this place, there is a uniformity in soil, timber, and surface, that amounts to a dull monotony in the eye of the observer. The timber is principally beech and maple. The surface is very flat; and the soil not

above second quality, if it would be considered that onality.

Indiana as far as I have traveled through it until I came within a few miles of this place, does not justify the general report which has been given of it; at at I confess that I was disappointed, not finding the country as good as I expected from report.

There are a multitude of villages springing upon the national road, of which Richmond, Indianapolis, and Tere Haute are principle, of these three, I should consider Richmond quite in advance of the others. Indianapolis, the seat of government, is a village of considerable size; but the building are generally small, many of them from one, to one story and a half high, and very few excel two storys high. The greater part of the houses are wood. The town is built on the east side of White river: the situation is pleasant, and would admit of a city of the largest size.

This village (Terehaute) is situated on the east side of the Wabash, which is a beautiful river, and flows majestically along the west side of the village. The steamboats ascend the river to this point. The village is situated on a wide spreading prairy of exceedingly rich soil, and the surface is level, and presents a sublime prospect, to the eye of the traveler as he comes from the east. From where the national road enters the prairy; it is about three miles to the river, where the village stands.

The prices of land on the national road is astonishing; take it at any point you will, and you will find, the wild land, from twenty to thirty dollars per acre; while the improved land, is from fifty to a hundred, according to the situation and improvements.

No thinking mind can travel through the country, and oserve the ways of man and things, without deep reflection. In passing along you will see wealth, beauty, and eligance, flowing in all richness, and the next minute, you will see poverty, want, and wretchedness, praying like a vulture upon the happiness of their subjects. The wretchedness and sufferings which is bound in many habitations, make the heart sicken, and throws a gloominess over the spirit of the philanthrophist.

A person who is acquainted with the purposes and work of God in the last days, by traveling only increases his desire, that the great work of God may be speedily accomplished; for the amolioration of the world depends intirely on the accomplishment of the purposes of God. For this cause, the intelligent saint earnestly desires the gathering of the elect; to be completed; that the scene of wretchedness may cease in the world, and the remainder may have rest.

For, however flourishing we may figure to ourselves is the condition of this or any other country, the representation is always partial, it is never universal. For amid the glory of our greatest prosperity, there are thousands, yea tens of thousands, of our race suffering grief and woe, that would melt the stoutest heart, if it would but stop to reflect.

There are many scenes which exhibit themselves in traveling through the western settlements, which are

painful to behold; multitudes of little children clothed in rags, deprived of all the advantages of good society, with a bare subsistence, and that of the coursest kind, their fathers are in many indolent, and do not make the provision necessary for their wants, and at the time when they ought to be receiving their education, they are deprived of all advantages, and grow up under circumstances calculated to deprive them of many privileges, and the enjoyments of society in its more refined state.

I am convinced of the great advantages there are in settling any new country, to do it by colonizing. It enables the settlers to obtain the comforts of life sooner, to establish schools, erect machinery; and colonies uniting in good faith, could soon have as many advantages as the elder settlements; while those who attempt to settle remote regions by individuals; according to the usual plan, is attended with the sacrifice of almost every comfort of life, and during the life time of the first settlers, if not longer: you shall hear from me again.

A TESTIMONY

I would like to share with you, my testimony of God's great goodness. When I was age 13 and then again at the age of 15, I was stricken with rheumatic fever. This is a disease that affects the joints and the heart. It is painful and the heart valve damage remains long after the soreness and swelling leaves the body.

When I was 13, I spent the summer mostly in bed with swollen, stiff joints unable to walk or care for myself. Then God blessed me and I walked again. Two years later, I was stricken again. Once again I was blessed with my life, but I had scar tissue on the valves of my heart that would hamper me for years. Once a doctor also told me that because of my physical condition, he didn't believe that I would be able to have children.

God has blessed me many times in these afflictions and I have lived a normal life with the exception of taking Penicillin everyday to prevent reoccurences of the rheumatic fever. God has blessed me with a good husband and four beautiful children that have given me joy. And I thank God for giving me my life so many times.

For 22 years, I have had doctors listen to my heart and explain what surgery would be needed to correct the injured parts, if it should become necessary. But God has always taken care of me and now he has given me a miracle!

During this past Thanksgiving vacation, our family made a trip to Maxwell, Nebraska to visit the Leighton-Floyd family, whom we love. The last 100 miles was driven at 15 to 20 miles per hour on ice, with high winds and blowing snow. It was a very tense drive even though we all had a prayer on our lips and in our hearts that God would take care of us. He answered our prayers and we are thankful for His watchcare.

During the trip, I became tense which in turn intensified the problem with my heart, that had been causing me some concern the two previous weeks. All day on Thanksgiving, I was bothered by the feeling that my heart was completely turning over. This had been happening about 3 or 4 times a day before the trip, now it was every hour. I became scared and thought of the things my doctors had said and prayed God would take care of me.

By Friday evening it was getting worse and God instilled in my mind that I should ask to be prayed for. This I did about midnight, Friday evening. We prayed and I was administered to and while the hands were on my head the power of God came down and filled my heart until I could feel each part of it on my body, like

the outline you see in a negative. My heart was burning and my soul was filled with joy. I opened my eyes and looked down at my hands that were in my lap and saw only my hands; my lap and legs were as if covered by a cloud or fog. I couldn't see them. I knew God was healing my poor heart, that he was answering the prayers of the believers gathered there. It filled my heart with thanksgiving and song. There were no words to express the joy that I felt.

After the prayers were said, I was asked how I felt. I was too filled with joy that I was at a loss of words. I said "I feel happy, I feel like singing." Then I couldn't think of a song I knew that would say what was in my heart. We just started singing and it seemed very right. We sang to God. "Hallelujah, Hallelujah, Thank you Jesus."

Later when I had prayed thanking the Lord for His great blessing and had fallen asleep with songs of praises in my heart and mind, I found that I kept waking myself up. It was as though my spirit was singing so loud it would wake me up. The song was "Praise Him, Praise Him." Each time I woke I would pray remembering the feeling that was in my heart when God's Holy touch was healing it.

God has not given me an easy way with words and even when I wanted to shout and sing with joy to all those I saw the next morning, I couldn't. But God knows my heart and my joy and I hope that when you read these words you can understand how happy and thankful I am.

I thank God for the witness of my burning heart. For His Holy Spirit that was with us. And I thank Him also for the witness of my doctor that was given me the following Tuesday.

Our youngest daughter fell and hurt her knee and I took her to the doctor for X-rays. The knee wasn't broken and has healed just fine. But while I was there I felt I was supposed to ask the doctor to examine my heart. He did and he didn't say, "I hear murmers," he didn't say "I would like you to have an EKG," or any of the things I heard during the past 22 years. He said, "Your heart sounds good, there's no problems." I left thanking God for the miracle he gave me.

I bear this testimony to all of you, desiring that it might bring honor and glory to Jesus Christ our Heavenly Father, Creator of all things, for His is the honor and glory forever. Praise be His Holy name.

"IF THEY DRINK ANY DEADLY THING,

IT SHALL NOT HURT THEM: . . . "

One summer day, when our oldest son, Brad (we call him Chip), was $3\frac{1}{2}$ years old, he received a miraculous blessing. He was in the back yard playing with his twin sisters, Karma and Konie, that morning while I was doing the housewifely chores necessary before fixing their noon meal. Vanna Joe (Jody) was 'helping'? me. Our back yard and our neighbors, had a fence part-way between us, but there was no fence where they dumped their trash.

When I called the children in for lunch, Chip told me he wasn't hungry and didn't want to eat. This was very unusual for him, so I asked him, "Why?" He told me he had eaten "all that candy." I hadn't given him any candy. I asked where he had gotten it. He told me the neighbor lady had thrown it out in her trash in little bottles, and it looked too good to throw away.

Well, I was beginning to get very scared, so I asked Chip to show me and he brought me a bottle which had had some medicine in it and he had eaten all that was left - a handful. I tried to reach our neighbor, but she wasn't home. I called the druggist and gave him the prescription number, and he told me that if a child had eaten more than 1 or 2 it could kill him! That I should make him throw up at once! But all that I was told to do, did not work. It had been too long! By this time, he was beginning to get very sleepy. I did not have a car at home, but Dick would be home soon. I called the Doctor and he told me to let him

sleep but wake him up every 30 minutes or so to make sure he was alright.

All this time the Scripture from the Book of Mormon which says:

And these signs shall follow them that believe: in my name they shall cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; they shall take up serpents; and if they drink (or eat) any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover;

And whosoever shall believe in my name, doubting nothing, unto him will I confirm all my words, even unto the ends of the earth. (Mn. 4:87-88)
