HARVEST TIME

As summer reaches it peak, we find ourselves in the time of harvest when the farmers begin to gather their crops for market. This ingathering of crops will continue throughout the summer months and into late fall when each of its own kind — grains, fruits, and vegetables — will have ripened in its season.

The Lord, in His own special way,, has used the harvest season to describe certain points of importance in the scriptures and prophecies. Most well known of these scriptures is the parable of the sower (Matt. 13:24-30, 37-43). When tares were sown among the wheat by the enemy (the devil), both the tares and the wheat were let to grow together until the time of harvest which is the end of the world. The tares (children of the wicked one) will be gathered in bundles and burned, but the wheat (children of the kingdom) will be gathered into His barn (kingdom).

This harvest was also shown to John through revelation when he saw one like unto the Son of man thrust in his sharp sickle and reap the earth. He was told that "... the time is come for thee to reap: for the harvest of the earth is ripe." (Rev. 14:15)

The inevitableness of this great harvest causes us to reflect seriously on the need to be those who are bearing fruit. Unlike the tares which look like wheat but never bear useful grain, each stock of wheat develops a head with an average of fifty grains in it. As it ripens, it turns a golden-brown color which is a

sign to the farmer that he must prepare for the harvest. It must be harvested at the proper time or the crop will be lost as the grain falls to the earth making it impossible to gather.

As the wheat is harvested, it goes through a threshing process which removes the husk and unusable parts. This can be said to be the process that each of us goes through if we are to present our lives and our works to the Lord. We are to remove the humanness and carnal wills that hide our good qualities.

We are told that wheat is the world's most important food crop. This shows again the Lord's wisdom in choosing that which typifies most accurately the value of His gospel as it truly is the spiritual staple of the earth.

Another type we find in the scriptures is the term "first fruits" which is used to depict those that the Lords looks on with special favor. As we gather our fruits, vegetables, etc., we always notice that the first to bear are usually the best and most desirable. This indicates that those who seek the Lord early in life and remain faithful to the end are most choice to Him.

The Lord also used the harvest time to typify the work that He commissioned His disciples to do (John 4:35-38) telling them that the fields were white already to harvest. He repeated this commission in latter day revelation: "Behold the field is white already to harvest, therefore, whoso desireth to reap, let him thrust in his sickle with his might, and reap while the day lasts, that he may treasure up for his soul everlasting salvation in the kingdom of God: yea, whosoever will thrust

in his sickle and reap, the same is called of God: therefore, if you will ask of me you shall receive; if you will knock it shall be opened unto you." (Book of Commandments 12:2)

This proves to us that there were certain times or dispensations when the gospel was to be preached and during these times certain conditions were right to convert the peoples of the earth. This is all according to the wisdom of God.

The gospel came forth in Joseph Smith's time known

as the eleventh hour dispensation and it has remained with us until the present time. We are still under that special commission to thrust in our sickles with our mights. As we consider our present situation, we find the words of Christ to his disciples of great importance to us: "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest." (Matt. 9:37, 38) Let us make this our sincere prayer.

Whether it be a life or a house there are always improvements that can be added which will make it more attractive. Life will be much more attractive to us if we put our trust and faith in God, and live by the description of life as Christ would write it.

Jesus said, "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me." John 14:1)

A cure for a troubled and dissatisfied heart is belief in God. The heart that is faithful, putting it's trust in God can be untroubled because it will be able to rise above the circumstances of daily life. No outward storm can disturb the inner peace that God gives to those who put all their trust in Him.

There is a story of four men who climbed a mountain to see a view.

The first wore new and expensive shoes which did not fit, and he complained constantly of his feet.

The second had a greedy eye and kept wishing for

this house or that farm.

The third saw clouds and worried for fear it would rain.

The fourth really saw the marvelous view. His mountain top experience was looking away from the valley out of which he had climbed to higher things.

True perspective of life is not looking back at what we have done, nor rationalizing our worth and our rewards upon complaints or worry or fear. It is looking into the future to perceive what can be done, regardless of the past, and finally coming into the sanctuary of God.

How do we come into the sanctuary of God? Like David (Ps. 73), we must re-evaluate our perspective of life and bring things into the proper relationship between ourselves and God.

We have the promise of Christ, "I am with you alway," if we obey His commandments. We must obey in word and in deed. Not only in outward religious duties but in the depth of our own hearts. If we love God with all our heart, soul and mind, only then are we giving Him a chance to make our lives beautiful and full. Only then will we know that we are in the right house, the house of God.

THE NAME OF THE CHURCH

In these references there is no intention of downgrading any church, but to state the facts as they are found in the Bible, Book of Mormon and Covenants and Commandments. James 1:27: "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this. To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the vices of the world."

We have faith in the Lord in different degrees, and I believe that all good Christians that believe in the Lord will be saved to some degree. The gospel in the restoration has a decided effect on most religion. They now teach the love of God while formally they taught the fear of God. The teaching of love will do a lot more good than the teaching of fear.

I just finished reading the Book of Mormon and Covenant and Commandments. I will refer to the Book of Mormon first; page 672, verse 13, "And they who were baptized in the name of Jesus were called the Church of Christ." We find in verses 16-18: "And they said unto him Lord we will that thou wouldest tell us the name whereby we shall call this church; for there are disputations among the people concerning this matter, and the Lord said unto them; Verily, verily, I say unto you, why is it that the people should murmur and dispute because of this thing? Have they not read the scriptures which say, ye must take upon you the name of Christ, which is my name, for by this name shall ye be called at the last day and whoso taketh upon him my name and endureth to the end, the same shall be saved at the last day."

We read on page 681, verses 17-20: "And it came to pass that the thirty and fourth year passed away, and also the thirty and fifth, and behold the disciples of Jesus had formed a church of Christ in all the lands round about: and it came to pass that there was no contention in the land because of the love of God which did dwell in the hearts of the people; and there were no envyings, nor strifes, nor tumults, nor whoredoms, nor lyings, nor murders, nor any manner of lasciviousness. And surely there could not be a happier people among all the people who had been created by the hand of God. There were no robbers nor murderers, neither were there Lamanites, nor any manner of ites, but they were in one, the children of Christ, and heirs to the kingdom of God." Page 633, verses 25, 26: "And now behold these are the words which ye shall say calling them by name, saying: Having authority given me of Jesus Christ, I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, Amen, and then shall ye immerse them in the water and come forth again out of the water."

We find that they had twelve disciples the same as they had in the old country. And we find in the Book of Mormon there were some 15 to 20 times after Christ came on page 633 that the church was called the church of Christ, and in fact, I never saw where it was ever called anything but the church of Christ. And I think the church should be called the "Church

of Christ Restored" today as it has been restored.

Page 684, verses 26-29, 31, 35: "And now I, Mormon, would that ye should know that the people had multiplied insomuch that they were spread upon all the face of the land, and that they had become exceeding rich because of their prosperity in Christ, and now in this two hundred and first year there began to be among them those who were lifted up in pride, such as the wearing of costly apparel, and all manner of fine pearls and of the fine things of the world, and from that time forth they did have their goods and their substance no more common among them, and they began to be divided into classes and they began to build up churches unto themselves to get gain and began to deny the true church of Christ. And it came to pass that when two hundred and ten years had passed away, there were many churches in the land; yea, there were many churches which professed to know the Christ and yet they did deny the more part of his gospel, insomuch that they did receive all manner of wickedness, and did administer that which was sacred unto him to whom it had been forbidden because of unworthiness. And again there was another church which denied the Christ; and they did persecute the true church of Christ because of their humility and their belief in Christ, and they did despise them, because of the many miracles which were wrought among them. And they did cast them into furnaces of fire, and they came forth receiving no harm; and they also cast them into dens of wild beasts, and they did play with the wild beasts even as a child with a lamb; and they did come forth from among them, receiving no harm."

We find these words in the Covenants and Commandments in section 17, par. 1: "The rise of the Church of Christ in these last days, being one thousand, eight hundred and thirty years since the coming of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the flesh." And it was called the Church of Christ in the Covenants and Commandments from the time the church was organized until page 239 (Section 108A) at a general assembly of the Church of Latter Day Saints. On page 240 in the 4th para., it was again called the Church of Latter Day Saints. Then on page 244 it is called the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and again on page 249 it is called by the same name, but we do not believe it was spoken under inspiration as on page 250 it was again called the Church of Christ of Latter Day Saints. In Sec. 113 it is called the Reorganized Church. The name of the Curch of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints is still the name that is used by the Mormons. Since the organization of the Church back in 1830, we believe the name should be the same, as the Lord doesn't change. And we still believe that Church should be called the "Church of Christ, Restored", as it is a Restored Church. And we have found in our study that they went two at a 'ime, that is the ministers, and we believe in this also,

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

A couple of questions:

Is your Book of Commandments the exact same wording as the RLDS Heritage Reprint?

Do you follow the original instructions given in BC 44:26 which call for consecrating of all properties? (as found in July 1832 Evening and Morning Star)

When was "Changing of the Revelations" by Mac-Gregor written?

Do you practice tithing? If not what are your general beliefs concerning stewardship?

Thank you, An Interested Party

Dear Brother:

Your card of May 1 arrived and I have accumulated information to answer the questions you propound to the best of my ability. First I might tell you that as Business Manager of the General Church, I am an elder in the Church and a member of the General Bishopric who are the trustees in trust of church properties and the administrators in temporal affairs.

My father, Apostle Clarence L. Wheaton, was a member of the Council of Apostles from 1925 when they were reinstituted by the Church of Christ on the the Temple Lot as the ones selected by revelation in the 1850's through John E. Page at Bloomington, Illinois, had all passed on and their successors as well, until his death in 1976. In the early 1900's my father, as a young man, was pastor of the Temple Lot local and Presiding Elder of the General Church, and as such had always taught the consecration law set forth in the Book of Commandments and those revelations in the Doctrine and Covenants which the Church had accepted at that time, as he understood it, and was instrumental in getting through the conference several resolutions authorizing the Bishops to proceed to administer the affairs of the Church temporally in harmony with these revelations. I am very sorry to have to tell you that this is about all that we have actually done. We have not really been able to have enough people converted to the consecration laws set forth in the Book of Commandments, Chapter 44, Chapter 51, so that we could put it into operation to any great extent, although throughout the Church from time to time several groups have endeavored to put it into effect in their local areas, some to a greater or lesser degree of success. But at the present time, the main temporal law which we do observe, is the law of tithing which we interpret to be one-tenth of one's increase. This increase has been further interpreted as the net income, in this industrial age, when the taxes have been paid and the normal expenses of operating a business where this is applicable. We believe that living expenses of a famly should be taken out of the nine-tenths which we have left. However, we do not make any effort to try to literally enforce

this interpretation, but leave it to the consciences of of the people, whether they abide by this strictly, or allow part of their other expenses to be considered necessary and thus exempt of fdrther tithe as most of the other divisions of the Restoration have it interpreted.

In the conference on October 19 in 1925 in Independence, Missouri the following resolution was adopted by the Church.

"Resolved it is the sense of this body, that it be recommended for acceptance of the Church as a whole, that there be an observance of the principle of consecration of all one's property to the Church, to be followed by tithing one-tenth of one's income."

On April 11, 1927 at a General Conference of the Church, the following resolution was also adopted.

"It was resolved that the conference endorse and approve the duties, responsibilities, prerogatives of the Bishops as stated in Chapters 44 and 51 of the Book of Commandments."

In 1937, the following was adopted.

"Resolved that we look with favor upon groups of members of the Church of Christ, everywhere, being encouraged to work along the lines of cooperative endeavor, in the establishment of greater security in the temporal affairs of their lives."

On April 10, 1950 the Joint Council of Twelve and the Bishopric presented the following resolution which was adopted by the conference.

"Inasmuch as the Church of Christ has expressed it's belief in the practice of tithing, a tenth of one's income, therefore be it resolved that it be the sense of the General Bishopric that tithing as referred to in the scripture means one-tenth of one's net income, (one's income after the actual cost of producing the income)."

"We therefore, call upon all members of the Church to send your tithes and offerings into the storehouse that there may be meat in the Lord's house and that the work of the Lord may prosper."

"Our purpose in the above was that we might, in unity, send this forth to the Church at the present, that the confusion in the minds of some may be resolved to the extent that they may again begin to temporally support the work."

"We went further in defining the cost of producing that income as follows:

"That one's house expense and living expense would not be considered as necessary to producing that income."

Since that time the Church has received greater support from the people and while we have not yet been able to come to a workable conclusion over our understanding and interpretation of the so-called consecration law these are the positions which the Church has taken and the direction in which we have endeavored to guide the people in their consideration of their temporal affairs. We have always considered, as set forth in the scriptures, Chapter 5:1-11, Book of Acts, at the time that they were selling property and placing it at the feet of the Apostles as the Apostle Peter said to Ananias at that time. "Why has Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and keep back part of the price of the land? While it remained, was it not thine own? and after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? . . . Thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God." So we believe that all members of the Church are stewards over their own property or that which has come under their control. We do encourage the study and prayerful consideration of the revelations that have been given with continual reference to the scriptures that we might come to a more perfect understanding of these principles of the gospel.

As to when the changing of the revelations by Daniel MacGregor was written, I am not able to determine. He transferred into the Church of Chist about 1926 or 1927 from the Reorganized Church when the "25 conference had adopted what it commonly referred to as "Supreme Directional Control." He became quite prominent in the Church of Christ as a missionary doing an effectual work to bring many honest in heart out of the divisions of the Restoration to the Church of Christ. At the very beginning of his work with the Church of Christ, these changes in the revelations had been published in various forms from time to time. They have been compiled at the present time, in a pamphlet for dstribution to the public. Also, my father has prepared a treatise on this covering some of the more detailed aspects of the printing of the Book of Commandments and the changing of the revelations in the little booklet entitled "The Book of Commandments Controversy Reviewed" which is currently available from the Church office.

I have not had the opportunity of comparing word for word the photographic reprint of the book of Commandments with the RLDS Heritage reprints but I do have a copy of it as do several other elders and members of the Church who have not as yet made a detailed review of it. The Book of Commandments which we currently print was copied from a copy of the original Book of Commandments which was in the possession of the Church of Christ and as it states on the fly leaf, was carefully compared with the original and certified to by the committee, Sister Melvina Ritchison and Daniel MacGregor, and we believe that it is in complete harmony as far as humanly possible with the Book of Commandments as published in Jackson County, Missouri in 1833 by W. W. Phelps and Co., even to chapters, paragraphs, words and punctation.

I would hope that this would answer the questions which you propounded in your post card. If we can be of any further assistance to you we would be happy to hear from you. Be assured of our prayers in your behalf as you study to understand the truth of those things which have come forth in these last days in this great Restoration work, and be assured that we look forward to the time when the honest in heart will be gathered out and work together to accomplish the purposes for which God brought this work forth in this day. May God bless you is our prayer.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

And all nations shall call you blessed; for ye shall be a delightsome land, saith the Lord of hosts."

In verse 9 it says those who won't tithe is cursed. Isn't that heavy — and we wonder why we aren't getting anywhere!

Soon I will have a steady paying job where I can give more! That means a lot to me since it goes to support the ministry and the church.

"For brethren, ye have been called unto liberty; only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another." (Gal. 5:13)

OLIVER COWDERY'S LETTERS NO. 4

To W. W. Phelps: Dear Brother:

In my last, published in the third number of the "Advocate," I apologized for the brief manner in which I should be obliged to give, in many instances, the history of this church. Since then yours of Christmas has been received. It was not my wish to be understood that I could not give the leading items of every important occurrence, at least so far as would effect my duty to my fellowmen, in such as contained important information upon the subject of doctrine, and as would render it intelligibly plain; but as there are, in a great house, many vessels, so in the history of a work of this magnitude, many items which would be interesting to those who follow, are forgotten.

You will recollect that I mentoined the time of a religious excitement, in Palmyra and vicinity to have been in the fifteenth year of our brother J. Smith, Jr.'s age - · that was an error in the type, it should have been in the seventeenth. You will please remember this correction, as it will be necessary for the full undrstanding of what will follow in time. This would bring the date down-to the year 1823.

I do not deem it to be necessary to write further on the subject of this excitement. It is doubted by many whether any real or essential good ever resulted from such excitement, while others advocate their propriety with warmth.

But if others were not benefited, our brother was urged forward and strengthened in the determination to know for himself of the certainty and reality of pure and holy religion.

And it is only necessary for me to say, that while this excitement continued, he continued to call upon the Lord in secret for a full manifestation of divine approbation, and for, to him, the all important information, if a Supreme being did exist, to have an assurance that he was accepted of him. This, most assuredly, was correct — it was right. The Lord has said, long since, and his word remains steadfast, that to him who knocks it shall be opened, and whosoever will, may come and partake of the waters of life freely.

These sacred and important promises are looked upon in our day as being given, either to another people, or in a figurative form, and consequently require spiritualizing, notwithstanding they are as conspiculously plain, and are meant to be understood according to their literal reading, as those passages which teach us of the creation of the world and of the decree of its Maker to bring its inhabitants to judgment. But to proceed with my narrative.

On the evening of the 21st of September, 1823, previous to retiring to rest, our brother's mind was unusually wrought up on the subject which had so long agitated his mind — his heart was drawn out in fervent prayer, and his whole soul was so lost to every

thing of a temporate nature, that earth, to him, had lost its charms and all he desired was to be prepared in heart to commune with some kind of messenger who could communicate to him the desired information of his acceptance with God.

In this situation hours passed unnumbered - how many or how few I know not, neither is he able to inform me; but supposes it must have been eleven or twelve, and perhaps later, as the noise and bustle of the family, in retiring, had long since ceased. While continuing in prayer for a manifestation in some way that his sins were forgiven; endeavoring to exercise faith in the scriptures, on a sudden a light like that of day, only of a purer and far more glorious appearance and brightness, burst into the room. Indeed, to use his own description, the first sight was as though the house was filled with consuming and unquenchable fire. This sudden appearance of a light so bright, as must naturally be expected, occasioned a shock or sensation visible to the extremities of the body. It was, however, followed with a calmness and serenity of mind, and an overwhelming rapture of joy that surpassed understanding, and in a moment a personage stood before him.

Notwithstanding the room was previously filled with light above the brightness of the sun, as I have before described, yet there seemed to be an additional glory surrounding or accompanying this personage, which shone with an increased degree of brilliancy, of which he was in the midst; and though his countenance was as lightning, yet it was of a pleasing, innocent and glorious appearance, so much so, that every fear was banished from the heart, and nothing but calmness pervaded the soul.

Though fear was banished from his heart, yet his surprise was no less when he heard him declare himself to be a messenger sent by commandment of the Lord, to deliver a special message, and to witness to him that his sins were forgiven, and that his prayers were heard; and that the scriptures might be fulfilled, which say: "God has chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the things which are mighty; and base things of the world, and things which are despised, has God chosen; yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things which are, that no flesh should glory in his presence. Therefore, says the Lord, I will proceed to do a marvelous work among this people, even a marvelous work and a wonder; the wisdom of their wise shall perish, and the understanding of their prudent shall be hid; for according to his covenant which he made with his ancient saints, his people, the house of Israel, must come to a knowledge of the gospel, and own that Messiah whom their fathers rejected, and with them the fullness of the Gentiles be gathered in, to rejoice in one fold under one Shepherd."

He then proceeded and gave a general account of the promises made to the fathers, and also gave a history of the aborigines of this country, and said they were literal descendants of Abraham. He represented them as once being an enlightened and intelligent people, possessing a correct knowledge of the gospel and plan of restoration and redemption. He said this history was written and deposited not far from that place, and that it was our brother's privilege, if obedient to the commandments of the Lord, to obtain and translate the same by the means of the Urim and Thummim, which were deposited for that purpose with the record.

A part of the book was sealed, and was not to be opened yet. The sealed part, said he, contains the

same revelation which was given to John upon the isle of Patmos, and when the people of the Lord are prepared, and found worthy, then it will be unfolded unto them.

While describing the place where the record was deposited, he gave a minute relation of it, and the vision of his mind being opened at the same time, he was permitted to view it critically and previously being acquainted with the place, he was able to follow the direction of the vision, afterward, according to the voice of the angel, and obtain the book.

I close for the present by subscribing myself as ever, your brother in Christ.

TO SCATTERED MEMBERS AND FRIENDS

The articles I have been writing have been persuing the theme of the kingdom of God, or as I have pointed out, we can refer to it as the church that Jesus said that He would build.

As one of the scriptures that relates to the work of God, even in these last days, it will be of deep interest to us to read Isaiah, chapter two, verses 2-4 as follows:

"And it shall come to pass in the last days, that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established in the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow into it. And many people shall go and say, come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths: for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. And he shall judge among the nations, and shall rebuke many people; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

It is generally accepted among scholars that "mountain" in Bible prophecy is a reference to government. This scripture is in harmony with the statement that Jesus made that He would build His church. There will be an opportunity to learn of His ways, instead of our own; we will desire to be pleasing to Him in all things. A great blessing to all mankind will be the lasting peace that will be established by His kingdom in these latter days.

Thus I point to these promises that have come to us through the grace and goodness of our Lord. They can be a sound foundation for our faith. In II Peter 1:19-21, Peter also pointed to the more "sure word" of prophecy that we should take notice of as a source of light. We need to seek for this light.

It is interesting to note that these promises are entwined within a prophecy that relates to the birth of Jesus. A familiar and ofen quoted scripture of Isaiah found in chapter nine, verses 6 and 7, links the events of His birth with the destiny of His kingdom. "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulders: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even forever. The zeal of the Lord of Hosts will perform this."

I call to your attention the positive nature of this prophecy. It shall not be left to chance or to man's desire to do it, and it will be done by the Lord. Of this we can be sure. "When," do you ask? This is part of the mystery that we see in these prophetic messages. Even when Jesus was born, there were those who were acquainted with the scriptures and recognized the birth as being a fulfillment of prophecy, but many saw nothing. Yet we now accept it as a historical fact — it has come to pass. So it will be with the fulfillment of the prophecy of this kingdom of God coming into being in these last days. Some shall see the hand of God and rejoice in the Spirit, while others shall not see because of spiritual darkness in their hearts. Nevertheless, God will move "His wonders to perform."

It will be expressed as a "marvelous work and a wonder." This is recorded in the 29th chapter of Isaiah, verses 9-11. Here another mystery is introduced for the latter day work of God. It is reference to a book that the learned man cannot read, but is put into the hands of the unlearned, and then God's power is revealed. The Lord speaks, (verse 14) "Therefore, behold I will proceed to do a marvelous work among this people, even a marvelous work and a wonder for the wisdom of their wise men shall perish, and the understanding of their prudent men shall be hid." Continuing in verse 18, we learn that this book is real, that spiritual understanding will come to those who are

deaf, and those who are blind, and they will have a great light. And, as it says in verse 24, "They also that erred in Spirit shall come to understanding, and they that murmured shall learn doctrine." This is in harmony with the prophecy of chapter 2, of chapter 9, and to the prophecy of chapter 11, that the Word of the Lord impressed upon Isaiah by His Spirit.

Now we have before us these signs of the work of God — that His kingdom will in these last days be revealed, that a book will be brought forth to give us understanding, and that the peace of God will be established upon the earth among nations. Jesus has been born as God said He would. In itself this miraculous event witnesses to the world that He is the true Lord and able to accomplish everything that He has promised. We can reasonably expect the rest of

the scriptures to be fulfilled as surely as God is in His heaven.

The prophecies given to man down through the ages present us with an astonishing array of testimony. These cannot be ignored or set aside as being of no significance to the believer in these last days. As we approach the "end time" it is well that we be fully informed and make sure that we have oil in our lamps.

I hope that you will ponder these things within your heart and be encouraged to look to the Lord with a greater faith even as we see the ever present weaknsses of man, and the raging of sin and evil about us. Let us humble ourselves before Him, cast on Him our every care, and trust Him who is faithful and true.
