"FOR THE POOR ALWAYS YE HAVE WITH YOU "

"For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost." Romans 14:17.

What does this mean? That the spiritual has no involvement with the physical or tangible? Is not reflected in the daily living and handling of the material necessities of mortal exsitence? No, Paul was speaking of the disputations and judgments the converts, Jews and Gentiles were making between themselves over what was or was not lawful to be eaten, by whom and when. To suppose that there is no connection between our handling of the things of daily life and our spirituality would be to make other of Jesus' teachings meaningless. In the parable of the sheep and goats, Matthew 25:31-45, on what were they being judged or rated? was it not on the ministering of, or failure to righteously act in accord with the requirements of the gospel in the use and service of these very tangible things of the flesh? Again James 2:13-16, says that if one is hungry or naked and we claim faith yet do not supply their need, there is no profit to us. In other words it is not counted to us spiritually. The Book of Mormon in the following scriptures all link the use of our substance for the poor and needy with the status of our righteousness. Jacob 2:24, Mosiah 2:28-43, 8:60-63, Alma 1:45-46, 16:218-225, Mormon 4:54-56.

The material, economic condition in the world is chaotic. Enlightened evaluations can in no way suppose the world is enjoying a high spiritually motivated status and the lack of it shows in the inconceivable handling of the tangibles of life as well as in the moral decline and degradation which is extant. Admittedly, as only one of the Christian professing groups of people, we do not control the world in these matters. But do we even give it a leading example? Can we, will we ever be able to if we continue to hold to some of the world's attitudes concerning these matters.

"And the Lord commended the unjust steward, because he had done wisely: for the children of this world are in their generation wiser than the children of light." Luke 16:8. I suppose that this statement has many applications, perhaps this case may be one of them. From the Springfield Daily News I quote, with permission.

INSENSITIVITY TO POOR IS DEPLORABLE

One of the most insidious, pervasive philosophies to come of age in the 1980s is the implied disgust of the poor.

No one comes out and says "The poor are disgusting," but plenty of disdain is couched in

phrases such as "Anyone who wants to work can work — look at the want ads in Sunday's paper!" or "If they don't like it, they can vote with their feet," or "The truly needy will not suffer," i. e. all those who suffer are not the truly needy. The implication is that those who suffer deserve it.

The mayor of Detroit, a region hard-hit by industrial layoffs, made a poignant observation recently: He termed Detroit's growing number of homeless and poor as valid a reason for emergency help as devastation by a tornado. Mayor Coleman A. Young declared a state of emergency in the city last week and asked Gov. William G. Milliken to declare the fact officially so Detroit could avail itself of federal aids as would victims of natural disasters. He cited the city's unemployment rate of 25 percent, an increase in infant mortality and an investigation which revealed one-third of the city's population suffered from an inadequate diet.

Coleman's request was an interesting first marriage of our philosophies about need: If devastation results from an "act of God," then we're eager to give victims aid. "It could have happened to us," think to ourselves. If devastation results from poverty, we say they did it to themselves and they deserve it The grating insensitivity of this stance is that we never ask why people are poor, why they "did this" to themselves.

If we asked the question, we might have to ask ourselves why we are where we are. We might find that we're not where we are because of brains, brawn, good looks or talent, or any other combination of qualities we thought assured us of salvation from the plight of the poor. We might have to examine our lives and find that our stations in life have come as a heritage from others in our live.s

We might have to admit that our parents, teachers, neighbors, Sunday School teachers — or anyone else who got through to us when we were impressionable — gave us dreams and visions of ourselves living above poverty. One cannot rise higher than the vision one conceives of himself.

If we discovered this basic truth about ourselves, that so much of what governs our thoughts and actions is culturally transmitted like dress codes or religion, we have to then look at the majority of poor people. What kind of visions were imparted to them? If mothers, fathers, grandmothers, grandfathers and generations before them lived in poverty, what kind of life can they conceive of for themselves?

We see many instances of people rising above their cultural imprinting, but they are the exceptions, not the rule. They are the wise, gifted or talented, or those lucky enough to be touched by people who teach them to dream. We've been wasting our brainpower on accusations and recriminations when it comes to the poor, when we should have been searching for answers. If we can conceive of putting men on the moon and revolutionizing industry via computer technology, we can conceive of true aids — not bandaids — for the poor. So far, we just haven't wanted to.

Are there those, out there, as we are so prone to call it, wiser and more concerned, and seeing more clearly than we when it comes to judgments, attitudes and reactions to the poor? Are we still among those King Benjamin spoke of who blamed the poor for being poor, withholding their substance from them, and whose substance would perish with them? Our columnist is not speaking alone of the need to provide food, shelter, clothing and heat for those who are without, but also of the attitudes by which we seek to justify our with-holding of these things from them. If she is right and the world could feed and clothe the hungry and destitute if it wanted to, how much more true it must be that justice and equity could be brought about within the Church, if we wanted to.

The following excerpts are from the writings of one William Law, published over a span of forty years during the early 1700's. Perhaps the bluntness of his comparisons may shock us into a close scrutiny of our attitudes and actions.

"All things are God's, so all things are to be used and regarded as the things of God.

"True devotion will make us religiously exact in the use of our money and worldy goods.

"As the holiness of Christianity consecrates all states and employment of life unto God, as it requires us to aspire after universal obedience, doing and using every thing as the servants of God, so are we more especially obliged to observe this religious exactness in the use of our estates and fortunes.

"The reason of this would appear very plain, if we were only to consider that our estate is as much the gift of God as our eyes or our hands, and is no more to be buried or thrown away at pleasure, than we are to put out our eyes, or throw away our limbs as we please.

"If there be nothing so glorious as doing good, if there is nothing that makes us so like to God, then nothing can be so glorious in the use of our money, as to use it all in works of love and goodness, making ourselves friends, and fathers, and benefactors, to all our fellow-creatures, imitating the Divine love, and turning all our power into acts of generosity, care, and kindness to such as are in need of it. "Another great reason for devoting all our estate to right uses, is this: because it is capable of being used to the most excellent purposes, and is so great a means of doing good. If we waste it we do not waste a trifle, that signifies but little, but we waste that which might be made as eyes to the blind, as a husband to the widow, as a father to the orphan; we waste that which not only enables us to minister worldly comforts to those that are in distress, but that which might purchase for ourselves everlasting treasures in heaven. So that if we part with our money in foolish ways, we part with a great power of comforting our fellow-creatures, and of making ourselves forever blessed.

"If a man had eyes, and hands, and feet, that he could give to those that wanted (needed) them; if he should either lock them up in a chest, or please himself with some needless or ridiculous use of them, instead of giving them to his brethren that were blind and lame, should we not justly reckon him an inhuman wretch? If he should rather choose to amuse himself with furnishing his house with those things, than to entitle himself to an eternal reward, by giving them to those that wanted (needed) eyes and hands, might we not justly reckon him mad?

Now money has very much the nature of eyes and feet; if we either lock it up in chests, or waste it in needless and ridiculous expenses upon ourselves, whilst the poor and the distressed want it for their necessary uses; if we consume it in the ridiculous ornaments of apparel, whilst others are starving in nakedness; we are not far from the cruelty of him that chooses rather to adorn his house with the hands and eyes than to give them to those that want (need) them.

"Every exhortation of the scripture to be wise and reasonable, satisfying only such wants as God would have satisfied; every exhortation to be spiritual and heavenly; every exhortation to love our neighbor as ourselves, to love mankind as God has loved them, is a command to be strictly religious in the use of our money."

I am not suggesting that the Church go public in propounding these things. I am suggesting that there is a need for us to pause and take a thorough look at the concepts we hold in the light of these scripture teachings, and of our practice in the light of those concepts, to see with clarity the attitudes which dominae our actions, and which, in the reasoning of William Law, may be robbing us of the very goal we are struggling for; which if held to may exclude us from that kingdom of heaven towards which our hearts yearn.

THE LORD SHALL BUILD UP ZION

"Thou shalt arise, and have mercy upon Zion: for the time to favor her, yea, the set time, is come. For thy servants take pleasure in her stones, and favor the dust thereof. So the heathen shall fear the name of the Lord, and all the kings of the earth thy glory. When the Lord shall build up Zion, he shall appear in his glory. He will regard the prayer of the destitute, and not despise their prayer. This shall be written for the generation to come: and the people which shall be created shall praise the Lord." Ps. 102:13-18.

With regard to Zion, I feel this is something that is a matter of our more eminent or desirable concerns, perhaps more than anything else we might discuss or have on our minds in the time in which we live, because, surely the events that are transpiring around us in the world today should cause us to realize that except the Lord does bring about that blessed condition that is referred to so abundantly in the scriptures of truth in which a people shall be prepared and ready for the coming of the Savior, and except that condition is brought about very shortly there perhaps would be no flesh that would be spared, before God

And I say this advisedly, because we are given to understand by the word of the prophets of old that the conditions that are to be, and are in the latter days are like unto that which was had in the days of Lot; also in the days of Noah; the imaginations of men's hearts being evil continually and becoming such a gross matter of insult to the righteous souls that are on the earth, though few they may be, that it behooves us to be thinking in terms of Zion and it's literal fulfillment, as I believe to be in our day and time, in the day and time of those of this generation. We need to be concerned about the conditions that will bring about Zion. And I want to say unequivically that I believe that Zion is really the destiny of the Church of Christ, and of course I'm speaking in so far as the earthly destiny is concerned realizing that the primary thing is salvation of the souls of of men; to bring them into a covenant relationship with God by which they might inherit a place at his right hand.

We should realize as the scripture gives us to understand that the time will come that the saints will inherit the earth. We are told to pray for that because God himself, in the presence of his Son, Jesus Christ, is going to dwell upon the earth again, and there's going to be peace prevailing upon the face of the earth and the hearts of the children of men will have been changed greatly from the grevious condition of sin and the gross wickedness that presently prevails, and which I believe is going to prevail to a greater extent

in the future than it has up till this time. That all is going to change and yet we should realize that this can only come about when and because the children of men have permitted the Spirit of God to change their hearts and their relationships one with another, insomuch that they become like the Master.

Going back to the scripture reading, I want to emphasize that the first verse said, the Lord shall arise and have mercy upon Zion for the time to favor her, yea, the set time is come. And that when the Lord should build up Zion that he would appear in his glory. And in the last verse it says, this shall be written for the generation to come and the people that shall be created shall praise the Lord. That's a rather peculiar terminology, but yet it is so appropriate to the facts as we understand them so to be given to us in a propheic sense, in the scripture.

We realize that the whole creation of God has been accomplished from the very beginning; that there was accomplished a spiritual creation and then a physical formation of all things and in which the Lord has caused that his Spirit should be breathed upon all that he had formed in bringing life to all things that do possess life, not only as far as the human family is concerned but also the animal family and the vegetable family. We believe that all these things exist by reason of the creative process that took place in which this Spirit of God was placed within all living things. But here it speaks of a people that shall be, and that's future tense, which shall be created shall praise the Lord. We must necessarily look upon that in a slightly different sense from what I've just been speaking of. It's speaking of that which I referred to a moment ago; a change taking place in the hearts of men, creating them to become godlike, causing them to become more like the Master.

And when the Lord has accomplished this thing, and which I'm fully persuaded will be accomplished in these the latter days in this generation, then there will come that blessed event of which I have spoken, when Christ shall dwell upon the earth and peace shall prevail amongst the children of men. I read in connection with this 102 Psalm, going over to the 60th chapter of Isaiah, verses 21 and 22, and remember that I said that Zion is the destiny of the Church of Christ, and I believe this is exactly what is referred to in these two verses. "Thy people also shall be all righteous: they shall inherit the land forever, the branch of my planting, the work of my hands, that I may be glorified-A little one shall become a thousand, and a small one a strong nation: I the Lord will hasten it in his time." And I want to say that this is the time, this is the set time for the Lord to begin the gathering of his people of the latter days and the establishment of Zion.

We're living right in the very opening moments of that blessed event that is going to transpire in which a people shall indeed be a branch of the Lord's planting. They will be his creation because he will have put his Spirit upon them because they have turned their hearts unto him. Note, he speaks of this as a branch of his planting, the work of my hands. And we're told in the scripture by the Master himself, "I am the vine, ye are the branches," and he goes on to tell us further that except the branches shall abide in the vine that there is no life there, that it shall wither and die. Therefore the importance of impressing upon our minds as the very essential element of the establishment of Zion the fact that there must come an abiding power within us, a desire upon our hearts to become godlike; to become as the Master of men. This is the only thing that will produce Zion. When that blessed event takes place, note that he says, a little one shall become a thousand and a small one a strong nation. I glory in that thought because we realize that the Lord uses the small the weak, the insignificant in the accomplishment of his purposes and we read that there was to be a stone that was cut out of the mountain without hands that was to roll until it fliled the whole earth and we are told that that stone was the Kingdom of God.

The Church of Christ represents the Kingdom of God upon the earth today notwithstanding the fact that there are those elements yet within us as a people that are not altogether as they should be; that God is going to have a cleanse and sanctify the body in order that there might be a people brought down into the depths of humility and to rise to the heights of righteousness that shall qualify them to be known indeed as the saints of the most high God. When this blessed event takes place the Lord will have then made a small one become a great nation. We're told in the Book of Mormon, that the saints of God, the people of the Church of the Lamb of God, were few and their dominions were small upon the face of the earth, and contrariwise the great and abominable church which is the church of the devil, would be a large people upon the face of the earth. But the Lord was to arm his saints with power, and we're looking forward to that time when the power of heaven will be upon the saints of God and they shall indeed have become a mighty instrument in the hands of God in the accomplishment of his purposes.

Going to the 61st chapter of Isaiah, I want to read just the 3rd. verse. Here the prophet is speaking of the Lord himself, of the great mission that was to be accomplished by Jesus Christ, and he says concerning him, "To appoint unto them that mourn," in other words Christ was going to "appoint unto them that mourn in Zion, to give unto them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness; that they might be called trees of right-eousness, the planting of the Lord, that he might be glorified." Now note this, he's going to give unto those that mourn in Zion, beauty for ashes, in other words this is speaking prophetically of a terrible time of tribu-

ulation spoken of by Christ and by Daniel that was to occur in the latter day and I'm very sure that this mourning that will be had by the people of God will be to a large extent because of the wickedness, the distress amongst the nations; that is in existence right at the present time.

Wickedness is becoming the order of the day, and has become so prevalent as to become acceptable in the hearts, the conversations, in the activities of the children of men. Sin is no longer sin so far as the world is concerned, as far as this great nation is concerned. You hardly hear about sin except, of course, from the pulpits as we have it brought to our attention by the ministers of the day, and I give credit to those who are very much concerned about sin outside of the Church of Christ. I give them credit and I believe the Spirit of God is working, but where there is one voice lifted up against the power of wickedness that is upon the face of the earth, there is a hundred or a thousand that are seeking to lead the children of men into darkness, and call it light.

The Lord is going to appoint unto them that mourn in Zion, to give them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness that they might be called trees of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, as we read prior to this, that he might be glorified. Again we have in the 62nd chapter of Isaiah, verse 1, "For Zion's sake I will not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest," the Lord speaking, "until the righteousness thereof go forth as brightness, and the salvation thereof as a lamp that burneth." The Lord is going to accomplish this task; and I'll tell you that if we will not submit ourselves that the leading of the Spiri of God will lead us into the ways of truth and righteousness, the Lord is going to take us out of the way that those that remain may be a people that will be a choice planting of his, whom he will lift up as an ensign upon the mountains, in which the nations will be able to see the great power of God. Yes, it's time that we were making that preparation within our lives in order that we might indeed be the Zion of God.

There is a thought that is sometimes presented with regard to Zion, that we might discuss just a little, and that is that there must be a Celestial law given. And of course we don't find that given in just that way in the Bible and Book of Mormon; we do find reference to it in latter day revelation, and I don't have any objection to the idea of there being a Celestial law of God that will be necessary for the establishment of Zion. I don't have any qualms or any feeling against the idea of there being a Celestial law, but I think sometimes that there are those who have not really considered from the scripture standpoint what the Celestial law of God is. This is really what I'm concerned about today, what is that Celestial law? It has been termed as a law of consecration in latter day revelation,

and I'm not opposed to the idea of there being a consecration. As a matter of fact, I am fully and heartily in favor of the idea of a consecration, but when I consider consecration I believe that I do so in terms of that which is revealed in the Bible and the Book of Mormon as that which contains the fullness of the gospel, not as being just simply a consecration of our monies or of our substance. But it's a consecration of our lives, of all that we have, and I can't consider the law of consecration in any other terms than that there should be a consecration of our lives, our very souls to God so that he has the pre-eminence there. Yes, above anything else in life.

I'm going to read to you what I'm persuaded within my own mind is the consecration law as found in the scripture and this is found in the 22nd chapter of Matthew, and here we find that there was one who was a lawyer who came to Christ and tempting him, saying, "Master, which is the great commandment in the law?" Pause right there; he's saying, what is the great commandment in the law? If the Lord gives him the answer to that, I can hardly believe it could be other than the Celestial law. So he is going to give him the answer and tell him what the Celestial law really is, and here it is, "Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind." Pause there; have you committed your soul in love to God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind? Well he says that's the great commandment. It's a part of it anyway. He says, "This is the first and great commandment and the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." I'm going to suggest that there is the Celestial law of the Kingdom of God, right there

It isn't that we haven't heard these things, every one of you, I daresay, except it be some of your little children are well aware of this scripture that I have just read. You know what the great commandment is, you know what the great law of God is. The problem is just putting it into effect in our lives. That's the problem, isn't it? It is something that must engage all our attention; it must engage our attention at this time and from here on as it has never done before. "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, mind, soul and strength; Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." It doesn't say anything about loving yourself, does it? Because that's just so human that we love ourselves and we love our families. I think most of us do really love our families although we're living in a world today that doesn't have much love of family, speaking in a broad sense If they did there would be some teaching going on that would not be permitting our children to do some of the things that are being done, the things that they are engaged in today that is making a generation of people to rise up that

will be further down the road spiritually than the present generation, if it keeps on.

I don't say this just in regard to our children ,because we are all the children of our fathers and mothers and we are to a very great extent that which we have been taught, or the failure of that teching that has been had for us. We are down the line; each generation is going further down spiritually and morally in everything that pertains to truth and righteousness. But God is to create a generation of people by his Spirit that He would place his approval upon. I want you to note that both of these commandments were based on love. We hear a lot about love, but when you come down to really loving God, it is keeping his commandments, and the doing of just such things as He has caused to be spoken here, by his Son.

Turning over to the book of 1st John, and reading from the 4th chapter, just verse 16. "And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him." We're told further here that by this we shall know that we love God, if we love our brethren, and of course not only our brethren but our fellowmen also, even as we love ourselves. I'm quite sure that what we need is to comprehend what the love of God is. We're told very plainly in the scripture that God so loved the world that he gave his only Begotten Son that whose should believe on him might not perish but have everlasting life. And yet sometimes I wonder if some of us in the Church of Christ really understand that much of God's love. The Christian world today in general, and to some extent this has found place within the Church of Christ, seems to have the idea that God only loves us when we come to Him and confess Christ, and if we haven't come to that point we are lost. As I say, this has found lodgment even within the Church of Christ, and so I think that some of us have really not comprehended how great the love of God is; because we are told in the scripture that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us. He loved us, that He might bring us to Him.

I'm not trying to get away from the idea that God expects us to come to him when we have the gospel preached, but I would like us to really seek to comprehend just how great the love of God is that reaches down and seeks to lift an erring soul, and that Christ is the good Shepherd who will go after that which is lost until he find it. I believe that when we have really come to comprehend that, we will begin to comprehend the love of God. This says that he that dwelleth in love, dwelleth in God and God in him. Christ has made the statement in the scripture and it's recorded, "Search the scriptures for in them ye think ye have eternal life, and they are they which testify of me." He went on further to say that, "they will not come to me because they have not known me," I'm putting my

THE MARTYRDOM

(Part III)

At the house of Hyrum Smith a little way off, the scene was not less heartrending. His wife had gathered her family of four children into the sitting room the youngest sat on her lap. The poor and disabled that fed at the table of the husband had come in and formed a group around the room. They were all sobbing and weeping, each expressing his grief in his own peculiar way. Mrs. Smith seemed stupified with horror at the deed. While these scenes were being enacted in the city, the bodies were on their way from Carthage. To preserve peace and prepare the citizens to endure the ordeal with resignation, a general assembly was called at 10 o'clock a.m. which was addressed by W. W. Phelps and Col. Buckmaster of Alton, aide-de-camp to Governor Ford.

No one thought of revenge; all seemed overpowered with grief. At three o'clock in the afternoon the bodies arrived in charge of Marshal Samuel H. Smith the only surviving brother of the murdered men,* and followed by Dr. Richards and Mr. Hamilton of Carthage. They were received near the temple ground by General Joseph Smith's staff, the major general and staff and brigadier general and staff and other commanders of the Nauvoo Legion; the city council and a vast concourse of citizens. The officials formed around the bodies, the mass silently opening to give them way. As the mournful procession moved on, the women broke out in lamentation at the sight of the rude boxes in the wagon covered by the Indian blanket. The weeping was communicated to the crowd and spread along the vast waves of humanity extending from the temple to the residence of the prophet. The groans and sobs and shrieks, grew deeper and louder till the sound resembled the roar of a might tempest or the slow roar of a distant tornado. When the bodies arrived at the mansion of Mrs. Emma Smith the people numbering eight or ten thousand mostly Mormons and in close sympathy with the deceased pressed about the house and the loud wail of the mourners outside and the family within were truly terrible.

Means to divert the multitude were finally in requisition to aid in making way for the removal of the bodies into the house. Judge Phelps, Doctor Richards and Messrs: Wood and Reed — the two latter having been the Smith's counsel, moved to different places and began addressing them. Mr. Wood, who was from Fort Madison and a lawyer of high standing was very severe in his commendations of the whole affair and censured Governor Ford in particular for the careless and guilty part he had acted in not protecting the prisoners. The bodies were carried into the dining room and about a dozen resolute men who could stand the scent of blood, were selected to lay them out. This occupied an hour or more and they were arranged un-

der the west window of the room and their familles were brought in to take the first look of the dead husbands, children and fathers. As the door opened the prophet's wife entered with two attendants. She advanced a few steps towards the body of Hyrum, swooned and fell to the floor. Her friends raised her up and gave her water but she fainted again and was carried out insensible. Six times she attempted to see th bodies and six times she was removed in the arms of her attendants. Hyrum's wife next entered the room with her four children supported by no one, she having resolved to bear the scene with her poor orphans. She trembled at every step and nearly fell but reached her husband's body, kneeled down by him, clasped her arms around his head turned his pale face upon her heaving bosom and then a gushing plaintive wail burst from her lips: O' Hyrum, Hyrum; are you dead? O! speak to me, my dear Hyrum. She drew him closer and closer to her bosom; kissed his pale lips and face, put her hand on his brow and brushed back his hair.

The time measured only unto man came to an end for our sister in Christ, Ruby J. Bryant, on January 3, 1983, at a late hour in her life of 80 years. She passed from this life at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Grace and Virgil Rudd of Independence,, Missouri. She was born on December 10, 1902 the second of four children the daughter of Charlie P. and Lelia A. Daniel. She was united in marriage April 30, 1924 to D. Ray Bryant of the rural Cowgill area. To this union were born two sons and two daughters: Gerald R. and Loren D. Bryant, Cowgill; Mrs. Grace Rudd and Mrs. Marcia Christian, Independence, Missouri. She lived in the Braymer-Cowgill area nearly all her life.
