Editorial

HOLD UP YOUR LIGHT!

As time goes by, we see the condition of the world worsening. We, in the church of Christ, feel the need to speak out against the increasing wrongs and to expose the evil powers of influence for what they really are. Unfortunately, our weak voices and limited means can't seem to reach far enough.

But, why can't we more effectively counter this world of sin? Could it be that we are not sufficiently righteous? Could it be that our individual lives are not pure enough to project this gospel as our Lord would have them to be?

Although we feel unworthy in many respects, we are compelled through a sense of responsibility to struggle forth in weakness to meet the increasing reign of sin in the wirld. We cannot afford the luxury of silence when so great a responsibility is laid upon our shoulders.

As a church we should be carrying forth this gospel—the fullness of the gospel—that all might see the truth. Our failure, if we wish to confess that we are failing to effect the world to the degree that we are called to do, is in our individual lives. We are not letting the true light shine through us; we are not yet that city that is set upon a hill.

Jesus said that he is the light of the world and that those who would follow him would not walk in darkness, but they would have the light of life (John 8:12).

Also we are told that they (we) are the light of the world (Matt. 5:14). If we are his people, we can conclude from this that Jesus gives us the responsibility of projecting and conveying his light (his gospel) to the world. We are not the source of the light, but we are transmitters. We must realize that our light is of no value unless it is a pure light, even as Jesus is pure.

To illustrate, one might liken himself to a pane of clear glass. He, the glass, is the means by which the light shines through unto others.

We know that a true pane of glass has no blemishes nor deformities. If it is clean and spotless, one can see through it perfectly. Also, light can be transmitted through it perfectly.

However, if the glass is dirty, the light is somewhat dimmed. The dirt or smudges are usually noticed rather than the light. Also, if the glass is faulty, it gives wavy or distorted effect.

So it is with our lives. If our lives are dirty, if we have lived an unclean life, then the light of the gospel cannot shine through us in its purity. Our lives are reducing the true effect of the gospel. No matter how much we claim to know this gospel, our presentation cannot be truly effective.

It is also true that if we have followed the precepts of men rather than the precepts of God, that we will distort the true light. If the light is to shine through us perfectly, we must be a clear, clean glass. Our lives must be clear of false doctrine and of sin. We have this responsibility individually. We can see why the Lord has commanded us to be perfect even as our Father in heaven is perfect.

In using this illustration, we might consider the stained glass windows in most church buildings and temples. Stained glass will let only a limited amount of light shine through, and it colors and diffuses it. The pure light cannot shine through.

It is rather ironic that that is what has happened to the gospel in many of the churches today. They have colored and distorted the truth. They are not letting the purity or fullness of the gospel shine through because of the precepts of men.

It is also true that stained glass does not show dirt or smudges like clear glass does. Using the comparison in our own lives, we can hide our sins more easily behind false docrines than we can if we are proclaiming the true doctrine of Christ.

This is an example to us: we are not to let our faulty precepts, traditions and beliefs stand in the way of the pure gospel. We must seek the truth and do as Jesus has said: "... he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God" (John 3:21). "Therefore hold up your light that it may shine unto the world. Behold I am the light which ye shall hold up—that which ye have seen me do" (3rd Nephi 8:54,55).

ARE WE GROWING?

A Sermon by Elder Frank Fann

This morning, our Brother was talking about being prepared, getting our lives in order that we may be able to meet our heavenly Father. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold all things are become new." This was one of the things he was talking about this morning, was changing, was repenting of the things that we are doing that are contrary to Christ's law and in so doing bringing our lives into alignment with that which Christ would have us to be. And the question I would like to ask each and everyone here tonight, individually and as a group: "Are we growing?" are we growing in numbers, as a church? As a local? Are we growing in Spiritual gifts? Are we growing in knowledge? Are we growing in understanding?

Turn to 1 Corinthians 12: verse 1. I'm going to read to you some of the Spiritual gifts that we should be growing in, "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I would not have you ignorant. Ye know that ye were gentiles, carried unto these dumb idols, even as ye were led." This is talking about us. We're carried away from time to time to dumb idols. Anything that we put before our Heavenly Father is an idol to us, no matter what that thing may be.

"Wherefore I give you to understand, that no man speaking by the Spirit of God calleth Jesus accursed: and that no man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the Holy Ghost." Now that is a spiritual gift; and by that we can call Jesus the Lord. "Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which

worketh all in all. But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal. For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom;" Is the word of wisgrowing among us? Are we becoming a wise people so as to be able to prepare to meet our heavenly Father-

"To another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit;" Are we becoming more knowledgable concerning the gospel of Jesus Christ? "To another faith by the same Spirit;" Are we growing in faith or are we on a plane that we have all reached and are floating along? "To another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit; To another the working of miracles; to another prophesy; to another discerning of spirits; to another divers kinds kinds of tongues; to another the interpretation of tongues."

How long has it been since you have heard the gift of tongues within this church? Do we lack? Are we ready to meet our heavenly Father, really ready? "But all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will."

Move over in the same reading to the 27th verse. "Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular;" We are the body of Christ, we have gone into the waters of baptism, we have accepted Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior, and we have claim on these spiritual gifts that he's talking about here, but they are getting away from us; they are in the church less and less and this a condemnation to each one, because we are not preparing ourselves to enter into God's kingdom; we are not obedient enough, we are not righteous enough and we must repent of our sins and go in a new direction.

"And God hath set some in the church, first Apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healings, helps, governments, diversities of tongues. Are all Apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Are all workers of miracles? Have all the gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? But covet earnestly the best gifts; and yet show I unto you a more excellent way."

He goes on in the 13th chapter and tells us the excellent way, and he tells that by this way all will come closer to God, and that is to have charity among us. To love one another and to love God. That is the only way that we will see these things more manifest in the church; more tongues, more miracles, more healings.

Jesus said, "..... If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, remove hence to yonder place; and nothing shall be impossible to you." Wouldn't that be marvelous, not to move mountains, no but to pray and nothing be impossible to us? Anything that we would ask, that was good, God would grant unto us? Oh, what a happy and joyful people we would be; what a mighty work we would do for Christ.

Turn to the Book of Mormon on page 220, starting with the 20th verse. I want to read a bit about knowledge, and I want to see if we're growing in that knowledge. "Even so I would that ye should remember, and always retain in remembrance, the greatness of God, and your own nothingness, and his goodness and long suffering toward you unworthy creatures." We are unworthy. We aught not to think more highly of ourselves than we are. The Bible tells us we are to realize our place in the scheme of things, we are to realize that God is holy, that God is all-powerful and that we are to follow him.

"And humble yourselves even in the depths of humility, calling on the name of the Lord daily, and standing steadfastly in the faith of that which is to come, which was spoken by the mouth of the angel; And behold, I say unto you, that if ye do this, ye shall always rejoice, and be filled with the love of God, and always retain a remission of our sins; And ye shall grow in the knowledge of the glory of him that created you, or in the knowledge of that which is just and true." We shall grow in knowledge if we do the things that God tells us to do.

"And ye will not have a mind to injure one another, but live peaceably, and to render to every man according to that which is his due." To live peaceably one with another; there should be no back-biting, no contention, if we truly follow after Jesus Christ.

Turn to page 438; this is just a little side issue here, verses 37-39. "And now, it has hitherto been wisdom in God, that these things should be preserved: for behold, they have enlarged the memory of this people, yea, and convinced many of the error of their ways, and brought

them to the knowledge of their God, unto the salvation of their souls." He's talking about this Book of Mormon; this book will enlarge our knowledge. "Yea, I say unto you, were it not for these things that these records do contain, which are on these plates, Ammon and his brethren could not have convinced so many thousands of Lamanites, of the incorrect traditions of their fathers; Yea, these records and their words, brought them unto repentance; that is, they brought them to the knowledge of the Lord their God, and rejoice in Jesus Christ their Redeemer." The words in this book will (can?) bring us to repentance, will bring us closer to our heavenly Father, will bring us closer in line with his will concerning us.

Turn with me to the 2nd chapter of 2 Peter, and read a little of what will happen to you and I if we reject these things that God has given us, 20-23 verses, "For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through knowledge of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning." And I believe that we have been able to escape the pollutions of the world by having a knowledge of Jesus Christ, by having a knowledge of what he can do for you and I. We've been able to escape to a certain extent these pollutions that are among us.

"For it had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than, after they have known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them. But it is happened unto them according to the true proverb, The dog is turned to his own vomit again; and sow that was washed to her wallowing in the mire." That's a terrible thing to think about, that you and I who know Christ, you and I who have accepted Jesus as our Lord and Savior, if we do not continue to follow in his paths, if we do not continue to grow daily, coming each day closer to our heavenly Father, coming each day better able qualify ourselves, our end will be worse than our beginning because we will drift away. We cannot stay stagnant, we cannot stay on the same plane, because it is human nature to be moving ahead or sliding backwards.

Are we growing in understanding? Knowledge is the coming in contact with the fact but understanding is grasping the full meaning of the fact. As a church and as a people, we have come in contact with many facts; we have a knowledge of many things written in the Bible and Book of Mormon, but we're not able to grasp the whole meaning of these facts. We're not able to take these facts and put them into our lives. I ask a question, are we growing in understanding daily in such a degree that there are no disagreements among us? In such a degree that there is pure love and charity among us? And I say that if we are not, then we are not qualifying ourselves to be ready to meet God, ready to meet Jesus and sit on his right hand. We're falling short.

Are we growing in gifts of healing? I know there are

My mind goes back to some of the stories I've read in the history, about some of the marvelous healings that were had in the early church, marvelous healings, even the dead were raised, the crippled were made to walk, children with fever and dying were healed instantly. Our Brother Joseph Smith was poisoned and yet through administration was healed. A brother Whitney had his leg broken with the bones sticking out through the flesh, and he was healed under administration immediately.

Why, I ask, don't we have that today? Where have we fallen down? Where are we short? Where have we not committed our lives to Jesus Christ? It's a condemnation to all of us that each of us individually and collectively can't bring our lives closer to God that we may be able to have these things again amongst us with power.

Are we growing in the gift of prophecy? I've heard very little prophecy within this church lately. What prophecy I've heard was of man, and it came to nought. Is God through working with us now? Has He put us aside? Has He forgotten us? Answer the questions in your own minds. Has He forgotten us? Does He refuse to speak to us anymore? Think back, when was the last time you heard prophecy? The Bible tells us that prophecy is for the edification of the saints. Does God feel now that we should not be edified?

Turn to 1 Corinthians 14. I'm going to read verses 1-4 and then jump over to the 22nd verse. "Follow after charity, and desire spiritual gifts, but rather that ye may prophesy." Charity is that pure love of God, charity is that thing which if followed after, will bring us closer to our heavenly Father, and maybe bring back into the church some of these things that seem to have slipped away from us.

"For he that speaketh in an unknown tongue speaketh not unto men, but to God: for no man understandeth him; howbeit in the spirit he speaketh mysteries. But he that prophesieth speaketh unto men to edification, and exhortation, and comfort. He that speaketh in an unknown tongue edifieth himself; but he that prophesieth edifieth the church."

And now the 22nd verse: "Wherefore tongues are for a sign, not to them that believe, but to them that believe not; but prophesying serveth not for them that believe not, but for them which believe." Do we not stand in need of prophecy? Why isn't our heavenly Father talking to us in prophecy? Why isn't our heavenly Father talking to us in revelation? We believe in revelation;

our church was founded by revelation, and yet revelation has not come unto us because of unbelief, because of drifting away, because we have not prepared ourselves to meet God.

Are we growing in prayer? That may be a strange question. Do we hear prayers of praise and thanksgiving or do we hear prayers that are selfish in nature? Are our prayers answered as they should be, as they were in times past?

I'm thinking of a story, and it's kind of gory, but I'm going to tell it anyway. Maybe you read it a few years ago in the Guidepost magazine. It's about a bush pilot in Alaska. He flew into this lake alone and taxied across the lake. He left the engine running and got out on the pontoon. If you know what a little sea plane is, it has pontoons that you can stand on.

He was standing on the pontoon, and it was a little icy there and he fell into the water. He thought, what a dumb thing I've done, I'll just swim back there, get back into the plane and take off.

As he was struggling back his arm was numb, and he thought, I must have bumped my arm because I have hardly any feeling there. Then he looked, and he had no arm. It had got caught by the propeller and there he was struggling with one arm to get back into that plane.

The blood was spurting out and felt helpless, he felt weak, he felt lost. He thought for a moment of just giving up and sliding under the lake.

Then he thought of the scriptures and he thought of where Christ said, I will never leave you nor forsake you, and he cried out for strength. Prayer was answered then and there. He was able to get back into the plane, he was able to stop the bleeding of his arm and he was able to fly that plane hundreds of miles back to a town because of answered prayer: the kind of prayer that we should have in this church today; the kind of prayer that God has promised to answer to each one of us if we are living to that measure that God wants us to. Where have we fallen down? Where have we fallen short? Why isn't it amongst us today?

Turn to page 426 in the Book of Mormon, verses 177-184, "Do ye remember to have read what Zenos, the prophet of old, has said concerning prayer or worship? For he said, Thou art merciful O God, for thou has heard my prayer in the wilderness:" He will hear our prayers in the wilderness, He will hear our prayers at home, He will hear our prayers in our secret closets if we are living up to that which He wants us to. "Yea, thou wast merciful when I prayed concerning those who were mine enemies, and thou didst turn them to me: Yea. O God. and thou wast merciful unto me when I did cry unto thee in my field; when I did turn to thee in my prayer, and thou didst hear me. And again, O God, when I did turn to my house thou didst hear in my prayer. And when I did turn unto my closet, O Lord, and prayed unto thee, thou didst hear me; yea, thou art merciful unto

thy children when they cry unto thee to be heard of thee, and not or men, and thou wilt hear them; Yea, O God, thou hast been merciful unto me and heard my cries in the midst of thy congregations; yea, and thou hast also heard me when I have been cast out, and have been despised by my enemies; Yea, thou didst hear my cries, and was angry with mine enemies, and thou didst visit them in thine anger, with speedy distruction; and thou didst hear me because of mine afflictions and my sincerity; And it is because of thy Son that thou hast been thus merciful unto me; therefore I will cry unto thee in all mine afflictions; for in thee is my joy; for thou hast turned thy judgments away from me, because of thy Son."

I usually wait until the end of my sermon to read a poem, but this so fits here that I would like to read it now.

Prayers are the stairs we must climb every day, If we would reach God, there is no other way; For we learn to know God when we meet him in prayer

And ask him to lighten our burden of care.

So start in the morning, and though the way steep-Climb ever upward till your eyes close in sleep. For proyers are the stairs that lead to the Lord And to meet him in prayer is the climbers reward.

Are we growing in love as we should? Are we growing in love? Page 768, from verse 50: "And if a man be meek and lowly in heart, and confesses by the power of the Holy Ghost, that Jesus is the Christ, he must needs have charity; for if he have not charity, he is nothing; wherefore he must needs have charity." This is showing us what the problem within the Church of Christ is. We don't have pure love of Christ. "And charity suffereth long, and is kind, and envieth not, and is not puffed up, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil, and rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth, beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things; wherfore, my beloved brethren, of ye have not charity, ye are nothing, for charity never faileth. Wherefore, cleave unto charity, which is the greatest of all, for all things must fail; but charity is the pure love of Christ, and it endureth forever; and whoso is found possessed of it at the last day, it shall be well with them. Wherefore, my beloved brethren, pray unto the Father with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son Jesus Christ, that ye may become the sons of God, that when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is, that we may have this hope, that we may be purified even as he is pure."

Now two verses, 14 & 18 on page 776: "And I would exhort you, my beloved brethren, that ye remember that he is the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever, and that all these gifts of which I have spoken, which are spiritual, never will be done away, even as long as the

world shall stand, only according to the unbelief of the children of men." If God gave the church the gifts yesterday, He'll give them to-day and He'll give them to-morrow, if we follow after Him, because God is an unchangable God. He will give these gifts that I talked about earlier: the gift of knowledge, the gift of wisdom, the gift of love, the gift of the Holy Ghost, the gift of tongues, the gift of prohecying, he gift of healing, all of these things of which He has spoken. It's pretty plain isn't it? If we don't have them today as we think we should, what is the reason? The Book of Mormon tells us what the reason is, it doesn't pull any punches, it doesn't sugar coat it over, it is because of unbelief.

The 18th verse: "And now I speak unto all the ends of the earth, that if the day cometh that the power and gifts of God shall be done away among you, it shall be because of unbelief." Verse 19: "And woe be unto the children of men, if this be the case; for there shall be none that doeth good among you, no not one." How can we grow? What can we do to get ourselves back into the grace of God? A renewed effort, a renewed desire to follow after Him. More prayer, humble prayer, down on our knees in humble prayer before Him; thanking Him and praising Him for that which we have already had and asking that He will show us each the way that we may become closer unto God. Try to pull our minds away from the pollutants of the world, concentrate our efforts and our strengths on spiritual things that are good, that will lead to eternal life. More study. The Bible says to study to show thyself approved, able to give an answer for the hope that is in us; and each of us has that hope. We have that hope that these gifts will be among us in abundance, and the will be, I promise you, they will be if we will come closer to God, if we will cleave unto that charity which God's been talking about.

I'd like to close by reading Colossians, chapter 3, start with the 8th verse. Paul's going to tell us how we can come closer; he's going to tell us how we can put somein our lives that might be able to help us to come closer to God. "Now ye also put off all these; anger," be not angry with your brother, "wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth. Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds;" Right at first I said that we should become a new creature, the peole of God are new people, we've put off the old man we've put aside those things that be contrary to God's commands, "And have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of him that created him; Where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free; but Christ is all and in all." That's what we should put first, Christ. That's what we should put at the head, Christ. We claim to be the body of Christ, we claim to be God's followers, so we should, "Put on therefore, as the elect Of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness if mind, meekness, longsuffering; Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye." Do we do this or do we carry grudges? If we carry grudges we have wrath. We just read that we should put these things away from us.

"And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness." Put on charity, put on that pure love of Christ, toward Christ and toward each other. That's the bond, that's the cement that will hold us together. "And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord." We should help each other, if one of us stumbles, reach down and pick him up. "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him."

I believe that by so doing these things that we will see ourselves growing. We will see ourselves developing and coming to that understanding and coming to that knowledge tha ech one of us wants, coming closer to Christ that we may see more of the gifts of the Spirit of God among us.

JESUS SAID, "I WILL COME AGAIN" Howard Leighton-Floyd

"And if I go and prepare a place for you, I WILL COME AGAIN and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." (John 14:3)

Here we have one of the most reassuring promises made by Jesus. However, it is said that there are over 300 references that can be found in the New Testament indicating that Jesus will come again. All twenty seven books, with the exception of four, refer to his second coming. Over fifty times the believers are exhorted to watch. Consider a few other statistics and we can get a vision of the importance the Lord places upon his second coming. The sacrament of the Lord's supper is mentioned in only four of the twenty seven books. In the writings of the Apostle Paul water baptism is mentioned fifteen times, while the second coming of the Lord is mentioned fifty times. This is not to say that either of these ordinances are less important but it does indicate the importance of the second coming of Jesus Christ. Indeed the eternal plan of salvation for man and the Kingdom of God could not be accomplished without the second coming of Jesus.

Many of the holy prophets, and Jesus the greatest prophet of all, spoke of the signs that would be evident upon the earth and among the children of men, to show to them the nearness of the Lord's return, and the impending judgment to come upon the wicked, in the great and dreadful day of the Lord.

Some of the parables that Jesus gave refer to his second coming. David in the Psalms speaks of the coming kingdom. Psalm 2 and 24 give many details of the kingdom. Isaiah in the eleventh chapter speaks of the Messiah, tells how he will judge, not with the sight of his eyes or with the hearing of his ears, but with righteousness. It speaks of the peaceful condition that will prevail in the Messianic Kingdom and of the great gathering of Israel and Judah and of the unity that will prevail between Ephraim and Judah.

In Isaiah 12, the whole chapter describes how his people will praise and worship in the coming Messianic kingdom. Let's read those words; praise God, His peaple don't have to wait. The sons of God that have the mind of Christ will be worshipping and praising the Lord right now, because he resides in their hearts. Isaiah 9:6-7 speaks of the Messiah's birth but immediately turns to his government, and his names.(9) "Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and justice from henceforth and for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this."

Isaiah 55 speaks to this generation thus, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and he shall have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon." Then in verses 12 and 13 we are told of the joy of all nature in that soon coming kingdom. "For ye shall go out with joy, and be led forth with peace: the mountains and the hills shall break forth before you into singing, and all the trees of the fields shall clap their hands." etc.

In Isaiah 61 the first one and a half verses speak of the Messiah, and Jesus proclaimed the fulfillment of that portion. "And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up: and as his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and he stood up for to read." That day he declared his mission, stopping with these words in verse two. "To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord . . ." the rest of that verse and the chapter had to do with his then future work and kingdom, it is near at hand. (3) "To appoint unto them that mourn in Zion, to give unto them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness; that they might be called trees of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that he might be glorified."

Isaiah 65 among other things speaks of the millennium, the thousand years when Christ will reign upon the earth. I want us to note the condition of the mortal in that blessed period. Soon to come here upon the earth, (18) But be ye glad and rejoice forever in that which I create: for, behold, I create in Jerusalem a rejoicing, and her people a joy."

Isa. 65:19: "And I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and joy in my people: . . ." (20) "There shall be no more thence an infant of days, nor an old man that hath not filled his days: for the child shall die an hundred years old; but the sinner being an hundred years old shall be accursed." (22) ". . . as the days of a tree are the days of my people, and mine elect shall long enjoy the work of their hands." Aren't the conditions as described interesting to contemplate? But we are not through yet. The Lord states, "I will rejoice in Jerusalem, . . ." The prophet Ezekiel gives some other reasons why the Lord will rejoice in Jerusalem. "In the visions of God brought he me into the land of Israel, and set me on a very high mountain, by which was the frame of a city on the south." (Ezek, 40:2)

"Afterward he brought me to the gate, even the gate that looketh toward the east: (2) And behold, the glory of the Lord God of Israel came from the way of the east: and his voice was like the noise of many waters: and the earth shined with his glory." (5) "So the spirit took me up, and brought me into the inner court; and, behold, the glory of the Lord filled the house." (7) "And he said unto me, son of man, THE PLACE OF MY THRONE, and the place of the soles of my feet, where I will dwell in the midst of the children of Israel for ever, . . . (Ezek. 43:1-2-5&7) Zechariah 1:16 confirms these words. "Therefore thus saith the Lord; I am returned to Jerusalem with mercies: my house shall be built in it, saith the Lord of hosts, . . ."

There is going to be a temple built in the near future in Jerusalem. It will be built on the sacred spot of Ornan's threshing floor, where Solomon's temple stood, and where the Mosque of Omer now stands. That's where the throne of David will be. We have just noted Ezekiel was told, "... the place of my throne ..., where I will dwell in the midst of the children of Israel forever. .." That brings to mind the words of the angel to Mary: "And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shall call his name Jesus. He shall be great, and shall be called the son of the Highest: and the Lord God will give unto him the throne of his father David. And heshall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end." (Luke 1:31-32-33)

THE SECOND TIME

"So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear THE SECOND TIME without sin unto salvation." (Heb. 9:28) We should take note that the promise is, "unto those that look for him shall he appear the SECOND TIME" not the third time, not the fourth time. The prophets foretold of the coming of a Messiah. To all who believe that Jesus was the promised Messiah (Christ) the birth, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension into heaven of Jesus fulfills the first coming of the Messiah. The suffering Messiah described in the fifty-third chapter of Isaiah speks of his first coming: "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid it as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not." "Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted." "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and WITH HIS STRIPES WE ARE HEALED." "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." (Isa. 53:-4-5) It was this suffering Messiah that the Jews failed to recognize in Jesus of Nazareth.

The Jews were looking for 'Messiah the King,' the one who would deliver them from their enemies. "But

(Isa. 49: 25,26) Jesus didn't fulfill these promises at his first coming. The Lord didn't make bare his holy arm in the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth didn't see the salvation of our God. (Isa. 52:10)

We are now living in that period of time just prior to the return of Jesus to this planet earth, where so many of the holy prophets and Apostles of old tell us Jesus is going to reign.
