#### **TWO KINDS OF SIN**

There are two kinds of sin; the sins of commission and those of omission. Briefly these are designated by the commandments, "thou shalt" and "thou shalt not." Generally speaking, the sins of omission are the ones the professing Christians are most apt to be guilty of, though they may well still be tempted by the "thou shalt nots." "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin."

There are two of the Lord's teachings which, it seems to me, emphasize the sin of doing nothing. First the parable of the man who fell among thieves, which Jesus told in answer to the lawyer's question, "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:25-37). The sin of the priest and the Levite was, that confronted with another's need, they did nothing. They hadn't robbed or beat or mistreated the man; they simply omitted coming to his rescue and ministering to his relief. They were not neighbor to him that had fallen into distress.

The second is drawn from the Lord's explanation of the judgment, given in Matthew 25:31-45. This emphasizes the seriousness of the sin of omitting to do what one ought. Those given a place on his right hand received that position because of that which they had done, "...unto one of the least of these my brethren,..." Those placed on the left were placed so, because of what they didn't do. They weren't accused of indulging in the "thou shalt nots"; they weren't called murderers, adulterers, robbers, liars, etc., but because they simply didn't do what the others had done. When, "one of the least of these," was hungry, they did not feed them. When one was thirsty they gave no drink; when one was naked, they did not clothe them; when one was sick, or was in prison, they did not visit them or minister unto them. Like the priest and the Levite they simply did nothing; they passed their opportunity by.

It is a sobering thought. Where do we occupy in the picture of these things? Have we, do we fail to feed the hungry? clothe the naked? visit and minister to the sick? visit prisoners? Jesus came to call sinners to repentance. Who needs the hope of the gospel of repentance and of Christ's atonement for sin more than those behind prison bars? Are the sins of their committing worse and more unforgivable in the sight of God than the sins of omission of those outside?

These needs to which Jesus spoke are very real in the world around us and are sometimes among us; but they are not always or only physical. There are those with emotional and spiritual hungers and nakedness; those in spiritual sickness and prisons, people who need love, understanding, friendship; who need forgiveness simply for being what they are that they might be freed and helped to become what they were meant to be. How long does it take for a stranger to feel one of us? None has enough to allay all the world's need, whether physical, emotional, or spiritual; only Christ is sufficient for that. We have a responsibility toward that need about which we can do something, to the extent that we can do something, "For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not." (2 Corinthians 8:12).

We will all be among those standing before that judgment seat to be given our place to the one side or the other according to what we have done, or left undone. Think about it!

#### UNSEALED

"And I saw on the right hand of him that sat on the throne a book written within and on the backside, sealed with seven seals: and I saw a strong angel proclaiming with a loud voice, Who is worthy to open the book, and to loose the seals thereof?

"And no man in heaven nor on earth, neither under the earth was able to open the book, neither to look thereon.

"And I wept much, because no man was found worthy to open and read the book, neither to look thereon.

"And one of the Elders saith unto me, Weep not: Behold, the lion of the tribe of Judah, the root of David, hath prevailed to open the book, and to loose the seals thereof." (Rev. 5: 1 to 5.)

"And I saw when the Lamb opened one of the seals..." (Rev. 6:1)

"... And Behold a white horse: and he that sat upon him had a bow; and a crown was given unto him, and he went forth conquering and to conquer." (Rev. 6:2)

The dictionary defines a seal as something used to secure a letter, lid, wrapper, joint, etc, any instrument that keeps something close, secret, or unknown, or prevents tampering. Only Christ is found to have the authority and power to loose that which has been secured by these seals.

Revelation opens with Christ showing "things which must shortly come to pass." He sends His angel to "signify" future events to His servant, John. (Rev. 1:1)

"Shortly" indicates immediancy, or rapidity, once action begins, also, abrupt, or changing suddenly. Obviously, these seals have been reserved for a time just prior to Christ's second coming. Christ opens them in quick succession, there is nothing to suggest any great interval between them. They lead up to and encompass Christ's return. There is no indication that one ceases his activities when the next one is loosed. They appear not only consequentially, but once loosed are co-existent.

Horses in the Bible are symbolic of power in war. Colors represent the nature of their mission. Riders are those who direct and control such powers.

There is no consensus as to the identity of the rider of the white horse. Generally, he is believed to be symbolic of Christ or Christians. A very few have ventured to suggest that he represents the Antichrist. I believe the preponderance of the evidence points to him as the Antichrist.

Comparisons between Christ and this rider show many discrepancies. This rider is unidentified, whereas Christ made Himself known to all who would hear him at His first coming. (Matt. 16:16, Luke 24:25, John 8:12; 11:25, 27; 12:13; 14:9; Acts 22:6,7,8.) When Christ returns there will be no doubt as to His identity. (Rev. 19:11, 16.) Christ said, I come in my own name, and ye receive me not: another shall come in his own name, him ye will receive. (John 5:43.)

It is surprising how many assume this unknown rider comes clothed in white; when no description whatsoever is given of his attire. He could be anyone wearing any kind or color of clothing.

Christ, however, will come in Vesture dipped in blood, therefore red. "Who is this that cometh from Edom with dyed garments from Bozrah? this that is glorious in his apparel, traveling in the greatness of his strength? I speak in righteousness mighty to save.

"Wherefore art thou red in thine apparel, and thy garments like him that treadeth in the winefat?" (Isa. 63:1, 2.)

This unidentified horseman comes wearing one crown. From whom did he receive it? What does it represent?

Christ comes wearing many crowns. He is crowned King of Kings, and Lord of Lords. (Rev. 17:14, 19:16.)

Out of Christ's mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it he should smite the nations: and he shall rule with a rod of iron: and he treadeth the winepress in the fierceness of the wrath of God. Christ's sword is symbolic of the word of God. (Rev. 1:16, Ephes. 6:17, Heb. 4:12.)

The rider of the white horse carries a bow only, for a weapon. This is but one half a weapon; but then, Satan specializes in half truths, and a half truth is still a lie.

Elisha instructed the King of Israel in the use of his sword and his bow, and again, in the use of his bow and arrow. He called it "the arrow of the Lord's deliverance from Syria." (2 Ki. 6:22; 13:15.) On the other hand, archers and bows are often associated with the enemies of God and His people. (Gen. 49:23, 1 Ki. 22:34, 2 Chron. 18:33, Ezek. 39:1, 4) Some are compared to "deceitful bows."

"They return, but not to the Most High: they are like a deceitful bow: their princes shall fall by the sword for the rage of their tongue: this shall be their derision in the land of Egypt." (Hos. 7:16.)

"Yet they tempted and provoked the Most High God, and kept not his testimonies: but turned back and dealt unfaithfully like their fathers: they were turned aside like a deceitful bow." (Ps. 78:56, 57.)

Satan not only appropriates God's word for his own purposes, he uses his symbols as well.

A recent book entitled, "The Hidden Dangers of the Rainbow," by Constance Cumby, documents a "New Age" movement that has taken the rainbow for its symbol. Memberhip is made up of various groups and societies that form a loosely knit coalition. Ideologies range from Socialistic, Humanistic and Atheistic to outright Satan worship. Many wear or display this emblem unaware of its present significance. The aim of this coalition is comparable to that of the Tower of Babel. They are working for an ideal world without benefit of God or His word.

Sixteen false Christs came before Jesus was born. All were crucified, but none arose from the dead. Satan, knowing the Messiah was to come and die on a cross, made certain that every one of his impostors died on a cross, likewise. Certainly the last Antichrist must resemble Christ in as many ways as is possible. Above all, he must appear to be righteous, or the whole world will not "wonder after and worship him." (Rev. 13:3, 4, 8; 17:2, 8, 15, 18.) His deceptions will be of such a nature that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect. (Matt. 24:24, Mar. 13:22.) As with all other false Christs, the last one must come prior to Christ's return or be everlastingly too late.

This rider comes on a white horse as does Christ at His coming. Just as "all that glitters is not gold" neither is all that purports to be righteous necessarily true.

"And no marvel for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light.

"It is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as ministers of righteousness; whose end is according to their works." (2 Cor. 11:14, 15.)

It may be of interest to note that the United Nations recently adopted a white horse as its emblem!

This unknown rider goes forth conquering and to conquer. One can conquer in more ways than one; by overcoming and subduing by force as in war, or by mental or moral force. Antichrist will likely employ both means.

Nothing is said here of how or whom he intends to conquer. Concerning the Antichrist, we read, "And it was given unto him to make war with the saints, and to overcome them; and power was given him over all kindreds, tongues and nations." (Rev. 13:7.)

At the time John saw this vision, Christ had already conquered and assured His everlasting victory. He was ascended into heaven and seated on the right hand of the Father. (Matt. 26:64, Mar. 14:62, 16:9) All things are under his feet. (Ps. 8:6, 1 Cor. 15:17. Ephes. 1:22, Heb. 2:8) He has the keys of Hell and death. (Rev. 1:18.) He has the key of David, He that openeth and no man shutteth, and shutteth and no man openeth. (Rev. 3:7.) All power is given him in heaven and on earth. (Matt. 28:18.) He has power over all flesh. (John 17:2.) Only Christ has power to bind or loose satanic powers. (2 Pet. 2, 4, Job 1:10, 12, Rev. 9:14; 20:2.)

Satan is a defeated enemy. His eviction notice has been served, but his lease is not yet expired. Christ only awaits his time to come in judgement, claim His inheritance and set up His kingdom.

Christ comes with a visible army, clothed in white. No army is seen to follow the rider on the white horse. The Antichrist will rule over multitudes who will be at his service, but any army he may have is hidden and as unknown as he. Satan always does his best work, incognito!

Of all the evils to come upon the earth in the last days the Antichrist belongs in first place as first cause of the great tribulation that follows after him.

Whenever any nation serves God and honors his word, both history and the Scriptures affirm that they have been blessed with peace and plenty. If these same people forsake God and disobey His work, judgement inevitably follows.

"Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord: and the people whom he has chosen for his inheritance." (Ps. 33:12.)

"For the nation and kingdom that will not serve thee shall perish, yea, those nations shall be utterly wasted." (Isa. 60:12, Jer. 18:7, 10)

Concerning this land the Book of Mormon says, "And now we behold the decrees of God concerning this land, that it is the land of promise, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall serve God, or they shall be swept off when the fullness of his wrath should come upon them.

"For, behold this land is a land which is choice above all other lands: wherefore he that doth possess it shall serve God, or be swept off; for it is the everlasting decree of God.

"And it is not until the fullness of iniquity among the children of the land, that they will be swept off.

"And this cometh unto you, O ye Gentiles, that ye may know the decrees of God, that ye might repent and not continue in your iniquities until the fullness come, they ye may not bring down the fullness of the wrath of God upon you, as the inhabitants of the land have hitherto done.

"Behold, this a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven, if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things we have written." (Ether 1:31 to 35.)

Christ compared the last days to the days of Noah. (Matt. 24:37, Luke 17:26.) In Noah's day, "God saw the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and every imagination of his heart was only evil continually." (Gen. 6:5)

"The earth also was corrupt before God, and the earth was filled with violence. (Gen. 6:11). Could there by any better description of our world today? Alexander Solzenitsyn has said of our time, "The fight for our planet, physical and spiritual, is not a vague matter of the future, it has already started. The forces of evil have begun their decisive offensive."

God is long suffering, not willing that any should perish. (2 Pet. 3:9). But his spirit will not always strive with man. (Gen. 6:3). When God reached the end of His patience in Noah's day, He opened the flood gates. When again the earth becomes corrupt and even surpasses the wickedness of Sodom and Gommorah and Noah's day, Christ opens the seals. (2 Pet. 2:5,6).

"And there went out another horse that was red: and power was given to him that sat thereon to take peace from the earth, and that they should kill one another: and there was given unto him a great sword." (Rev. 6:4).

That a red horse signifying war should emerge from under the second seal should come as no surprise. "Sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death." (Jas. 11:15). War with all its attendant evils is a natural consequence of Godlessness. This horse and rider clearly represent world wide conflict.

War generally causes shortages of goods to some degree.

Some of you may remember that during and after World War Two some items were restricted. Ration books, containing coupons, permitted limited amounts of sugar, shortening, meat and gasoline to be purchased for each person. some things, such as green tea, were unobtainable. Tin cans were flattened and stored in boxes, and every scrap of waste fat was saved to be returned to collection centers for the "war effort."

"And when he opened the third seal... I beheld, and lo a black horse; and he that sat on him had a pair of balances in his hand.

"And I heard a voice in the midst of the four beasts say, A measure of wheat for a penny, and three measures of barley for a penny; and see thou hurt not the oil and the wine." (Rev. 6:5,6).

A black horse represents drouth and scarcities as described by Jeremiah. "The word of God came to Jeremiah concerning the dearth.

"Judah mourneth, and the gates thereof languish: they are black unto the ground: and the cry of Jerusalem has gone up.

"And their nobles sent their little ones to the waters: they came to the pits and found no water: they returned with their vessels empty: they were ashamed and confounded, and covered their heads.

"Because the ground is chapt, for there is no rain in the earth, the plowmen were ashamed, they covered their heads." (Jer. 14:1 to 4).

For behold, the Lord of Hosts doth take away from Jerusalem and from Judah the stay and the staff, the whole stay of bread and the whole stay of water." (Isa. 3:1).

This rider on the black horse measures and sets the price of the grain he carries. The price is exorbitant. Whatever its value in that day, a "penny" comprised an entire day's wages. (Matt. 20:2,9,13).

A "measure" has been estimated to hold a little less than a quart. If it took a day's wages to buy such a small allotment of food, there would be nothing left with which to purchase anything else. Oil and wine would probably be in even shorter supply than grain. If at all obtainable, it would be used sparingly.

Obviously this rider is engaged in commerce. Concerning the woman, Babylon (Antichrist) we read, "For all nations have drunk of the wine of the wrath of her fornication, and the kings of the earth have committed fornication with her, and the merchants of the earth are waxed rich through the abundance of her delicacies." (Rev. 18:3). Kings and merchants are in league with Antichrist.

"And he (the Beast, Antichrist) causeth all, both small and great, rich and poor, bond and free, to receive a mark in their right hand, or in their foreheads:

"And that no man might buy or sell, save he had the mark, or the name of the Beast, or the number of his name.

"Here is wisdom. Let him that hath understanding count the number of the Beast: for it is the number of a man; and his number is six hundred three score and six." (Rev. 13:16,17,18).

The merchants of the earth are in league with Antichrist, they deal in, "The merchandise of gold, and silver, and precious stones, and of pearls, and fine linen, and purple, and silk, and scarlet, and all thyine wood, and all manner vessels of ivory, and all manner vessels of most precious wood, and of brass, and of iron, and marble.

"And cinnamon, and odours, and ointments, and frankincense, and wine and oil, and fine flour, and wheat, and beasts, and sheep, and horses, and chariots, and slaves and souls of men. (Rev. 18:12,13).

They deal, therefore, in necessities, luxuries, slaves and souls of men; indicating traffic in both spiritual and temporal effects.

The cost of privilege to buy and sell is far greater than of temporal goods. The price is no less than a man's soul.

To receive this mark is tantamount to sealing one's soul to the Devil. God's wrath will be poured out on all who take this mark. (Rev. 16:2,9,10).

To risk one's eternal life for such a short term gain  $(3\frac{1}{2} \text{ yrs.} \text{ at the most})$  would be an infinitely regrettable compact.

"For what is a man profited, if he gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matt. 16:26, Mar. 8:36,37).

"For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall find it." (Mar. 8:35, Matt. 16:25).

The black horse symbolizes spiritual as well as temporal famine.

With such vast control of commerce and religion there is bound to be a spiritual famine. "Behold the days come, saith the Lord God, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, nor thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord:

"And they shall wander from sea to sea, and from north even to the east, and they shall run to and fro to seek the word of the Lord, and shall not find it. (Amos 8:11, 12). This has happened before and can happen again. All History is prologue.

Christ, the Word of God, is the bread of eternal life. (John 1:1,14,33,35). Of all the "bread" Satan seeks to destroy, God's word is his prime target.

Brother Addington also read from the 3rd chapter of Revelation, in which Jesus said:

It's nearly spring here in the Ozarks. There's a certain little bird that announces this glad news to me every year and I can hear him out there singing even today. After last week's foot of snow the thought of spring sounds even better.

Our guest speaker for the month of January was Brother Loren Bryant from Cowgill, Mo. He began his sermon by telling us that he wanted to talk of salvation and things that might bind us together. He spoke of the mercy of the Lord and how it reaches out to individuals. He read to us from Revelations 2:2-4 and 2:9-11 telling us that we need to understand how serious these few days of life here on earth are. He spoke also of the second death found in Rev. 20:5-6 saying that some will not listen and will be partakers of this second death. We are in possession of the knowledge of good and evil. God doesn't require us to love sin, but to love the sinner. We live in a privileged time. The gospel has been restored and we have a hope of life everlasting. Rev. 3:20-22, "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man will hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me. To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, and am set down with my Father in his throne. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches."

An excellent sermon was brought to us January 29th by Brother Oren Caviness. He said we must pick up our cross DAILY. We set an example no matter where we are or who we're with. If you make light of God or morals you cast an image -- an example. If you believe certain things are important you must live a life that reflects such. God doesn't condemn us for falling, but he will for staying there! Christ's gospel is a gospel of action. It takes more that lip service. Loud protestations are no guarantee that we'll have eternal life -- with Christ. The living center of our lives should be spiritual. What makes a man good? The church he belongs to? The number of times he attends on Sunday? What about the "WEAK"-days? Is it, then, the amount of tithing he pays that will make him good? Or maybe the things he DOESN'T do wrong? It's the habit -- the spiritual habit. It's what you do with what you have -your time and energy. We can't get by on someone else's virtues. When you take part in a good service or purpose, you align yourself on God's side.

On February 12th, Brother Allen Kauffman was our speaker. He titled his sermon, "Living for Jesus", after Olivia Yates had played a beautiful version of that song for us as a special. He said nothing could have been more appropriate. He used Solomon as a reference. What Solomon asked of God was an understanding heart to discern between good and bad so he could judge the people. Because he didn't ask for possessions and such, he was not only granted wisdom, but also great riches. Matt. 6:33, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Brother Kauffman had several comments referring to how we can let others influence how we live. That we must not let ourselves be pulled away, but must endure to the end. He listed three attributes of an athlete he heard on T.V. from a sportscaster and applied them to our Christian lives. They were: desire, determination and discipline. He finished by quoting Joshua 24:14-15: "Choose you this day whom ye will serve..."

Brother Leslie Case was our guest speaker for February. He said it was a great blessing to be here -that obstacles had loomed up, but never materialized. He spoke of a great task that is laid before the people and read Luke 17:20-21: "... the kingdom of God is within you." Then 3rd Nephi 5:60-63 which says we are the salt of the earth, a city set on a hill, a lighted candle. Also he made reference to Matt. 13:44-46 where it speaks of a merchant man seeking goodly pearls and when he found one pearl of great price, went and sold all he had, and bought it. He then asked, "Am I ready to sell all I have to buy that pearl?" Do we have provisions to put on our selling or buying? Can I give God my heart, 100%? He closed with a beautiful reading done after the fashion of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Our Brother Larry Shaw spoke to us the following Sunday on something he says is not very often preached about from the pulpit -- money. He asked four questions: 1. Does God want us to have wealth? 2. Does God want us to be poor? 3. Does wealth guarantee that we'll go to hell? 4. Does poverty guarantee that we'll go to heaven? He said we must define these things. Poverty is not a gift of God. "Things' are put on this earth to use. (Gen. 1:28-31) If they're used properly God is pleased -- if not??? What does God expect of us? He told us to pray for discernment. He told us God's natural law was that man should have joy and prosper. He said it is a great experience to be able to give -- spiritually or monetarily. Pray always. Matt. 6:31-33, "Therefore take no thought saying, What shall we eat?...But seek ye first the kingdom of God..."

Another tall, sturdy man, Michael, (a stranger to us) stood shivering in the cold beside a highway in the Twin Cities area with a shaving kit in his gloveless hand, the snow swirling about him. He bowed his head and prayed, "God, You know I am cold and stranded. What am I going to do? Please help me."

Ben, in the comfort of his home was thinking, "there must be some way to convince my friend of God's power and love" -- and he prayed for God to show him how...for God to give him "something" that would have significance and meaning to speak to his friend's spiritual being and plant faith in God there. (Ben's ministry comes first in his young life, and his ministry bids him bring this friend to know Christ.)

Two minutes after Mike's prayer for God's help, John, with family aboard, stopped and inquired of Mike, "Where are you headed?" "Rochester," was the answer. "Climb aboard! We're headed for church in Minneapolis and will take you along with us. We have a church member who lives in Rochester and can take you back with him. We expect him for dinner at our house after church." On the way, Mike explained that he had been hired to help a man with cargo handling. He had been with the employer, the work finished and pay expected. However, the employer had found opportunity to take off without Mike, whose suitcase containing his clothing, was in the former employer's truck. All Mike had in his gloveless hands was his shaving kit. No pay and no suitcase.

Our Bible study was in progress at church. Mike was introduced and joined in with contributions to the study, in a clear voice with good diction which evidenced knowledge of the Bible and a keen mind, as well as a probable good upbringing. His pleasant smile and somewhat embarrassed chuckle at his predicament caused our hearts to embrace him in welcome.

Ben, from Rochester, was just thirty-five minutes late getting to church. Road conditions added twenty-one extra minutes to the 14-minute late start. Exceptionally good time, considering the snow storm in progress! For one whose intent was to stay off the highways.

We know that some of our families had been having colds and flu; and that Ruth and Tom were visiting family in sunny Phoenix and San Diego. But our congregation was sizeable. During testimony session, Mike told us of his prayer for help. Ben told us of his prayer request for some special witness for his friend's doubting. Fervent prayers both! Neither denied! Someone commented that Gary and Gloria probably would not make it this day. We missed their family. But they had something else of importance required of them to do: They had started to church. News of road conditions on their truck radio, plus lack of visibility, the thickening snow...caused fear of not being able to get back home after church. Sacrament Service is the life force of the Christian; but God requires a "reasonable" service. To jeopardize family safety was perhaps beyond reasonable service. Already two-thirds of the way to church, they reluctantly turned back homeward.

Out in their snowy path was a lone woman motorist. Her destination was a "funeral" at some miles distance beyond this storm in Minnesota. Maybe she was beginning to hope that a second funeral would not be her own. Her car was stalled. Who can say whether her prayers were sent heavenword for God's assistance? Gary was able to find the trouble caused by the snow, beneath the hood of her car. He was able to quickly take care of it for her, and saw her gratefully on her way.

A Special Spirit was present at our Minneapolis meeting. We renewed our covenant. Prayers and testimonies were good. The "closed communion" had been lovingly explained to our guest who accepted the explanation appreciatively. We appreciated his contribution to the meeting and prayed whole heartedly for his need of employment. There was a confidence that God would so provide. The Confidence Itself was there -- much more than just a "feeling" or a feeble hope! Mike promises to meet with us again upon his return to the Twin Cities and we assured him of a warm welcome.

Ben and Mike had invitation to dinner with John and family. Gary, later in the afternoon explained by telephone to Forest, their absence of the morning.

How come all these "coincidences" during the snow storm on March 4? The only one who could not have stayed at home (and justifiably so) in warmth and comfort was Mike. He sure did need some Fatherly looking after -- And was not given a stone. How come an elderly woman pushed a swollen foot into a big sports shoe to be there? ## ALL RIGHT, LET'S LOOK AT JOB

Every time I have made the statement that God does not put trouble or trials on us, some one says, "But look at Job." This tells me that they have not looked at Job. So let's take a look.

In order to understand Job we must start with faith. One could write pages on faith, but let's keep it as short as possible. Faith is a law of God and it works whether we believe it or not. "For what if some did not believe? Shall their unbelief make the faith of God without effect? God forbid: yea, let God be true, but every man a liar; as it is written, That thou mightest be justified in thy sayings, and mightest overcome when thou art judged." (Romans 3:3,4) Faith in God does not fail, but we can cause faith to fail as we will see by looking more closely at Job.

The Lord told Peter that Satan "... desired to sift him." The Greek word desired translates demanded. Now the Lord doesn't sift, Satan does.

Many of us think that God puts trials on us, but the truth of the matter is, He gives us the way out. If we feel that God is laying it on us, we will, of course, not resist, for who would want to resist God? Thus we willingly submit to these burdens. Believing that way causes a great blow to our faith. Therefore Satan, the great enemy of our faith, has won another round.

Patience is also a spiritual force. It is the undergirding of faith which helps us to hold the same conviction through the troubles that Satan has brought on us. God the Father is the giver of all good things, and He loves us. However, "The thief cometh not but to steal and to kill and to destroy." (John 10:10)

Now as to Job: "His substance also was seven thousand sheep, and three thousand camels, and five hundred yoke of oxen, and five hundred she asses, and a very great household; so that this man was the greatest of all the men of the east." (Job 1:3).

"Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan came also among them.

"And the Lord said unto Satan, Whence comest thou? Then Satan answered the Lord, and said, From going to and fro in the earth, and from walking up and down in it.

"And the Lord said unto Satan, Hast thou considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a perfect and an upright man, one that feareth God, and escheweth evil?

"Then Satan answered the Lord, and said, Doth Job fear God for nought?

"Hast not thou made a hedge about him, and about his house, and about all that he hath on every side? thou hast blessed the work of his hands, and his substance is increased in the land." (Job 1:6-10) Please note that Job had a hedge about him -- he was under God's protection. Job was living and working in faith, but faith can fail. What causes this? Fear.

God did not put Job in Satan's hands, Job did. What happens next? "And his sons went and feasted in their houses, every one his day; and sent and called for their three sisters to eat and to drink with them.

"And it was so, when the days of their feasting were gone about, that Job sent and sanctified them, and rose up early in the morning, and offered burnt offerings according to the number of them all: for Job said, It may be that my sons have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts. Thus did Job continually." (Job 1:4,5)

Fear! Now Job offered sacrifices "continually" which means he got out of faith and into fear, listening to the voice of Satan. Then things really began to happen quickly.

Verse 16: "While he was yet speaking, there came also another, and said, The fire of God is fallen from heaven, and hath burned up the sheep, and the servants, and consumed them; and I only am escaped alone to tell thee." (The Hebrew says, a great fire.) But Satan is "prince of the air." Winds, storms, tornadoes and lightning are in his power. So who sent the great fire?

In Job 1:21, Job made a statement: "Naked came I out of my mother's womb, and naked shall I return thither: the Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." Now this is not a true statement; it is true that Job said it, but God did not take anything away. Satan took it away and Job let him do it by getting into fear.

Job 3:25: "For the thing which I greatly feared is come upon me, and that which I was afraid of is come unto me." It took Job nine months and a lot of suffering to overcome, but when he got back into faith and started praising God, he received twice as much as before.

We see by this that faith and fear are opposite forces; they cannot abide in the same place. "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." (II Timothy 1:7)

God had a hedge about Job but fear broke it down and let in the destroyer. James 1:13-17 says: "Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man: but every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed.

"Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death.

"Do not err, my beloved brethren. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning."

So let us not be found in the sad state of cursing God by blaming our trials and burdens on Him Who loves us, but raise our voices in thanksgiving for the way out He provides.

I also feel that it would be good if each of the young people in the church could spend some time in the younger children's Sunday School classes. They need to observe the children's teacher teaching the little ones the beautiful stories of the gospel. It would be good for the young men and women to help the children's teacher loving the little ones and caring for them. Each of the young men and women need to take a turn, because one never knows who will have the responsibility of teaching the children in the family.

People who are isolated from the church often feel very left out. They miss out on much by not having a local church to go to. Some become very discouraged. These people need our prayers and perhaps an occasional letter to help encourage them and help them know the affairs of the church.

Perhaps from time to time the Advocate could publish locations of the locals and the pastors' phone numbers. If an isolated member is near a local church in their travels, they could go to church in that area. The times of services may need to be published too.

In these last days people need to be helped to do God's Will. They need to be helped to be strong. So many things can happen to try one, whether they are near a church or far from one. The chance to tell others about the goodness of God may arise also, so that an isolated member still needs to be in touch with the church.
