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EDITORIAL ...

LEARNING THE EVERYDAY LESSONS OF LIFE

Because of our human weaknesses, we need the special guidance of the Holy Spirit in helping us to make decisions. Our natural abilities usually are not sufficient to outmaneuver the evil one; we are too susceptible to his devious ways.

If we seek God's help we will find that He has ways and means to strengthen us against the temptations and wiles of the devil. By looking close at our own personal lives, we can see that everyday events bring about many little trials and tests that will prepare us against the greater problems of life.

We should not hide the fact that we are all looking down the road to the much prophesied time of great trial and destruction. The signs of the time point unmistakably to our day which almost overwhelms us with fear and dread. The nearly impossible chances of surviving the terrible destructions that undoubtably are coming on the earth make us reflect carefully upon God's promises to His people. His promises are always dependent upon our observance of His laws — our keeping of His commandments.

What we usually fail to realize and appreciate is that God is well aware of our situation and He has already planned our way of escape. But our escape is dependent upon our preparation. He will prepare us now for that time of greater trials and tribulation, but we must be listening and responding to His Spirit. God's ways of preparing us are not readily noticeable by us or the evil one, for the Lord has all things under perfect control. He is knowledgeable in the ways of the natural man as well as the ways of the devil. So it goes without saying that God can train us up in ways appropriate to the times and problems that we will meet if we will listen to His promptings. He will teach us those things that will give us knowledge and wisdom, but most importantly, He will strengthen us in a will and desire to do that which we have learned is right through His daily teachings.

We have two main obstacles to overcome: one is the persuading power of the devil; the other is our own human ways and wills — the weaknesses of the flesh. It is very difficult for us to distinguish between the two for the devil continually uses our weaknesses to enter in and control us. When we give in to one of our human weaknesses, he immediately strives to take control. When he succeeds he will enlarge that weakness or fault to the point of destroying our courage and strength to do good.

The devil is primarily a destroyer. It may not appear so at first for his leadings are deceptive. But he can only lead us to the same place that he is destined to go himself.

While the Lord will allow us to suffer from our own mistakes or let us endure trials for a time by which we

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might remain humble and learn to rely on Him, the devil will use the same mistakes or trials to drag us down to despair or cause us to turn in anger against the Lord. Our reactions, therefore, give us a key to our success. We determine our own direction by how we respond to the trial or situation.

If we look up to God asking His help immediately when trials come, He will give us an inner strength that will match the weight of the problem. If we stubbornly or neglectfully go on our own, we jeopardize our very souls, because the devil can easily get control.

A fact of great importance should be known among us all: when a time of crisis comes and the problem stares us in the face, that is not the time to prepare for it. The time to prepare is already past.

If we have been listening to the promptings of the Spirit all along the way, we will be prepared when it comes. This preparation will be in ways that we never realized until the actual event takes place. This is the mystery and wisdom of God!

Although God's knowledge is infinite and far superior to all other beings including the devil, we must realize that the devil's knowledge is rather vast considering the fact that he is a spiritual being. The devil's plans and works are to draw you and I into the mainstream of death if we will allow him to do so. He is working to breakdown every characteristic of truth and goodness that we have. He cleverly assists us in making us comfortable in the little private sins and thoughts which open the way for larger ones.

It would do us well to take a close look at our private sins and thoughts to see if we can detect the openings by which greater sins can enter and expand our latitudes. It is discouraging to look at our own faults, but if we look at the other side of the situation, we can see that the spirit of the Lord is prompting us to overcome those faults and use them as a foundation of strength against evil. The same weakness or fault that allows evil to prevail can be changed to a righteous bulwark if that weakness is overcome through the strength and guidance of the Spirit of God.

There is one thing we must know for sure: there is no middle of the road or place of compromise where we can be safe and comfortable. We are fighting a continuous battle and it will be so to the end.

Let us also be aware of where the battle is taking place. It is not at church, work, home or some one or two places that we are in, or certain times of our lives. The battle takes place within us — within the individual person. Our thoughts, words, actions, attitudes, emotions, etc. give evidence of the war that is being waged within us between the forces of good and the forces of evil. Our very soul is the prize over which the contending powers are battling. Thank God that the forces of good are still striving to save our souls for we know that the evil one will never cease until he is subdued by a higher power.

It is said that experience is a great teacher. We know that God teaches us through experience. As we indicated before, a small mistake that is of little consequence can effectively warn us against making a much larger mistake and suffer the greater consequence. Of course, we can use our own human judgment in the matter and say that we have learned it by the same means as people of the world learn through experience. But if we consider such learning processes as being directed of God, we will soon recognize His hand in many such experiences and He will manifest Himself in them. He is ever willing to prove Himself to those who believe in Him and seek His help. Just as God is willing to prove Himself to us, so should we be willing to prove ourselves to Him. This often requires a process that brings us right down to the bare facts about ourselves.

Just as experience can teach us certain lessons, so can experience reveal certain things about ourselves that would help us correct ourselves. We need to know just how well our minds are trained in the things of the Lord and just how true our basic desires of good are.

It appears that we are given an opportunity to know this from time to time. On occasion we are left to face a trial or make a decision on our own. We may cry to the Lord to help us, but in His infinite wisdom it seems that He withholds His Spirit for a time using the situation as a test. If we have done our homework beforehand and if we have been listening to Him when He gave us the example problems, we will be prepared. We will have obtained a sufficient knowledge of the truth through His continuous teachings as well as a greater development of willpower by which we might remain faithful. We will have proven ourselves to God just as he has proven Himself to us.

However, if we fail the test all is not lost. It is not too late to seek God. We must let Him know that we are ready to listen by being observant, prayerful and responsive. It may take time but He will prove Himself to be patient with us if we are patient with Him.

God knows how prepared or unprepared we are. He knows the deadline. He can prepare us quickly if we are willing. It all depends upon how alert and how much we are listening to the promptings of His Spirit. Let us therefore seek the Lord in earnestness that we will be ready for the next test.

"And I looked and behold, a pale horse: and his name that sat on him was Death, and Hell followed with him. And power was given unto them over the fourth part of the earth, to kill with sword, and with hunger, and with death, and with the beasts of the earth. (Rev. 6:8).

This rider is the only one to be given a name, and it is Death. It is interesting to note that in this case power is given unto "them", for "Death" is an appropriate name for each one of the riders who preceeded him. This rider incorporates all the evils of the first three horsemen. Hell follows with him as it does the Antichrist's mission. Spiritual death is the result of Godlessness. He kills with a sword as does the rider of the red horse. He kills with famine, hunger, both temporal and spiritual, as does the rider of the black horse.

He kills with some unspecified "death." The color of his horse can give us a clue.

I understand that the original word for pale means a pale yellow. Yellow is a term used for certain character traits such as jealousy, melancholy, dishonor, and cowardice. It is also applied to various diseases of plants, trees and humans. A yellow flag means quarantine. Added to spiritual death, war, famine, he adds plagues and pestilences and kills with beasts of the earth.

It is possible that food might become so scarce that animals would attack people, but I'm more inclined to believe that this symbolizes martyrdom as suffered by early Christians, when they were "thrown to the lions." It can also represent death of Christians by any unusual and merciless means.

Since the Communist Revolution in 1917, Christians in the Soviet Union, and in lands dominated by them, have suffered monstrous and inhuman tortures and death. There is considerable evidence that this infection is surreptitiously creeping into this land, where of all places on earth it ought never to be.

The Pale horse also represents fear. Christ said that in the last days men's hearts would fail for fear, for looking after the things which are coming upon the earth. (Luke 21:26).

"And these are the words the Lord spake concerning Israel and concerning Judah. For thus saith the Lord: we have heard a voice of trembling, of fear and not of peace.

"Ask ye now whether a man doth travail with child? wherefore do I see every man with his hands on his loins, as a woman in travail, and all faces are turned into paleness?

"Alas for that day is great, so that none is like it: it is

even the time of Jacob's trouble: but he shall be saved out of it." (Jer. 30:6, 7).

"For the Lord hath redeemed Jacob, and ransomed him from the hand of him that is stronger than he." (Jer. 31:11).

"For the terrible one is brought to naught, and the scorner is consumed, and all that watch for iniquity are cut off:

"That make a man an offender for a word, and lay a snare for him that reproveth in the gate, and turn aside the just for a thing of naught.

"Therefore thus saith the Lord, who redeemed Abraham, concerning the house of Jacob, Jacob shall not now be ashamed, neither shall his face now wax pale." (Isa. 29:20, 21, 22).

"And when he had opened the fifth seal, I saw under the alter the souls of them that were slain for the word of God, and for the testimony which they held.

"And they cried with a loud voice, saying, how long, O Lord, holy and true, dost thou not judge and avenge our blood on them that dwell on the earth?

"And white robes were given unto every one of them: and it was said unto them, that they should rest yet for a little season, until their fellow servants also their brethern, that should be killed as they were, should be fulfilled." (Rev. 6:9, 10, 11).

We are not to suppose, as some do, that these martyred Christians still cry from the alters where they were slain. This too, is symbolic; the alters representing their testimony for the Lord's words. Their sufferings and death are held in remembrance for the final judgement. They are at rest, clothed in white (righteousness) awaiting the resurrection.

When Cain killed Abel, God said to him, "What hast thou done? The voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground." (Gen. 4:4). All injustice, including unfair business practices, "cry out" for redress. "The hire of the laborers who have reaped down your fields, which is of you kept back by fraud, crieth and the cries of them that reaped are entered into the ears of the Lord of the Sabaoth." (Jas. 5:4).

"And God shall bring every work into judgement with every secret thing, whether it be good or whether it be evil." Eccl. 12:14.

Some question how a merciful and loving God could possibly permit His own to be killed by the wicked. God must be just as well as merciful, or He would cease to be God.

Bruce Dunn, Pastor of a Presbyterian church in Peoria, Ill. said in a recent radio broadcast, "Far too many ministers today present God as some kind of giant marshmallow in the sky, and say nothing of His

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justice."

Judgement has a remedial purpose. "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness: but is long suffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." (2 Per. 3:9). "Some men's sins are opened beforehand, going before to judgement, some follow after." (1 Tim. 5:24). Those who refuse to repent and turn to God, will answer for their sins at the judgement. Their victims will stand as evidence, a testimony against them. (Matt. 10:18, Mar. 13:9, Luke 21:12, 13).

When the sixth seal is opened, the scene changes dramatically from symbolism to a graphic portrayal of actual events.

"And I beheld when he had opened the sixth seal, and lo, there was a great earthquake: and the sun became as black as sackcloth, and the moon became as blood.

"And the stars of heaven fell unto the earth, even as a fig tree casteth her untimely figs, when she is shaken with a mighty wind.

"And the heavens departed as a scroll when it is rolled together; and every mountain and island were moved out of their places.

"And the kings of the earth, and the great men, and the rich men, and the chief captains, and the mighty men, and every bondman, and every free man, hid themselves in the dens and rocks of the mountains.

"And said to the mountains and rocks, Fall on us and hide us from the face of him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb;

"For the great day of his wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?" (Rev. 6:12-17)

When the first seal is opened, an unknown rider appears on a white horse. He comes to conquer something unspecified.

No symbols are to be seen when the sixth seal is opened, but actual events. Christ returns, clearly indentified, to execute judgement. Before the seventh seal is opened God's servants are to be sealed in their foreheads, that they might be protected from the wrath to come. This is comparable to the passover of the Old Testament, when the blood of a lamb, sprinkled on door posts, protected the Lord's people from the destroyer who came through in judgement against the Egyptains.

Before the seven last plagues are poured out, John sees, "As it were a sea of glass mingled with fire; and them that had gotten the victory over the Beast and over his image, and over his mark, and over the number of his name, stand on the sea of glass, having the harps of God, and they sing the song of Moses the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb, saying, great and marvelous are thy works, Lord God Almighty.

"Who shall not fear thee, O Lord, and glorify thy name? for thou only art holy: for all nations shall come and worship before thee: for thy judgements are made manifest." (Rev. 15:2, 3, 4).

God always sends warning before He executes His judgements. And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues.

"For her (Babylon's) sins have reached unto heaven, and God hath remembered her iniquities." (Rev. 18:4, 5).

When Christ returns, the white horse and his rider shall be destroyed. And then shall that wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming. (2 Thess. 2:8). In place of falsehood and deception, the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. (Isa. 11:9).

In that day many people shall go and say, come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of Jacob: and he will teach us his ways, and we will walk in his paths: for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of God from Jerusalem. (Isa. 2:3).

The red horse and his rider shall be no more. Instead of war there will be peace. For he will judge all nations, and shall rebuke many people; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. (Isa. 2:4). The Lord shall give peace. (Ps. 29:11, Rom. 14:17).

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace.

"Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgement and with justice from henceforth even forever. The zeal of the Lord of Hosts will perform this." (Isa. 9:6, 7).

Even the animals will be at peace with one another and with the inhabitants of the land. (Isa. 11:6, 7, 8).

The black horse and his rider shall be abolished. In place of hunger, there will be plenty. "And I will restore to you the years that the locust hath eaten, and the cankerworm, and the caterpillar, and the palmerworm, and my great army I sent among you.

"And ye shall eat in plenty, and be satisfied, and praise the name of the Lord your God, that hath dealt wonderously with you: and my people shall never be ashamed.

"And ye shall know that I am in the midst of Israel, and that I am the Lord your God, and none else: my people shall never be ashamed." (Joel 2:25, 26, 27).

The pale horse shall be "swallowed up in victory." (1 Cor. 15:54). "Behold, I show you a mystery: we shall not all sleep, but we shall be changed,

"In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet; for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed." (1 Cor. 15:51, 52).

"And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes: and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for former things are passed away." (Rev. 21:4).

Satan will be bound and shut up in the bottomless pit, where he will be "sealed" for the 1,000 years of the millenium. (Rev. 20:2, 3).

"And they that know thy name will put their trust in thee: for thou, Lord, hast not forsaken them that seek thee." (Ps. 9:10)

"For thus saith the Lord unto the house of Israel, seek me, and ye shall live.

"Seek good and not evil, that ye shall live: and so the Lord the God of Hosts shall be with you, as ye have spoken." (Amos 5:4, 14).

Elder T.W. Paschall of Whitlock, Tennessee passed away at the Calloway County Hospital in Murray, Kentucky, at the age of 72 years on March 15, 1984, after a long illness. He was born Feb. 18, 1912 to the late Wrather and Ella Paschall, in Henry County, Tennessee.

ALCOHOL USE AMONG TEENS—A MODERN DILEMMA

Drinking by teenagers is a practice that is so widespread that by the senior year in high school it is almost universal. In public health terms, the population that uses a drug as extensively as alcohol should know its psychological and physical effects and the risks involved in its use and abuse.

Ethyl alcohol or ethanol — the type in beer, wine, bourbon, gin, etc. — is classed pharmacologically as a depressant drug. It has the power to bring about the feelings of well-being, and to induce sedation, intoxication, and unconsciousness. Ethanol also has the potential for producing toxic effects on the mind and body that are dangerous or even fatal to the drinker.

The immediate effects of alcohol consumption are widely known. By virtue of alcohol's depressant and sedative effects the drinker's coordination is impaired, sleepiness may occur, and reaction time is reduced in complex and dangerous tasks such as driving an automobile.

Other effects or reactions are also widely known. Some persons, when under the influence of alcohol, become overly talkative, loud, reckless or hostile. Others may experience a sense of euphoria, become more outgoing or friendlier.

Some of these behaviors seem contradictory. Though alcohol is a depressant and a sedative, some persons appear to be stimulated by alcohol. In fact, many people believe, mistakenly, that alcohol is a stimulant. Actually, the apparent stimulant effect is the result of alcohol's depressant effect upon one's inhibitions. By virtue of socially acquired inhibitions (or social restraints) we behave in relatively calm and controlled ways. Alcohol reduces or depresses our controls. The outward appearance is that one has been stimulated. One useful illustration is that within the complexities of life we are like an automobile, going down a dangerous hill. To control the situation we have developed certain "brakes" which keep us within safe and acceptable limits. The use of alcohol weakens our braking system and reduces our control over ourselves, resulting in behavior that may be reckless, dangerous or even lifethreatening.

Some have called alcohol a "social lubricant" because it makes it easier for people to socialize and enjoy themselves at parties, etc. The bashful person may be less bashful, the anxious person may be more calm, the frightened person my be less afraid. Unfortunately, as one uses alcohol as a means of dulling various emotions or reducing anxiety, there is always the threat of the practice becoming a habit. In time, the habit may even become an addiction.

Ideally, young people and adults alike would be fully aware of the nature of the drug ethyl alcohol. Ideally we would respect its powers. Roughly one out of ten "social drinkers" eventually develops drinking problems or becomes alcoholic. So the potential for addiction is substantial.

Many more people than alcoholics get intoxicated, or simply, drunk. On the physical side, weight, how fast they drink, whether they have eaten, their drinking history and body chemistry, and the kind of beverage (and mixer) used all influence the degree of intoxication. On the psychological side, the drinking situation and the drinker's mood, attitudes, and what the individual wants or expects to happen, based on previous drinking experiences, all contribute to drinking reactions. All in all, however, there is one sure thing. If a person drinks enough, fast enough to outrun the body's ability to burn alcohol, he becomes intoxicated. When he becomes intoxicated, he has less control of himself in every regard, physical and emotional.

Teenagers are faced with the tasks of developing intellectual, emotional and social discipline. All of this is a part of maturing. Growing up can be postponed, interrupted or incomplete as a result of using various drugs to reduce the realities of life. Growing up, as we call it, is as complex a task as learning to fly a 747 airliner. None of us would expect to master the many skills required to pilot such a complex machine if we deliberately drugged ourselves in the process. One might feel better. One might be less afraid to fly and feel more confident of his ability to fly. But those false feelings would not make him skillful. Similarly, the false feelings of security, happiness and fun that alcohol may bring are fake substitutes for growing up. Would you risk your life in the hands of a drunk airplane pilot? Should you risk your life in the hands of a drunk driver of an automobile? Can we learn to walk or run by

always leaning on crutches? Drugs, alcohol included, can become crutches and their users run the risk of becoming emotional and physical cripples. (This article was supplied by AIDS. Alcohol Information Distribution Service)

"Therefore, repent all ye ends of the earth, and come unto me, and believe in my gospel, and be baptized in my name; for he that believeth, and is baptized, shall be saved; but he that believeth not, shall be damned; and signs shall follow them that believe in my name." (Ether 1:115)

"Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you." (James 4:7)

"And they went out, and preached that men should repent." (Mark 6:12)

"Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38)

"Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment." (Matt 22:37, 38)

"Yea, come unto Christ, and be perfected in him, and deny yourselves of all ungodliness, and if ye shall deny yourselves of all ungodliness, and love God with all your might, mind and strength, then is his grace sufficient for you, that by his grace ye may be perfect in Christ; and if by the grace of God ye are perfect in Christ, ye can in no wise deny the power of God." (Moroni 10:29)

"Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." (Matt. 5:48)

"Wherefore, cleave unto charity, which is the greatest of all, for all things must fail; but charity is the pure love of Christ, and it endureth for ever; and whoso is found possessed of it at the last day, it shall be well with them. Wherefore, my beloved brethren, pray unto the Father with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son Jesus Christ, that ye may become the sons of God, that when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is, that we may have this hope, that we may be purified even as he is pure. Amen." (Moroni 7:52, 53)

In ending, it would be fitting to turn to John 14:15: "If ye love me, keep my commandments."

The foregoing has shown a path that God has set before the people. This path gives purpose, direction and understanding to everyone who truly wishes to receive paradise after the death of the flesh.

"WILL A MAN ROB GOD?"

"Even from the days of your fathers ye are gone away from mine ordinances, and have not kept them. Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of hosts. But ye said, Wherein shall we return?

"Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings.

"Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation." (Malachi 3:7-9)

Tithing is an ordinance or commandment. Like all commandments given of God, it should not be taken lightly. "He that hath my commandments. and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me: ... He that loveth me not keepeth not my sayings: and the word which ye hear is not mine, but the Father's which sent me." (John 14:21, 24)

We have an understanding through the scriptures, by previous examples recorded, that tithing consists of a tenth part of that which the Lord has given you or your increase. Now, as you reason within yourselves as to what constitutes your increase or the "whole" from which a tenth would be given, consider Christ's words: "... and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." (Matt. 7:2)

Another thing which we should consider is that when

we offer our tithe to God that it is possible for us to do so in an unrighteous manner. In Hebrews 11:4 we find: "By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts:" So when we give our tenth to God remember it is for His work and we do not have the right to dictate what that tithe is to be used for. This is where we must exercise our faith in God that His servants would use wisdom in the distribution of those funds for God's purposes in these last days, even as Abraham relied on Melchisedec to use that which was given to Melchisedec for the Lord's work in their day.

There is one more thing we must understand about tithing. There is a difference between tithing and offerings. Tithing is the one tenth part of our increase which we are commanded to give. Money given to miscellaneous funds other than tithing constitutes a free will offering which is above and beyond our required tithe.

"Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." (Psalms 139:23, 24)

THE LORD DOES WATCH OVER HIS CHILDREN

As I look back through the years I can see so many times when the Lord's protecting hand has been over me and my family keeping us from harm and the evils in the world. Our lives have been spared by his intervening hand.

My husband and I and our young children could have lost our lives in a tragic fire if God had not intervened. We had an open fireplace in our unfinished home, with no hearth, so the floor boards came right up to the firebox, and had become tinder dry from so much heat. If the Lord had not awakened me some or all of our family and my husband and I could have lost our lives. Thank the Lord, and praise be to his Holy Name! How can we ever forget what He has done?

LIBERTY AND RELIGION

by Dr. Benjamin Trumbull (1801)

Religion has incalcuable influence on the government, and happiness of a people. In proportion as men are influenced by the genuine principles of the Gospel, they will be selfgoverned. Crimes will be prevented, even in secret. Faith will give to individuals and to the community at large such security; peace and order as mere law can never afford. Where men feel the influence of religion, mild laws will be sufficient for the purposes of government, and but few restraints on the natural rights of the people will be necessary. But when conscience is lost, and moral motives have no influence, a people must be governed by severe laws and punishments - by prisons, swords and cannon. In just proportion as the influence of moral principles and motives are annihilated, the restraints of law must be increased, and the natural rights and liberties of the subjects be diminished.

At the same time property, character, life and all public and private interests will be less secure. What order, honor, or safety, what liberty or happiness can there be among such a people? It is doubtless the greatest quackery in politics to imagine that free government and liberty can be maintained without religion and morals.

LETTER EXCERPTS

I'm still trying to learn the lesson of living, one day at a time: I've amply proven his promise of strength for the day, or moment, but fall so often into the haggling worry about next week, next month, year, even though I know there is no need and no way He can give me grace for those demands so long in advance. Today I only need grace to meet today's requirements.

I'm so glad the Lord doesn't require us to be great, just to be yielded, which is all most of us will ever achieve anyway. The human ego does not find humility a desirable trait for one's self even though admirable in others. Who wants to be servant to others? (Inspired Version) If being poor in spirit means not being among the world's great, or bold, or talented, or courageous, but being among the world's nobodies;still by coming to Christ we too can be of the kingdom. The requirement of the kingdom is to become pure of heart, not great. If we only have two mites worth of service and we give it, it counts for all.

What a merciful Father we have. I am so glad that He is our judge. Not only for my own sake but that I don't have to try to judge any other. What a relief that all that is asked of us is to forgive, and that we can ask him to forgive others also. On the other hand if we don't forgive, how terrible to have to stand and be the accuser of those we should have loved enough that they could cause no umbrage in our feelings, regardless of how or where they failed in living up to our expectations of them.

When I think of all the people throughout the land where I am welcomed with open arms I feel I must surely be among the most blessed of all people. If only my heart could some way return only the half of it. It seems I am always on the receiving end and I don't have any way to return in kind, so all I can do is pray the Lord return to these through whem He blesses me, over and over again of his own love -- the blessing of his choosing -- and that they be made aware of his covering about them for being the instruments in his hands in blessing to others such as I.

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
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
