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
Editorial . . .

Unnecessary Burdens

In an observation penned by Martin Buxbaum appearing in a recent Reader's Digest, a certain less-than-courageous knight was described as preparing for a long journey by trying to anticipate every conceivable problem or obstacle he might encounter and pack accordingly. Besides armour and a sword in anticipation of meeting an enemy, he carried ointment for burns and poison ivy, an ax for firewood, a tent, blankets, cookwear, feed for his horse, etc. So much did he carry that he was like a "clanking... tinkling...

junk pile." Part way into his journey and halfway across an old wooden bridge, he, his horse, and all his gear fell through weakened boards into the river and drowned.

Mr. Buxbaum's moral to the story is that "when we overburden ourselves with the anticipation of trouble,



Fate is laughing her head off." His conclusion, however, is what I want to enlarge upon, as he said, "... that he who travels with faith, travels lightest and safest."

Each of us may apply a different set of circumstances to this principle since our individual lives are so diverse, but the application I want you to dwell upon is something that should be common to all of us; man, woman or youth. The scriptures speak in numerous places about each of us having the responsibility as "hearers" of God's word

to also be "doers" of what He says. With that thought, then, we may properly assume that each of us are called to bring forth and establish the cause of Zion. Though the Priesthood may carry the heavier load to that end, including the preaching of the fullness of the

Gospel to all of the world, each baptized member has the real responsibility of carrying the principles of God's law, of shedding God's light and love, upon their own particular corner of the world. So, in the pursuit of that just cause, we all will travel upon lifes "highways" to some extent, and, even though to some that highway may only take us as far as our immediate neighbors or our place of employment, the same kind of dangers lurk for us to stumble over. But, if we devote most of our energy in the wrong type of preparation, we will fall through the first weakened board (like the knight did) and fail.

Apply Buxbaum's theory, now, to this task. Will you pack a revolver to ward off potential psychopaths, mace spray for vicious dogs, three spare tires, a bottle of No-Doz, and a spare can of Gas? Being more realistic, will you maintain a small library in your desk at work so that you can quickly read up on Episcopalians, Methodists or Lutherans should one of them approach you with questions? Will you arm yourselves with every available concordance, commentary, study guide, topical Bible and reference book so that you will have at your fingertips the answer to every conceivable question about your religion? If you do, you may find yourself in the same predicament as our knight, for surely a question will be asked that you are not prepared for and you will fail. The most studied Apostle or prolific Evangelist in The Church of Christ hasn't the answer to every question, yet they don't fail because immediate knowledge of the scriptures is neither their first nor their last resort. Arm yourself, then, with faith and a good portion of God's Spirit. Christ said, "Settle it therefore in your hearts, not to meditate before what ye shall answer: For I will give you a mouth and wisdom, which all your adversaries shall not be able to gainsay nor resist." Luke 21:14-15.

Certainly, study is essential and many times various reference works can help us in a thorough study of a given subject. But over and above all that study is the very necessary aspect of prayer and fasting for understanding; the use of our individual faith in God's word; and a close walk with His Spirit. James (1:25), speaking of the "doer" of the word and the work it requires, said that "this man shall be blessed in his deed."

Truly, we can burden ourselves unnecessarily with concerns, fears and apprehensions about living our religion to its fullest — being doers of God's word - to the point where it fattens us and our spiritual health suffers. Let us take away the "fat" of those burdens by believing in the good news Isaiah brings (40:28-31): "Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the LORD, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary? there is no searching of his understanding. He giveth power to the faint; and to them that have no might he increaseth strength. Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall: But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint."

Let us pray for one another, especially your Priesthood, that we may "mount up with wings as eagles," free of unnecessary burdens, in pursuit of establishing the cause of Zion.

Sermon by Apostle Marvin Ely



I want to touch more fully on the thing called faith. It is an important thing in our lives. It is one of the spiritual gifts. Moroni gives not only faith but exceeding great faith. And then it is one of the fruits of the Spirit that each of us can have. Not each one will have exceeding great faith because to some it is given as a gift to be used by the power of God. Each can have faith as a fruit of the Spirit in your life. It is one of the fundamental principles of the gospel. I won't go into the others but I want to read about this one. Unto every man, and I don't care who it is, is death a measure of faith.

Turn to Romans 12, verse 3, "For I say, through the

grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think;" This is a human failing. Sometimes we think of ourselves more highly than we ought. If the Lord would use you, don't think it's of yourself, for it isn't your power that does it. It isn't my power when I do something for the Lord. It's because we have come down in humility and yielded to him. "... but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith." So we can be thankful, to every man, every woman, every child a measure of faith hath been dealt. Now lets back up and read verses 1-2.

"I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Romans 12:1. Now that says *holy* and acceptable unto God. Now note verse two, "And be not conformed to this world:" I think that one of the things that's hurting mankind as much as any single factor is conformation to the ways and things of this world. It's

plainly said that we must not be conformed to this world. No, if there is vile language, we don't have to speak vilely, or use profanity. This is too much a part of the world in which we live. I'm literally amazed at the language that is used by those in places of leadership; and in books and on T.V. The Aposle Paul said, to not be conformed to the ways of the world, "but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." You can prove it by your study of the scripture which you should search diligently; by your prayers in your private places; by your worship in Church; by your Godly walk of life; by your example before your fellowmen.

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In Luke 18: 8, just part of a verse, Jesus Christ had this to say: "... when the Son of man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?" Just think on that for a few minutes. When He comes, shall He find faith? He was concerned. Why? Because of all the things that were going to happen that would be very trying to the faith of the children of men. It behooves us to exercise our faith, to diligently follow God and Jesus Christ.

I want to touch on some of the things that were to happen in the last days, because I earnestly believe that we're going to have to have faith to stand. I know that. Turn again to the 24th chapter of Matthew, this wonderful prophecy of Jesus Christ. A lot of it pertains to events that will happen shortly before and just preceeding His second coming. We find the disciples asking him the question, "... what shall be the sign of thy coming and of the end of the world?" They wanted to know, maybe a bit prematurely, but they wanted to know. And the number one thing He mentioned (and I want you to notice this, I want to impress it upon you) says, verse 4, ".... Take heed that no man deceive you." He was aware that deception would be rampant upon the face of this earth. There would be those who would be teaching without the authority to do it and would be teaching other than the true way. And He said, "For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ; and shall deceive many." There would be those who would even stand in the pulpit saying Jesus Christ is the one you should follow, that He is the way, and shall go on to deceive many. Verse 11: "And many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many." Verse 24: "For there shall arise false Christs, and false prophets, and shall shew great signs and wonders; insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect.-- Now Christ foretold that of a certain day, and I believe we've entered a part of that era of time. It isn't completed yet; you haven't begun to see nearly all. Verse 21: "For then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, no, nor ever shall be." I believe we've entered the fore part of that tribulation, but we've not nearly begun to see all the trying events that will take place.

I want to encourage each one of you to increase your faith, for most certainly with faith you can stand.

We need the gift of the power of the Holy Ghost in our lives. In the 12th chapter of the book of Daniel, Daniel looked down through time and saw this day: a time of trouble such as had never been. He saw it accurately. Turn to another statement of Jesus Christ in Luke 21: 25, "And there shall be signs in the sun, and in the moon, and in the stars; and upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity;" That's uncertainty, and if ever there was a day of uncertainty, it is today among people of the earth, and a bit of it flows over into those who are a part of the body of Christ. Uncertainty, but it really need not be if we reach out in that humble faith. "... the sea and the waves roaring; Men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth: for the powers of heaven shall be shaken." Yes, there is a fear of nuclear warfare, and hydrogen bombs and rightly so. I have no way of knowing how those will go, but I do know that God, all by himself can accomplish more than all the hydrogen bombs together. We mustn't underestimate the power of God and he is going to do some great and marvelous things. Fire and brimstone was rained down on Sodom and Gomorrah. There couldn't be found even ten righteous souls, and they were destroyed. Don't underestimate the power of God. Neither underestimate the power of God in the blessings he can bestow upon the children of men.

Now to go back to the question I read earlier: "When the Son of man cometh shall he find faith on the earth?" I turn to Moroni 7 and read the 35th verse: "And Christ hath said, If ye will have faith in me, ye shall have power to do whatsoever thing is expedient in me." If ye have faith ye shall have power to do it. Now turn to Ether 5: 28-29, "I give unto men weakness, that they may be humble;" So don't feel bad if you're weak creatures, "and my grace is sufficient for all men that humble themselves before me . . . and have faith in me, then will I make weak things become strong unto them." We really can't lose. "Behold, I will shew unto the gentiles their weakness, and I will shew unto them that faith, hope, and charity, bringeth unto me the fountain of all righteousness." There the way is outlined so clear that each one of us should understand.

Now to verse 46 of Moroni 7: "How is it that ye can attain unto faith, save ye shall have hope? And what is it that ye shall hope for? Behold I say unto you, that ye shall have hope through the atonement of Christ and the power of his resurrection, to be raised unto life eternal; and this because of your faith in him according to the promise;" The promise is there. What a fortunate people we are. The Apostle Paul said, "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable." 1 Corinthians 15: 19. But he said that was not the case, because Christ died and was resurrected that men might live. Continuing in Maroni, "Wherefore, if a man have faith, he must needs have hope; for without faith there can not be any hope."

49: "And again, behold I say unto you, that he can not have faith and hope, save he shall be meek and lowly of heart;" Make a mental note of that and don't forget it. You want to know the way? This servant is explaining the way, that's the way it is, meek and lowly of heart. "If so, his faith and hope are vain, for none is acceptable before God, save the meek and lowly of heart; And if a man be meek and lowly in heart, and confesses by the power of the Holy Ghost, that Jesus is the Christ, he must needs have charity; for if he have not charity, he is nothing; wherefore he must needs have charity." And further on it says that charity is the pure love of Christ. There we have it in a nutshell. In order to have faith and hope we must have charity, and in order to have charity we must have faith and hope.

Now to 1 Corinthians 13: 1-8. Part of this is the same as verse 51 of Moroni, but I choose to read it here because of the part that isn't in the other. And I want to impress upon each the importance of this charity; this pure love of Christ in your lives. It is vital. It is the WAY, and I want to impress upon you how you might know if you have that charity, and how you might arrive at it. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal." Without charity these don't amount to one thing. "And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing." And now read verse 13 out of place and then go back to verse 4, "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.'

Charity, the pure love of Christ, is the greatest. But let me tell you, you can't have it without faith and hope; and also you cannot have it save you are meek and lowly of heart. What is charity? Why is it so important? It says, verse 4, "Charity suffereth long . . ." Another place says longsuffering. So these with the pure love of Christ in their hearts are those who are willing to be longsuffering. "And is kind;" I like the scripture, "And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you." Ephesians 4: 32. That is the way we are to be, tenderhearted, forgiving one another. "... charity envieth not;" We don't envy what another has. Make mental notes of this, come back and read it, and the way it is written in Moroni: "charity vaunteth not itself," means to brag or boast. Jesus Christ never bragged or boasted. He was the greatest man that ever walked the face of this earth, yet he was meek and lowly of heart. We are to be a meek people. He said, "Come . . . learn of me . . . and ye shall find rest unto your souls." Matthew 11: 28-29. So when you are troubled, learn of Jesus Christ. When everything goes well, learn of Jesus Christ, and you will find rest for your soul. We're going

to have trials that we can't even imagine in the days ahead, but with Jesus Christ you'll be able to be the victor. James 1:3 says that "the trying of your faith worketh patience." Be patient with your brothers and sisters. Those with charity are "not puffed up." They're not proud. Yet the Lord has given each of us certain talents, certain abilities. Use them in a humble way to give honor and glory to God. If you're more talented than another, don't be proud or puffed up about it but be humble, and I admonish you to use your talents.

"Doth not behave itself unseemly . . ." Unseemly means improperly. ". . . seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil;" We'd better watch our thoughts. You are not hiding one thought from God. He knows what everyone is thinking as you're listening to this sermon. I hope you are paying close attention.

Before I go into the rest of this I want to go to the book of Mosiah chapter 2, and read verse 49, the plain language of King Benjamin: "But this much I can tell you, that if you do not watch yourselves, and your thoughts, and your words, and your deeds, and observe to keep the commandments of God, and continue in the faith of what ye have heard concerning the coming of our Lord, even unto the end of your lives, ye must perish." That's as plain a language as can be read.

Let's go back to the scripture in Corinthians where it says not to rejoice in iniquity, yet there are those today in the land that do rejoice in iniquity. They even rejoice in those that perform iniquity. What a sad thing. Rejoice in the truth of the gospel of Jesus Christ that can lead you in the way to eternal life. Be willing to bear with whatever becomes our lot. Apostle Paul said, "I glory in affliction:" Why? That's a strange statement. Because it works patience. He knew this. Believe all things, and certainly that's goodly things, not lies. Hope all things, endure all things. "Charity never faileth:" This charity will never fail.

Turn, once more, to Moroni 7, and you will notice that at the end of verse 51, it says, "for charity never faileth." Now verse 52. I want to impress this upon you: "Wherefore, cleave unto charity, which is the greatest of all, for all things must fail; but charity is the pure love of Christ, and it endureth for ever; and whoso is found possessed of it at the last day, it shall be well with them."

I hope I've outlined THE WAY, but add one more responsibility from verse 53: "Wherefore, my beloved brethren," and I want to speak to you the same as he spoke to them of old, "pray unto the Father with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love" (or charity) "which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son Jesus Christ, that ye may become the sons of God, that when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is, that we may have this hope, that we may be purified even as he is pure." And how do we become the true followers of his Son Jesus Christ? In John 14:15, Jesus Christ said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments."

COMMITMENTS

This is a testimony that I wanted to give on the weekend that my daughter Diane was baptized, but I was not able to talk because of the tears in my voice. I would like now to share it with all readers of the ZION'S ADVOCATE.

Thirty-eight years ago, my Mother said to me, "Gale, do you think its about time for you to be baptized?" I said, "yah, I guess so." So on the following Sunday, I was baptized. I obeyed one of the commandments of God. As you can see, I didn't make very much of a commitment, but never-the-less, I WAS baptized.

Two weeks ago, on June 16, 1984, my daughter Diane obeyed that same commandment of God; she was baptized. This is where the similarity of these two baptisms stops. You see, Diane made a commitment to God and to her baptism. She read and studied and prayed until she was convinced that she MUST be

baptised, and that it MUST be done in the CHURCH OF CHRIST. She, further, made this commitment against the will of her husband, and against the will of her husband's minister, and against the will of her mother. I believe Diane received an immediate blessing after her baptism because of this commitment on her part.

The point I would like to make, and the reason I'm telling you this story, is that several months ago, I made a similar commitment, only in my case it was about 38 years after I was baptized. Never-the-less, I also received a blessing, one of which was the baptism of Diane, and another, is that others of my children are also reading and studying the Word of God. Also I am back in Church and have found Brothers and Sisters with love and compassion even for a prodigal son.

I know that it is a very beautiful thing, for a person to make a strong commitment to God before or at the time of Baptism, but I know this also: some of us need the help of the Holy Spirit abiding with us after baptism so we can make that commitment. It is a matter of how well we listen and how willing we are to follow that determines the length of time between baptism and our commitment. Some may take 38 years! I know this, that had I not been baptized 38 years ago, I never would have been baptized. So I am thankful to my Mother for leading me to baptism and I am thankful to the Holy Spirit for being patient with me all these years. I would like now to make a plea to all people who read this testimony: If you are baptized and haven't yet made YOUR commitment—MAKE IT! If you are not yet baptized—DO IT! You must take the first step in order to travel any journey. So TAKE THAT STEP! After you have made that commitment or taken that step, keep your heart and mind open, and allow the Holy Spirit to lead you gently home. Do not procrastinate or be prodigal for 38 years like I was. There may not be 38 years left before the coming of Christ. There may not be 30 years left. There may not be 8 years. THERE MAY NOT BE 8 DAYS. No person knows! This much we do know, however: God said there would be signs before the coming and He told us what some of these signs would be. Brothers and Sisters, the world is ripe with signs and these signs are getting stronger every day. We each must make our own decision; a decision that will effect us for all eternity. That decision must be made before the return of Christ. My prayers go out to all who will read this, and especially to those who haven't yet made THEIR decision.

Sermon Excerpts

I want to commend my Brother on the comments he made just before the last song, in requesting that we refrain from criticizing other churches. There was a revelation given in the early days of the Restoration when the Church of Christ was newly organized, that warned we should not contend against other churches, with an exception: the church of the Devil. We've got to contend against Satan and his determined efforts which are bold today, even coming out with a church in his name. We are admonished that we should not contend against other churches, and to "contend" means to criticize them. As our Brother has said, and I was happy to hear him say it, we can hold up our responsibilities affirmatively. We don't have to tear down anybody else to do that.

I think back to when I was a young boy, new in the church, although I had been raised up in it. I had not long before seen the need of putting Christ first and requested that I might enter into that relationship with Him. Can I bring something that will cause us to think and feel just a little bit more fervently than we have ever felt before? Can I bring something that will be challenging? The Lord has said, "Preach nothing but repentance to this generation," and I certainly can't improve on the Lord's program.

I turn to Peter's writings. We find Peter (chapter 1: 1-2) was addressing, "the strangers scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappacocia, Asia, and Bithynia, Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ: Grace unto you, and peace, be multiplied." And they've been handed down to us because they are full of important things for us to be ever aware of. Starting with the 3rd verse, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to his abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope . . ." We were begotten once, and we can go back to the first chapter of Matthew and find a great listing of generations beginning with Abraham. Abraham begat Isaac, and Isaac begat Jacob, and Jacob begat the twelve patriarchs, etc. Earthly fathers, but this is a little different, being a spiritual birth; a spiritual bringing forth, and there's where we find ourselves. Where do we go from there? "Unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. To an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you, Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time."

When is the last time? "Time only is measured unto men," Alma 19: 38. There is time and then there is eternity, and they are two different things. And the "last time" is the end. Do you have any idea what the Lord has in store for those who serve him? What he has in

store for you . . . in eternity, after time has ceased? I can't comprehend eternity. Can you? I can comprehend a few years, say seventy. I think I can comprehend a hundred, but I can't comprehend eternity. Let's get into mathematics now because eternity and mathematics are related. Mathematicians talk about infinity, but where is that? Well, it's out there, it doesn't cease. It's beyond comprehension. So is that which God has prepared for those who diligently serve him and keep his commandments. What is it worth to attain it?

"Wherein ye greatly rejoice, though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations." I Peter 1: 6. Are any of us beyond temptation today? I'm not. I stumble and I have to get up and try again. I have not reached perfection. Maybe some of you have. We're called to it; it's our responsibility to meet it, but I lack. I don't know about you. Why don't I know about you? Because I can't see into your heart. God can. What do I see? I see the outside; I see what appears to be, what appears to me to be doesn't necessarily appear to my brother to be. We might look at you and I might see one thing and he might see another. Why? Because we're imperfect. We're not looking as God looks.

We run into manifold temptations and oftentimes we yield to them, so we're told that we should meet together often to confess our faults one to another. Do we do it? Do we have any to confess? Well, if we didn't, the instruction would not be that we confess, so I presume that we have them. I hope there are those among us that have reached that stage of perfection. I hope that I reach it, but I'm quick to tell you that I haven't reached it yet.

I want to tell you something that has been on my mind almost continually for some time. I heard about a dream that a sister in the church once had. I think this sister has gone on to her reward, I'm not real sure about that. This sister had a dream or vision, let it be either. Some one came to her and gave her an object, it looked like a beautiful white egg. She was told not to let it go, to hold it, take care of it, not to let it go! She walked into a building and was given to realize that the building was the church, and when she walked in, it looked neglected: Cobwebs, unkept, and she was upset and thought, "Oh! I've got to get in and help to clean this up." So she laid the object down so she could get busy and help clean up and she was rebuked right then. "You were told not to let it get out of your hands. Hold it, hold it faithfully, You can't clean this up, but I in my own due time will clean it up." Think abut that.

Now I want you to think about the egg. We've all seen eggs. We crack an egg and there is a little orange yellow substance in the middle, a little nucleus. And

around it is another substance all contained in a membrane, a shell to protect it. What is an egg? An egg is a cell in which there are all the elements to make or form a complete being, be it a bird or whatever. Now think about that a moment. Do you see the beauty of this thing that she held in her hand, and was told never to let it loose? It had all the elements in it to make a perfect being. You and I have in our hands, if we have made a covenant with God, all the necessary elements to become that perfect being that God would have us to become, that we might dwell in His presence

through the endless reaches of eternity. You and I have something to develop. When I take that egg and hold it tight and let it develop, all the cobwebs are going to be cleared out by a power higher than mine. All the dirt and all the disorganization, or whatever you want to call it, is all going to be cared for and straightened out because I've done my part and let the egg develop into the beautiful creature that God wants it to be. That's in keeping the commandments of God. The more I've thought about that dream the more joy and happiness it has brought to my soul.

He has told us many times of his experiences on the road and how the Lord protected and directed him.

It was good to share the sacrament Sunday morning with friends of Jesus. Brother Don McIndoo and Brother Marvin Ely presided over the meeting. It was particularly fulfilling to one of my children when he experienced the joy of the Holy Spirit during a sister's testimony concerning the raising from the dead of her little son, who is now grown and has children of his own. It is hard to explain the rush of feelings when the Spirit enters your heart, so now we have no need to further explain to him. Aric is ten and beginning to recognize his need to serve God, so this was a timely testimony to him. Two sisters from Phoenix testified of the uplifting missionary feeling they had experienced. We do have a story to tell to the nations, and the Lord will direct those who carry it forth. One brother from Independence told of his lack of spirituality, of his need to be more spiritually minded, to recognize the workings of Satan for what they are and rebuke him. It was good to hear of the healings and helps sent by God for the edification of the saints. Those things that discourage and hurt us are more than outweighed by heavenly blessings.

The music was especially good on Sunday evening (you can tell I truly enjoy others musical gifts!). The song service included special talent offerings by the Phoenix Ladies, the Phoenix Kids, the Grand Junction youth, to name but a few. Johna Ely sang "Somebody Knows". He knows and has graciously invited us to know Him.

Brother Don McIndoo was the final speaker, leaving us with a message to ponder on until we meet again. He has a special feeling for this local, having been here many times before. We never seem to greet a stranger when he comes. Too soon, it was time to bid farewell to our friends and pray for their safe return to

homes all over the nation. We sang "God Be With You Til We Meet Again."

Things have been quieter since then, but by no means on a downhill slide. Some visitors stayed to enjoy camping in these beautiful mountains, and my family went along. One afternoon was spent in scripture study, and there were many opportunities to talk about the church and the gospel.

Some sermon gleanings: We must abide in Christ's love and bear that good fruit, which is the product of worshipping in the spirit. Special love is required of the Lord's people. He was sent to hold out salvation to all, and sometimes we need a time of agonizing to become the beloved of the Lord. We must maintain faith to obtain the strength to endure, for Satan will exert his strength against those who would seek that Rod of Iron and hold fast to it. The truth of the gospel will bring us joy.

Our nation has made errors that have become stumbling blocks. People are pleased with themselves and do not have concern for the common good. We cannot travel very far alone, but must be fellow beings in the service of God. We care about each other to a degree and must strive to increase in brotherly love and kindness, for we injur our own soul if we do not care for others. The Lord is pleased with good manners and consideration for others. Repentance is necessary for those who would be purged of sins.

God does not change, and if we do not change, then we can stay with Him. He does not force us to believe, but encourages us to be honorable. He has called us to better things, but we become dimayed when feet of clay disturb an orderly world. We are sometimes confused and in need of calming reassurance. Yet, we still have a testimony which cannot be taken away. It can be *thrown* away, but never *taken* away from us. Jesus himself was kindly and gracious, leaving us the instruction to study His word, so that we may know His commandments and endure to the end.

We have begun a new course of study in the midweek study class. The Fruits of the Spirit and the Spiritual Gifts could be examined for some time and we could never find a really good stopping place. Our pastor has drawn out comments and encouraged us to share our references, in which we gain much from the notes and insight of others. We sometimes find that the needs of the early church were very much like our own, which brought good instruction from Paul, Nephi, and other men of God.
