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Editorial . . .

THANKSGIVING DAY — A SIGNIFICANT TRADITION

Three hundred sixty-three years ago, a few pilgrims gathered together with their native friends at their settlement now known as Plymouth, Massachusetts to give thanks to God for the good crops they had harvested that year. It was a very simple happening compared to the varied activities that dominate our lives today. Nonetheless, it was of such profound significance that at least two nations on this land, the United States and Canada, have honored the occasion by establishing national holidays known as Thanksgiving Day.

As we observe this special day in 1984, we might do well to reflect upon the great changes that have occurred upon this "land of promise" since that time in 1621. If those few people who enjoyed that first Thanksgiving Holiday had had the privilege, as we often do, to sit down and look at some of our documentaries on film, and to look forward in time as we are able to look back in history, what a revealing incident that would have been. The founding of a new nation, the numerous inventions and the great increase in knowledge and science probably would have been incomprehensible to them. Yet we take all this so much for granted.

Such a revealing incident, however, as seeing into the future was not entirely unheard of; God has given prophecy and has revealed through vision many of the things that were to happen down through the ages to various individuals whom He chose. One of the first to have experienced such an incident was the Brother of Jared who lived around four thousand years ago. Because of his exceeding great faith, he could not be kept within the "vail" and he was privileged to see and talk with Jesus Christ some two thousand years before Jesus was to come in the flesh. He also saw "all the inhabitants of the earth which had been, and also all that would be." (Ether 1:90)

At a later time the patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph along with Moses, the lawgiver, were blessed with promises and revelations concerning their posterity, the Israelites. God sent prophets among that people over a long period of time warning and foretelling of happenings that were shortly to come and of many events which were to transpire in future generations even reaching down to our day and beyond. The prophecies are found in the Bible and the Book of Mormon which identify the very time in which we live today—the latter or last

days—indicating that we are nearing that time that is called in prophecy as "the day of the Lord."

The Father of this nation, George Washington, was also privileged to see through vision future events and the destiny of this nation. He was shown three great perils, two of which have already passed: The Revolutionary War and the Civil War. The last and greatest peril is yet future which is described as an invasion upon this land by vast armies from Europe, Asia and Africa, which will "... devastate the whole country." Only by the intervention of God will this nation survive that peril. This means that except this people repent of their wickedness and turn to God in obedience to His will, they will not be saved.

This unalterable truth is brought out in the Book of Mormon and was known as far back as the Jaredite time. The decrees that God had made concerning this land is "... that it is a land of promise, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall serve God, or they shall be swept off when the fullness of his wrath shall come upon them. .. And the fullness of his wrath cometh upon them when they are ripened in iniquity." (Ether 1:31-32)

Moroni, the last prophet to write in the Book of Mormon, gives us a timely warning: "And this cometh unto you, O ye Gentiles, that ye may know the decrees of God, that ye may repent, and not continue in your iniquities until the fullness come, that ye may not bring down the fullness of the wrath of God upon you, as the inhabitants of the land have hitherto done. Behold, this is a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven, if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things which we have written." (Ether 1:34,35)

The sad truth is that this warning is only known to just a few of the peoples of this land today, and sadder yet is the fact that many of the few are ignoring or rejecting this warning. As the devil and his angels work within the imaginations of the people's hearts, sin and crime of varied sorts are increasing daily at an alarming rate. At the same time, the very truth of the gospel of Christ, which would save this people, is being changed to fit with the modern world. Unless this people break with the power of their adversary by turning to God in repentance of their sins and committing themselves to Him in obedience to the Gospel of Christ, they cannot hope to escape the destruction that will inevitably come upon this choice land according to the decrees of God.

Like the pilgrims, the first people to inhabit this land, the Jaredites, took occasion to give thanks unto the Lord when they arrived here: "And when they had set their feet upon the shores of the promised land, they bowed themselves down upon the face of the land, and did humble themselves before the Lord, and

did shed tears of joy before the Lord, because of the multitude of his tender mercies over them." (Ether 3:14)

Those people were greatly blessed for many generations leaving behind evidences of one of the greatest civilizations to have existed. Unfortunately, they eventually turned to wickedness and they were swept off even as God had decreed, only leaving their record as testimony of God's truth.

When Lehi and his people arrived on this land, the Lord made a covenant with Lehi much like He did with the Brother of Jared which is effective even today:

"Yea, the Lord hath covenanted this land unto me, and to my children for ever; and also all those who should be led out of other countries, by the hand of the Lord. Wherefore, I, Lehi, prophesy according to the workings of the Spirit which is in me, that there shall none come into this land, save they shall be brought by the hand of the Lord. Wherefore, this land is consecrated unto him whom he shall bring. And if it so be that they shall serve him according to the commandments which he hath given, it shall be a land of liberty unto them; wherefore, they shall never be brought down into captivity: if so, it shall be because of iniquity: for if iniquity shall abound, cursed shall be the land for their sakes; but unto the righteous, it shall be blessed for ever." (2 Nephi 1:8-15)

Our hope is in that last statement, that we would be counted among the righteous. We are privileged at this point in time to look back in history and also to look forward in prophecy in contemplating the promises of God both fulfilled and unfulfilled. From His fulfilled promises, we are strengthened in hope and courage as we look forward in time to His promises that are yet to be fulfilled. With the many testimonies of those who have went before us, we have undeniable evidences of God's faithfulness in keeping His promises.

We, who have embraced the precious gospel of Christ and have committed ourselves to obeying the divine will of God through His word, have the opportunity to once more give observance to the sacred tradition of our forefathers by giving special thanks and praise to God on this Thanksgiving Holiday for the numerous blessings that He has poured out upon His people on this land. However, our personal praise and thanksgiving is not due just once a year, but we must express our deep appreciation in heartfelt praise and thanksgiving daily. We must also observe Jesus' instruction which points to our very day: "Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man." (Luke 21:36)

Oneness With God And In God

I would like to begin with St. John 14:5-15: "Thomas saith unto him, Lord, we know not whither thou goest; and how can we know the way? Jesus saith unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: No man cometh unto the Father, but by me. If ye had known me, ye should have known my Father also: And from henceforth ye know him, and have seen him. Philip saith unto him, Lord, shew us the Father, and it sufficeth us. Jesus saith unto him, have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Philip? He that hath seen me hath seen the Father; and how sayest thou then, shew us the Father? Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in me? The words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself: but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works. Believe me that I am in the Father, and the Father in me: Or else believe me for the very works' sake. Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and the greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto my Father. And whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the son. If ye shall ask anything in my name, I will do it. If ye love me, keep my commandments."

In this reading we find in verse 9 that Christ says "He that has seen me hath seen the Father." We see by this that Christ was so in tune with the will of the Father that he knew what to do, and he did this through fasting and prayer. We, as Christians today, need to be in so close communication with God that we also should be able to say "If you have seen me you have seen the Father." We need to dedicate our lives to God in all that we think, say, and do.

In Matthew 19:16-22 we read of a man that had kept all the commandments and honored his mother and father and asked Christ, "what lack I yet?" When Christ told him to give all to the poor and take up his cross and follow him the man couldn't give up his riches. Could we give up our possessions and follow Christ or would we be like the rich young ruler and go away sorrowful? We have to be willing to make a sacrifice and act on faith. In Hebrews 11:6 it says, "But without faith it is impossible to please him."

In Romans 12:1: "I beseech you therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrafice, holy, acceptable unto God, which, is your reasonable service." That means that everything we do we have to realize that we represent Christ here on earth, and everything that we do we need to make sure it will please God. (Read also I Cor. 3:16-21 and I Cor. 6:19-20).

In Matthew 6:33 it says, "Seek ye first the king-

dom of God, and his righteousness." Romans 12:2 says, "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." This means that we must not conform to any of the doctrines of the world and do things just because everybody else does them, but we have to keep our minds on the teachings of God and his word, and read and study the scriptures to show ourselves approved, that we can prove what the will of God is in our lives, that he may accept our lives as a living sacrifice.

Romans 12:1-16. In verse 6 it says, "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to that proportion of faith;" When I read this I think of the woman in Matthew 9:20-22. Her faith was so strong that she knew all she had to do was to touch his garment and she would be healed; and she was.

Read Alma 16: 149-154 and then skip to verses 163-173. It compares the word of God to a seed. In verse 151 it says to "experiment upon my words, and exercise a particle of faith." To grow in faith we have to exercise our faith or it will become dormant and waste away. James says, "Be ye doer's of the word and not hearers only." In verse 153 it says, "Now if ye give place, that a seed may be planted in your heart..." this reminds me of what it says in Moroni 10:4-5: "and ye shall receive these things, I would exhort you that ye would ask God, the eternal Father, in the name of Christ, if these things are not true; and if ye shall ask with a sincere heart, with real intent, having faith in Christ, he will manifest the truth of it unto you, by the power of the holy ghost; and by the power of the holy ghost, ye may know the truth of all things." Here again we have that gift which is ours, the holy ghost, revealing the truth to us.

Back to Alma 16, verse 154. The latter part of the verse says, "it beginneth to enlighten my understanding, yea, and it beginneth to be delicious to me." When we think of the word delicious, we generally think of food, physical food. We don't think of the spiritual food as being "delicious." "Blessed are they that do hunger and thirst after righteousness for they shall be filled."

Verse 163 says, "and now behold, after ye have tasted this light, is your knowledge perfect? Behold, I say unto you nay; neither must ye lay aside your faith, for ye have only exercised your faith to plant the seed, that ye might try the experiment, to know if the seed was good." Now you have to exercise that faith... use it.

Verse 166: "But if ye neglect the tree and take no

thought for its nourishment, behold it will not get any root; and when the heat of the sun cometh and scorcheth it, because it hath no root it withers away, and ye pluck it up and cast it out." Read also the parable of the sower and the seed in Matthew 13. If we don't read and use the scriptures that we have, and nourish the word of God daily, they will wither and die.

Verse 171 says, "Because of your diligence and your faith, and your patience with the word, in nourishing it, that it may take root in you, behold, by and by, ye shall pluck the fruit thereof, which is most precious" (or delicious) "which is sweet above all that is sweet, and which is white above all that is white, yea and pure above all that is pure."

I like where Paul says in Philemon, "Paul, prisoner of Jesus Christ." Are we, as the Church of Christ, as the people of Christ, a prisoner of Jesus Christ? Are we cuffed with Christ in our daily walk? Or are we only linked with Him on Sunday or Wednesday nights in our prayer services? Does our daily walk include Christ or just once in a while?

Matthew 7:7-9, "Ask and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock and it shall be opened unto you: for every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened."

James 1:5 says, "If any of you lack wisdom let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not, and it shall be given him." This is the purpose of the Holy Ghost, to reveal things to us that guide us in time of need. I John 2:27 says, "But the

anointing which ye have received of him abideth in you, and ye need not that any man teach you: But as the same anointing teacheth you of all things, and is truth, and is no lie, and even as it hath taught you, ye shall abide in him." Let's use that gift that we have... the promise of the Father. We must strive to serve God and our fellowman for this is a commandment of God. Let's think of others and not of ourselves. Let's not be selfish and greedy. When Christ hung on the cross he said, in Luke 23:34, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do."

I would like to close with St. John 15:12-17, "This is my commandment, that ye love one another, as I have loved you. Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you. Henceforth I call you not servants; for the servant knoweth not what his lord doeth: But I have called you friends; for all things that I have heard of my father I have made known unto you. Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit; and that your fruit should remain: That whatsoever ye shall ask of the father in my name, he may give it you. These things I command you, that ye love one another."

We,as a Church, have to unite ourselves, our thoughts, and all that we do for God and the cause of Zion, and be ready to give of ourselves, our talents, and our time, to the work of God. We need unity with one another and with God.

Whom Say Ye That I Am?

Jesus had just asked his disciples, "Whom do men say that I the Son of man am?" Well, you recall the scripture in Matthew 16:13-18. Jesus received several answers from the disciples.

Some say thou art John the Baptist, some, Elias; and others Jeremias. In other words the general public of the time were divided on just who Jesus really was. So Jesus put the question to them personally. But whom say YE that I am?

Strange after two thousand years the nations are still wrestling with the answer to Jesus's question, but Peter received the answer. "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus told Peter that flesh and blood had not revealed this answer to Peter, "but my Father which are in heaven." What a profound statement by Jesus. It seems to me Jesus was saying, man can not tell you who I the Son of man am. It has to be REVEALED by the Holy Spirit. Of course today we have the scriptures, but his disciples had Moses and the prophets. They were all expecting the Messiah. Moses had said, "The Lord thy God will raise up unto thee a Prophet from the midst of thee, of thy brethren, like unto me; UNTO HIM YE SHALL HEARKEN;" Deut. 18:15.

The promise is again repeated in Deut. 18:18-19, only with a bit more detail. Moses was of the tribe of Levi and Yeshua (Jesus) was of the tribe of Judah, note the wording. "I will raise them a Prophet from among their brethren, like unto thee, and will put my words in his mouth; and he shall speak unto them all that I shall command him. And it shall come to pass, that whosoever will not hearken unto my words which he shall speak in my name, I will require it of him."

Jesus was a prophet, for example as it is recorded in the 24th chapter of Matthew, a chapter filled with prophecy. Verses six and seven tell how the disciples came to him to show him the temple. Jesus had the spirit of revelation from the Father, he prophesied. "See ye all these things? verily I say unto you, There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down." My point is this, the Father told Jesus what to speak. "For I have not spoken of myself; but the Father which sent me, he gave me a commandment, what I should say, and what I should speak." John 12:49. Jesus explains this further in John 14:10 "... the words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself: but the Father THAT DWELLETH IN ME, HE DOETH THE WORKS."

Peter through the spirit of revelation that was in him at that moment declared, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus knew that Peter had received a revelation from His Father because that is the work of the Father, to reveal, to bear witness, of the Son. So Jesus said to Peter, "... flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven." Then Jesus made another very profound statement. "...upon this rock I will build my church;..."

UPON THIS ROCK

WHAT ROCK? "THOU ART THE CHRIST, THE SON OF THE LIVING GOD." He is the Rock of our salvation, blessed be the Rock, the Rock of our salvation be exalted. But this year there was not one stranger among us; except perhaps our youngest baby, Jennifer Lynne Eddy, age two and a half months — daughter of Eva Lin and Merlin Eddy, and year-old Crystal Joy Ferrier, daughter of Leah and Doug Ferrier. Being so newly from God, Jenny and Crystal soon captured the hearts of all with their soul-winning ways.

The group camp provides more of the "comforts of home" than one expects of a State Park. New restroom and shower facilities, equipped for handicapped, had been built since last year, heated and well lighted, a good system of walkways lead to cabins, a good distance apart, which could have slept so many more whom we would have been delighted to welcome. Large walk-in cooler held food for a larger crowd. Many more voices could have joined in praise to God in prayers and testimonies; their songs round the wood fire could have raised the sturdy rafters even higher! The wish was heard again and again that "more" could have been with us... But has not experience told us that sometimes less is "More" in intent and fervor and invitation of the Holy Spirit?

Mists softening the tallest trees along the perimeter of skyline far above us gave us the feeling of being in another world. On Monday morning the bell tolled on schedule, then later a banjo played out there as gentle reminder to assemble for our last breakfast together and breaking of camp. We think it was Merlin doing his job creatively and uniquely.

Sister Ruth Maley who suffered severe neck and shoulder pain, was administered to many times during reunion and received a blessing each time. Brother Clarence Boettcher who has had to place his beloved wide, Ida, into a nursing home, was administered to, that God might relieve his anguish over her condition of almost complete loss of memory. We were so happy that he met with us. Please pray for Sister Ida & Brother Clarence.

Sister Bethany Gould was in charge of getting together and presenting an afternoon of "talent" which we enjoyed. Jeannine Gould held a class for the young children with study and art work at the far end of the dining room, with folding partition between, providing quiet for prayer and testimony services and our Sacrament Service on Sunday morning. At song service Sunday evening Jeannine and the children presented a song.

Each had made a tree which bore colorful "fruits of the spirit" and gave good definition of one of the fruits. Last year's reunion guests were impressed with Jeannine's relinquishment of attending meetings to provide quiet and order and minister to the needs of the children. Thanks, Jeannine, for this special service to the reunion. A treasure hunt was conducted by Jon Gould, which provided excitement for the young. Scripture references were read over and over which gave clues to the location of the hidden treasure. Many were led to a certain spot; but it took Ronnie Gill's sharp eyes and perseverence to find the item searched for. His prize was a badminton set.

Our speakers were: Apostle Robert Jensen, Elders Benny and Marvin Case, and Elder Alvin Harris.

One evening was spent with our five elders assembled to answer questions deposited in a question box considerably beforehand. References thoughtfully presented from Bible and Book of Mormon gave light which surprised some who have been faithful scholars of the Gospel of Christ through many years.

As a brief part of Brother Alvin Harris' sermon Sunday afternoon, we were given insight into hidden dangers of specific modern games which are more intriguing to youth than the ouija board of older generations, and more soul destructive, referred to as "Satan's new tools to open doorways into young lives". We were instructed to be not fearful; but wary. Apostle Robert Jensen verified the timeliness of the warning, telling us that minds and souls are being destroyed. He gave instruction to prepare by periodic fasting and prayer, with twenty-four hour vigilance and dependence upon God; so that if one is called upon to aid a victim of evil spirits, God will hear our cry. Preparation in advance is URGENT. Casual acquaintance with God cannot prepare us for the defense of our young. "The Lambs of our own fold are not exempt. Our counterattack must be to have God with us every moment". A testimony given by Brother Jensen, of the power of the Book of Mormon against Satanic forces, was an impressive part of this warning. Bro. Jensen stressed that there might not be time to call on the Elders of the Church; that God gives the power to rebuke evil spirits in the name of Jesus Christ, not to the ministry only, but also to baptized Church members. This warning and instructions given belongs to the whole church.

It was as if Our Father had provided a beautiful setting for family council, to tell us: The job is getting tougher and the qualifications tighter. Your strength is not going to be equal to the task already upon you. You must depend upon ME for your ability to warn and save your very own. I AM your only defense —Your ever-present Help.

I will now bring to you the testimonies of the Sunday morning Sacrament Service. As you read them please observe that we were being prepared beforehand, to hear the warning and instructions which came later in the afternoon's preaching service. In testimony, Elder Marvin Case said, "In trying to help each other along the way, we learn to love each other." He was shown in a dream as a young man, that we need not fear the different things "lurking in the shadows". We should not get involved in giving them "lots of attention". It is *not* important that we see and examine the things in the shadows trying to take us. It is all important that we stay in the Safety of the LIGHTED PATH.

Sister Joyce Harris's testimony was about the disableing control that fear can exert upon a young, healthy physical body, noting that fear is as crippling as alcoholism and not easy to overcome. The 21st

Chapter of Revelations was cited. Verse 7 says, "He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son". And verse 8, "But the fearful, and the unbelieving, and the abominable, and the murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death." (May I say — Note that the fearful and unbelieving are named first and are traveling in mighty unwholesome company!) Courage is a gift we can and must have to inherit eternal life. Joyce expressed thankfulness for her gift of courage.

Beverly and Fred Hesse are sharing their home and the knowledge of God's goodness with an 18 year old young woman needing a Christian home. We here, bask in the cheer and good will which radiate to us on infrequent visits of the Hesses. Beverly is Brother "Hook" Eddy's sister. Hook and Grace are a joy to us and also their niece, Cindy Scott. Both families are from Wisconsin.

Brother Jensen spoke of the gift of prayer, and agreed with Sister Joyce that courage can be a gift. He spoke of a dearly loved "little rascal" who would begin to sing when she was corrected. He found it irritating. But in looking back he came to see that it was her way of saying and demonstrating that, "I will obey and not hold it against you." We could be well advised to accept things in this life that are trial and tribulation, cease doing the things that cause them, and rejoice that Our Heavenly Father thought enough of us to correct us. We can accept courage as a "divine gift".

Edith Case says, "Courage comes in different forms. I always felt "The Lord will take care of it". When Edith was three years old she survived a ruptured appendix. The Lord has healed her through five major surgeries, cancer, and three severe heart attacks. Her desire and prayer is always to be helpful. (Their daughter, Dianne and nieces, Nancy and Carmine Case came with Marvin and Edith. Nancy was our sometimes pianist.)

Sister Ruth Maley testified of the blessing of "no pain" as the result of prayers of administration. She told also of being directed to Minneapolis through recurring dreams. Her girlhood home was Chicago, then San Diego, California. Finally, she made inquiry of Apostle James E. Yates, who forthwith brought her to the Church of Christ. The Holy Spirit had succeeded in directing her to the Church of Christ!

Rolland Sprague told about the gift of divine courage that comes to the spirit of man when his body quakes because of the knowledge of things man can do to him. When we hold uppermost in our hearts that it is God we must fear to displease — not man—then God provides the courage. He told also that my father, Arthur Yates, many years ago delivered to him a never forgotten lesson. The then young Elder,

was shaking hands with a number of folk in rapid succession at church. Father detained him with the words, "Look! When you are shaking hands with me, look me in the face. I am the one you're shaking hands with." We were reminded also that the late Brother Levi Maley had an open vision several years before his death in 1972, wherein it was necessary to run to read the words emblazoned across the sky in tall blazing letters which diminished in size and clarity as he ran to read them, for the sky was beginning to darken. The words were: "NOW IS THE TIME OF THE END and of the Lord's Vindication".

Brother Benny Case told of his trip to talk with Julie Tansey with respect to her baptism. He was somewhat concerned with the weight of his mission; but God did the leading in his talk with Julie (our daughter), making it correct to proceed with the baptism, in accordance with her expressed wish that "Daddy" conduct her into the Kingdom. Brother Ben spoke of his thankfulness for all the prayers he has had that he will be useful in God's eyes and always do His will.

The crowning event of the reunion, for many, (though here again we did miss many not present this year), was Sunday evening's song service, led by Brother Forest Maley, 'round the wood fire in the big, circular fireplace in our meeting room. It was purely soul-satisfying and brought us so close we had no doubt that God heard our prayer, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". Though we sometimes differ in understanding, through song we are one. Caught up in the blending of voices, we never quibble over inspired words we sing!

Here I paused at this quite satisfactory ending, and leaned my forehead against the cool typewriter's surface. My eyelids were closed; but I saw in fine detail a thick, metal cable beside the typewriter... Did its entwined metal strands represent the blending and understanding of personalities in love and faith, signifying that something of strength and importance had been accomplished? Was our Father pleased with our use of his fine gifts?... My mind scanned the two and a half days: We thank the Lord for meeting with us. We had prayed that He would. He also gave respite from the heat, from the daily cares of life, safety upon the road for all. (Here I see the snowy hair of Sister Mary Johnston, who gifted with joyous courage, drove alone from Lamoni, Iowa).

What other strands were woven into our time together? Outdoor recreation including hikes, and a weiner roast; visiting at table and between meetings; our individual prayers in the seclusion of our cabins at day's end and morning's beginning; our enjoyment of the beauty surrounding us; our forebearance of one another. All are strong strands of the cable entwined with the additional strands which I have detailed for you.
