History Revisited

"The Dawn of a New Era for the Church of Christ"

Chapter twenty three of An Outline History of the Church of Christ is headlined, "The Dawn of a New Era for the Church of Christ." It mainly covers the events that transpired from 1916 through 1930 and reveals to its readers a resurgence of Christ's Church on earth. And I mean resurgence literally: "A rising again into life, activity, or prominence."

This era compares with the Church's first resurgence which occurred in the late 1820's and 1830's after a long apostasy. A major difference is that while innovations crept into the church in the 1830's that were contrary to God's will and the holy scriptures, the 1920's found the leaders of the Church discarding those innovations and repenting of ninety years of erroneous practice. It is an inspiring time of progress and courageous pronouncements. Though not without their share of mistakes and disagreements, they were never-the-less able to achieve both spiritual and numerical growth.

"At the 1928 April conference, three more men were called to be Apostles, thus filling the Council. The men so called were James E. Yates, E.E. Long, and B.C. Flint. These men were ordained during the year." Thus, for the first time since God restored His Church in 1830, there was a full quorum of twelve Apostles called of God and taking their place at the head of the Church of Christ with Jesus Christ their spiritual leader and "chief cornerstone." Also for the first time, in 1930 the Church "made provision for a Bishopric of seven men, instead of the three-man Bishopric" erroneously set up in the early days of the restored Church.

The Church organization was scripturally correct, the quorums were full, the numbers of converts were increasing — truly it was the "dawn" of a new era, but still part of the last dispensation of the Church of Christ that began in 1830. Much has happened since then, some good, some bad, and we stand today, 56 years later, on the threshold of considering callings to once again fill the quorum of Apostles; and for those at all conscious of the moving of the Spirit upon His Church, it is apparent that there is "something good" happening and a definite movement toward fulfilling what is required of this Church in these last days, subtle though it may be. We may now be well past high noon in that "new era," with still very much to do.

Another significant event occurred in 1918, when the conferences of both the Church of Christ and the RLDS church approved an "agreement of Working Harmony" between the two churches. You may read more about this on page 119-121 in the Outline History to further understand its significance, but what is more significant is what occurred in 1924, 1927 and 1985 relative to this "Working Harmony" and the Reorganized Church (RLDS).



In the years following the adoption of this "Working Harmony," where each church's priesthood authority was recognized by the other, much change was under way. "In 1924 the doctrine of Supreme Direction Control vested in the First Presidency (of the RLDS), with Effective Discipline, was advanced." With this, the idea was also advanced "that revelation from God was not a direct communication, but was a result springing from the higher powers of man in himself..." This philosophy could not be accepted by men of sound mind and a "spirit of inquiry" prompted a deep study of the scriptures and of Church history, such that hundreds of changes in the recorded revelations were discovered, including those revelations that purportedly called for a Presidency and High Priests. Thus, these innovative, man-instituted offices were abolished and the invitation went out to all known Restoration groups to repent of such things and join the Church of Christ whose headquarters were on the "Temple Lot." The "Working Harmony" was put aside and forgotten, until finally in 1985 the Church of Christ officially rescinded that agreement.

However, in 1927, a manifestation of the Spirit of God was received through James E. Yates (formerly an RLDS Elder), that was to have a great impact on the Church and was added impetus and inspiration for the work that was the "dawn" of the "new era." This revelation was accepted by the Church as being of God. It is one that will humble each of us; one that should not swell our heads but, instead, prompt us to greater achievement for Christ, the author of our salvation. You will find it on the following page. Please read it and let it inspire a new generation to more completely fulfill the obligations upon us as Christ's Church.

"All Shall At Last Be Accomplished"

A REVELATION OF GOD

(This word of the Holy Spirit was given through James E. Yates, then an Elder, in answer to fasting and prayer at Independence, Missouri, May 1, 1927. It has been accepted as the word of God by the Church of Christ. Please refer to this month's editorial for further explanation.)

By the quickening power of the Holy Spirit, thus is given the word of the Lord to all who will open their souls to hear my voice, saith the Lord.

Your prayers are before me, ye who have asked that I shall lead all my people who put their trust in me, but ye must hear my voice if I am to be your leader indeed, and thus are you to know how to follow.

Ye have asked of me to know my will. Will ye hearken when I shall speak? Will ye obey if my word shall conflict with the thoughts and beliefs of your imperfect humanity?

Behold, thus saith the Lord, I lead my people when they have courage to follow me, and to keep my commandments.

By my spirit in the hearts of all those who truly feel after me I have been with the various broken factions of my church to bless and to comfort and to shield my people from much of the power of evil.

And today do I declare that I, the Lord, will continue to give of my Spirit and blessing to those of every name and kindred, tongue, and people, who feel after me daily, and whose delight is to seek my ways.

But thus saith the word of the Lord to all my people everywhere who will open their hearts to hear the voice of my Spirit as given through my servant in these words: Verily I have rejected the Reorganized Church, with its sins and follies and its system-making, because they have departed from me, and by the deceptions of the wicked one, their leaders have caused a defilement of much of mine heritage.

Yet in my love and compassion, I will continue to feel after those among them whose spiritual vision is darkened; and in as much as they will come unto me and forsake the worldly idols that have been set up before them, I will surely manifest myself unto them in might, and by the refreshing power of my Spirit in blessing.

But in as much as my people will continue to bow down before the idols of mammon, and to submit their backs to the bearing of financial burdens for an institutionalism that I have not commanded, and which is contrary to the purity of my word and way, behold, in as much as my people will continue to yield themselves to the will of task-masters, whose plans I have not appointed, verily my Spirit will not always strive with

them, and they must at last reap the results of their folly.

And verily, thus speaketh the Spirit to mine Elders everywhere, whose spirits have been burdened because you have beheld the havoc that hath been wrought in mine heritage. If ye will now hearken to the voice of my counsel, behold the fire of my spiritual zeal shall be renewed in your hearts, and a spiritual refreshing from the throne of my glory shall descend upon you, and your joy shall be increased in the labors of my vineyard.

Verily, out of the broken fragments of my spiritual kingdom of these last days I have preserved unto myself a remnant for the carrying forward of my work unto its final completeness.

The people of this remnant of my church on the Temple Land, which has been consecrated to me, have not been wholly in accord with my will, neither do they this day fashion all their work perfectly in me, but behold, for a wise purpose in me your Lord and your Redeemer, I have held them in the hollow of mine hand.

Their priesthood and their ministry hath been preserved in me, and their ministrations among men I will continue to bless; for they are an instrument of mine own choosing.

Ye of my people, and of my ministry have questioned the spiritual call of those men of the ministry chosen to be Apostles in this remnant of mine heritage. Verily, if ye will hear my word, today I declare unto you that these are my Apostles of the present day dispensation, and through their ministry, if they continue humble and faithful, and through this chosen remnant of my broken heritage, I will, from this day forward, quicken their spiritual ministrations among the people, and will continue to use these servants of mine, and this remnant, to bear the message of life and salvation to the souls of men.

In the midst of many trials, and despite the human weaknesses of my servants who shall remain true to the trust given them, I, the Lord, will carry forward my work, and in mine own time, and in mine way all shall at last be accomplished.

Thus speaketh the voice of the Spirit through my servant by whom I have chosen to deliver these words. And they who shall hear the voice of my Spirit speaking herein unto their hearts, shall find witness in me, that I, your Lord, have truly spoken. And it is by my word that all shall be judged at the last day.

Thus speaketh the voice of the Spirit unto all saints who will hear, and who will heed my word, even so.

Amen.

Later as the group jammed the bath house I went inside the Little Brown Church for a few moments of serene and quiet worship.

In the fall of 1984 visiting ministers came from the Church of Christ to my town to bear witness that the Church which Jesus set up was alive today with the fullness of the gospel. While the sheep were scattering to strange calls, I was blest to detect the call of the Shepherd, and, picking up on it, I followed Him alone to the waters of baptism. More Than A Testimony

The many painful things that are taking place about us do not incline us to "lift up our heads and sing." Nevertheless, on the morning of September 14, 1985, when I awoke from sleep, a song accompanied my waking. It was there — words and music deeply appropriate to the sorrow within me. The previous evening, mind and spirit had been stunned with the information that my dear sister, Josephine Winkler, had met with fatal accident on the highway at Warrensburg, Missouri, on her way home from having made arrangements to move into a senior citizen apartment in Kansas City, from Pittsburg, Missouri.

The song I awoke to was "The Last Mile of The Way", the chorus of which tells us "When I've gone the last mile of the way, I will rest at the close of the day; And I know there are joys that await me; When I've gone the last mile of the way." The song begins with the small word "If" and repeats that word five times in the four verses of the song:

"If I walk in the pathway of duty
If I work till the close of the day
If for Christ I proclaim the glad story
If I seek for His sheep gone astray
If here I have earnestly striven, and have
tried all His will to obey "...
(If I've done all these things:)

"I shall see the great King in his beauty . . .
I am sure He will show me His glory . . .
But no sickness, no sighing forever . . .
'Twill enhance all the rapture of heaven
When I've gone the last mile of the way."

When later in Independence I was asked whether I knew my sister's favorite songs, I said, "No, I really don't." Then I told the one seeking to know for the funeral service — "But I awoke singing 'The Last Mile of the Way'; and another song occupying my mind is 'Face to Face . . . What will it be, When with rapture I behold Him, Jesus Christ who died for me.' You notice that the words of these two songs embody the Gospel of Christ."

To say that my sister, Josephine, was one of my finest blessings is not just an extravagant statement to make because she is gone. That I held her in great regard was no secret. Once when I had written such in one of my frequent letters to her, she replied, "I can't think of anything very special I've done for you; but if I have, I'm glad." She made her part of the rocky Ozarks bloom with color, enticing the humming birds

to come and sip, and shared with anyone interested. Her friends' observations expressed were that Josephine's sweetness of spirit and loving personality put a special sparkle into any gathering where she was. For such dear ones, when they meet their Redeemer "Face to Face" their welcome home will be sweet.

"Jo", who wanted no attention drawn to herself, but who looked outward in kindly regard to all those whom she knew and those she didn't, would laugh in embarrassment at the thought of a eulogy spoken or written with her as its subject. Therefore, I write as testimony of thankfulness to God for allowing me to be Josephine's sister. That He should also fill my mind with a great variety of song to help me through this time of sorrow has been of much comfort and a thing of amazement.

Are You Satisfied?

(Transcribed and prepared for The Advocate by Amy Schrader)

"Are you satisfied?" was the title of a brochure announcing a three meeting series held at the East Local, Church of Christ on Holke Road in Independence, Missouri, on March 8, 9, 10, 1985, with the thought and desire of introducing our beliefs in the gospel of Jesus Christ to those of our community. The following is a condensation and integration of those three sermons with my own brief comments. Elder Gary Housknecht was the first evening's speaker followed by Elder Smith Brickhouse with Elder Robert Oldham concluding the series.

PART TWO

Brother Brickhouse:

I ask that you might open up your hearts and minds and think about what you are doing in your life, and whether you have put Jesus Christ first in your life. There is nothing confusing, nothing hard to learn or understand in the gospel of Christ. It's plain, it's simple, it's straightforward. What gets confusing is the interpretations of man. If we would only heed the word that Christ has given us, if we would only follow his example and obey his commandments, we would be richly rewarded. The confusing issues would disappear; we would have understanding and we would have blessings untold.

Turn to 2 Timothy 3:16, where it says, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." I wonder if each of us can say that we have taken the time to read the scripture as we ought to. And do we make it a matter of prayer? Have we asked for meanings? Have we asked him to bring out those things He has for us for any particular day or circumstance? He has promised that if we ask we

will receive. That's good for each of us and always will be. Are we taking advantage of that promise of God? Are we humbling ourselves and diligently seeking him?

The Lord has set certain requirements before we can reach that ultimate goal to stand guiltless before our Father on the day we are to be judged. The requirements are; we must repent of our sins, we must be baptized in Christ's name, we must keep his commandments and endure to the end. That's true for all of us.

Brother Housknecht read verses 1 and 2 from the 55th chapter of Isaiah: "Ho, everyone that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread? and your labor for that which satisfieth not? hearken diligently unto me, and eat ye that which is good, and let your soul delight itself in fatness." This is speaking of the Spirit of God present in our very beings, and of the gospel revealed in the written word as being free through the grace of God, "without money and without price."

Why do we spend our time and our labors for those things that don'tmatter when we can give ourselves to Jesus Christ, the only thing that does matter? It says that we should hearken diligently. If we hearken diligently to our heavenly Father we will be filled. We will have all the things that we ever need.

It says in the next verse, "Incline your ear, and come unto me: hear, and your soul shall live; ..." Have we inclined our ears? What does inclining your ear mean? I think that means more than just listening, that we have to take an active role, diligently trying to understand and make those things a part of our lives.

Oh, we can hear, stand up straight and listen in our own pride and love for ourselves, come to church every week and sit and listen, but unless we put those things into our lives we become as Christ says in the 15th chapter of Matthew, "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me." v.8.

Turn to the 7th chapter of Matthew, 7-14th verses. Christ talking, "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock and it shall be opened unto you: For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone? Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him? Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets. Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be that go in thereat: Because straight is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." Ask and it will be given to us, if we seek we will find him; it takes action on our part. Then he says that there'll be but few that find the way. I wonder why that is? How many people have these scriptures available to them? There's quite a few who at least have the Bible, but it says there'll be but few that find the way, 'strait is the gate and narrow is the way which leadeth unto life'. What is that strait gate? What is the narrow way?

In verse 21 it says, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." Let's turn to John 3: 5th verse, Christ talking to Nicodemus, "... Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Over in Acts 2:38-39 verses, it says, "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." We must be born again. We must be baptized as Christ did, go down into the water and be raised up, and then it says, we shall receive what? The Holy Ghost.

We say that we have received the Holy Ghost through the laying on of hands, but let's just see what that is. In the 14th chapter of John 15-17 verses it says, "If ye love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever; Even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive,

because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye shall know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you." In the 26th verse it says what that Comforter is, "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." And in the 26th verse of chapter 15 it says, "But when the comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father, even the Spirit of truth, which proceedeth from the Father, he shall testify of me." That's a powerful promise that we have available, each and every one of us, that that Holy Spirit will be with us in all things if we listen, if we incline our ear, if we are tuned to that still small voice. Are we taking advantage of it? Are we yielding to the enticing that he's giving us? We have to allow it to do that teaching. We have to allow it to direct us. I say that if we aren't allowing the Holy Ghost to work within our lives there is not any way that we're going to endure to the end.

Turn to the Book of Mormon, page 161, starting with verse 16, "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, I know that if ye shall follow the Son with full purpose of heart, acting no hypocrisy and no deception before God, but with real intent, repenting of your sins, witnessing unto the Father that ye are willing to take upon you the name of Christ, by baptism: yea, by following your Lord and your Savior down into the water, according to his word; behold then shall ye receive the Holy Ghost; Yea, then cometh the baptism of fire and of the Holy Ghost; and then can ye speak with the tongue of angels, and shout praises unto the Holy One of Israel. But behold, my beloved brethren, thus came the voice of the Son unto me, saying, After ye have repented of your sins, and witnessed unto the Father that ye are willing to keep my commandments, by the baptism of water, and have received the baptism of fire and of the Holy Ghost, and can speak with a new tongue, yea, even with the tongue of angels, and after this, should deny me, it would have been better for you, that ye had not known me. And I heard a voice from the Father, saying, Yea, the words of my beloved, are true and faithful. He that endureth to the end, the same shall be saved. And now, my beloved brethren, I know this, that unless a man shall endure to the end, in following the example of the Son of the living God, he cannot be saved; Wherefore, do the things which I have told you I have seen, that your Lord and your Redeemer should do: For, for this cause have they been shewn unto me, that ye might know the gate by which ye should enter. For the gate by which ye should enter is repentance and baptism by water: and then cometh a remission of your sins by fire, and by the Holy Ghost. And then are ye in this strait and narrow path which leads to eternal life; yea, ye have entered in by the gate; ye have done according to the commandments of the Father and the Son;

And ye have received the Holy Ghost, which witnesses of the Father and the Son, unto the fulfilling of the promise which he hath made, that if ye enter in by the way, ye should receive. And now, my beloved brethren, after ye have gotten into this strait and narrow path, I would ask, if all is done?" And that's the question I have this evening for us here, is all done?

He goes on to answer that question, "Behold, I say unto you, Nay; for ye have not come thus far, save it were by the word of Christ, with unshaken faith in him, relying wholly upon the merits of him who is mighty to save; Wherefore, ye must press forward with a steadfastness in Christ, having a perfect brightness of hope, and a love of God and all men. Wherefore, if ye shall press forward, feasting upon the word of Christ, and endure to the end, behold, thus saith the Father: Ye shall have eternal life." Are we pressing forward? Are we taking opportunity to feast upon the word of Christ?

We asked in the brochure we sent out, 'Are you satisfied?' Are we satisfied with what we as individuals, each of us, have accomplished? Are we satisfied with our spiritual lives? Are we satisfied with the blessings, the fulfillment of the promises we've experienced? I hope that none of us at this point have really become satisfied; because if we've become satisfied, and I'm afraid that to some extent we might be, we will no longer incline our ear; we will no longer be listening to that still small voice, we will no longer ask and seek; we will no longer yearn for the truthfulness of the gospel. I am convinced that our heavenly Father has much, much more for us today and every day. Oh, we are told we're going to have to go through tribulation. We're going to have to suffer for Jesus Christ's sake, but we are told he will always be with us that we'll be able to get through any and every trial that's put in front of us.

I believe that we have an unchangeable God, that he is the same today as he was in days of old and that he's going to be the same tomorrow and any day thereafter; that he never changes his position, that he never varies from what he has said. Turn to the 16th chapter of Mark, 15th verse, Christ is talking, "... Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. And these signs shall follow them that believe; in my name they shall cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." Do you believe those words? He didn't put any time limit on it, that's for all time. I have to admit I'm not satisfied. I don't see that outpouring of untold blessings, however, we have experienced many blessings right here in this congregation. I think each of us have more than one testimony. But I believe that the things we have this day are just the crumbs compared to the meal the Lord has for us. I have to ask the question, what's happened? Have we for some reason allowed ourselves to be caught up in the ways of the world? Have each of us in some form or fashion laid up treasure on this earth over and above laying up treasures in heaven? Have we become prideful?

In 2nd Timothy, 3rd chapter, reading the first 7 verses, "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, Without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, Traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof; from such turn away. For of this sort are they which creep into houses, and lead captive silly wonen laden with sins, led away with divers lusts. Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth." In the last days perilous time shall come, men shall be lovers of their own selves. You could pick up any newspaper in the world today and what's printed on the front page is a testimony of the truthfulness of what is written here.

We've all become proud, lovers of ourselves to some extent. We have become disobedient to the commandments of God, and if we want to admit it or not we've become lovers of the pleasures of this world. To some extent we fit verse 5, 'having a form of godliness but denying the power thereof.' We've become lukewarm. Christ has given us the choice, are we satisfied with the crumbs?

In Malachi 3:6, the Lord asked us to prove him, "For I am the Lord, I change not..." He tells us we are to return unto him with our tithes and offerings, we are to make sacrifices for him, we are to be dedicated to him, we are to seek his ways, we are to put him first in our lives; he is to be the cornerstone of our activities, and he says, try me, prove me, see if I'm telling you the truth, see if I will not open the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room to receive it. Can you imagine that? Just think about that promise the Lord has made. I ask that each of us might go to our heavenly Father where we might yield to the enticings of the still small voice, that we might take time out of our busy lives and study the scripture. That we might be careful not to just take part of them but to take them all, to pray about them, to try to understand them, to ask God and then to set our lives in order. We need to make sure that we're doing the things that Christ has shown us to do; that we submit ourselves to his will. Let's make sure that each of us reaches that goal and that we aren't found short at that last day. Let's not be satisfied with anything less.

You may recall that we have treated upon a latter day desolation of Israel, and of the nations of the gentiles, in that many are to be subjected by Gog/Assyria/Russia, and some to go into captivity in the course of this third world war. Then the Lord's fury is to come up into His face; there is to be a great shaking in the land of Israel, and all men are to shake at His presence (see Ezekiel 38:18-20). Thus with great power will the Lord wreak vengeance upon the heathen, upon all who fight against Zion and His covenant people. He shall deliver them with a mighty hand stretched out. They shall come out of the north parts, from Russia, from the isles of the sea which are no more, and from all nations whither He has scattered them; and they shall come to the lands of their inheritance, to Jersualem of old, and to a New Jerusalem (Zion) upon the land of the Americas! It staggers the wildest imagination! Who can visualize it all?

What is this "tongue of the Egyptian sea" (Isaiah 11:15) which is to be destroyed that men may traverse by foot? Remember that through a world shaking quake, the land is to be "married" and the seas come together. How fittingly is the Mediterranean Sea described as a "tongue," and which courses the north African coast, all, or most of which, in ancient times was designated as "Egypt!" This tongue of the Egyptian Sea will disappear in preparation for the march of Israel to her homeland! And what a march it will be!

Isaiah 49:24-26: Shall the prey be taken from the mighty, or the lawful captive delivered? But thus saith the LORD, Even the captives of the mighty shall be taken away, and the prey of the terrible shall be delivered: for I will contend with him that contendeth with thee, and I will save thy children. And I will feed them that oppress thee with their own flesh; and they shall be drunken with their own blood, as with sweet wine: and all flesh shall know that I the LORD am thy Saviour and thy Redeemer, the mighty One of Jacob.

Isaiah 51:10,11: Art thou not it which hath dried the sea, the waters of the great deep; that

hath made the depths of the sea a way for the ransomed to pass over? Therefore the redeemed of the LORD shall return, and come with singing unto Zion; and everlasting joy shall be upon their head: they shall obtain gladness and joy; and sorrow and mourning shall flee away.

Jeremiah 23:5-8: Behold, the days come, saith the LORD, that I will raise unto David a righteous Branch, and a King shall reign and prosper, and shall execute judgment and justice in the earth. In his days Judah shall be saved, and Israel shall dwell safely: and this is his name whereby he shall be called, THE LORD OUR RIGHT-EOUSNESS. Therefore, behold, the days come, saith the LORD, that they shall no more say, the LORD liveth, which brought up the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt; But, The LORD liveth, which brought up and which led the seed of the house of Israel out of the north country, and from all countries whither I had driven them; and they shall dwell in their own land.

Jeremiah 50:4-5: In those days, and in that time, saith the LORD, the children of Israel shall come, they and the children of Judah together, going and weeping: they shall go, and seek the LORD their God. They shall ask the way to Zion with their faces thitherward, saying, Come and let us join ourselves to the LORD in a perpetual covenant that shall not be forgotten.

This stupendous exhibition of divine power in the deliverance of Israel will be so marvellous that her earlier deliverance from Egypt shall pale into insignificance, forgotten in the magnitude of this future deliverance and gathering, no more to part, for her King shall dwell in the midst!

Much more could be said, and quoted from scripture, but we leave this item of our study so as to not be tedious and to handle other matters relative to God's marvellous establishment of His kingdom in the last days.

We are not called to have larger farms and grain bins but to feed the poor and the needy better. We are not called just to purify ourselves through fasting and prayer but to walk with His Spirit in power and service to our fellow man.

Isaiah 58:1-12 (A description of true religion):

Cry aloud, spare not, lift up thy voice like a trumpet, and shew my people their transgression, and the house of Jacob their sins. Yet they seek me daily, and delight to know my ways, as a nation that did righteousness, and forsook not the ordinance of their God: they ask of me the ordinances of justice; they take delight in approaching to God. Wherefore have we fasted, say they, and thou seest not? wherefore have we afflicted our soul, and thou takest no knowledge? Behold, in the day of your fast ye find pleasure, and exact all your labors. Behold, ye fast for strife and debate, and to smite with the fist of wickedness: ye shall not fast as ye do this day, to make your voice to be heard on high. Is it such a fast that I have chosen? a day for a man to afflict his soul? is it to bow down his head as a bulrush, and to spread sackcloth and ashes under him? wilt thou call this a fast, and an acceptable day to the LORD? Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh? Then shall thy

light break forth as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily: and thy righteousness shall go before thee; the glory of the LORD shall be thy rereward. Then shalt thou call, and the LORD shall answer; thou shalt cry, and he shall say. Here I am. If thou take away from the midst of thee the yoke, the putting forth of the finger, and speaking vanity; And if thou draw out thy soul to the hungry, and satisfy the afflicted soul; then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness be as the noon day: And the LORD shall guide thee continually, and satisfy thy soul in drought, and make fat thy bones: and thou shalt be like a watered garden, and like a spring of water, whose waters fail not. And they that shall be of thee shall build the old waste places: thou shalt raise up the foundations of many generations; and thou shalt be called. The repairer of the breach, The restorer of paths to dwell in.

We will not be judged righteous by what we quit doing, or haven't done that is evil. We will be judged righteous by what we have done that is good, charitable, loving, kind, longsuffering, just, patient, merciful. This is the pure love of Christ, which is charity.

The fact is, all have gone astray and none can be delivered except by the mercy and atonement of Christ, and if you have not been merciful, mercy cannot be extended unto you.
