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Editorial . . .

Are You Aware of How Much Your Children Don't Know?

Notwithstanding the present reputation of the nation's education systems, neither public nor private school curriculum committees would even dream of not covering the basics of reading, writing, arithmetic, history, social studies, science and health. To do so would leave a child unprepared to meet the challenges of today's world.

As a parent, you or I would be appalled at a school system that didn't cover these basics — and cover them well.

Now, focus upon what each of us should consider at least an equal priority, if not higher: Your child's religious upbringing and Christian education. Are you as demanding? Are you as conscientious at getting your children to Sunday School once a week as you are to a secular school five times a week? Do you care or are you concerned what and how your child is being taught at Church? Are you as concerned about who teaches at Sunday School

and what qualifications they have as you are about your child's secular teacher's certificate of eligibility?

More importantly, are you even aware of what your child doesn't know about things you may be taking for granted? I suspect the answer is "no." The sad part is that you or I may never realize this — until our children reach adolescence and a time difficult, at best, to understand and communicate with one another.

Too late? I wouldn't say that, but just what parts of a "basic" Christian education is lacking that would help so much during those potentially turbulent times?

Think about it... For many years the total membership of the Church of Christ crept upward — slowly, but surely, and it was due largely to our member's son's and daughter's baptisms. The last several years the total membership has been creep-

ing downward.... Is there a connection here? Yes. The same thing that has produced a largely ignorant new generation of job seekers that can't read or write and parents that can't parent, in our nation, is destroying the foundation of the Church of Christ membership: A faltering and unorganized education system.

I am all in favor of Heavenly inspiration as our Sunday School teacher's guide — in fact we all would be hurting badly if that inspiration wasn't there. However, do we abandon all forms of organization and a planned curriculum because some think "planning" is not conducive to the leading of the Spirit? In some of our local churches this has been the case, but since when are we not to use our God-given gifts and wisdom to lay down a simple educational plan that would assure coverage of the basics of Christianity and yet not stifle Spiritual inspiration or restrict individual creativity?

With no coordination of who will teach what to whom and at what age, how do you know your child will even learn what baptism is really all about, or the meaning of the Lord's Supper? Do our kids know what the Book of Mormon is? Really? How many of our teenagers could tell you even a small portion of our significant church history? I could go on and on, but I think you may see my point. If you think it totally unlikely that a child born and raised in the Church of Christ could reach the "age of accountability" and never have been formally taught in Sunday School about what Baptism is and the need for it in their lives, think again — for it most certainly has happened and will happen again and again unless we do something about it. One of my own flesh and blood had such a poor knowledge of what the Book of Mormon truly is and how it miraculously came about in the history of this Church, that when the "sun scorched" down upon her with emotional strain, the "seed" dried up and the world's ignorance about these divine things prevailed — and she is lost from the fold. This is not an isolated case!

There has been talk for several years of abolishing the General Sunday School Association. I am not only opposed to such an idea, but am advocating the idea that this Association be totally revived, expanded and required to have a certain minimum of ordained ministry involved actively in its government and activities. A well organized curriculum guide should be established at the General Church level — in simple outline form only. The Sunday School Association should then be the body appointed to regularly encourage all local Sunday Schools to use the curriculum, or if not, to establish one of their own and use it.

Another large Restoration church has, in the past few years, created controversy and division by instituting a curriculum to be used in their local Churches around the world. Problems center around the facts that this became "law" for their Sunday Schools and was steeped with detailed new and innovative concepts in line with modern day national and world non-denominational church councils.

I neither advocate nor encourage anything even resembling such an atrocity. But must we totally abandon all attempts at even some very basic guidelines established with widsom, discretion and Godly inspiration to be offered and made available as a "suggested" yearly curriculum?

I pray for your every honest and prayerful consideration of this matter. If you feel it is important enough, voice your concerns at your local Church and Sunday School business meetings and at next year's April Ministers' Conference. G.H.

The Spirit of Deception

"Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1).

"For there shall arise false Christs, and false prophets, and shall shew great signs and wonders; insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect" (Matthew 24:24).

Therefore, "... take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares. For as a snare shall it come on all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth. Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man" (Luke 21:34-36).

And, "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Peter 5:8).

John, however, goes on to add in 1 John 4:2-3 by saying "Hereby know ye the spirit of God: Every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is of God: And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God: and this is that spirit of antichrist, whereof ye have heard that it should come; and even now already is it in the world."

But what about the more clever deception by those spirits (not of God) which do confess Christ? We have this recorded incident in the life of Christ: "And when he was come to the other side into the country of the Gergesenes, there met him two possessed with devils, coming out of the tombs, exceeding fierce, so that no man might pass by that way. And, behold, they cried out, saying, What have we to do with thee, Jesus, Thou Son of God? art thou come hither to torment us before the time?" (Matthew 8:28-29).

But more importantly for us we have this word: "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:21-23).

These are those who confess Christ by some other spirit but have not the authority of Christ. This

is shown clearly in 2 Corinthians 11:13-15: "For such are false apostles, deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the apostles of Christ. And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light. Therefore it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness; whose end shall be according to their works."

My purpose in writing this article is to share some thoughts regarding the work of God in these last days, I realize that each of us who have a concern for the work are anxious for it to move forward. I realize, too, that our desire for the onward progress of this work, which at times seems so painfully slow to us, can sometimes cause a great deal of anxiety for us. We want desparately for the Lord to begin to move and yet we know that according to His word this work will one day (soon, we feel) accomplish whereunto it was sent forth. So we have a tendency perhaps to run ahead of the Lord. We become impatient and discouraged as we see the years pass and seemingly little or no real progress being made. Zion is not yet redeemed, Israel not yet gathered nor the gospel preached unto all the world. So much to be done, the time so short and the servants few. Surely the Lord must be waiting on us to be about His business. So we strike out, yet not really knowing how to proceed. Perhaps rather than the Lord waiting on us we should be waiting more on the Lord. It seems that the bride is still hid in the closet, her clothes still in tatters. The fault no doubt lies with us, not with the bridegroom. So what is the answer?

Different ones of us approach the matter in ways befitting our individual differences. Some of us become discouraged and drift away. Others of us sit back and wait for God to step in. Still others keep plodding on doing what they can. Still others latch onto any ray of hope available and strive in their way, though not always in wisdom or even according to knowledge, in their attempt to bring about the cause of Zion.

Through all this, lay member and ministry alike, the key is to humble ourselves sufficiently before the Lord and to come out of the world to that degree which will enable us to receive from the Lord the endowment of His Spirit and the spiritual direction necessary for the consummation of His work here on earth. This event will happen whether we humble ourselves or are humbled because of circumstan-

ces. Otherwise we will be found wanting and outside the work of God.

Unfortunately, the difficulty which presents itself is in the how of it. We are so caught up with the 20th century world and its ways that we have no idea the degree to which we have partaken of it. In fact, we are completely unaware of the extent the 20th century has become a part of us or we have become a part of the 20th century. In becoming so we are unable to adequately comprehend the righteousness of God nor how piteously below that level of righteousness we fall. We are, therefore, unable to clearly discern our true spiritual state or our great need before God. So we tend to be at ease in Zion even though all is not well. Yet we may have a gnawing feeling that all is not well with us but we do not know just how to remedy the situation. So we feel somewhat in a quandry and content ourselves with the crumbs, not knowing how to avail ourselves or perhaps not quite willing to avail ourselves of the banquet God has for us. It is no wonder that judgment must begin at the house of God, for it is quite evident after 155 years that we, left to our own devices, will never redeem Zion.

So we feel we need God's special blessing. This is the crux of the matter. It is here that we must be careful to not run ahead of the Lord, for then Satan has the perfect opening to enter as an angel of light to accomodate and deceive us in our anxiety for the work of the Lord. The Lord's work will go on; we don't have to steady the ark of God, as it were.

The forces of good and evil are now enjoined in the great spiritual battle of the last days. True, at the moment Satan appears to be gaining the upper hand. But the scriptures tell us to try the spirits, for many spirits have gone abroad. And the devil has a spirit for every occasion, to deceive every type of person. His allures are bold and blatantly presented to those who have wholly gone after the world. But a more refined description is prepared for those whose views are less worldly. But his greatest refinements are reserved for those whose desires are truly toward the Lord. For these are the most difficult to deceive for they will not usually yield to anything that is plainly or obviously contrary to righteousness.

Thus Satan's greatest efforts are concentrated on those of us who are the true followers of Christ. Our deceptions are more likely to be spiritual than moral though we are not exempt from moral allurements. Therefore, we must constantly be on our toes lest when we think we stand, we fall. It is in the area of spiritual deception that I wish to concentrate most of my efforts in this writing for I feel that this is the area in which we stand in most danger.

The reason for this is that we are in the forefront of the battle and Satan knows that his time is now

very short. The more of us he can effectively neutralize the more successful he will be in subverting our efforts for the Lord, though, we know that God's work will not, ultimately, be thwarted.

I heard an illustration presented about a member of the restored gospel and a member of a protestant faith meeting together ostensibly to help a poor destitute woman who had, I believe, lost her husband, had no work and was pregnant. She was sitting on a park bench when they came upon her from opposite directions. The two Christians sat down on either side of her for the purpose of extending help to her. Instead, they began making disparaging remarks about one another's religion until finally the woman arose in disgust and departed. This brought the two Christians up short. They realized that they had failed to help the woman because of their disputations so they both agreed to unite in the cause of helping the woman to come to Christ and to bury their differences.

The error of this thinking was vividly apparent. I recalled the warning given to Joseph Smith to "join none of them" for their creeds were an abomination to Him, etc. I also knew that the angel was sent bearing the everlasting gospel to be preached unto all the world. (See Revelation 14:6-7). Christ said that it would be the gospel of the kingdom, not some protestant distortion. He also said that a church was His church only if the church was called in His name and if it be built upon His gospel. We cannot serve God and Mammon. Nor can we join forces with those who have not the Spirit of Christ. For the Spirit of the latter day gospel and the spirit of pentecostalism is not the same spirit. Neither can they work together to bring salvation to men. If Joseph Smith was commanded to join none of them, how dare we join forces with them today in a joint missionary effort? Jesus told the Nephites that if a church be called in His name and was built upon His gospel then would the Father show forth his works in it. If works are shown forth in churches bearing neither his name nor His gospel then we can only conclude that those works are of the other spirit. In 2 Chronicles 18 and 19 we find an account of a righteous king coming to the aid of an unrighteous king. The prophet of God reproved him by saying "shouldest thou help the ungodly and love them that hate the Lord? Therefore is wrath upon thee from the Lord."

Of course we are aware that those who follow pentecostalism do not consider themselves ungodly. However, they in the main have not heard nor followed the voice of the good shepherd. I myself have attended two such services, one in southern Missouri and one in Northern Missouri, and I must say with frankness that the spirit of Christ was not present either time though there was ample praising of God, speaking in tongues, singing, etc. Such

manifestations are really ungodly when the Spirit of God is not in it. The fact of the matter is that people are so easily taken in and deceived. It is as the scriptures state in 3 Nephi 12:23, "But if it be not built upon my gospel, and is built upon the works of men, or upon the works of the devil, verily I say unto you, They have joy in their works for a season, and by and by the end cometh, and they are hewn down and cast into the fire, from whence there is no return."

And we, in our zeal and anxiety for the work, must not latch onto a false hope in thinking this spirit is of God and thus a means to speed up the work we may feel is progressing all too slowly. God is also aware of the situation as we are, yet His time table remains unchanged. The work will be done on time and God will not delay His coming. But in the interim we must diligently be about His work and be more fully preparing ourselves for the time in which that work will go forth in power.

Certainly one who holds the priesthood authority cannot join forces with one who has taken this authority unto himself. This spirit of cooperation which we see today in the world is the ecumenical spirit. And the ecumenical movement's underlying spiritual power is the charismatic spirit.

Getting back to the illustration referred to above, we are not permitted to present a united front with any other church or representative of any other church. To do so is to acknowledge the authority of that church as equal to our own and its spirit as the one we serve. Ecumenism cannot and must not be a trademark with us at all. All who desire to be affiliated with the Church of Christ must come to the church with full purpose of heart, repenting of their sins, being baptized, etc. Though we should not join forces with those outside the church, we should nevertheless submerge our internal differences as much as possible, at least as far as the public is concerned, and work together for the salvation of mankind.

Another thought I have heard expressed and which caused me a great deal of consternation was the idea that it is not yet time to teach the Book of Mormon or the Church but only the gospel of Christ. The reasoning being, I believe, that the deaf would hear the words of the book after Lebanon had become a fruitful field. However, I would like to point out a number of things. Is it not strange that God would go through the trouble to bring forth the plates, have them translated by His power and published, only to hold back the work for more than 155 years, especially when the early church was instructed to rely upon the things which were written therein and that within its covers was contained the fulness of the gospel? Is not this the gospel of Christ that we should be carrying to all the world? Is not this the gospel of the kingdom referred to in Matthew's gospel which would be preached to all nations, kindreds, tongues and people before the end come? And does not the book itself tell us that it was given as the lesser part to first try our faith and then if we accept these things the greater things would be made manifest? And was not this book to be a witness to the Lamanite that when they shall begin to see these things that they might know that the time of their gathering was at hand, etc? Did not the work begun in 1820-30 mark the cutting out of the little stone without hands from the mountain and the establishment of the kingdom of God once again upon the earth? And did not, according to Isaiah 29, the book come forth a little while before Lebanon was to become a fruitful field? Just 24 years later in 1853 the former and latter rains returned to Palestine after an absence of nearly 2000 years proving the book to indeed be the book of God. And shall we hold back such great light that God had once again restored His church and kingdom to the earth? And did not the prophet Ezekiel also declare the stick of Judah (the Bible) and the stick of Joseph (the Book of Mormon) were to be joined in His hand as one? And is it one in our hand if we keep it back from the world? How then would we stand out as being different from other churches? We are to be peculiar people and not conformed in any way to the world.

I heard it said, "they preach love." But be not deceived, for Satan also preaches love when it is to his purposes. In the book written by Ruth Montgomery, a biography of Jean Dixon, the main theme of all her communications from the spirits was love. Love then is no criteria or quarantee of the spirit involved.

Though I do not recognize the authority and work of any other church outside the Church of Christ, I do recognize the faith of individuals outside the church and that God does honor such faith. I even accept that in some rare cases or instances God may even work with one in the capacity of a minister, though not as a called priesthood. However, the organizations which presume to function for Christ must necessarily be included in the statement that, Lord, Lord, have we not done many mighty works in thy name, etc. But the Lord will say to them, depart from me, I never knew thee. In other words they took an authority not of God and worked by a spirit not of Christ.

Now having said all of this and not wanting to cause discouragement in the hearts of any, I would like to reaffirm our hope in Christ and His glorious work of these last days. The time is shortly coming when the power and blessings of the Spirit of God will be made manifest in great power. Then that which we may see and possibly be drawn to in the charismatic or pentecostal spirit will seem as nought in comparison to the mighty power of God. Be patient and trust in the Lord. Run not before Him.

Let Him go before you and be your rereward for the time will shortly come when God will send out His faithful servants and they will be few. We have opportunity, if faithful, to be counted among those servants. Those servants will go forth in great power, even as did Ammon of old. And signs will then truly follow the believer for the power of God will descend upon the saints of God and even Christ will work among them. And we shall be armed with righteousness even that in that day the enemy may not reach us. This, my brothers and sisters, is the mighty word of God from the Book of Mormon. We dare not withhold its message from the world for it is indeed a message of hope and of redemption and deliverance.

Pentecostalism is a husk, the charismatic spirit a deception. Let us be among the very elect whom Satan cannot deceive. Let us hold forth the true light of God. Let us be true. Thus our lives can become a living praise to God. In time we shall shout and sing praises to God. But not as some do which offer no honor to God but rather tends to chaos.

Friends of mine at work highly recommended a book entitled, How To Live Like a King's Kid. It was the rave of the office. As soon as I heard the title I held the book suspect. Nevertheless, I read it and then answered it. The charismatic spirit was strongly in evidence throughout. Visions, dreams, prophesyings, speaking in tongues, etc., were prominent accounts. However, instant healings were performed even by women who administered by the laying on of hands. The spirit of the book and of these miracles was totally alien to me. It did no honor to the beautiful spirit of Christ.

Another book recommended to me was entitled, Hey God. It was about the purported conversion of an Italian Catholic woman to Christ. Her conversion was so strong that she gathered up all her images, beads, rosaries, etc., of her former pagan faith and burned them up in a bonfire. The spirit upon her was so strong that it went through the house as a mighty wind and even slammed doors. At mealtime on one occasion she prayed in tongues for 30 minutes. She was so completely convicted that she began preaching to the other Italian Catholics in the area and in the surrounding towns. Her preaching and the spirit upon her was so strong that invariably she would move audiences of hundreds to tears after which they would renounce Catholicism and join with Pentecostalism. This fulfills the scripture which says that many shall come in my name saying that I am Christ and shall deceive many. This charismatic spirit of pentecostalism is a very strong and deceptive spirit because it is such a clever counterfeit of the true. And the ignorant and over-zealous are easily deceived.

More recently, still another book was brought to

my attention. It is entitled *Exodus II* and is about a vision had by one Steve Lightle of the Jewish exodus from Russia to Palestine and how God was going to open a pathway for them to leave the country. Also how preparation is already going forward on a worldwide scale for this great exodus. So I went to the Baptist book store and purchased the book. I found the book to be charismatic throughout, a false work if you please, one not of God. The evidence of the false spirit was so strongly evident that spiritual discernment seemed scarcely necessary. Yet I knew that members of the body of Christ had been taken in by it. I felt perplexed and dismayed for the spirit of this book is surely not the Spirit of truth.

For example, he traveled to Moscow to visit a Jewish synagogue where he mightily pursuaded them by speaking in tongues — no interpretation mind you. Later an angel appeared to him one night in his home but when he turned to look at him, all he saw was pitch blackness, this according to his own testimony. Later he did see two angels whose belt buckles were 25 feet high. He also relates a vision of Christ who took his heart and cut out his pride and in that instant he died and was resurrected. Finally one cold winter night he heard the voice of God which spoke instructing him to get up and lay down on the floor because he had something to say to Him. He argued with God but finally relented and did so only to have God say that all he wanted to tell him was to get up and get back into bed. Why? To see if he would be obedient.

Obviously God does not work like this. All we have to do is read how God worked and communicated with his servants in the Bible and Book of Mormon and to the early Elders of this church and the contrast with the way God supposedly works and communicates with the pentecostals becomes glaring.

God will not work outside this church in the accomplishment of His great work. Nor will he use the instrumentality of any protestant denomination to bring about the restoration of the two houses of Israel and their gathering together unto Him. We, not them, are to carry the restored gospel, the Book of Mormon, the gospel of the kingdom to Lamanite, Jew, and Gentile. If this is true we must not and cannot withhold this record from them and it is by the authority of the Holy Priesthood that this will be accomplished. If we fail to do so then we have hid our light under a bushel.

This work will be done in God's wisdom, not in man's wisdom. Let us carry forth the Book of Mormon boldly and not be ashamed of the fulness of the gospel of Christ. Let us proclaim that the Church is again upon the earth for if we bring people to Christ but have no actual spiritual home to bring them to they are left dangling.

Time and Change

The Youth Issues of *Hand of Fellowship* have been interesting to us all. Now your editor introduces this Old Timers Issue, and asks me to contribute something to its pages. As an old timer myself, perhaps it is appropriate to consider some of the changes time has brought within my span of years.

TRANSPORTATION

In 1914 our family (missionary father, mother and seven children,) traveled by horse and muledrawn covered wagons from Guthrie, Oklahoma, to Phoenix, Arizona. One of the horses later pulled a fringe-topped surrey over the streets of Phoenix, to carry us to and from church services, to the grocery store or wherever we needed to go. Later we acquired vehicles fueled by gasoline instead of hay and oats. But they were not too trouble-free in those days. Now, most everyone enjoys driving an automobile, reliable, if modest, and for long-distance travel we soar through space via jet airliner, the most commonly used method of distance travel today. What a change from covered wagon days!

COMMUNICATION

My earliest memory of local mail delivery was by horse-drawn coach or buggy. It had come from distant places by train. Now, a large percent of all mail goes by air, even without an airmail stamp. The regular 13-cent stamp (now 22 cents — E.S.) has replaced the 2-cent stamp in use then. Telegrams were sent by Morse Code of dots and dashes to correspond with short and long sounds translated into words, as they are today. Cables, buried deep in the ocean, carried intercontinental messages, as they still do, but in addition to all these methods greatly improved today, we now have radio telephones, inter-com systems, television and telstar to carry both sound and picture.

The first telephones I remember were great, large boxes attached to the wall and the numbers desired were reached by turning a crank with alternating short and long turns, to activate short and long sounds, thus alerting the persons at the other end of the wire. Our streamlined, punch-button telephone instruments today are a far cry from the old wall boxes performing the same service! The modern techniques we have now, transmitting both sound and picture around the world in mere seconds are things we casually accept, but they still seem

like miracles to me. In reality, are not all miracles simply the operation of laws unfamiliar to us? We call them miracles because we do not understand the laws by which they are performed. But God knows all about those natural laws, because He devised them in the first place, and at His command any law or set of laws are put into operation to bring us blessings possible to receive by use of our puny knowledge or methods!

MUSIC

What a change I have observed in the field of music! Fortunately, the inspiring hymns I heard from earliest childhood are still sung and loved in our churches and homes, and the classical and semi-classical pieces and beautiful old ballads I learned to enjoy in my youth are still available. But I must confess that much of the so-called *music* heard today on radio and TV is only *noise* to some of us, and offensive beyond description! Is this merely a generation gap syndrome? Or is today's modern ear-splitting, raucous noise and yelling a part of the overall decline in cultural and moral behavior so prevalent in today's society?

LITERATURE

Perhaps it is literature, as much as anything else, that reflects the change in our culture during my lifetime. While there are still some fine, idealistic, clean books and magazines on the market, there are far too many that emphasize violence, crime, drinking, gambling, promiscuity, pornography and atheism. Some of our high-ranking social and government leaders and educators condone these changes, but others are pointing out their danger and their contribution to a breakdown of the very morals and principles upon which our nation was founded; a breakdown that will as surely destroy our nation as it has destroyed nations in the past.

A nutritionist has said, "Tell me what you eat and I will tell you what you are." What we eat is vitally important to our physical health. It is equally true that what we feed our minds — the literature we choose to read — is vitally important to our mental, emotional and spiritual health. There have always been both good and bad from which to choose, but changes in recent years have produced more filthy literature than ever before. Let us reject it as we would avoid exposure to the plague or any dread disease!

EDUCATION

If reports are correct, our schools today, from the elementary level through college are centers of rebellion, drugs and immoral activities of various kinds; phenomena unknown in my school days. Such deplorable conditions must, in part at least, stem from irreligious, unstable and, perhaps, broken homes — all conditions difficult for dedicated, responsible teachers to cope with. And there are many such teachers still in the profession though we know that all are not that conscientious. Such conditions are tragic, and will require the best efforts of the best people to overcome them and to restore our schools to their once wholesome atmosphere. God bless the good people who are working to that end!

RELIGION

In the category of religion I've seen many changes. Even professed Christians (some of them ministers), now proclaim their disbelief in the immaculate conception of Jesus and His virgin birth, thus denying a basic belief of Christian doctrine, and limiting their concept of God's power to that of finite man! New religions have sprung up, even Devil worshippers. Some new sects adopt, but desecrate the name of Jesus by introducing forms of so-called worship foreign to anything found in our sacred books; blasphemous change in once-revered Christian religious practice and form! The modicum of good in some of them serves only to mask their greater evil.

"Thus saith the Lord, Stand ye in the way, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls..." (Jeremiah 6:16)

HAIR STYLES, MODES OF DRESS

The way we wear our hair and the way we dress are personal matters, and what we like or dislike is based largely upon what we are used to. Whether we like or dislike the new long hair and beards on menfolk, has nothing to do with their morals or character. And whatever way Jesus wore his hair was not what made Him the Savior of the world, nor was His long, white robe a factor in His divinity. But its modesty is significant. Cleanliness, neatness and modesty are the cardinal factors in good grooming. In some of the changes in dress we see today, one of all three of these factors are ignored, but His people need not ignore them.

MORAL STANDARDS

Statistics indicate that crimes of every kind are on the increase: theft, embezzlement, extortion, exploitation, murder. In my youth we enjoyed playing outside in the twilight and early evening hours. Today, because of prevailing crimes, even adults

are afraid to take a walk after dark. This reminds us that our only safety anywhere lies in God's divine protection.

Just how much immodest dress contributes to the lowering of moral standards we cannot know, but those dealing with delinquency in the young, and who are involved with youth in the courts, have faulted scanty dress as a factor in laxity of morals. One of the early prophets foretold the day when "the spirit of adultery" would be "poured out on the nations." We see it fulfilled in the breakdown of marriage; in emphasis on, and permissiveness in illicit relations between the sexes among young and old. Change? Yes, and not to the advancement of chastity and virtue (Or physical health, as evidenced by the fatal disease, AIDS, which has surfaced since this article was originally written, reminding us of the scriptural warning: "For to be carnally minded is death; ... " [Romans 8:6] Always spiritually, and in some cases, physically as well!).

Jesus' teachings on the sanctity of marriage and the purity of relationships between men and women are plain, and regardless of the evidence of promiscuity all around us, and violators virtually shouting it boldly from the housetops, pure living merits our open support and our constant way of life.

These are only a few of the many changes which have taken place in the past three quarters of a century. We need to be on the alert all the time and pray for discernment to be able to know which ones are good and which ones are bad — to be able to identify the subtle, innocent-appearing innovations which are contrary to the high standards of the pure gospel of Christ, and to follow those high standards faithfully, from youth to the end of the way.

THE UNCHANGEABLE

Some things have never changed, nor will they ever change. "For I am the Lord, I change not; . . ." (Matthew 3:6) "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and to day, and for ever." (Hebrews 13:8) Because God and His Son never change, the Gospel never changes. Its basic truths are timeless. He revealed Himself to men of old, to give commands, laws, exhortations, commendations, priesthood calls. He reveals himself today for the same purposes. Because of this, both young and old may rejoice and be glad!

Youth is a beautiful time of life, but age has its compensations. Experience provides the stepping stones to knowledge. Sweet memories hallow past years and time heals every wound. Faith takes away the fear of death when it edges closer and closer as these mortal bodies wear out. Faith lights the pathway to God's bright and beautiful tomorrow where all the faithful, including old timers, will walk in newness of life.

Gifts and Fruits by Amy Schrade

"Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I would not have you ignorant . . . Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit . . . For to one is given by the Spirit the word of widsom; to another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit; To another faith by the same Spirit; to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit; To another the working of miracles; to another prophecy; to another discerning of spirits; to another divers kinds of tongues; to another the interpretation of tongues; But all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will." 1 Corinthians 12:1-11.

Here we have enumerated various spiritual gifts given to man by the Spirit from God. It is a matter of no small import to be given such a gift of the Spirit. It is, however, essential that we recognize a gift is just that—a gift. A gift is not something that is earned or deserved. A gift is wholly by the grace of the giver, not the recipient. Humble appreciation is the only appropriate response to the offer of a gift. To receive a gift in any sense as an enhancement of oneself is to impose the idea of one's merit over the benevolence of him who is the giver.

Now days we hear rather much claim amid the christian professing community, to the presence or practice of two, at least, of the afore mentioned spiritual gifts; the gift of healing and of speaking in other tongues. People are heralding abroad through every form of media, their claim to the operation of these gifts among or through themselves. This, Jesus, the author from whom these gifts come, did not do. "Charity vaunteth not itself," Never did Jesus appeal for disciples or for a following by proclaiming abroad or boasting of the miracles and healings he performed. Just the opposite, he sometimes asked the persons healed to tell no one. Jesus was meek; (patient, kind, gentle) and lowly, (humble, non-selfassertive). We are to let the mind of Christ dwell in us.

Somewhat strange, also, is that we hear little claim being laid to the rest of these spiritual gifts. Are they not as valid, or as valuable as healing and the speaking in other tongues? Perhaps they are not as sought for as these. Perhaps they are not as demonstrable. Perhaps they are more easily discerned

But the gifts of the Spirit, alone, are not enough. Receiving a gift often does not change the recipient, whether the gift is of man or of God. Gifts can fail, even these given of the Spirit, will cease, "... whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away. For we know in part, and we prophecy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be

done away." I Corinthians 13:8-10.

A spiritual gift can be a one time occurrence, an occasional thing, a momentary, or a temporary happening according to the purpose for which it is given, perhaps leaving little impact on the individual through whom it is exercised. To view the recipient of a gift of the Spirit as other than the instrument used, by that individual or others, may thwart the purpose for which the gift is given, and intrude upon the glory of God. Joseph Smith once commented to the effect, that a prophet is a prophet only when being used by God as a prophet; the Spirit or gift of prophecy not being a perpetual condition to be exercised at the will or by the choice of man. So neither are the other gifts.

Without something other than the gifts of the Spirit, we are found wanting. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing." (I Cor. 13:1-3) Not only does a gift not make anything of the individual, neither do exceptional deeds. They are good or evil depending on the motivation which backs them.

And then there are the fruits of the Spirit. Fruit is produced from within, as contrasted to that which is given, even though it is done of the same Spirit. The fruits of the Spirit are, "... love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance; ..." (Galatians 5:22-23.) These are the qualities of being; the same as the attributes of charity, without which we are nothing; the qualities of the meekness and lowliness of Jesus. They are the result of the abiding in of the presence of the Holy Ghost, "And I will pray the Father, and he will give you another comforter, that he may abide with you forever. Even the Spirit of truth; ... for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you." And where that Spirit is, there is it's fruit also.

The fruits of the Spirit; the qualities of charity; the mind of Jesus; the pure love of Christ dwelling in one, these are what change the individual. So though we are admonished to desire the "best gifts" for the purpose that God be glorified, 1 Corinthians 12:31, we are further admonished to "follow after charity" I Corinthians 14:1; to pray with all the energies of our hearts that this pure love of Christ might possess us, for without this we are nothing; Moroni 7:52-53, however many gifts we may have been given, however many times the Lord has used us for one purpose or another.

Grace Versus Works by Amy Schrader

Hear a parable. Suppose you were one that should receive word that an unmet, unknown friend had died leaving you a great legacy deposited in a certain banking institution. In order to claim it, of course there would be certain processes to go through and perhaps certain requirements to be met and agreements to be made. Instructions would have been written and made available.

To claim the legacy the beneficiary would have to believe the report given, at least he must believe sufficiently enough to make an investigation. Then if satisfied the report was true he would have to avail himself of the instructions concerning thereto. If on study of these he concludes the legacy is not worth the stipulations attached he can simply forfeit it, and there it will lay unused for no other can claim what is left in his name.

If he decides to claim it there will be the legal process of proving his identity, the signing of documents and perhaps of affidavits of agreement to abide by the requirements specified. One might be required to take, along with their own name, the name of their benefactor. One may be required to continue a work the benefactor has initiated, or to use the legacy for various charitable purposes. The nature of the legacy is such that it never diminishes. He will always retain as much as is expended. It is his gift to dispurse and by dispursing to always have.

Now the question. Can these requirements, if adhered to, in any way be construed as earning the gift? Is the gift his by his works or by the beneficence of the one who gained it and put it on deposit for him? True if he did not abide by the requirements laid down he could never have had the gift, but all of those acts would never have produced the gift had not another

prepared it for him. "Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."

Romans 12:20-21

That one phase of that quote, or at least the interpretation usually put on it, 'for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head,' has always troubled me. Why should we suppose we are told to do good to our enemy, feed and give him drink, in order to mortify him? It seems a contradiction that we should be told to heap any kind of abuse, overt or covert upon the head of one we have been told to love and do good to. Indeed the 21st verse indicates our action is for the purpose of overcoming his evil with our good.

Now there comes from the practices of the East and Near East of that day, a custom continued in much of the area even today, which offers an entirely different explanation of the meaning of that phrase: the practice of carrying whatever burden one might have on the head. In that day before matches, if one's cooking fire went out a live coal from a neighbor or friend's hearth was a very real blessing, and like all other things was carried in a suitable container on the head. Thus the heaping of coals of fire would be as filling their container heaped up with blessings.

This, as well as giving us a very literal example of doing that which blesses our enemy, gives us a spiritual parallel; the heaping of love and loving things upon them, which can rekindle the fires of love in their hearts and turn an enemy into a friend, in the which evil is overcome and we are rewarded in that God is glorified in the return of a prodigal to the status of a dear son.

Do not think of yourself more highly than you are. Mike (Martin) gave our closing prayer with, "Our heavenly Father, we come to a closing of another service; it means a lot to us who are here.... Forgive our sins. Help us to take the opportunity to share our faith. Be with us until we meet again. These things we pray in Jesus name, Amen."
