A Future Of Despair Or Hope?

Much that we read in the scriptures tells of the time just ahead of us. We read of terrible things to come upon the earth:

"And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars: ...For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows ... For then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, no, nor ever shall be." Matthew 24:6-8, 21.

"The great day of the LORD is near ... the mighty man shall cry there bitterly. That day is a day of wrath, a day of trouble and distress, a day of wasteness and desolation, a day of darkness and gloominess, a day of clouds and thick darkness ... And I will bring distress upon men ... and their blood shall be poured out as dust, and their flesh as the dung. Neither their silver nor their gold shall be able to deliver them in the day of the LORD'S wrath; but the whole land shall be devoured by the fire of his jealousy: for he shall make even a speedy riddance of all them that dwell in the land." Zephaniah 1:14-18.

"That which the palmerworm hath left hath the locust eaten; and that which the locust hath left hath the cankerworm eaten; and that which the cankerworm hath left hath the caterpillar eaten. ...The field is wasted, the land mourneth ...the harvest of the field is perished." Joel 1:4, 10,11.

"... let all the inhabitants of the land tremble: for the day of the LORD cometh ... A day of darkness and gloominess, a day of clouds and of thick darkness ... a great people and a strong ... A fire devoureth before them; and behind them a flame burneth: the land is as the garden of Eden before them, and behind them a desolate wilderness; yea, and nothing shall escape them ... The earth shall quake before them; the heavens shall tremble: the sun and the moon shall be dark, and the stars shall withdraw their shining: And the LORD shall utter his voice before his army: (This army is an army of the heathen sent by the LORD to pour out his wrath upon the wicked on this land.) ... for the day of the LORD is great and very terrible; and who can abide it?" Joel 2:1-3, 10-11 (Emphasis and parenthetic commentary by the author.)

All of these scriptures, and many more, point to the time just ahead of us. And these predictions of doom come not only from the scriptures, but also from many scientists, economists, sociologists, etc., of today.

Do we face this time with despair? Or is there a hope for us? "And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh." Luke 21:28. "And except those days should be shortened, there should no flesh be saved: but for the elect's sake those days shall be shortened." Matthew 24:22. "Then will the LORD be jealous for his land, and pity his people. Yea, the LORD will answer and say to his people, Behold, I will send you corn, and wine, and oil, and ye shall be satisfied there with: and I will no more make you a reproach among the heathen: But I will remove far off from you the northern army ... Fear not, O land; be glad and rejoice: for the LORD will do

great things. And ye shall eat in plenty, and be satisfied, and praise the name of the LORD your God ... and my people shall never be ashamed." Joel 2:18-21, 26. " ... the Lord will be the hope of his people, and the strength of the children of Israel. So shall ye know that I am the LORD your God dwelling in Zion, my holy mountain: Then shall Jerusalem be holy ... And it shall come to pass in that day, that the mountains shall drop down new wine, and the hills shall flow with milk...." Joel 3:16-18.

"The LORD thy God in the midst of thee is mighty; he will save ... I will gather them that are sorrowful for the solemn assembly, who are of thee, to whom the reproach of it was a burden. Behold, at that time I will undo all that afflict thee: And I will save her that halteth, and gather her that was driven out; and I will get them praise and fame in every land where they have been put to shame ... I will make you a name and a praise among all people of the earth, when I turn back your captivity before your eyes saith the LORD." Zephaniah 3:17-20.

So, even though there will be much to afflict the LORD's people and will have to be brought out of captivity (from sin and from the clutches of the Babylonian system under which we live), there is a marvelous hope.

So it should be our goal that we become more righteous and have in our hearts the law of Christ, that we reach for that perfection required of us so that we can be partakers of that hope.

Steps Toward Zion

(Part One of Two)

I haven't come here to entertain you. In fact, I like to charge people with a task before I even begin, and it's found in the 4th chapter of Colossians, starting at the 2nd verse. It says: "Continue in prayer, and watch in the same with thanksgiving;." In other words as I attempt to bring the words of God to you today, let your heart be stretched out in prayer that you might hear the words of eternal life. And that as you hear them, you would give the thanks unto God. It goes on, "Withal praying also for us, that God would open unto us the door of utterance to speak the mystery of Christ, for which I

am also in bonds: That I may make it manifest as I ought to speak." And that's your charge this hour. Depending on how diligent you are at your task, you will be rewarded of the heavenly Father.

My first scripture reading comes out of II Nephi 10:54. I fasted for

a week when I thought about coming to the Phoenix reunion, that if opportunity was granted and I was to speak, I would have the words that would be pleasing unto the Father, and that I would have the topic that the Lord would have me speak about. This verse was drawn to my attention in very great strength at a prayer meeting. It says, "What shall then answer the messengers of the nations? That the Lord hath founded Zion, and the poor of his people shall trust in it."

In my work in Cherokee, N.C., I'm driven by that constant thought: The gathering of the Lord's people. It's kind of like there's a wind on my back that pushes me forward, when my heart is troubled with the trials of the day and the trials of the missionary work. I think upon Zion a lot. Our Brother Don McIndoo brought up six points that constitute the cause of Zion, and I'd like to emphasize two of those points. Since the gospel has already been restored, and the place selected, and Zion founded, there are two other things that seem to be lacking: personal righteousness and the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ. I feel these two elements are what hinder our progress. It is our personal unrighteousness and our lack of preaching the gospel that holds us back.

There's another very grave concern of mine. Not our imperfections, in our work before the Lord, but the spiritual deception of the day. That to me is one of the more awesome threats in this Church of Christ. We have people who have difficulty in discerning the spirits. As you know when the evil one finds his way into the assemblies of the saints, it's not long and you have empty seats. That's the ploy of Satan in this last day and the strength of his power is great upon the face of the Lord.

As for spiritual righteousness, I'd like to turn to Ephesians 4:11-13. I read this many times to people I come in contact with because it tells of the mark of perfection that God Almighty requires of us. We talked today in the testimonies, of the deliverance of the saints; we have been told of the protection of the saints, the escape, the refuge. But I tell you the scriptures that I read say that the holy shall escape; the holy. Now how far do we have to go to reach that? I think the mark is listed here and it's very important because it talks about the carrying forth of the gospel of Jesus Christ, and also about the perfection of the saints; the righteousness of God's people.

"And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:" Very important elements in the cause of Zion. Some might ask, how perfect do you need to be? It says, "Till we all come in the unity of the faith,

and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ:" That's the yardstick. And we've been told that since we were a child; that Christ is our example. Let me ask you, have you follwed that example? We have young here and we have old here. Old ones, when you're ready to lie down, have you followed that example? Let me read one thing that Christ said to his heavenly Father, and you consider whether you can say this to your heavenly Father, young and old. It's found in John 17:4. Christ walked upon the earth and he did the will of the Father each and every step. His steps were ordered of the Lord. Now, isn't that a command for us, that every step should be ordered by the Lord? Then wherein comes this attitude, 'I'm doing my own thing?' Well, I've got my own ideas about that. There's no room for that in the day and age that we live in. Time is short and if you don't feel the presence of the hand of God ordering your each and every step, then you're not going to make it to the point that God created you for. That's right, God created each and every one of us for a specific task upon this earth, just like Christ had a mission upon this earth, and when it was done, what did he say to his heavenly Father? It's recorded in John 17:4. He says, "I have glorified thee on earth: I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do." There are many here that say, "Well, I'm not really sure why God put me here." Is that an attitude that you can keep for very long? Have you sought the will of the Father?

We read a parable; one servant knew the Lord's will and didn't do it, and he was chastized, and cast out. There there was the servant who didn't know his Lord's will. Why didn't he know? Because he didn't seek sufficiently. What is the fullness of your creation? You plant the seed and a flower grows. It is a beautiful flower-sometimes. Sometimes that flower comes up and it's crippled. It doesn't fulfill the fullness of it's creation. I'm talking to saints. Sainthood, the fullness of your creation. What is it? Why did God put you here upon this earth? Are you fulfilling your mission? Do you have the knowledge from God that you are walking in the path of righteousness? For without that knowledge your faith cannot increase. You must have that knowledge of Almighty God, that he's there and the he is ordering your each and every step. Think about

We look at the Church of Christ. The Church of Christ came forth just like you did, as a child. You came forth and God had a plan for you. He had a blueprint right there, and you agreed to those plans before you ever stepped on this earth. This Church has a blueprint when it came forth, and it carries us to Zion: and the gathering and the return of Christ. The Church of Christ must grow. Remember what

Brother Sheldon talked about; the little stone in Daniel that was to grow and become a mighty mountain of the Lord, and it was to strike the image upon the feet? Well, the plot where that little stone was planted, as recorded in the 57th chapter of the Doctrine and Covenants, tells you. Zion is founded but it must grow into — what? — just exactly what he said — the mighty mountain of the Lord. And then think of where we are today. How are we going to fulfill the fullness of the creation of the Church of Christ?

God by his mighty hand came to earth and set up his Kingdom and restored his gospel, and now I hear people rejecting that gospel. I am not talking about other churches - I'm talking about the Church of Christ. Some are offended at the revelations that came down from heaven. The Book of Commandments tells us that that which came down from heaven was sacred and must be spoken in sacredness and in care. You see people drawing away. An interesting thing, a dear lady told me that she did not believe there really was going to be a Zion. In the Church of Christ! To what are we converted?

There's a destiny for this Church and there's a destiny for each and every one of you, and if you're not seeking the direction God would have you go, the steps you are to take toward holiness, you might ask, "Sam, do you think you are holy?" No, brother, I've got a long way to go to get to that Zionic state, but if I'm going to escape the things that are coming upon this earth, I've got to reach up to that high mountain of spirituality. God makes it sound so easy in Philippians 2:13. He says, "For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure." And yet we reject it sometimes and do our own pleasure, our own thing.

I'd like to take that thought a step further. In II Nephi 6:100, it says, "Wherefore, do not spend money for that which is of no worth, nor your labor for that which cannot satisfy." Now sometimes I look at the Church of Christ, and I begin to think. Well, we've got two couples, one is in the church, each living in a home, they've got two cars, they've got two kids, they've got two yards, and I'm wondering just where the dividing line really is between these two couples. What are you spending your money for? What are you laboring for? Is it that new boat, or whatever it might be? Are you being cast in the image of God, or the Son of God, that you might say, "My Father, I've completed what you set me upon the earth to complete," or are you saying, "World, I look just like you think I should look." Are you cast in the image of God or are you cast in the image of man? Sometimes I think we're torn too much between God and the World. When we feel comfortable, we've got a good family, those two

kids, got those two cars, we begin to forget the cause of Zion. Brother Sheldon brought it out. How do you ever expect to accomplish the cause and design of Zion unless you have all things common? Unless you think about the situations in the families of the Church of Christ, in South America, North America, wherever you might find them.

I had an interesting dream, one that was very important to me. There was a great dearth upon the earth, and I was standing in a long line. There were saints in that line; and there was bread in one pan and there were pork chops in another. I like them both, but I could see there was not enough to feed the ones behind me, and yet, as a person went through that line they could take what they wanted, two rolls, whatever. So when I got to those pork chops I forked me up two. The fellow in front of me turned around (it happened to by my Uncle Gene). He grabbed my hand, and he said, "Sam, eat out of need, not out of greed." Think about it. I was about to deprive somebody out of a pork chop out of greed, not out of need. It would have been nice to have but it was out of greed that I took it. It was fully in my power to take it, though. It's the same thing with our incomes, our labor, our days upon this earth. How much time have you taken to yourself and to your family that was not really required and neglected the gospel of Jesus Christ? Oh, it's fun, skydiving or whatever you're into, but it does very little for the gospel of Christ.

Many times we have people that are reaching outside, to find something internal that gives them that which satisfieth. They try to get things from the outside, and we all know that's not how it happens. That which satisfieth comes from the inside. I think that's what he's alluding to here, somewhat, "nor for that which cannot satisfy."

I'd like to go to another favorite of mine and that's found in II Nephi 11:109. "But the laborer in Zion shall labor in Zion; for if they labor for money, they shall perish." I'd like to couple that with that last verse, if you labor for that which cannot satisfy, you shall perish. Your heart will not be in Zion. Zion is a living part of me, and I believe it's a living part of most of you. But some of you still have the idea that it's a vague concept, and I charge you to study it out. Zion should be as much of the living word of God that's within you as any other part of the gospel. And if you couch the gospel of Jesus Christ in any other terms it will be nothing but husk.


At work people tell me, "I went to Nassau; I went to Hawaii; I went snorkeling off the beach of so and so; where did you go, Sam?" I went to Zion. What? You mean like in the Old Testament? No, as in right now, I went to Zion and I had the best time of my life. And I hope and pray I can go again. I went to Zion.

I'd like to tell you a little story about myself. I try

to use stories about myself so I don't hurt feelings. When I entered the mission field at Cherokee, N.C., I was a young urban professional, I guess they call them yuppies today. I'd just bought my second car, I had two kids, I had these comfortable things, and I told Elder M. Harvey Seibel, "I can't go with you, door to door, Saturday." He said, "Why?" I said, "I've got to mow my lawn." Thinking about that today humbles me. But he said, "What?" And he could be quite exuberant when you said something like that to him. I said, "Yes, my neighbors are going to be awfully upset with me if I don't mow that lawn." and I didn't go. (I thought he was being awfully hard with me, he said some of the nastiest things that I knew to be true.) I mowed my lawn, and the next week I went down there to Cherokee, and that night as I lay thinking about those events, my heart began to get hard. Some of you have experienced the hardening of the heart. I began to think about these things. Everybody else that I worked with had all these comfortable things. I lived in Knoxville, a nice place, I thought. And here I was in a little broken down trailer in Cherokee, with my wife and children. I was bemoaning, and while I was laying there contemplating the matter (that's usually when I'm supposed to be talking to God, but when you've got a hard heart, sometimes you kind of stray away from doing that with real earnestness). It was just like the roof of the trailer just rolled back and the clouds of heaven rolled back, and there was a council meeting being held in heaven and there were two spirits holding accusations against me, and I knew them to be true. The voice from the throne said, "What shall we do?" And I pleaded, "Oh, please, do whatever it takes to save my soul, that I might bring the word of God to others like I should, Oh, please." And the voice said, "It will be done." And the clouds rolled back. I laid there thinking about the vision most of the night.

When I got in church the next morning, being the Sunday School Superintendent, I opened the meeting with prayer, and the Spirit of the Lord came upon me and I prayed that the Lord would set his chastening hand upon those who required it and that his kingdom would be set in order. I had a car accident on the way home, lost one of those two cars. It was like there was a dark sleep came over me and I ran right into the back of a guy's car that I worked with. That meant a lot to me and I had many days of humility and contrition. And I decided that I was going to be cast into the image of God and not in the image of man. And I would labor for these things that had worth to them, that could satisfy the soul, that I could look back on a day later and say that I have something kept in store for that moment. Let's watch ourself along these lines, and not only watch because the requirement is holiness.

So many blessings were ours that I would like to share them with you. My husband, Allen, was hospitalized right after Christmas with a terrible case of vertigo. The treatment was successful and he was back to work the next week. Our experience with Aric (our 12-

year old son) has surely shown us the grace of God. The diagnosis was that he had a tumor in the front lobal area of the sinuses, which was pressing on his eyes and causing blinding headaches and numbness in his hands and arms. He was in the hospital for a week, then out again without any improvement. For several days, we were on a medical merry-go-round: the date of surgery was set, then postponed, then re-scheduled within a matter of days. Two other doctors agreed with the diagnosis, including a neurosurgeon who ordered a second CAT scan. Aric was very ill during this time, barely able to keep his head up. When surgery was done, the tumor was simply not there. Praise the Lord! We felt blessed in having a doctor who recognizes the power of prayer and the wonderful healing ability God has given our bodies. This doctor has kept up on all the new surgical procedures and was able to do an endoscopic surgery using very small instruments and a small telescopic device. Aric's incision at the inside corner of his left eyelid is barely noticeable now, and his recovery has been slow but sure. His homebound tutor comes twice a week, and he should be going back to school soon. The doctors were amazed at Aric's maturity in handling his situation, and we know that the Lord gave him much comfort and strength to endure. This whole experience has been a powerful testimony to him and to others who are familiar with all the details. We are thankful for your prayers and support and thank God for this glimpse into his loving kindness and great mercy.

Then said Mary unto the angel, How shalt this be, seeing I know not a man? And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God. And, behold, thy cousin Elisabeth, she hath also conceived a son in her old age: and this is the sixth month with her, who was called barren. For with God nothing shall be impossible."

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"And Mary said, Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word. And the angel departed from her. And Mary arose in those days, and went into the hill country with haste, into a city of Juda; And entered into the house of Zacharias, and saluted Elisabeth. And it came to pass, that, when Elisabeth heard the salutation of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elisabeth was filled with the Holy Ghost: And she spake out with a loud voice, and said, Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For, Lo, as soon as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears, the babe leaped in my womb for joy. And blessed is she that believed: for there shall be a performance of those things which were told her from the Lord. And Mary said, My soul doth magnify the Lord, And my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior. OBITUARIES

Oren A. Caviness

Oren Alfred Caviness, born in Durango, Colorado, on August 31, 1903, passed from this life on March 12, 1987, in Phoenix, Arizona, at the age of 83 years, 6 months, and 12 days. He was the son of George W. Caviness and Martha J. Mathis.

Oren was preceded in death by his parents; one brother, Clifford O. Caviness; and two sisters, Irma Mortensen and Ethel Yates. He is survived by one brother, George W. Caviness, Jr., of Independence, Missouri.

Oren was married to Esther M. Yates in San Bernadino, California, on August 31, 1924, his twenty-first birthday. To this union three daughters were born: Lorraine I. (Mrs. A.D. "Bert" Patterson), of Phoenix, Arizona; Velma J. (Mrs. R.A. "Dick" Wheaton), of Vernal, Utah; and Sharon I. (Mrs. L.E. "Larry Kelley), of Springfield, Missouri.

Oren worked his way through high school as a night janitor at the library in Durango, Colorado, reading every book he could, forming a life long thirst for literature and knowledge.

He worked as a cow puncher in Colorado as a young man and as a miner in Bingham Canyon, Utah (the largest open pit copper mine in the world), and the silver mines of Tonapah, Nevada.

Oren was an avid outdoorsman. Included in his interests were rock hunting and polishing, photography, camping, hunting and fishing.

He worked for the Phoenix Fire Department for thirty years, working his way up from Hoseman to Battalion Chief, retiring on May 1, 1961.

Oren was baptized into the RLDS church as a young boy, later transferring to the Church of Christ (with Headquarters on the Temple Lot) with his wife, Esther in February 1928. He was ordained an Elder in the Church of Christ on March 17, 1929, and served as Pastor of the Phoenix, Arizona, and Collins, Missouri, local churches and as a General Bishop of the church from 1962 until his death.

Oren leaves to mourn his passing, his wife, Esther, three daughters, Lorraine, Velma and Sharon, fourteen grandchildren, twenty-four great grandchildren and a host of relatives and friends.

A memorial service was held at the Phoenix Local Church of Christ, Sunday, March 22, 1987.

I came into Oren and Esther Caviness' family 34 years ago as Velma's husband. Some refer to this relationship as being a son-in-law. But I did not have a father-in-law and don't have a mother-in-law, I have another father and mother. Like all three of their sons, I have always received the same generous portion of their love and concern that their daughters have enjoyed.

Dad was a most remarkable man, confident, capable and self-assured. But he was also an humble man, not given to boasting of his deeds or accomplishments. He had a quiet, gracious manner that sometimes belied his deep concern and convictions of life. He was a devout man giving much of his time and himself to his God, his church and his fellow man.

Dad Caviness and I served together for several years on the Board of Publications where his efforts and dedication were greatly appreciated and of great benefit to the Church.

He personified the oft seen illustration of the young boy carrying a small boy on his back and when asked if his load was not too heavy replied, "He's not heavy, he's my brother." Dad cared that way for all of his family, his friends (which included everyone he knew) and the stranger.

Dad and I had many things in common. We loved nature, the mountains, desert, wildlife, the deer that came to his yard, the cardinals that called at his back door, and fishing for the beautiful rainbow trout. He loved poetry, music and good literature. He loved the Gospel and church friends and he loved children and family.

Dad loved to find the hidden beauty in rocks that his many rock hounding forays yielded up.

Dad loved life and savored each moment of it with zest. But he never became so preoccupied by living his own life, that he was too busy to help those in need. Like the poet Eva Rose York, who penned these lines, he seemed ever aware of his responsibilities to those about him:

I shall not pass this way again—
Although it bordered be with flowers,
Although I rest in fragrant bowers,
And hear the singing
Of song-birds winging

To highest heaven their gladsome flight;
Though moons are full and stars are bright,
And winds and waves are softly sighing,
While leafy trees make low replying;
Though voices clear in joyous strain
Repeat a jubilant refrain;
Though rising suns their radiance throw
On summer's green and winter's snow,
In such rare splendor that my heart
Would ache from scenes like these to part;

Though beauties heighten, And life-lights brighten, And joys proceed from every pain.— I shall not pass this way again.

Dad Caviness was a very special person in my life and in the lives of his family and friends, both young and old. He was first a true friend who never failed you. And he was a fellow servant of our Lord, Jesus Christ. He was a companion on many adventures in life, camping, fishing and vacationing together many times to many beautiful parts of God's creation.

During Mother's recent illness, he prayed constantly for his sweetheart's recovery and return to him. His prayers and faith were answered by Mother's miraculous recovery.

Dad was aware that his time was near, and he spent the last few hours of it the night he left, trying to prepare Mother for the time when he would not be with her, and telling her how rich a life they had had together, how very deeply he loved her and that she must be strong after he was gone. Then he layed down and went to sleep and met his Master to rest in His paradise.

So true to his nature, Dad, in his last hours, was still building the bridge for those who would follow, so beautifully portrayed in Will Allen Dromgoole's poem:

"The Bridge-Builder"

An old man going a lone highway

The old man crossed in the twilight dim,

Nellie DeGroot was born August 22, 1904, and was adopted into the family of John and Alida DeGroot on August 28, 1909, where she enjoyed a loving family life of which she often spoke.

Nellie was baptized into the Church of Christ (with headquarters on the Temple Lot, in Independence, Missouri) by Apostle James E. Yates on November 17, 1928, at Ogden, Utah.

Nellie was engaged in domestic work and child care most of her working years, sometimes working in factories, retiring in 1969. Many of the children, now young men and women with children of their own, and their parents were in attendance at Nellie's service.

Nellie DeGroot passed from this life on March 27, 1987, at the age of 82 years, 7 months and 5 days in the hospital in Ogden, Utah.

She lived most of her life in Ogden, Utah, at 446 River Drive. She cared for both her mother and father during long illnesses preceding their deaths.

She loved her mother and father and family. Often caring for her nieces and nephews. She was generous to family and friends.

Nellie was preceded in death by her only adopted brother John DeGroot, of Ogden.

And then shall it come to pass that the spirits of those who are righteous, are received into a state of happiness, which is called paradise; a state of rest; a state of peace, where they shall rest from all their troubles, and from all care, and sorrow, etc.... I first became acquainted with the DeGroot family in 1929 in Independence, Missouri, when the family attended the conference of the Church of Christ. My family camped in the park just east of the DeGroot home on River Drive during the summer of 1934. One of my three older brothers, my younger sister and I, attended the school at the old Mound Fort School at 12th and Washington that Fall and Winter.

In 1981, my wife, Velma, and I moved to Vernal, Utah, and renewed our association with Nellie, and had many long visits in her home at 806 23rd Street, ministering to her spiritual needs and encouraging her during many difficult times of illness and injury.

Nellie never failed to affirm her strong belief and faith in God, though she was isolated from other members of her own denomination. She had many good and caring friends and relatives in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Ogden to whom we shall always be grateful, among whom was her very dear friend, Trudy Carr. Nellie often spoke to us of Trudy and the care and concern she had for her. Trudy was with her during her final days in the hospital.

She was a very independent and determined person, caring for her self and her home. Nellie worked in her yard, little garden and flowers. She even shoveled the snow from her sidewalks in the winter.

Nellie is now in the very loving and tender care of her Master in Paradise as we were told in Alma.

He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.
