"And the Lord said unto him (Moses), What is that in thine hand...?" Exodus 4:2. Moses at that time was herding Jethro's sheep when the Lord called him to deliver the Israelites from their Egyptian bondage. Moses doubted his ability to accept such a task, and showing all his human weakness, began to seek an excuse. It was then that God asked him the above verse in a questionlike manner. Steps Toward Zion

I'd like to go to Mosiah, second chapter, starting with verse 9. These children of God did something. It says, "And it came to pass that they did plead with their father many days, that they might go up to the land of Nephi." They did plead many days in their desire for the conversion of the children of the Lamanites to God. How many of us have poured out our souls to God that we might serve God in a greater capacity, that we might go to the teeming millions out there and bring them the light of the gospel? Some of us will go if asked, others go if commanded, but these men pleaded with their father. (Maybe it was hard for their father to accept that his sons wanted to go to such a ruthless bunch of people, those that hated the children of God. They wanted to go into the midst of them, probably be killed.) "And the Lord said unto Mosiah, Let them go up, for many shall believe on their words, and they shall have eternal life; and I will deliver thy sons out of the hands of the Lamanites." And they went. The Book of Commandments tells us that he who has the desire to do the work, God will call. Those who don't have the desire, or are pursuing the things of this world the Lord will not call and he will not send, and they will not be preserved by the mighty hand of God.

I don't know how many beg to go with you, Brother McIndoo, but there should be some. And I think this uncovers something else; that you don't just go on your own, that you go under the direction of the Lord. Even though you have the zeal, the Lord knows how he can use you in his vineyard. So you must get the direction of the Lord.

I'd like to go to Moroni, the 9th chapter, the 6th verse, and while you're turning to that I'll tell you of a discovery that came to me in this last year. We had a new driveway put in for the Church of Christ, there. And we were worried about what was the right kind of sign to put out that would say, 'This is the Kingdom of Heaven'. Did you ever think of that? What do you put there? And do you know what drew me? It was the insignia that we have stamped on all of our literature; of Christ with open arms. So I asked my brother Stephen if he would make that on the sign. So he began to work the wood, a big circle he was going to have at the top of the sign, and then he writes out these words, "Come all ye that labor." When he showed me that, I was struck, Come all ye that labor, what does that mean? This is the calling together of Zion. Come all ye that labor, there's work to be done. The more I think about it the more I think it shows the divine hand of God when they selected that insignia, and I think back to my childhood when I first saw that insignia and I felt the presence of the

either, it says, "And now my beloved son, notwithstanding their hardness, let us labor diligently; for if we should cease to labor, we should be brought under condemnation; for we have a labor to perform whilst in the tabernacle of clay, that we may conquer the enemy of all righteousness; and rest our souls in the kingdom of God." Labor diligently. He had a well beloved son who was saying, these are rough times, these are tough people, and they don't like us. He said, labor diligently for whilst in this tabernacle of clay we have a labor to perform. Do you think you can stand before the lord when he returns in Zion, and say, "Lord, I've done what you asked me to do." There will be no need of it if you've done the work. And certainly you won't be standing there in the presence of the Son of God, if you have not done the labor. We have a labor to perform. Let's be about that business, and make sure our paths are being ordered of the Lord.

It's an interesting thing working with the Cherokee Indians in that there's very little fruit that one can quantify. I've heard things like: well, it's still the time of the gentiles; it's because you have a belief different than mine, Brother Gould; it's because - I don't care why, because the Lord came to me in a vision and said, "Redeem Israel." I said, "Lord, that is too much for any one man." And he said, "Redeem those that I have placed in thy charge." Therefore I have a labor to perform, and the Lord would not have sent me unless I had a work to do. We all have a labor to perform in this tabernacle of clay. It doesn't matter if you're a woman, a child, or a man.

I'l like to talk about Alma after his conversion, and this is found in the 17th chapter, the 22nd verse. He said, "Yea, and from that time, even until now, I have labored without ceasing, that I might bring souls unto repentance; that I might bring them to taste of the exceeding joy of which I did taste; that they might also be born of God, and be filled with the Holy Ghost. Yea, and now behold, O my son, the Lord doth give me exceeding joy in the fruit of my labors; for because of the word which he has imparted unto me, behold many have been born of God, and have tasted as I have tasted, and have seen eye to eye, as I have seen." That's an interesting concept. I've been told many times we're not going to see eye to eye until Christ returns. Here's an example of those who were truly converted by the Lord and they saw eye to eye. If we move to that Zionic condition, don't you think we will see eye to eye better than we do today?

I believe that it's a command of the Lord, just like having all things common. I don't believe that everyone in the Church is going to have everything common before the return of Christ, but there will be

those who do. And there are those who are doing it today. I do not seek to be at variance with any of my brothers for one of us has to be wrong, and it might be both of us. But I seek for the unification of beliefs in the true doctrine of Christ. That doesn't mean that I'm going to bend like cardboard, it means that the Lord God Almighty must touch me and the other fellow. It says, "Therefore they do know of these things of which I have spoken, as I do know, and the knowledge which I have is of God." That's a requirement also, that which you know comes from God, and that's what you must stand upon. You look for that witness and testimony of the Holy Spirit. When a man gets up here and speaks the words of God by the Spirit of God, and it's carried into your heart, you still must receive it, or shun it. It's your responsibility.

In the 12th chapter of Alma, I'd like to read verses 2 through 5. "Now these sons of Mosiah were with Alma at the time the angel first appeared unto him, therefore Alma did rejoice exceedingly, to see his brethren; and what added more to his joy, they were still his brethren in the Lord; yea, and they had waxed strong in the knowledge of the truth;" that truth which comes of God. Many times I've caught myself wanting to do something different; I've seen others do it, you know, they have a belief and you ask them some questions that kind of unsettle them for awhile, and they go through and they confirm their belief by their favorite scriptures. What is the merit of this? You're still in the same old ditch, just to confirm your beliefs. Isaiah said, "Come let us reason together," that's not me and you reasoning together, that's me and you reasoning with the Lord that the truth might come from Almighty God and not from the mind of man, but by the gift and power of the Holy Ghost it be born into your heart that you cannot deny it: that you be truly born of God and taste of that precious fruit that we hear about.

He tells how it came about. And that's the next question, how do we do that; right? It says, "But this is not all: they had given themselves to much prayer, and fasting, therefore they had the spirit of prophecy, and the spirit of revelation, and when they taught, they taught with power and authority. even as with the power and authority of God." Because they had received it of God. Even as saints we must strive for perfection. As ministry we also must strive to that same sound knowledge that these men had, that we might teach with the power and gift of God in our ministrations. I know that you've seen that witness here at reunion. I have felt the presence of God and he is calling people back to Zion. It is the Spirit of the Lord and it's calling his people to that which will bring them unto salvation, that which will cause the gathering to take place; to prepare us spiritually for that which is coming upon this earth.

It is the hand of God.

It speaks here of the spirit of revelation and the spirit of prophecy, and there is a thought in this Church, some places anyway, that I do not like to see. You doubt everything until it's proven beyond a shadow of a doubt to be true. That person will never receive the truth. In the New Testament we read that they received the word with gladness. And then they searched the scripture diligently to see that the words are true and they be not deceived. But there was a glad receiving of the word of God. There are some today who would say, we are going to close the canon of scripture with the 15th chapter of the Book of Commandments, and that's it. That's no different than the world saying that the canon of scripture was closed with the Bible. John the Revelator says that the spirit of prophecy is the testimony of Jesus Christ. You must have it within your midst. Do you think we can have a gathering without the spirit of prophecy and revelation in our midst in a much greater degree than we have today? It's something we should seek and pray after, that we would hear the voice of God in the assemblies of the saints; that we might hear his word; that we would not despise the revelations that come of God. those sacred utterances that come down from heaven.

I'd like to go to Jacob 3:29. I bring this to your attention for one reason, and that is, that when you are speaking under the power and influence of God Almighty, because of the anxiety of your hearts, sometimes you can be led astray. Therefore, it's a warning, it says, "Behold, my beloved brethren, I will unfold this mystery unto you; if I do not, by any means get shaken from my firmness in the Spirit, and stumble because of my over-anxiety for you." He was afraid tht the humanness might get in there and cause him to stumble because of our anxiety. Ther needs to be caution there.

When working in the Cherokee mission field, Peter and I suffered a great deal of rejection, physical abuse, and trial all in a single day. You know, that was hard on me. But this verse, diligently labor because you have a labor to perform, and there was that underlying assurance that drove me on. My brother was pretty well disgruntled too, so we got down and prayed, and not the words but the thought came to my mind, to enter into a 28 day fast and the Lord would show me the end of my labors in that land.

So I entered into that 28 day fast and on the last day of the fast I saw a dream that shows the days that the gathering will occur. We were in this little area penned in, fences up, and I was sitting there in the dust. There wasn't any grass to sit on, and there were children crying and mothers weeping; and they were all huddled together; they were trying to

console their children. I was praying, I didn't feel well. One of the mothers turned to me and said, "You take yourself to be a prophet of the Lord. Wherein is our deliverance?" It struck my heart chords and I prayed unto the Lord, and I saw an open vision there in this dream. I saw the coming of the Lord, and there was a huddled clutch of people in Independence that the Lord was returning to: a glorious day. And I saw, and understood that in a month or two, the Lord would return, maybe a couple of weeks but in a very short time the Lord would be there. Then I saw what was going to happen to us the next day. We were going to be killed, it was our day of death but that I would go to another clutch of the Lord's people. I stood up and looking at the little huddled mass I couldn't bear to bring myself to tell them that they were going to give their life for Christ that day, and I said, 'the Lord hath shone that tomorrow is the glory of the Lord.' And I sat back down and began to weep while they rejoiced. So I told my sons, there; what it was that I worried about, wept about.

But it didn't turn out quite that way. The next day, in the dream. I went forward, and there was this woman with a gun, she hated me more than all the others. She would hit me with it, my body was frail for some reason, and finally she hit me on the head, and I fell down and kind of slid part way under the fence. Then she cursed and spat at me because I was dead. But my spirit hovered above my body and when she left, it went back in and I went on down the mountain. Just as I started down the mountain I heard a ruckus, and my two sons came leaping over the top of the fence, and down throught the woods we went. We were going to console another little branch of Zion, another little clutch of the Lord's people. Sometimes I worry about these things the Lord has shown me, but they give me a strong direction. I had a lady once ask me, she said, "Knowing those things that are going to happen, how do you deal with that?" And I said, "I have the resolve that comes with the Holy Spirit, the directing power of God. For that reason I was created and I pray for the hastening of that day."

It will be a glorious event when the Lord returns, and I look forward to that day to stand before my Savior. I'd like to leave you with one last scripture reading, and that's found in Luke 21:34. It says, "And take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life...." I'd like for you to think about how much the cares and comforts of this life weights heavy upon your heart, that you not be overcome, that you would seek to know what is required of you that you attain perfection in this life, that you come to the fulness of the stature of Jesus Christ. It goes on and says, "For as a snare shall it come on all them

that dwell on the face of the whole earth." If you're not prepared for Zion and the coming of the Lord, it will overtake you as a thief in the night, and so will the things that are coming upon this earth. You must prepare. "Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man." Pray always. That's a command, to pray always that you will be counted worthy to escape the things coming upon this earth, that you might understand why God has placed you here, that you at that last day will be able to stand and know that you have fulfilled that which God has created you for. I thank you for your time.


Saturday, the 18th of April, the young people met at Lake Jacomo and engaged in three merciless games of volleyball. The record would be incomplete were it not noted that the team whose

The girl next door to us just moved in at the first part of April. She's a sad story. At 22 years of age and single, she has a little girl who's 3, a baby boy, 9 months, and she's 3 months pregnant with another child. All have different fathers. She's on welfare, has no car, keeps a dirty house, unclean kids and on top of being pregnant, is slightly over-weight.

The entire month of April I had taken great caution to avoid any opportunity to make her aquaintance. Finally, this past Monday, as I was outside working, she approached me and made her introduction. I found very quickly that my patience wouldn't tolerate either her or the little girl. It was all I could do to smile and be somewhat friendly.

I awake early on this particular Wednesday morning so that I might be able to get my housework done and work outside in our flower bed. As I was busy weeding and digging, she came out of her house and walked over to where I was. In her own rough way, she asked if I could take her and the children into Grand Junction so they could go to the Medical Clinic. I felt myself grow cold and with a bit of a grudge I agreed that I would.

As the time grew close for us to leave, I sat Bob and Charlie down on the couch and told them that we needed to show this lady and her children how to be good people. I explained that we needed to set a good example for them. I went on to say that mommy was having a hard time because I didn't really like the lady and I wasn't looking forward to this trip into town. I also explained that we needed to ask God to be with us and help us to be good and to help the lady understand that our life was very different from hers and we were indeed happy in our way of life. So the three of us got down on our knees and prayed to God for his guidance.

Our blessing was great.... We spent an hour and a half in the clinic in which time I read stories to the children and they played with little cars that I had brought with us. The time went fast and everyone got along and behaved wonderfully.

On our way home she said that she wanted to find a table because they didn't have any furniture. I stopped at various places that I knew of (junk dealers, I call them) but their prices were out of this girl's range. We drove on towards home and were nearly there when we passed by a house with an old table sitting out behind a shed. I turned around and drove into the drive where I got out and went to the door. A middle-aged lady answered my knock and she couldn't have been kinder. I told her of this young lady's financial need and the need for a table. I then asked about the one sitting in her back yard. A big smile came across the woman's face and with deep sincerity she told me to take the table, that I was most welcome to have it and she'd be glad to get rid of it! I was over-joyed!

That old table turned out to be of solid wood and very stable. Once it was cleaned up it would make a very beautiful piece of furniture. Into the van it went and on towards home.

As we were unloading the table into this girl's apartment, one of the other tenants from our building came over. She had 3 solid wood chairs that she was willing to sell for a total of five dollars. Somehow, my neighbor managed to dig up the five dollars with which to pay for her new chairs. You never saw a happier person in all your life.

We went to our own apartment where we ate our supper and dressed for our usual Wednesday night church service. I deeply thanked God for being with us that afternoon and for giving me the patience I needed to not only deal with my own children but with this young woman and her young ones as well. Not once during the afternoon did a foul word come from her mouth. Not once did she yell at her children (which she does often as I can hear through open windows). Her attitude was one of amusement and curiosity as she watched us with our gentle spirits and kind words. She didn't say thank you for the afternoon and the events that took place but she didn't need to. The gratitude showed on her face and through her actions. Our thanks came from God. The best thank you of all. Indeed, what a blessing we received!

Judge Or Judge Not?

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged; and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again" (3 Nephi 6:13-14)(Matthew 7:1-2).

We often hear people make the statement that we should not judge and of course it is based on this scripture. But like all other scripture the full truth is found by searching out the other lines of scripture. There are many kinds of judgment. We know that God will judge the world in the end. We are also told that the Twelve Apostles of the Lamb will judge the twelve tribes of Israel. This judgment may be a continuing work on their part over the tribes throughout eternity as they act as priests and kings unto God. Then we are told that the queen of the south shall rise up in the judgment with this generation and shall condemn it. By her righteousness in hearing the wisdom of Solomon she will condemn that generation who refused to hear the words of one who was greater than Solomon.

There is a kind of judgment which we are forbidden to execute. At such times we are to turn the other cheek, because vengeance belongs to God and God will repay. It is not in our place to administer repayment for personal wrongs. Then there is a time when judgment must be meted out. When the civil laws or the laws of the land have been broken, it is the right of kings and rulers to bring such to justice and to administer the law upon them, not as a personal vendetta, but in the interest of the welfare of the people as a whole. The same is true of the overseers of the church as we read in Mosiah 11:114-146 in which Alma inquired of the Lord how to judge the transgressor. Such that will repent will be numbered with the church, otherwise they will be rejected.

There are times when we are permitted to judge, but in so doing, we must exercise care that it is a righteous judgment. "... see that ye are merciful unto your brethren; deal justly, judge righteously, and do good continually; and if ye do all these things, then shall ye receive your reward; Yea, ye shall have mercy restored unto you again; ye shall have justice restored unto you again; ye shall have a righteous judgment restored unto you again; And ye shall have good rewarded unto you again, ... and be restored" (Alma 19:78-80). John tells us to "Judge not according to the appearance" (John 7:24).

From this we see that our own judgment in the end will be patterned after how we judged our brother in

this life. For this judgment to be just, we should not judge from appearances only. Yet at the same time it is by their fruits that we shall know them, so then that which is in the heart is reflected in the acts of a man. That is why it is dangerous to judge too quickly. "For behold, the same that judgeth rashly, shall be judged rashly again; for according to his works shall his wages be; therefore, he that smiteth, shall be smitted again of the Lord. Behold what the scripture says: Man shall not smite, neither shall he judge; for judgment is mine, saith the Lord; and vengeance is mine also, and I will repay" (Mormon 4:24-25).

Because of the proneness of man to make rash judgments it is better not to judge at all. And certainly it is not ours to bring personal retaliation against that individual. Only in the mouth of two or three witnesses shall a thing be established and judgment pronounced, whether by the laws of the land or by the law of God within the body of Christ. This too should be done in righteousness, not in a personal grievance to be carried out against a brother by way of revenge which is certainly a mark of an unforgiving spirit. That kind of judgment is forbidden to us.

As to outward appearances we have this word in Romans: "Let not him that eateth despise him that eateth not; and let not him which eateth not judge him that eateth: for God hath received him ... He that regardeth the day, regardeth it unto the Lord; and he that regardeth not the day, to the Lord he doth not regard it. He that eateth, eateth to the Lord, for he giveth God thanks; and he that eateth not, to the Lord he eateth not, and giveth God thanks But why dost thou judge thy brother: or why dost thou set at nought thy brother? for we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ Let us not therefore judge one another any more: but judge this rather, that no man put a stumbling block or an occasion to fall in his brother's way" (Romans 14:3,6,10,13).

This says it better than I can and needs no explanation. We need not stand in condemnation of our brother because he is different than we are in the mundane affairs of life. Rather we should, "Learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow" (Isaiah 1:17).

But if a matter of a more serious nature does arise we have this word of instruction: "Dare any of you, having a matter against another, go to law before the unjust, and not before the saints? Do ye not know that the saints shall judge the world? and if the world shall be judged by you, are ye unworthy to judge the smallest matters? Know ye not that we shall judge angels? how much more things that pertain to this life?" (1 Corinthians 6:1-3).

What is our motive in bringing complaint against a brother? Is it out of a desire to get satisfaction from our brother, an eye for an eye attitude, or is it out oof a sincere concern for the soul's welfare of that brother or, failing that, for the welfare of the body of Christ as a whole?

"Wherefore take heed, my beloved brethren, that ye do not judge that which is evil to be of God, or that which is good and of God, to be of the devil. For behold, my brethren, it is given unto you to judge,

that ye may know good from evil; and the way to judge is as plain, that ye may know with a perfect knowledge, as the daylight is from the dark night. For behold, the Spirit of Christ is given to every man, that they may know good from evil; wherefore I shew unto you the way to judge: for everything which inviteth to do good, and to persuade to believe in Christ, is sent forth by the power and gift of Christ;....And now, my brethren, seeing that ye know the light by which ye may judge, which light is the light of Christ, see that ye do not judge wrongfully; for with that same judgment which ye judge, ye shall also be judged" (Moroni 7:12-14, 17).

Big Words For Little People

Children's Sunday School Lesson from the Warrensburg Local

We have been learning four very important words. They are: compassion, politeness, kindness and patience.

Compassion means to care about, to share the suffering of another, or to sympathize. It is a way of being and a way of doing to show that you care. Compassion is being extra kind to your friend when he is sad about someting. Compassion is not calling names even though everyone else is. It is also being a friend when someone needs one.

We read in the Book of Mormon, III Nephi 8:5-9, that Christ showed compassion unto the multitude. Other examples are found in Matthew 20:34 and Mark 1:40-42. Luke 10:25-37 tells the story of the good samaritan and how we should love our neighbor as ourself; and from I John 4:21, that he who loveth God loves his brother also. We conclude our study on compassion by reading Matthew 22:36-40.

Our second word is *politeness*, which means having correct manners, and to be courteous and considerate in noticing the needs and feelings of others. Politeness can be shown by saying thank you, please, you're welcome and excuse me. By giving your seat to someone, or carrying packages for someone also shows politeness.

We must remember to be helpful when we can, as it says in Proverbs 3:27 and in I Thessalonians 5:15. Let brotherly love continue, as it says in Hebrews 13:1,2. We read together the first great commandment, also the second, found in Matthew 22:36-40.

Our third very important word is *kindness*, meaning to show concern, to be understanding, to sympathize and to care. It is the act of love and good will. Kindness can be shown in things we say or do not say. It can be shown in things we do or do not do every day. Kindness is taking time to help someone in trouble, even though you are in a big, big hurry. Kindness is visiting a lonely grandmother or grandfather who lives next door. Kindness is not staring at someone who is different, but giving that person a smile instead.

It tells us in Psalms 117:2 and III Nephi 10:16 that the Lord will have mercy with everlasting kindness. We should show kindness, tenderheartedness and forgiveness to one another, even as God, for Christ's sake, did for us (Ephesians 4:32), and to love one another as God so loved us (I John 4:11). Qualities to strive to attain within ourselves are found in Galatians 5:22, 23, the fruit of the Spirit. Again, together we read Matthew 22:36-40 in closing.

Today we will talk about patience. Patience is a quiet thing — something that can grow every day in little ways. If we have patience we are capable of bearing delay and waiting calmly for the right moment, like waiting for a baby kitten to grow big enough for you to take it home. Patience is waiting quietly to tell Mother something until she is finished talking to someone on the telephone. Patience is waiting quietly to tell Mother something until she is finished talking to someone on the telephone. Patience is not giving up, but trying again and again when learning something new until something hard

becomes easy to do.

Galatians 6:5 tells us of having patience, so does Luke 6:35. Hebrews 10:36 shows us that we have need of patience, and in James 1:2, 3 we find that when our faith is tried, through temptations, we develop patience. In the Book of Mormon we are advised by Alma to have patience, to be humble, to be gentle and to keep the commandments of God at all times (Alma 5:39). Also please read Alma 7:40: "And not many days hence, the Son of God shall come in his glory; and his glory shall be the glory of the Only Begotten of the Father, full of grace, equity and truth, full of patience, mercy and long suffering, quick to hear the cries of his people, and to answer their prayers."

Let us read together Matthew 22:36-40, and remember that we should love our Lord with all our heart, and our neighbor as ourself.

If we try to show compassion, politeness, kindness and patience, we are being the kind of person God wants us to be.

In our class, we studied one word each week, making four lessons. You might like to use two words in one lesson, or all four words in the same lesson. It might depend on how much time is allowed for class, and also on how many children are in the class, and how much each contributes in relating his understanding of the word and his examples of the word in his daily life.
