OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS

"Except your righteousness exceed that of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the Kingdom of Heaven." Matthew 5:20. WHY SO MUCH SUFFERING

Sermon By Priest Aaron Heath April 24, 1988

If GOD is good, if He is love, why is there so much suffering in the world? This is an old question, as old as pain, sickness, accident, and loss. People have been asking it for thousands of years and will go on asking it till the end of time.

Probably no completely satisfying answer will be available until God makes all things plain in His kingdom, but the Bible offers several helpful suggestions.

You will find the first reference to suffering in

Gen. 3:16, where God reveals to Eve the consequences of her disobedience: "I will greatly multiply thy sorrow and thy conception; in sorrow shalt thou bring forth children." From this it might be deduced, and rightly so, that all suffering springs from that initial act of wrongdoing. Yet, that is not the whole story. Just as there are many types of suffering, so are there many reasons for it.

Some suffering is a result of ignoring basic law. This is true both in the spiritual and physical realms, for through all creation runs the law of cause and effect: "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Gal. 6:7). If you break the laws of the land, you expect—if caught—to suffer punishment. If you break the laws of health, you know you will get sick. If you break the moral law, the consequences are just as certain. "For he that soweth to his flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting" (verse 8).

Some suffering is the result of accident or natural disaster. Three times Jesus asserted that trouble often comes upon innocent people. When He was told about some Galileans whom Pilate had unjustly killed, He said, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans, because they suffered thus? I tell you, No; but unless you repent you will all likewise perish" (Luke 13:2,3, Revised Standard Version).

Then He mentioned eighteen persons upon whom a tower in Siloam fell, killing them all. "Do you think that they were sinners above all men that dwelt in Jerusalem?" He asked. "I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish (verses 4,5).

(John 9:2,3) On another occasion, as He passed a blind man along the way, His disciples asked, "Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents."

In each case Jesus strongly repudiated the thought that the calamity happened as a result of the individual's sin. Usually when earthquakes, tidal waves, explosions, airplane accidents, and the like occur the majority of sufferers have no responsibility whatever for the disaster.

Some suffering results from power in the hands of evil men. Says the prophet Habakkuk: (ch. 1:13) "Thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and canst not look on iniquity: wherefore lookest thou upon them that deal treacherously, and holdest thy tongue when the wicked devoureth the man that is more righteous than he?"

One of the facts of life most difficult to understand is "the prosperity of the wicked" (Psalm 73:3). "They are not in trouble as other men," says David; "neither are they plagued like other men....Their eyes stand out with fatness; they have more than heart could wish. They are corrupt, and speak wickedly concerning oppression; they speak loftily....Behold, these are the ungodly, who prosper in the world" (verses 5-12).

This is a perfect picture of the dictators and racketeers who elbow their way to power in politics and other phases of organized society regardless of the consequences to others.

Some suffering is a result of God's remedial

judgments. Just as a parent punishes his child to keep him in the right way, so God sometimes permits hardship and sorrow to come to His children in order to turn them from an evil course. "He doth not afflict willingly nor grieve the children of men" (Lamentations 3:33), but sometimes some correction becomes necessary. Should this ever happen to you, "Know then in your heart that, as a man disciplines his son, so the Lord your God disciplines you" (Deut. 8:5 R.S.V.).

There is always a good reason for God's judgments. Comparing the correction of parents with that of the Lord, the writer to the Hebrews says in ch. 12:10: "For they verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but he for our profit, that we might be partakers of his holiness".

In our Bibles we will find several examples of sinners brought back to God through affliction.

When Jonah refused God's call to go to Nineveh and fled on a ship bound for Tarshish, he was thrown overboard and swallowed by a great fish. "Then Jonah prayed unto the Lord his God out of the fish's belly, and said, I cried by reason of mine affliction, unto the Lord, and he heard me" (Jonah 2:1,2).

In 2 Chron. 33:12,13: King Manasseh was carried captive to Babylon because of his fearful wickedness. But "when he was in affliction, he besought the Lord his God, and humbled himself greatly before the God of his fathers, and prayed unto him: and he was intreated of him, and heard his supplication, and brought him again to Jerusalem into his kingdom. Then Manasseh knew that the Lord he was God".

Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, defied God and lost his reason for seven years.

Later he testified: "At the end of the days I Nebuchadnezzar lifted up mine eyes unto heaven, and mine understanding returned unto me, and I blessed the most High, and I praised and honored him that liveth for ever, whose dominion is an everlasting dominion, and his kingdom is from generation to generation" (Dan. 4:34).

Several times in the Old Testament God is portrayed as a refiner sitting by a furnace skimming off the impurities of His people. As in Malachi 3:3; and Job 23:10. Through Isaiah He says, "Behold, I have refined thee, but not with silver; I have chosen thee in the furnace of affliction". That was Isaiah 48:10. Later in verses 17, and 18, He adds: "I am the Lord thy God which teacheth thee to profit, which leadeth thee by the way that thou shouldest go. O that thou hadst hearkened to my commandments! Then had thy peace been as a river, and thy righteousness as the waves of the sea."

Most of Israel's troubles could have been averted

by obedience and right living, but when, through disobedience, affliction became necessary it was sent for their prophet to lead them in the way that they should go.

Some suffering is the result of dedication to Jesus Christ.

From Jesus Himself we have this warning: "If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you" as read in John 15:20. This certainly came true in the life of the apostle Paul who, time after time, was imprisoned and beaten because of his fearless witness for his Lord.

Out of this full experience of suffering he assured Timothy: 2 Tim. 3:12—"All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." When he returned to Lystra, where he was once stoned, he told the members, "We must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God" and that is written in Acts 14:22.

So there are several causes of suffering, and sometimes it is difficult to classify correctly one's personal troubles. However, if you see to it that, whatever their cause, they drive you toward God rather than away from Him, the ultimate result is bound to be beneficial.

If you think that your affliction is the result of disobedience to some basic law, ask God to help you remedy the defect.

If you know it comes from an accident for which you are in no way responsible, pray for patience to bear it, wisdom to understand it, and love to forgive those who caused it. In Job 1:21; and James 1:3; and 5:11 we can read about these things, that I have just mentioned.

In Romans 12:12, we will read if what you endure is the result of evil men, pray that God may turn them from their wicked ways; "rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer". Now in Heb. 12:11; or in 1 Peter 5:10, If you believe your troubles are a divine discipline, search your heart for the reason why God is displeased with you. Then plead for forgiveness and pledge Him your eternal devotion.

If you are enduring persecution for Christ's sake, "Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: For great is your reward in heaven" as it tells us in Mat. 5:12. Remember, in 2 Tim. 2:12, "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him".

Without doubt all of us need more of the glorious fortitude Paul revealed when he said, "None of these things move me". That's from Acts 20:24.

"Therefore," he told the Corinthians (this is taken from 2 Cor. 12:10), "I take pleasure in infirmities,....in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong".

For him and for all who endure to the end, a glorious reward is awaiting. In James 1:12 we read: "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him".

Please read the following passages from the Book of Mormon: I Nephi 5:236-238, Alma 5:36-40, Alma 7:39-40 and Alma 16:171-173.

If God's only begotten son, had to go through all that suffering and pain for us, why shouldn't we as God's children also have to endure these same hardships? Are we worthy servants? Are we willing to sacrifice and suffer for our blessed redeemer? Let us lift up our heads and be counted. The Lord can only help us, if we let him. There also must be effort on our part. One of my favorite verses is Prov. 16:3. It reads: "commit thy works unto the Lord, and thy thoughts shall be established." Let our thoughts always be on what's good and proper and what is pleasing to God.

HE THAT DOETH TRUTH

PART ONE

A scripture that is quoted by most all Christians is found in John 3:16,17. The beauty and truth in those words never grow old; they are ever a source of inspiration to all who will trust in God. Let's look at those words again that we might be renewed in the



divine truth which they contain.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.

For God sent not his Son into the world to con-

demn the world; but that the world through him might be saved."

God's merciful love for the world caused Him to send His only begotten Son into the world for the special purpose of saving it. This was done, not because the world deserved it or that God was obligated to do so, but rather it was a gift from God to all who would respond favorably by believing on the Son of God.

Jesus Christ was not sent to condemn the world, although he, being perfect without sin, brought a distinct contrast to sinful man. This contrast would cause a reaction by all who would come in contact with him either in the belief and acceptance of Jesus Christ, or in the disbelief and rejection of him.

Jesus plainly tells us of the importance of believing on the only begotten son of God in the 18th verse:

"He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten son of God."

Jesus makes it plain that our personal response of accepting or rejecting the great gift of God will bring either God's favor or condemnation upon us. Although this may be referring to the initial reaction of all those who have made contact with the gospel of Christ in this life, this nonetheless contains an all inclusive truth that we each should consider. Let's read the remainder of his statement:

"And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil.

"For every one that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should be reproved.

"But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God." (verses 19-21)

The natural reaction of those who do evil (sin) will be to hate the light (truth) because it exposes their sinfulness. Those who obey the truth will be drawn to the light because it is compatible with their desires of good.

The big test for the natural man is to get past that first reaction without being offended and to be able to embrace the love of God by comprehending His mercy and grace. It is humbling to the ego of man to realize that he is not alright as he is—that he is a sinner and must repent of his sins and strive to overcome his desire to win.

There are two important parts of man's experience with the plan of salvation: he must be able to understand it and he must be able to obey it. Essentially, he must do both simultaneously. He must believe the truth and apply it to this life at the same time. Otherwise if he stops short of applying it to his life after having an initial understanding of it, he returns to darkness and comes under condemnation.

This fact is applicable to all of us at any point in our lives after we have once heard the gospel. When we cease to grow in faith by applying the truths of the gospel to our lives, we let the darkness of disbelief or rebellion overtake us and we are unable to discern the truth. If we are not aroused and awakened to the danger of our state of being, we can soon come under great condemnation. Therefore we must keep ever new in our hearts and minds the message of God's love for us—the gift of His only begotten Son.

When Jesus preached the gospel of truth to the Jews, it brought favorable and unfavorable responses according to the belief or disbelief of the hearers. On one occasion, when Jesus healed a blind man, it caused a great stir among the Jews. Jesus made a profound statement that brought a reaction by the Pharisees:

"And Jesus said, For judgment I am come into this world, that they which see not might see; and that they which see might be made blind.

"And some of the Pharisees which were with him heard these words, and said unto him, Are we blind also?

"Jesus said unto them, If ye were blind, ye should have no sin: but now ye say, We see; therefore your sin remaineth." (John 9:39-41)

Jesus brought judgment into the world by bringing the light to those who were ignorant of the truth that they might understand and respond accordingly. Those who already had a degree of the light, such as the Pharisees, rejected the greater truth that Jesus brought and were made blind. They were accountable for the truth apparently, but refused to obey it, for Jesus said, "...your sin remaineth."

In the sermon on the mount, Jesus describes the effect our attitude toward good and evil has upon our comprehension of the truth:

"The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light.

"But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness!" (Mat. 6:22,23)

If we are receptive to the truth and make the favorable response, its light will increase to give us a full understanding. On the other hand, if we respond negatively, we have some comprehension of the truth, but it becomes darkness to us. As Jesus said, "....how great is that darkness!"

James said, "...to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." (James 4:17) The word "do" is small yet very essential in the gospel of Christ. In an earlier quote (John 3:21), Jesus said, "But he that doeth truth cometh to the light..." How simple, yet how beautifully descriptive that statement is! The willingness to do the truth (obey the gospel) is fundamentally essential to come to the light (the fullness of the gospel). If we obey the truth we will not be ashamed of our deeds for "...they are wrought in God."

On another occasion Jesus answered the Jews in this language:

"My doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me.

"If any man will do his will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God, or whether I speak of myself.

"He that speaketh of himself seeketh his own glory: but he that seeketh his glory that sent him, the same is true, and no unrighteousness is in him." (John 7:16-18)

The means by which a person is to know if the doctrine is of God is to do the will of God. In other words, he must put the doctrine to test in his own life. Again that little word "do" plays an essential part in gaining knowledge.

Later Jesus made this statement: "I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." (John 8:12)

Jesus offers us the "light of life" upon the condition that we shall follow him. The alternative if we do not follow him is that we will walk in darkness.

One of the first things that Jesus told the Nephites when he came to them after his resurrection was, "I am the light and the life of the world." (3 Nephi 4:48) Later he told them, "Behold I am the light; I have set an example for you." (3 Nephi 8:49)

The light that Jesus has shed upon mankind is his living the truth by example. He has not only given us the truth by the spoken word but he has demonstrated it by his deeds. The Nephites became witnesses to the light and Jesus reminded them to give that witness thus: "Behold I am the light which ye shall hold up—that which ye have seen me do." (3 Nephi 8:55)

Jesus did not stop at calling his people to be witnesses in word only. He told them to be the light: "Verily, verily I say unto you, I give unto you to be the light of this people. A city that is set on a hill can not be hid." (3 Nephi 5:61)

Very emphatically, Jesus instructed his disciples to do the works that they had seen him do:

"Verily, verily I say unto you, This is my gospel; and ye know the things that ye must do in my church; for the works which ye have seen me do, that shall ye also do; for that which ye have seen me do, even that shall ye do; therefore if ye do these things, blessed are ye, for ye shall be lifted up at the last day." (3 Nephi 12:34,35)

Jesus Christ was given as a sacrifice for the benefit of the children of men that all those who would believe in him might be saved from the condemnation of sin. For mankind to be able to be totally free from sin, however, they must be shown a perfect way of life to follow as an example. Jesus has done this, not just as an example, but through the absolute obedience to the will of the Father, he lived a perfect life because he loved the Father. This is the light that is in him which makes him the light and the life. He has called us to follow his example that we might possess that light also.

And lend no encouragement by your countenance, or a rejoinder in kind. Your silence or withdrawal can speak volumes; but if wisdom directs that a rebuke is in order, let it be with firmness and meekness, in the fear of the Lord, rather than in harsh condemnation.

Though there be, all around, those of close association, and of pretended friends (or indeed of proven friends) who, in weakness will defile the temple of God, which is their body, by use of alcohol, drugs or tobacco - go not after their way, but —

Dare to do right,

For theirs is the way of physical death and possibly that of the spirit. If sexual desire, which is implanted in the human family by divine purpose to prepare a godly seed, is permitted an unrestrained course resulting in fornication or adultery, those who thus disobey the commandment of God and continue therein cannot inherit the kingdom of God —

Dare to do right and dare to be true!

In a world where one devours another before he himself is devoured, and takes advantage of the other in his weakness, let us rather lift him than to crush him —

Dare to do right,

For he that exalteth himself shall be abased, and he that abaseth himself shall be exalted.

We are schooled with the view of advancing ourself economically, socially or politically, according to individual desire; and the world will adulate and claim her own; yet how quickly, when we fail, does she forget, and perhaps to turn and rend. THOU SHALT NOT ADD NOR TAKE AWAY

If we have decided that we shall close our minds and our hearts to God then we are obligated to determine when we shall do this. We must determine just when our "end" shall be. When we shall become dead to God. Let's go to Prov. 30:6, "Add thou not unto his words, lest he reprove thee, and thou be found a liar." Was Joseph Smith a liar? If so, then the Book of Mormon must also be a lie. I think the real admonition here is that man is not to change the meaning of His words, don't you? Let's take a look at Deut. 4:2, "Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish aught from it, that ye may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you." Are you willing to draw your line here? What say ye? How about Deut. 5:22? "These words (10 commandments - AB) the Lord spake unto all your assembly in the mount out of the mist of the fire, of the cloud, and of the thick darkness, with a great voice; and he added no more." Are we yet found to be bound by the Law of Moses? Of course not! Christ came to fulfill the Law of Moses. He gave (added) unto us a new and better law. A law of Grace, a law of Mercy, the Gospel Law. The same which the ancient Israel lost because of transgression. The same which the Jews have denied even exists. Please turn to Deut. 5:24 and read the last eight words, "...God doth talk with man, and he liveth." If God does NOT talk with man then man is dead! But we rejoice that God does talk with us (if we'll listen). No, we must not draw that line that separates us from the love of God. We must not close that door that He has opened unto us, even Jesus Christ, in whom is the Spirit of Prophecy. Once more turn to Deut. 12:32 and read "What thing soever I command you, observe to do it; thou shalt not add thereto, nor diminish from it." He's telling us to obey His commandments and not to change them to suit our own purposes.

Do you realize that God has said that He will do things which are not written in His Scriptures? Deut. 28:58-61, "If thou wilt not observe to do all the words of this law that are written in this book that thou mayest fear this glorious and fearful name, THE LORD THY GOD; Then the Lord will make thy plagues wonderful, and the plagues of thy seed, even great plagues, and of long continuance, and sore sicknesses, and of long continuance. Moreover he will bring upon thee all the diseases of Egypt, which thou wast afraid of; and they shall cleave unto thee. Also every sickness, and every plague, which is not written in the book of this law, them will I the Lord bring upon thee, until thou be destroyed." (emphasis mine - AB). Of course He speaks here of the law of this book and glad we are for that! But wait! Did not John say the same thing in the Book of Revelation when he wrote "... the prophecy of this book ' Are you beginning to understand? Do you now see how a small amount of acceptance for additional knowledge does cause your heart to leap with joy? Oh, remove that stumbling block which blinds you and binds you. Do not be as the ancient Israelites referred to in Psalms 78:41, "Yea they turned back and tempted God, and limited the Holy One of Israel."

It would be well for us to observe at this time that no where do we find evidence that God shall not add nor take away, only that man shall not add nor take away, unless commanded to do so (see 3 Nephi 10:33-41 and 2 Nephi 12:65 for examples of this). You may be saying in your heart, "But God is an unchangeable God," and right you are! It is because He is an unchangeable God that He continues to reveal to those who do not shut Him out things which confound the learned and the wise. (See 1 Nephi 3:26-32 and Alma 16:144-146). Not to change what has been given, but only to give the more. Read now if you will Eccl. 3:14 & 15; Matt. 13:12; 2 Nephi 12:38; and Gal. 3:15. Can you now see by reading these passages that it is man who should not add nor take away but that God can and will if He desires. And all this without contradiction.

Do you sit at the Master's table and pick and choose what may be tasteful to you? Perhaps, like a little child, you have not sought to clean your plate. You then lack the proper nourishment. You will not develop to your full potential. Surely it is true, you more than any, can not afford to deny the mercies of Christ no longer, lest ye die and Satan gain the victory.

Once we realize that, indeed, the Lord can and does add and take away then we discover a great evidence to verify the Apostasy (taking away) and the Restoration (giving back or adding to).

Let us place this thought train on another track. Please turn to and read Job 1:21, "...Naked came I out of my mother's womb, and naked shall I return thither; the Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." Blessed be the name of the Lord if you have understood! Without the Lord adding to or taking away you would have no Hope, you would have no Joy, you would not be reading this because you would not exist! I praise God continually that He takes away my sins, for they are many, and that He gives so freely that which does not canker or spoil.

Perhaps, now, your mind doth begin to expand. Please, by all that is ordained of God, do not allow Satan to deceive you with his half truths. Do not harken unto his spirit. You have been commanded, but have you heard? Are you listening to God? Will you obey? You have your agency. Hear, therefore, the words of the Psalmist: "Be still and know that I am God" 46:10.

Consider Eccl. 12:12-14, "And further, by these, my son, be admonished; of making many books there is no end; and much study is a weariness of the flesh. Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter; Fear God, and keep his commandments; for this is the whole duty of man." Also John 21:25: "And there are also many other things which Jesus did, the which, if they should be written every one, I suppose even the world itself could not contain the books that should be written. Amen!" Will you still claim that God has stopped speaking or causing that more should be written? Do my words burn as the hot ember? Perhaps it is the truth of God that does distress you? "Yea, wo be unto him that saith, we have received, and we need no more. And in fine, wo unto all those who tremble, and are angry because of the truth of God. For behold, he that is built upon a rock (Christ -AB)), receiveth it (truth - AB) with gladness: and he that is built upon a sandy foundation, trembleth, lest he shall fall. Wo be unto him that shall say, We have received the word of God, and we need no more of the word of God, for we have enough. For behold, thus saith the Lord God: I will give unto the children of men line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little: And blessed are those who harken unto my precepts, and lend an ear unto my council, for they shall learn wisdom; For unto him that receiveth, I will give more: and from them that shall say, we have enough, shall be taken away even that which they have" 2 Nephi 12:32-38.

I know there are some who will say, "We have received and we need no more." 2 Nephi 12:45, "And because my words shall hiss forth, many of the Gentiles shall say, A bible, a bible, we have got a bible, and there can not be any more bible." I would expect that response from those who no longer listen to God and therefore deny that He speaks, and follow after the precepts of men. I am saddened greatly to report that we, too, as a people, have given way to that same spirit which deceives the world. We profess a belief in the risen Christ, but many deny the mercies thereof.

Therefore, I am compelled to write, not adding to nor taking away from the word of God. The same spirit that causes the world to reject the Book of Mormon causes us to reject that which we've received, bit by bit, until all that is left is one verse. It's the shortest verse in the Bible:

"Jesus wept"

Please contemplate upon that.

LAY UP TREASURES IN HEAVEN

"Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, — where thieves break through and steal: But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, — where thieves do NOT break through nor steal: For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. Repent therefore, and enter ye in at the strait gate: — Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and FEW there be that find it. Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that DOETH the will of the Father which is in heaven. Therefore whosoever heareth (or readeth) these sayings of mine, and DOETH them, I will liken him unto a wise man, —: And everyone that heareth these sayings of mine, and doeth them NOT, shall be likened unto a foolish man, —.'' Matt. 6:19-21, 7:13-14, 21, 24, 26. (Paraphrased and emphasized throughout by G.B.)

Coming to church on Sunday is one way to help us lay up treasures in heaven. It is not just a social event; not just a place to go; not just an event or outing to give us something to do. Coming to church on Sunday is more like going out to a fine restaurant; a specialty restaurant; a restaurant that serves only a certain specific kind of food; a restaurant that serves SOUL FOOD!

What I mean by this, is that "THE CHURCH" is meant to FEED the soul; to FILL the soul; to satisfy the spiritual hunger; the longing, the righteous desires, the emptiness of spirit. The meal is meant to help us renew our FAITH. I say <u>RE</u>-new, because we all had faith at one time. When we submitted to baptism, we had this faith! We must continually <u>RE-</u> NEW that faith! We must nourish, and exercise, and sustain, and cause our faith to grow! We don't need to count calories in OUR restaurant, the Church of Christ!

THE BIBLE AND THE T.V. GUIDE

The Holy Bible and the T.V. Guide. One is well worn but cherished with pride, (Not the Bible, but the T.V. Guide). One is used daily to help folk decide, No! It isn't the Bible, it's the T.V. Guide. As pages are turned, what shall we see? Oh, what does it matter, turn on the T.V. So they open the book in which they confide (No, not the Bible, it's the T.V. Guide). The Word of God is seldom read Maybe a verse e're they fall into bed. Exhausted and sleepy and tired as can be, Not from reading the Bible... from watching T.V. BOOK OF MORMON NOTICE

Because of the passing of James Hedrick, who had undertaken the responsibility of preparing the Book of Mormon for publication, this project was virtually at a standstill for nearly a year. However, due to the continued interest of Alma and Daniel Hedrick, there is a renewed effort being made. The services of these men were and are without cost to the Church, and we are deeply indebted to them for their kindness and dedication. We understand that at least one other, a fellow-employee with Brother James Hedrick, is also offering valuable assistance.

With previous publication of the original notice in the course of a couple of years, many donations are on hand, held in reserve for the time of publication, which we anticipate may be in the fall or early winter months. That notice offered the Book of Mormon with a cheaper binding for a donation of \$10, and the book with a better binding for a donation of \$25. We may offer a limited number of these with better binding also with thumb-indexing; this would cost a few dollars more. These are only initiatory prices, which may be changed after actual publication costs have been determined; but these pre-publication prices are good for any who will donate until those prices have been fixed. Considerable effort has been made to prepare this book even more nearly in accord with original manuscripts than the present 1908 authorized edition of the RLDS Church. The preface goes into historical detail not previously given, and answers some notable criticisms against the book. Reference text material has been revised and expanded, and study helps have been included at the back.

This project being a conference action, we would like to emphasize the importance of supporting this worthy cause to its completion. It is hoped that you will generously donate even above your anticipated order of new books, and if feasible, you will raise funds at the Local church level for the publishing of our own Book of Mormon. We pray that this precious record may always be available to us and our posterity.
