

HE THAT DOETH TRUTH

PART TWO

We have found that a necessary part of being saved is our responding favorably to the gift of salvation as provided by Jesus Christ in sacrificing his life as an atonement for our sins. This favorable response requires a following of the example that Jesus has set for us as a way of life. More than just a casual effort is necessary on our part to follow Christ; we must develop a sincere desire to do the will of God.

When the people asked Jesus, "What shall we do, that we might work the works of God? Jesus answered and said unto them, This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent." (John 6:28,29)

Some might oversimplify that statement by saying that all you have to do is believe. But as we have already found in the scriptures, believing in Jesus Christ necessitates doing what he has commanded and demonstrated for us to do. Truly, believing in Christ is a work if we are to fully benefit from our belief in him. James confirms this fact when he wrote: "Faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone." (James 2:17)

The step from simple belief to understanding the gospel of Christ requires a continuous faith and willingness to learn. King Benjamin gave a proclamation to his people. His first words were: "My brethren, all ye that have assembled yourselves together, you that can hear my words which I shall speak unto you this day: for I have not commanded you to come up hither to trifle with the words which I shall speak, but that you should hearken unto me, and open your ears that ye may hear, and your hearts that ye may understand, and your minds that the mysteries of God may be unfolded to your view." (Mosiah 1:38,39)

King Benjamin made it plain that he did not want his people to treat lightly the things that he was to speak. Not only were they to open their ears to hear, but they were also to open their hearts and their minds. Their hearts had to be turned toward the good things that the king was to speak. The people had to be willing to receive his words before they could understand them. Likewise their minds had to be receptive before the mysteries of God could be unfolded to them.

Throughout the scriptures there are statements made concerning the heart. Like the physical heart, the spiritual heart is the most vital part of the being. It is the center of one's livelihood and gives strength to the total body. The heart is the seat of desire and therefore controls the entire spiritual being. If the heart's desires are directed toward things that are good, good works will be the results. If the heart's desires are evil, however, the results will be evil works.

By nature the heart is inclined to be evil, but we can control our heart's desires by our awareness of good and evil, and the realization of the consequences of doing evil as compared to the promises of reward in doing good. To control our hearts as we face the various types of temptations and oppositions in our lives, we are required to exercise selfdiscipline in the light of truth which gives us an incentive to do good.

The prophet, Abinadi, while speaking to King Noah and his priests, dared to make this statement: "Ye have not applied your hearts to understanding; therefore, ye have not been wise." (Mosiah 7:83)

Applying one's heart to understanding indicates far more than a few passing thoughts, especially in the consideration of the commandments of God. To say the least, a concentrated effort is needed. However the rewarding fact is that as our understanding increases our desires of good also usually increases.

Alma, being converted by Abinadi's words, formed a church and led a sizeable number of people back to Zarahemla where he in turn converted many of the people there. As time passed, however, some of the younger generation who had grown up after Alma's return, did not accept the teachings of their parents. One of these young people was Alma's own son, Alma. It was said of them: "And now because of their unbelief, they could not understand the word of God; and their hearts were hardened." (Mosiah 11:107) July 1988

We find a simple truism here: as belief is necessary to understanding so is unbelief the cause of not understanding. When their hearts were hardened it is evident that they could not apply their hearts to understanding. In continuing the story we find that by miraculous means the Lord softened the hearts of these young people and they became stalwarts of the truth.

At a later time, Alma the son of Alma, brought a type of a parable to the Zoramites (see Alma 16:152-173) which we can apply to ourselves. He compared the word of God unto a seed, which when it is planted in your heart it will begin to swell and grow. You will then know that it is a good seed and it will begin to enlighten your understanding. This will in turn increase your faith, but eventually your knowledge in that thing will become perfect and your faith will become dormant.

Alma emphasized the need to nourish the tree with great care that it might get root and grow up to bring forth fruit. If it is not properly nourished and cared for, it will eventually wither away and you shall pluck it up and cast it out. This is not because the seed was not good but because your ground was barren. If this happens you will not be able to pick of the fruit of the tree of life.

Alma admonishes us to nourish the word "...by your faith with great diligence, and with patience, looking forward to the fruit thereof..." (Alma 16:170) Considering our present environment with all the modern pushbutton conveniences and the general attitude of expecting, if not demanding, immediate results, the words "diligence" and "patience" as well as the expression, "looking forward to the fruit thereof," are somewhat foreign to our way of life. The real meaning of Alma's counsel to the Zoramites would probably require considerable study and effort to fully apply them to our lives.

Paul gave Timothy this appropriate counsel: "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15)

We all know from our school days that to study requires effort. The goal placed before Timothy (and us) is to show himself approved unto God. When we set aside all desires to impress man and seek only the approval of God in learning His precise will, we can become that workman that needeth not to be ashamed.

Helaman was admonished by his father, Alma, to

learn wisdom in his youth and to direct the affections of his heart toward the Lord:

"O remember my son, and learn wisdom in thy youth; yea, learn in thy youth to keep the commandments of God; yea, and cry unto God for all thy support;

"Yea, let all thy doings be unto the Lord, and whithersoever thou goest, let it be in the Lord; yea, let thy thoughts be directed unto the Lord; yea, let the affections of thy heart be placed upon the Lord for ever; counsel the Lord in all thy doings, and he will direct thee for good:

"Yea, when thou liest down at night, lie down unto the Lord, that he may watch over you in your sleep; and when thou risest in the morning, let thy heart be full of thanks unto God; and if ye do these things, ye shall be lifted up at the last day." (Alma 17:68-70)

These words are especially appropriate for the young for it shows the need for a person to develop a personal closeness to the Lord early in life. Such daily habits of praying for the Lord's protection over you during the night and giving thanks unto Him in the morning may seem rather routine and childish, but in reality it is necessary in developing a true faith in God. If we have faith to seek the counsel of the Lord in all things that we do, we can be sure that He will give us answers that will be to our good.

Moroni gives us these profound words on the subject: "Wherefore, whoso believeth in God, might with surety hope for a better world, yea, even a place at the right hand of God, which hope cometh of faith, maketh an anchor to the souls of men, which would make them sure and steadfast, always abounding in good works, being led to glorify God." (Ether 5:4)

Our sincere belief in God and our hope for that place at His right hand will cause us to become sure and steadfast in our efforts and to do many good works. The scriptures repeatedly point us to the need to be constant and unwavering in our obebedience to the commandments of God. This is being steadfast. To most of us, however, this requires a great effort as we are inclined to yield to the will of the flesh and relax our efforts from time to time. Returning our thoughts back to God and to the glorious gift of Christ—his life, his death and his resurrection—we can curb our humanness with an awareness of the goodness of God which in turn will keep our hearts pure before Him.

1988 CONFERENCE REPORT

The purpose of a Solemn Assembly is that the people of the Church might humble themselves before the Lord in fasting and prayer. We meet to specifically ask God's blessing on the Conference and for discernment, for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, for guidance as to the work of the gospel, the establishing of Zion, and the building of the Temple. With these desires in their hearts and minds many saints met at the Temple Lot Local on Friday morning, April 1st, for the first service of our Solemn Assembly.

Apostle Roland Sarratt was in charge of the service with Priest Jim Yates Jr. assisting. The service had several seasons of prayer. Complying with the purposes for which we had met, there were prayers for the work of the gospel, the restoration of the house of Israel, and strength to overcome our weaknesses.

Friday afternoon Elder Jay Moser was in charge with Elder Ken Oar assisting. Brother Moser read to us the definition of the Solemn Assembly along with several scriptures. He counseled us to ask the Lord what we can do for Him, rather than what the Lord can do for us. There were many beautiful, sincere prayers offered by the elderly, middle-aged and several children.

Friday evening we gathered together with Elder Leroy Wheaton in charge and Elder Nicholas Denham assisting. Parts of the 10th chapter of Moroni were read. The words admonished us to exercise our faith and remember that God is the same yesterday, today, and forever. The service was filled with prayer and worshipful singing.

The second day of our Solemn Assembly convened the next morning at 9:00 a.m. Elder Hubert Yates was in charge with Elder Jim Yates Sr. assisting. Brother Hubert spoke to us about the need to fast. The Psalms tell us that we can humble our souls by fasting. With this counsel we entered into a season of prayer. There were earnest prayers offered for the work of the gospel. After we arose there were many prayer requests voiced for our Brothers and Sisters who were sick or had other serious needs. We had another season of prayer for these expressed needs. Immediately after this season of prayer, Brother Stephen Gould stood and sang a prayer which had been given to him through inspiration:

We pray a song of healing for those we hold so dear And thus O Lord we address thee in humble reverent fear.

- We pray for Sister Maria; may Brother Ed be made strong.
- We pray for dear young Vanessa, O Lord, please hear this song.
- Our Mother Smith is ailing with sickness through and through,
- Our Brother Curtis needs healing that only can come from you.
- Thy children, oh so weary, whose eyes hold many a tear,
- For all our young hearts so tender that you might draw us near.
- We pray for Brother Victor whose troubled soul's misplaced,
- Oh call him back to this gathering that he may take his place.
- We pray for thine Apostles whose age has caused distress;
- We ask now for their healing, that this thy church may be blest.
- Our brother's arm has withered, that it may now become strong.
- Oh Lord, we ask now thy blessing upon this earnest song.
- We ask thy consecration upon the prayer of this song.

Our hearts were touched and tears were shed as God's spirit moved in the assembly. There was a feeling of humility, reverence and deep praise among the saints at that meeting.

Elder Charles Brantner was in charge of the final meeting of our Solemn Assembly with Elder Virgil Addie assisting. Brother Charles read several scriptures and commented that we must seek God's guidance. After the season of prayer, Brother Addie testified how God had answered numerous prayers throughout his life. He spoke of the beauty and benefit of prayer. As we meditated on Brother Addie's words, we were encouraged that through faith God would answer the prayers that had been offered at this Solemn Assembly.

The next morning was Easter Sunday and at 9:00

a.m. we met at the Independence Town Hall for a sacrament service. Apostle William Sheldon was in charge with Apostle Don McIndoo assisting. Brother McIndoo gave the opening remarks. He read several scriptures and spoke to us about recalling what the sacrament means. If we take it in remembrance of Christ, his Spirit will be with us. He read from 3 Nephi 9:21-24, and reminded us that these promises are extended to us today.

Then the congregation was privileged to witness the blessing of two beautiful babies: Hailey Yates, the daughter of Jim and Kim Yates, was blessed by her two proud granddads, Elder Robert Oldham and Elder Jim Yates Sr.; Johanna Kidd, daughter of Bruce and Teresa Kidd, was blessed by her uncle, Elder Joel Yates and Elder Hubert Yates. Our hearts rejoiced in this provision the Lord has given to his Church.

We had a season of prayer and then testimonies were given by the following people: Aaron Heath, Gary Housknecht, Mary Lois Bryant, Peter Gould, Ray Feely, Shirley Bailey, Becky Sheldon, Hubert Yates, Cheri Pennington, Milo and Neva Housknecht, Kim Yates, Sam Gould, Max Spencer, Nicholas Denham, Nanette Smith, Harvey E. Seibel, Joel Yates, Glen Gill, Marie Weaver, Ben Case, Randy Sheldon, Wanda Jo Eddy, and Stephen Gould.

Many of the testimonies dealt with love. Several people spoke of the love they felt for the saints and all of mankind. One sister explained that love is the universal language. Several testimonies talked about what a privilege it is to be in the Church of Christ and that we should not take this blessing for granted. There were testimonies of answered prayers, divine healing, and God's protection in very marvelous ways. The service lasted four hours, but because it was filled with God's Spirit it went by very quickly.

Later that afternoon, after lunch was served, an Easter cantata was performed together by the Independence and Phoenix choirs. We want to give Martha Bruner and Michelle Yates special thanks for all their efforts in bringing that production to pass.

Apostle Marvin Ely was the preacher for the Sunday evening service. He began his sermon by reading 1 Peter 5:6-9. Brother Ely stressed the importance of being humble. We need to be alert and realize that we can not handle the forces of evil alone. We need to rely on God and remember that He cares for us.

He reminded us that to be carnally minded is death and to be spiritually minded is life eternal. We must know the consequences of walking in sin. He read Proverbs 14:12 which says, "There is a way which seemeth right unto man; but the end thereof are the ways of death." Brother Ely implored us to remember that the devil is the great deceiver. There are ways to denounce sin and escape deception, and Brother Ely expounded the scriptures on how to do that. He reminded us that Jesus is the bread of life, and it is the words of Christ that will tell us all things that we should do. He explained that the Lord speaks in plainness. If we follow the Lord's plan we can have happiness in this life as well as eternal life. Just as the consequences of transgression are destruction and sorrow, those who keep the commandments of God are happy and blessed.

Brother Ely also spoke to us on the importance of repentance. 2nd Nephi 12:78 explains "...the Lord covenanteth with none, save it be with them that repent..." He also rehearsed to us the promises made, not only to the house of Israel, but to the Gentiles. The Gentiles that repent will be numbered among the House of Israel. In closing, Brother Ely reminded us of the promise of the city, New Jerusalem, and that we can be there if we are repentant. Our duty now is to prepare our lives for the great work which is ahead of us.

Our next preaching service convened on Monday evening and Apostle Don McIndoo was the preacher. The theme of his sermon was the promise of eternal life. Brother McIndoo pointed out that this is the greatest promise of all. He read to us from Hebrews 11:13, 16, 36. He explained that when many of us think of the promises of God, we think of the abundant life, or the redemption of Zion. But, the promise of eternal life is the most important, for it is the promise that goes out to all people. We need to turn our hearts and minds toward this promise and how we can attain it and share it with others.

Brother McIndoo read to us from 2nd Nephi 1:116, 117 and 120 and Mosiah 1:121-122. He told us two inspiring testimonies from two of our brothers from Yucatan and how the promise of eternal life changed their lives.

Mosiah 2:10 says, "...thereby salvation might come to him that should put his trust in the Lord, and should be diligent in keeping the commandments, and continue in faith even unto the end of his life." After reading this scripture Brother McIndoo pointed out that we must remember several things about attaining eternal life. First, sanctification is a daily process, for it does not happen in one moment. We must repent daily. Second, we must study and read God's word every day. It can inspire us and change our lives. Third, we must heed God's Spirit as it leads us to do good and stay away from evil. Brother McIndoo admonished the children and young people never to do anything that they wouldn't talk to their parents or Sunday school teacher about. He counseled the ministry to live what they preach. You can not take the message of eternal life if there is a

contradiction between your actions and your words.

In closing, Apostle McIndoo implored us to labor diligently for the work of the gospel. He told about a dedicated young brother in Yucatan who labors for the Lord in spite of hardship and trial. We must exercise our faith, keep the promise of eternal life before us, and labor with all our mights.

Tuesday morning bright and early at 8:00 we met for the prayer service that precedes the business meeting. Elder Frank Fann was in charge with Elder Joel Yates assisting. Brother Joel made the opening remarks. He read several scriptures that spoke of putting on charity, being humble, and forgiving one another. He admonished us to take counsel from the Lord and to let Him lead us.

We had a short season of prayer. Then there were many beautiful testimonies about how God is working with his people. One sister told us that, through faith and prayer, she was able to overcome a phobia. Several sisters told about how they had received a blessing through administration. Two testimonies dealt with the power of love. One Elder told us that because of the differences in the Church he used to have a wounded and troubled heart, but the love of the saints healed his broken heart. Another sister told about how she overcame her shyness by asking the Lord for a portion of his love. She had a dream where she saw Christ and felt His overwhelming love.

As usual, the morning prayer service was very inspiring. Those of us who attended felt very blessed and were able to enter into the business sessions with an extra portion of God's Spirit.

Tuesday evening, Elder Jay Moser gave us a very unique sermon. He put some items out on a table and explained that his sermon was going to be about what it is like to be in Yucatan. It was Brother Moser's desire that we might better know and understand our brothers and sisters there. He stressed that they are our brothers and sisters in this Church of Christ. There are many concerns as you travel through Mexico, but Brother Moser explained, when he attended his first Church service there his fears rolled away.

He showed us a bolsa, which is a net bag, a hammock, a machete, flowers and an embroidered handkerchief. He explained a little bit about each object, and read a scripture in Spanish.

Elder Moser told us several things about their lifestyle and their services. He explained that the services are led by the Spirit, and that there is much singing. The children are very involved in the singing. The Church people love to visit with one another and speak often about God and his blessings. In spite of a great deal of sickness and trial, they have joy and a great hope of eternal life. Brother Moser read us a letter that a young sister gave him. She started out by calling him "Brother", and he told us that this exemplifies the attitude of the people there. They are very loving and very concerned for their brothers and sisters in the United States.

Mark 10:31 and 3rd Nephi 10:1-4 were the scriptures to which Brother Moser referred. He brought to our attention that we can assist the House of Israel right now. We can help provide for some of their temporal needs, such as books in Spanish. We can also help them spiritually. We can reciprocate the love they share for us by earnestly praying for them.

There was a good crowd for the Wednesday morning prayer service. Elder Nicholas Denham was in charge with Elder Allen Kauffman assisting. In Brother Kauffman's opening remarks, he reminded us that these services help us remember the Lord and his commandments. Brother Denham led us in a season of prayer. After the season of prayer there were many beautiful testimonies which glorified God.

Several members told about how God had healed them of their physical afflictions. Two dreams were brought out during the service. One brother admonished us to be specific in our prayers. He told several testimonies about how specific prayers had been miraculously answered. Another brother testified of how the Lord had humbled him and helped him put those things out of his life that weren't right. Before the service ended we had a short season of prayer for a specific prayer request.

Wednesday evening was the last service of our 1988 Conference. Elder Smith Brickhouse was our preacher. Brother Brickhouse challenged the congregation to use our time and talents for the Lord and the work of the gospel. He asked us what we as individuals are doing to help to bring forth Zion. He encouraged us to focus on the promises of God. Brother Brickhouse read Psalm 33:11 and Hebrews 2:1. He asked us to take counsel from the Lord and to give earnest heed to his word. We were reminded of some of the fundamentals of the Gospel. He proclaimed that this is the Church of Christ. The Bible and Book of Mormon are one. This is the promised land and we have a hope of Zion. Brother Brickhouse asked us what positive actions we were making for the cause of Zion. We can help and serve others and increase our desires for the Lord.

Elder Brickhouse gave an important analogy: He asked us to think about the song, "We're Marching to Zion." He pointed out that it is a march. We cannot stroll or walk as we help to bring forth Zion. A march is hard, but we have a purpose and a destination. We have maps and provisions and a leader. The

A Mighty Wind of Faith

When I was a boy of ten, I had my first experience with the power of God. My family worked and lived on a hennequin plantation where they were virtually slaves to the Spanish landowners.

In order to grow their crop of corn, which is the staple food of the Maya, the people had to go outside the rock fence of the plantation, cut the forest, then burn the cut trees and brush. The following year we could plant our seed on the burned area. Occasionally the fires would get out of control and spread onto the plantation where it would burn the hennequin plants. In order to discourage this practice, the landowners made it a death penalty, by hanging, if one of the workers let his fire get out of control and onto the plantation.

On this particular day I went with my father to burn the trees on our land. We were burning the trees on a calm day when, suddenly, a strong wind arose and blew our fires directly toward the plantation. The fires were soon burning out of control toward the fence. My father cut some branches of a special fireresistant tree, and with these branches we tried to beat out the flames, but it soon became evident that we were not going to be able to control the fire and keep it from entering the fields. When the flames were just a few meters from the edge of the plantation, my father dropped his branch and said, "Son, we cannot control the fire and surely we will be put to death. Let us bow down and pray to God for His help."

We knelt there on the smoldering earth and prayed with all our hearts. Tears ran down our faces. When enough time had passed for the fire to enter the plantation, we finished our prayers and looked up. Just then, we felt a strong wind begin to blow from the opposite direction. It drove the fire back over the burned ground and that which wasn't put out burned off into the forest in the other direction. When we told others of the miracle, they said it was just "luck" or an "accident," but I knew it was a miracle from God. When the gospel was first preached in Uayalcek many years later, it found a receptive heart in Isidro Koyoc. To this day, he is faithful to that God who saved his life so many years ago.

I Found The Bus To Zion

A year or two before I was baptized, I had a rather outstanding dream which, at the time, I didn't understand. As it began, I was on horseback in a large open field. I was holding a small boy in the saddle with me. We didn't seem to be going anywhere, just sitting there. The field was bleak and desolate of life like mid-winter. The sky was a solid gray and everything seemed colorless.

Suddenly, I became aware that there was danger a large bull was crossing the field toward us. I felt that we should find safety, so we dismounted and I carried the boy to the nearest fence. We crossed the fence and from that point I don't remember anything more about the boy in the dream.

I walked over to an old barn and entered it. On the opposite wall from where I entered was a large sliding door. Bright light, which appeared to be sunlight, shone through the cracks in the door. I immediately went over to the door and pushed it open. As I went through the door I found that I was still in the barn, but on the opposite wall was another door with light shining through it, also.

I went over and opened that door, finding still another door with light shining through it. I continued opening doors, each having bright light shining through them like the first one.

In a short time I had gone through several doors (I don't remember how many) searching for the light.

When I finally came to the outside, I found that the sun was shining and the sky was clear and beautiful. Some have said that we dream only in black and white, but I can testify that in this part of my dream everything was as colorful as real life. The grass and trees were green, the sky was blue and everything was in its natural color.

Upon a hillside just a little distance from the barn was a road. I quickly crossed over to the road where a bus was parked, apparently waiting for me. The bus started up and, as we began to move, the dream ended.

I have interpreted this dream as being my personal experience with the gospel of Christ. The bleak and desolate condition was descriptive of my outlook on life before I was baptized. The danger of the bull and my crossing the fence to safety was my

awareness of evil and my desire to escape it. The small boy apparently indicated my immaturity and indecisiveness which left me as I began to seek safety from the power of the evil one.

Entering the barn describes my return to attending church. The light was the gospel being preached and taught. Opening the doors was my search for the truth. The brightness and colorfulness of the outdoors described the effect the light of the gospel had on my outlook toward life. Getting on the bus was my joining the Church of Christ.

GRACE + FAITH + WORKS

"And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free," John 8:32

The varied interpretations and/or emphasis put upon the scripture by the limitations of the human mind not opened in understanding by the Spirit of Truth often confuse truth, purporting conflicts where there need be none. One such question over which there has been many stormy discussions is "grace versus works" as pertaining to salvation. It appears to me that the very statement is the beginning of the error. Grace and works are not opposites, they are both essentials to the end desired.

There must be a sense in which the statement of Ephesians 2:8-9 is true, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." It takes both grace and faith. What is the part which is dependent upon grace? Is it not of God's grace that he so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever would believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life? John 3:16, Is it not of the grace of Jesus' love that he lay down his life? John 10: 15-18. Even when we were yet dead in sins he so loved us as to make a way that we might be reconciled, through himself, with God, Ephesians 2:4-6, and this by his grace. He didn't owe it to us. It was not our due that he should so love us; he was in no way obligated to do this except by the grace and love that was in him.

All that we have of the gifts of his Spirit is because of this grace that is in him. A gift is something given that is not earned. Once the matter of recompense for whatever enters, it ceases to be a gift. The Holy Ghost is a gift, Acts 10:45. Such good as we appear to have achieved is not of ourselves, John 3:17, but is given of heaven. Even Jesus claimed no good in his own right, Matthew 19:16-17, nor to do anything of himself, John 5:19, 30, but ascribed all to God, in that he did only those things that pleased the Father. John 8:28-29.

All that we have, all that we are, all that we can hope to become, is of, and depends upon, that grace of God for, towards and in us. We receive grace according to the measure of the gift of Christ, Ephesians 4:7, And through the manifestation of the Spirit is given to the profiting of all, it's gifts are divided severally as he will, 1 Corinthians 12:6-11, these gifts of the Holy Ghost are given as he wills, Hebrews 2:4, they all come from him, James 1:17, and he it is that works in us both to will and to do as he pleasures, Philippians 2:13, and without him we can do nothing, John 15:5. The works which Jesus himself did, as he said, were the works of the Father dwelling in him, John 14:10, so the works of faith wrought in us, are they not also the works of the Father? all, of his will and purposing to our salvation, wherein there is no space for aught of boasting left to mortal man. Ephesians 2:8-10.

All gifts have one condition. They must be accepted before they can benefit the one to whom they are offered. Accepting a gift, including the going through of various legalities (in the case of an inheritance or legacy) in order to claim it can in no way constitute earning it; or even deserving it.

It seems the condition coupled with this gift of the grace of God, is to receive it through faith. He that believes on Jesus Christ has everlasting life, John 6:47. In modern definition, to believe is to accept something as being true; to have faith in its validity, to trust and depend upon it. To profess to hold any belief which is not in any way followed by action borders on hypocrisy; saying one thing but doing another, professing allegience but living contrary. It is the resulting action that proves the live faith. And what is this action to be other than simple obedience to the teachings and commandments of God? And though we come to him in perfect obedience, we can not claim that we have earned the gift nor the grace by which the gift has come to us; only that our faith is real.

People can and do believe, with corresponding actions, in any number of things; and history records the tragedies of misplaced faith; of lives diligently mis-spent because of misplaced faith, faith in that which had no foundation. All the works possible growing out of faith in God would also be empty were it not for the grace of God upon which this faith and hope and action is grounded. Still with the reality of God and his grace toward us, and the sureness of his word and promises; if we by the gifts of the Holy Spirit in us should rise to a perfect faith and obedience in performing all the acts enjoined upon faith, we can not account it as of ourselves but are to acknowledge ourselves as unprofitable servants, Luke 17:10, that all praise, honor and glory can go to him to whom it belongs; lest we diminish it in taking some unto ourselves, or in some way assume to add to it simply by being subject to him, being what we were intended to be and doing what it is our duty to do.

This grace of God in all his power and love, stooping to our hopeless and helpless condition, is the foundation of all our hope. It is the first cause, without which all striving for salvation is futile. But that grace with all its limitlessness being real, is something to place faith and hope on, which leads to trust, surrender and obedience, which are the works of faith. To suppose one can believe anything without a resulting response is nonsense.

In the words of Diedrich Bonhoffer, "to believe is to obey". In the light of this, how real and deep is our belief? In a count of obedience to Christ's commandments where would we score? How alive would our faith be found to be?


