

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

YOUR REASONABLE SERVICE



I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God. Romans 12:1-2.

From the above scripture we can readily learn that we each have a reasonable service to perform to God. This service must be acceptable to him and should not be conformed to this world. All too often mankind conforms to the ways of the world that bring heartache and grief. Instead our lives must be transformed from the carnal man and the ways of the world to the spiritual man that can bring peace and happiness.

The church members at Ephesus at one time were idol worshipers and followed the way of the world. They were converted unto Jesus Christ and then followed the way of the spirit. THE FALL OF BABYLON

Ancient Babylon: The Proto-type

It is generally conceded as is stated in Smith's Bible Dictionary that Babylon is another term for the even more ancient Babel. Babel, of course, was the city and people which attempted to build a tower to the heavens, to make a name for themselves, lest they "be scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth" (Gen. 11:4). This was an act of defiance toward God, and an attempt to exalt a people beyond the power of God to touch; it was the common prevailing attitude within the world at that time. Because of this, the Lord confounded their language so that they could not understand their fellows, and in spite of themselves, they were scattered upon the face of the earth. Babel is the genesis of the term, "babble", for their attempted conversations were an unintelligible babble to others. Babel signifies confusion, and modern, spiritual Babylon is therefore a state of confusion, rebellion and pride. This is so whether it be considered from either a spiritual or temporal aspect; and the Lord will not indefinitely permit its continuance. We will see, also, that greed is a natural accompaniment of the above qualities which identify Babylon.

The nation of Israel (twelve tribes) became divided after the reign of King Solomon, nine and a half tribes identified as Israel, and two and a half tribes identified as Judah. Israel was taken into captivity by Assyria and later, Judah was subjected by Babylon.

We only state the matter as a fact without feeling the necessity of verifying it by the scriptures, for our special purpose here.

Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, inflicted terrible loss and suffering upon the Jews, as they were called, before the major portion of the people were carried into Babylon; some of the poor were left as vine-dressers and husbandmen to care for the land and to render a tribute to the king. He destroyed the temple at Jerusalem and carried off the treasures thereof; it was the profane use of some of these vessels which figured into the death of King Belshazzar, his son, and the rending of the kingdom by the Medes.

Nebuchadnezzar became exalted in pride and the glory of his kingdom. He built a golden image and demanded all his subjects to fall down and worship it, as also his other idols. We have probably all heard or read of the wonderful story of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, his Jewish subjects, who had been given authority in his kingdom. They refused to worship those gods or the image, and were committed to a fiery furnace, yet survived unscathed. Because of this, Nebuchadnezzar commanded that none should speak against their God, the great God of all.

Later, as he contemplated his own greatness, and no doubt harboring the thought that his majesty approached or equaled that of a "god", he heard a voice from heaven decreeing that his kingship would be taken from him. He immediately lost his reason-

ing power and was driven from among men to eat grass as the ox until seven years should pass. At its conclusion, he was restored through the return of his reasoning power. He recognized that God had debased him, and now he extolled with praise and honor the King of heaven, the only true God.

Our purpose in briefly rehearsing these things concerning Babylon and her king is to reveal a pattern of similarity, characteristics of ancient Babylon which are a type of modern Babylon. Of course, the human propensity toward greed, pride, self-exaltation, of persecution and conquest, etc. has never changed; but God has a time-table, a toleration for the exercise of the human will until the cup of iniquity is full, followed by His judgment. The wicked will destroy the wicked, as with Babylon and Judah; there are times of famine, of pestilence and of plague; and finally, there will be convulsions of the earth and the universe when He says: it is enough; my patience is exhausted. It appears this decree is near, even in this generation.

A third world war seems imminent; famine and pestilence are assuming world-wide dimension; plagues and disease are increasingly severe insomuch that the medical field cannot keep abreast. New viral strains appear with which they are virtually hopeless to combat. Need we mention the dreaded AIDS disease which threatens to decimate the nations? All this because, in part at least—

"The earth mourneth and fadeth away, the world languisheth and fadeth away, the haughty people of the earth do languish. The earth also is defiled under the inhabitants thereof; because they have transgressed the laws, changed the ordinance, broken the everlasting covenant. Therefore hath the curse devoured the earth, and they that dwell therein are desolate: therefore the inhabitants of the earth are burned, and few men left." Isa. 24:4-6.

A spiritual pollution, which has festered long, is that which finally, by overflowing the nations, incurs the great wrath of an offended God.

Ancient Babylon pre-figured the appearance of a later, mystical Babylon which was to develop and continue even until the last days, or until that system should be destroyed by the brightness, the glory of the coming of the Lord; and Nebuchadnezzar, as a destroyer of God's people, in his arrogance and exaltation, pre-figured the evil ruling force of that Babylon of later times, whose seat was at Rome; this force is the papacy.

The Man of Sin

The apostle Paul prophesied concerning the ap-

pearance of a "man of sin" before the second advent of Christ, in this language:

Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition; who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that he is God...And now ye know what withholdeth that he might be revealed in his time. For the mystery of iniquity doth already work: only he who now letteth will let, until he be taken out of the way. And then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming: even him, whose coming is after the working of Satan with all power and signs and lying wonders, and with all deceivableness of unrighteousness in them that perish; because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness." 2 Thess. 2:3,4,6-12.

Jesus had said:

"And then if any man shall say to you, Lo, here is Christ; or, Io, he is there; believe him not: for false Christs and false prophets shall rise, and shall shew signs and wonders, to seduce, if it were possible, even the elect." Mk. 13:21, 22

The apostle John spoke of a spirit of antichrist being even then in the world (see 1 John 4:1-3), and his warning, together with those of Jesus and Paul alluded to a lying spirit loosed upon the earth, taking many forms but focusing upon a presumptuous system of church government known as the papacy.

Many latter day interpreters of prophecy as recorded in the Bible consider that the "man of sin", the "antichrist", is yet to make his appearance; a single person possessed of great deceptive power over the nations. This may be partially correct, but it is incorrect as to its total time frame, and identification. The "man of sin" is a spiritual system covering centuries, a succession of popes (presumed to have been headed by the apostle Peter).

We have no intention to delve into all that is available to confirm our assertion relative to the papacy in this connection. It has been admirably done in "A Marvellous Work And A Wonder" by the late apostle Dan McGregor, which is available in the Church, and should be in our private libraries if possible.

Many people - catholic and non-catholic - become offended at what is assumed to be an attack against a church and its people. In general, people are innocent dupes of those who should know better, and often do know better, but will advance a particular cause for personal gain, favor, or ambition; such as these are worthy of severe scrutiny and condemnation if found guilty. But opposition to a church or political body is best served when limited to the principles involved. Such opposition may, however, be centered in people who personify the evil principle; and so it has been in several instances, noteworthy for their audacity; for instance: a totalitarian regime is an evil form of government, notably revealed in a Stalin, a Hitler or a Mussolini.

We will give a few statements made by popes of the past, and by others in reference to some of these popes, to show the almost unbelievable magnitude of their audacity and exaltation. Daniel, in prophesying concerning a "little horn" or power developing among the nations of the earth (see Dan. 7:8,20, 21,24,25) thus alluded to the papacy, saying that he (this spiritual system centering in the pope) "made war with the saints and prevailed against them" (ibid., v. 21), and that "he shall speak great words against the most High (ibid., v. 25). Now, how is the following for blasphemy, or speaking against the most High?!

Pope Innocent III:

"Christ hath set one man over the world, him whom he hath appointed his vicar on earth ...In him (pope, w.a.s.) alone is the right of making laws...His sentence is not to be

repealed by anyone...He is to be judged by none." A Marvellous Work and a Wonder, p. 56.

Pope Boniface VIII (ibid., p. 56):

"The pope is of so great dignity and excellence, that he is not merely man, but as if God, and the vicar of God. The pope alone is called most holy, divine monarch, and supreme emperor, and king of kings. The pope is of so great dignity, and power, and he constitutes one and the same tribunal with Christ, so that whatsoever the pope does seems to proceed from the mouth of God. The pope is as God on earth."

Pope Nicholas:

"The pope who is called God by Constantine, can never be bound or released by man; for God can not be judged by man". The Fall of Babylon, p. 88, by Elder W. J. Haworth

The cry of Sicilian ambassadors, prostrated before pope Martin IV:

"Lamb of God! that takes away the sins of the world". A Marvellous Work and a Wonder, p. 56.

A Venetian prelate, in the Fourth Lateran, thus addressed the pope:

"Thou art our shepherd, our Physician, in short, a second God on earth". *The Fall of Babylon*, ibid., p. 88.

IN MEMORY

As Memorial Day came this year we were again reminded of our neglect to one who was so dear to many of us. Our memory was caused to see the beautiful green slope in White Chapel Memorial Gardens near highway 1 in Gladstone, Missouri, just north of Kansas City. It was in June 1985 when Sister Martha Clara (Ferricks) Bell was laid to rest beside her beloved husband, Archie Fransis Bell, who had preceded her in death in 1980. Sister Martha was loved by all who knew her, which I am sure caused many to feel they could not adequately express their appreciation for this marvelous gift that God had granted unto us for over 82 years.

Martha was born on June 19, 1903 to Mathew and Adelaid Ferricks, of German heritage, in the farming community of Diller, Nebraska. Her mother died when Martha was 5 years old. Her father remarried before he passed away leaving Martha to be raised by her stepmother from the age of 8 years old. Martha began to work as a hired girl in homes when she was young and by the time she was 16 she left her home to live in homes where she took care of the sick, mothers with new babies, and general home tasks.

When Martha started school she had a special friend in Alvina (Schnuelle) Bell. This friendship

lasted throughout her life. When Alvina was 10 years old she moved with her parents to western Nebraska, in Cheyenne County. Their friendship continued through communication of letters until Martha went to visit Alvina's family in 1920. She made frequent visits there after. She was on hand to show her love, friendship and care when Alvina's second daughter, Irene, was born. It was here that she met Brother Archie Bell and they were married on November 2, 1927. This brought Martha and Alvina closer together as sisters, because Alvina had married Archie's brother, Harvey, in March of 1923.

Sister Martha was baptized into Christ, as a member of the Church of Christ with headquarters on the Temple Lot in 1928, by Elder Martin M. Case. She remained faithful to her commitment to the Lord all her life, and was a help to Brother Archie in his missionary work, where she reached into the hearts of many with her caring, helpful nature.

While Archie and Martha were living in western Nebraska, three children were born: Donald Dean, Lela Rena, and Ella Darline. Donald and Lela died in infancy.

Brother Archie accompanied Elder Martin Case on a missionary trip in the west. Then in 1930 Archie and Martha went to Independence, Missouri where Archie worked on the Temple excavation and Martha worked in the kitchen to help feed and care for the workers. They returned to Nebraska after the work on the Temple stopped because of the need of funds. In 1933 the little family moved to western lowa, around Portsmouth and McClelland. It was here that Archie, now an Elder in the Church of Christ, worked with Elder Martin Case to develop a group of Church of Christ believers. It was, also, here that two more children were born: Archie (Jack) Fransis and Deloris Jane.

The family of now five moved to Ava, Missouri in 1936, where Martha was again close to Alvina, as they raised their young children. They were blessed as they joined the Arthur M. Smith, Alex Smith, Harvey Bell, and Grant Burgan families and soon a Local Church was organized. The Ava Local is still very active with the descendants and some of the

original members. In Ava, Archie developed the carpenter trade and when World War II began, he followed this trade into Fort Riley, Kansas, Whitehorse, Canada and other locations. Before Archie returned home to stay, they bought a farm southeast of Ava, near Arthur and Alex Smith and the Church. Here Martha kept the farm going and nurtured their children almost into adulthood.

In 1961 Archie and Martha moved to Independence, Missouri. By this time Archie was an Apostle and engaged in full time missionary work. The children were married except for Deloris. It was here that Archie's mother, Sister Rena Bell came to live with them most of her last seven years. Sister Martha accompanied Brother Archie on many of his missionary trips through Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, Florida, Illinois, Ohio, and Michigan. It was during these times that Sister Martha reached into the folds of many hearts as a true sister; to others she had already found a special place in our lives as an aunt; as a mother and grandmother she has a place that is held most dear. A place that is appreciated with thanksgiving to a loving God by all of us.

Following Archie's death in 1980, Martha moved to Raymondville, Missouri near her daughters, until her sickness which took her home to rest in the arms of Jesus. She attended the Houston Local while in Raymondville.

Martha's three sisters and two brothers preceded her in death. She leaves two daughters, Ella D. Engle and Deloris J. Smith of Raymondville, Missouri and one son, Archie F. (Jack) Bell Jr. of Conesville, Iowa; seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Our hearts and memories will keep her in that place where God so lovingly placed her. We thank Him for the heritage He has given us in her. The Light of Jesus that she let shine, the patience of adversity, the joy of love, and endurance that comes from the strength of the Holy Ghost, the gift of God. We thank you Dear God for giving us Sister Martha Bell.

While doing some outside reading, I came across the following:


WANTED: PEACEMAKERS

A REPORT FROM YUCATAN

As our plane left the Gulf of Mexico behind and crossed the coastline of Quintana Roo, even at 10,000 feet the effects of Hurricane Gilbert were obvious. The little coastal fishing village below had been ravaged by a powerful giant which had risen from the warm Caribbean waters and seemingly tried to erase it from the narrow strand of sand. Behind the village the great tropical forest of hardwoods lay flattened, a million outstretched arms uniformly pointing westward along the track the monster storm had followed.

Seeing the obvious power of the storm which struck the heartland of the Maya, we marveled that the toll of death and injury was not greater. Only one of our church people had been injured, and that in an accident while cleaning up after the storm. This young man was seriously injured by a high tension electrical shock but is now doing well and in good spirits although still not able to work. However, the loss and suffering has been, and will continue to be, great.

There could be no doubt the relatively low death rate was due in part to the evacuation of coastal towns by the Mexican authorities. Yet, as we viewed the passing villages from our bus window as we traveled between Cancun and Merida, we were impressed by the number of wind-toppled trees which

had fallen just inches from the little thatched homes of people who huddled, fear-stricken and praying, inside as "Gilbert" roared across their land. Surely God had to some degree spared these humble people from the full fury which could have befallen them.

Now in Merida, as we began in earnest to confront the suffering and loss which had been sustained, we were again filled with gratitude for all the good people of the Church of Christ who had, without solicitation, forwarded funds to help their brothers and sisters. \$837.00 was delivered into the hands of eighteen families to assist them in their medical needs. Some of these needs were a direct result of the hurricane which had felled all power lines, thus cutting off access to pure drinking water. In some places, power was out for several days while in others it was weeks before all the downed poles and lines could be replaced.

Fourteen families received a total of \$698.00 in direct economic assistance. This will be an on-going expense as many jobs have been curtailed because of the storm. The 125 mph winds which passed over the state of Yucatan severely damaged the hennequin crop which is their main source of employment and income. All crops have been damaged or destroyed throughout the three-state area where our people live; hence, there will be a shortage of food grown, a loss of income coupled with the necessity of purchasing higher-priced food for day-to-day use. The specter of hunger now looms over the land. The

On one occasion I had a conversation with the Lord. It was not an audible conversation, but there were words communicated.

Apostle Roland Sarratt Independence, MO This is not my own testimony but I have not been able to forget it. It belongs to an elder sister who can no longer stand and share it with us. I hope to meet her again; she might hold out her arms and say, "See, I told you!"

Angela Wheaton more than once told us this story in an emotion-choked voice. It shook my composure every time; it still does. I will tell it as correctly as I can remember...in her memory.

She had been troubled by a good bit of friction with an associate. It seemed they just couldn't get along. One night she felt considerable sorrow and some resentment and couldn't get to sleep. As she prayed for help a vision opened before her eyes. She saw a breathtakingly, incredibly beautiful form, more appealing than anything she had ever seen or could ever imagine. She knew what it was. It was the soul of her antagonist! She cried out, "I'm so sorry, Lord, I didn't know!" The answer came back sadly and tenderly, "Every soul I have ever created is just as beautiful."

Donna Moser Phoenix, Arizona rural people who depend upon the rains cannot replant again until May or June nor expect a harvest until next September and October. We must realize that our support cannot merely be a one-time generosity.

As might be expected, a great number of families had received substantial damage to their homes. Some of the structural damage and repairs to roofs had already been done by those who could afford it. Now we were able to help the remaining fifty-five families with an assistance of \$3,400 to repair their homes. This accounts for all the work needed except a replacement of two homes which had completely disappeared. In each town a committee was formed to assess the damage, purchase the necessary materials and assist with the repairs for those who could not do so. As we visited and planned with these brethren in the eleven communities which were hardest hit by the storm, we had a growing awareness that something good could grow out of the destruction that had befallen our people. These committees of ministry and laymen were generally excited and eager to help one another and perhaps reach out to the needs of others in the community after the needs of our own people have been met. That is an opportunity that yet lies before us.

Two of our church buildings had sustained damage to their roofs and needed \$295 to complete the repairs. Other needs that were not storm-related were also dealt with, expending another \$507.

None of us can look into the future and predict how great the needs of our people might become. We have one plan to offset future need that was proposed by several of our Elders which we would like to implement in order to minimize the threat of hunger. This plan pertains to brethren who live in poor areas where irrigation water is not available. The September storm destroyed their harvest almost completely and they have no expectation of another before next fall. The plan will entail the purchase of a piece of arable land which has a good well. A cooperative will be formed in the name of the church and our people encouraged, and taught, to plant vegetable and fruit crops in such a way that there

would always be food to harvest (as they have a 12-month growing season where water is available). We would have to help with the furnishing of a pump and motor, hoses, seed, fertilizer and insecticides. We wish each group so helped to include in their bylaws a statement of purpose that a tithe of their production will be used for those unable to work and other needy people within the community.

One cooperative as described might demand an initial outlay of between \$2500 and \$4000 depending upon the value of the land. There are probably a halfdozen towns where such, or similar, projects are needed. If you would like to be a partner in the continuing effort to provide for the spiritual, economic and medical needs of an impoverished, but righteous, people and assist in the development of means by which they can attain a greater degree of self-sufficiency remember to send your tithes and offerings to the General Bishopric of the Church of Christ. Some of the projects we have described fall outside the scope of the General Church's ability to help, so we appreciate a continued support of our local Yucatan Fund here in Phoenix. Make your check payable to the Church of Christ but indicate that it is for the Yucatan Fund and send it to our treasurer, Doris Housknecht, 1909 E. Grovers Ave., Space 15, Phoenix, Arizona 85022.

AVA LOCAL REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER

Ecclesiastes 3:1—To everything there is a

season, and a time to every purpose under heaven:

As I write the fall season is coming to our hills after the heat of the summer. The leaves are starting to change color on our trees, and most look dusty and tired, their green faded only a little. But some of the sassafras and sumac have glowing leaves. The Virginia creeper that climbs a small tree by my son's window is more red than green, although still a mixture of the two colors.

Out in the garden it's time to clean out the spent plants and dig compost into the beds to prepare for next spring's planting. For I hope, as usual, for a better garden next year.

It seems to me that human souls have growing cycles also: times of gaining new or broader understandings of the gospel, of making changes in our personality and actions, and of dormancy—a time of rest when we can see no development. If my analogy of the growth of a soul to the growth of a garden has any truth in it, then the rest time can be as important as are the other times. For time spent in study and prayer that enriches a faith upon God and His Eternal Goodness prepares the soul for stronger and truer growth.

In his sermon on the last Sunday of September, our pastor, Brother Joe Smith, said that we must not just profess a belief in Jesus Christ, but we must practice that belief. To continue the analogy then, we cannot allow the growth of our souls to remain indefinitely in a rest time, rather our time must be such as to lead to growth, or we become stagnated rather than enriched.

But how do we know whether our rest time is one of preparation or stagnation? In August, Brother Tony Grizincic pointed out to us that we must not counsel ourselves, but be counseled by the Lord in all our doings. Thus in a rest time of preparation we must ask the Holy Ghost to guide our personal study, reading, and pondering that we will be led to knowledge necessary to the growth of our individual souls.

For, as Brother Bob Oldham reminded us in July, we are expected to continue growing until we are perfect. Christ has commanded us to do so, and we dare not allow ourselves to become satisfied, thinking that we understand all we should understand or that we have reached our human limits of perfection.

AKWESASNE LOCAL REPORT

Hogansburg, New York

As the leaves fall from the trees in Autumn, I cannot help but compare them to the falling pages of a calendar. The months and years seem to pass so quickly and "time" itself has vanished. My report takes us back a few years and leads us into our most recent news.

We are a group of Restoration believers who have been meeting in the home of Eli and Gretchen Tarbell on the St. Regis Mohawk Indian Reservation since July of 1975. We are Indian and non-Indian. We all have RLDS and/or LDS backgrounds. We love the Book of Mormon and have tried sharing the beautiful gospel story with other Native Americans here at Akwesasne. Sometimes successful, sometimes not. We have had many people come and go, and at times it has been very discouraging. Somewhere within us, however, we have had enough faith to keep striving to fulfill God's purposes in us.

Our first contact with the Church of Christ (Temple Lot) was Apostle William A. Sheldon and Sister Doris upon the invitation of Sister Theresa Guthrie in 1980. We had been praying a long time for God to send someone to us to teach us His true gospel. Our prayers were beginning to be answered when the Sheldon's (who have fondly become Grandpa and Grandma to our children) came to visit us. A few years later in July 1982, Theresa was baptized by Brother Sheldon and two years after that in September 1984, Brother Sheldon baptized Theresa's daughter-in-law, Gretchen Tarbell. We continued to meet as a group seeking spiritual direction for ourselves and our part in "taking the gospel to the Lamanites"—our Iroquois brothers.

In June of 1985, Bill and Lillian Zabriskie came to

visit us, again upon the invitation of Sister Guthrie. Because of their love for the Gospel and the Book of Mormon and their desire to bring the gospel to the House of Israel, they felt spiritually directed to come here not knowing how long their "visit" would be.
