I do not wish to raise a fuss, Soon there may be no one left of us. It seems so many have lost their truss, My heart faints and my thoughts a muss.



# **ABRAHAM BELIEVED GOD**

t is easy for us to equate knowledge with righteousness. Knowing certain things can become so important to us that we are inclined to think that knowledge is the only thing that counts as far as religion is concerned.

It is natural for us to be so inclined because of the world in which we live. Education, training and the ability to retain knowledge is important to our lives, and rightfully so. However, we also know that the ability to use knowledge is equally important.

To be able to apply our knowledge and training to our duties on the job is one thing, but to apply the doctrinalteachings of Christ to our personal lives is quite another thing. The laws of this land are so designed to give eachcitizen the right to live according to his own conscience. His rights are a rather broad and diversified field, considering that field includes the most strict of religious tenets in a belief in God to the extreme of total atheism. Therefore with the few limited guidelines of our social lives in the world, we are somewhat on our own except for the religious trainingwe get from our family, church, etc. The personal will topersevere in applying the teachings we obtain from the Holy Word of God is that which determines the height of our moral standards.

Knowledge and the ability to obtain knowledge is important. But a head knowledge, as some call it, is not enough. The knowledge that comes through the exercise of faith in God is what really counts. Such a knowledge comes from a personal relationship with God.

Abraham's relationship with God has often been referred to as an exceptional example of faith. It is written that Abraham believed God. He not only believed that there was a God, but he communed with God accepting what God told him as the truth. Nothing is said in the scriptures that would indicate that Abraham was a great theologian, that he had made an in depth study of the being of God, that he had analyzed what God said, that he had analyzed the creation story, etc. Abraham merely believed God and acted accordingly.

But what is there to be said of Abraham today? Many of the promises that God made to Abraham are still in effect. Some of the most important events in the existence of man - past, present and future - are hinged upon the childlike faith of an aged man and his wife many centuries ago, all because Abraham believed God and it was counted unto him for righteousness.

The beginning and ending of all worthwhile religious endeavors must include faith in God. Though faith terminates when knowledge comes, faith in God, as in Abraham's example, is a lifetime experience. It is a trust in God that is never quite exhausted as long as life lasts.

Abraham had the kind of faith that pleased God. God was so pleased that He made unsolicited promises to Abraham. Abraham regarded those promises with the greatest of sacred trust and they were handed down from father to son as traditionally true.


Today we find the scriptures replete with simple, yet profound traditions that express the divine mind of an unchangeable God. To the learned and over-sophisticated mind, the treasures hidden within the scriptures are seldom found. The most knowledgeable being on earth, as to the things of this world, may hold a great advantage over many of his peers, but his ability is limited to the finite mind of the natural man. In comparison the childlike trust of the spiritually-minded person opens the door of heaven that he might glimpse the infinite being of God which gives him a knowledge of eternal value.

God is no respecter of persons, but He favors the humble and contrite person over the self-confident and self-willed person. He is a jealous God who dislikes the adoration of man and personal indulgences. He requires an initial broken heart and a contrite spirit, with a continued will to endure to the end of life as a proof of one's devotion to Him.

The God of heaven would have each person who is so inclined to gain a knowledge of Him via their faith in Him. He delights in the personal relationship that comes through personal prayer and childlike submission and respect to His will. He wants us to recognize His infinite abilities above man's finite limitations.

It appears that God would have us do all that we can within our limitations to prove our sincerity, but He would not have us remain in the realm of our own reasoning when He has so much more available to unfold to our understanding. He would not have us to become trapped in the strength of our own human conclusions. He wants us to keep the door open, because He won't close it as long as we exercise faith in Him.

# **TESTIFY TO THE TRUTH OF THE BOOK**

#### **Part Five**

Anthropologists have long been interested in the "physical traits" of the Indian people and have made innumerable studies of them. One such study is currently being conducted by a biochemist in an entirely new approach to the subject. Dr. Svante Paabo is studying DNA samples from numerous tribes, as well as taking samples from ancient mummies and bodies preserved in bogs, in an attempt to identify the common ancestors of the Indian peoples by their inherited genetic material. In an article appearing in the Arizona Republic on Nov. 10, 1988, this scientist from the University of California at Berkeley said, "...his and other studies have found four different maternal lineages in the Americas." The complete results from this work will not be complete for several years.

Years ago, anthropologists, although placing Indians in the general Mongoloid division of mankind, have recognized that the Indian peoples are a composite race made of several distinct groups. Constance Irwin, in her book *Fair,Gods and Stone Faces*, states it in this manner: "The peopling of the Western Hemisphere is one of the great dramas of all time ... and one of the great mysteries too. It is a pageant enacted by many men from many places black, brown, yellow, and probably white men - for the so-called red man evolved from all of these; the American Indian is not of one race but a mixture of many." (p. 22)

Dr. Cyrus Gordon of the University of New York, in his book Before Columbus, says, "There is no basis for saying that the people of pre-classical Meso-America are a total mystery, or that they are simply the descendants of Paleolithic hunters who wandered south from the Bering Straits, or that none of them came to Middle-America across the Pacific or Atlantic. We know who they were, racially, from countless portrayals by ancient American sculptors. They definitely came across both oceans in pre-Columbian times. In fact, prior to A.D.300, there is hardly any trace of types that we call 'Indian' among the ceramic portraits (p.30)." He then quotes Jonathan Leonard, who states that the groups of American Indians show a great deal of variation. "In general, the farther they live from the Bering Straits ... the less Mongoloid they look, some of them possessing strikingly prominent noses, long heads or wavy hair, in contrast to the flat noses, round heads and straight hair that the typical Mongolians have today."

Dr. Gordon certainly summarizes well the position of the Book of Mormon, which indicates at least three known

migrations to Middle America - two of which probably crossed the Pacific and a third from across the Atlantic. Of course, two of these voyages included a fair-skinned, Semitic people. It is, therefore, of interest to read the report from one of the first Spanish explorers in the New World. Pierre Honore, in his book, In Quest of the White God, quotes Pedro Pizarro as writing that "the ruling class in the kingdom of Peru was fair-skinned with fair hair about the color of ripe wheat. Most of the great lords and ladies looked white like Spaniards. In that country, I met an Indian woman with her child, both so fair-skinned that they were hardly distinguishable from fair, white men. Their fellow countrymen called


I have a precious family, especially two wonderful daughters who look after me. And friends, lots and lots of them; they don't belong to our Church, but they are church-going
