#2 - Editorial Policy: Once again, I would like to draw all potential submitters' of material to ZA attention to the editorial policy stated on the front inside cover of each Zion's Advocate. This policy, I believe, offers a wide variety of potential subjects to address. Erroneously, many are possibly assuming that the only subjects worthy of publication in ZA are those that are "new and different."

The truth is, material is sorely lacking in the "basics" of the Gospel of Jesus Christ that teach readers of ZA (yes, members, but especially those not acquainted with the purity of the Gospel of Christ) the whole truth of the plan of salvation of Christ, the Son of God. Such subjects as faith; repentance; baptism; Christian duty in todays "contemporary" world; and amplification of such things as the unchangeability of the God that created this world and its people; why "works" are necessary as demonstration of our faith and love of Jesus; and the idea of realistic hope of life everlasting amidst a world of turmoil and seemingly insurmountable temptation ... are all in need of coverage.

This publication, representing the Church that Christ set forth in His lifetime, and the advocacy of the establishment of a Zionic, divine condition and place, does not need to address subjects that, while they are controversial with relation to presently debated doctrine of the Church of Christ, have little to do with the salvation of unsaved souls. By default, the material appearing in Zion's Advocate may be subject to the deeper feelings of its Editor in spite of the Editor's (me) sincere attempt to be impartial. But I believe strongly in the stated editorial policy, and will, with God's help, continue to adhere to it as closely as I am able.

Were the Priesthood of the Church to think in terms of what they would say if they had the opportunity to address a gathered group of unrepentant souls who were largely unfamiliar with any of the truths of the Gospel, and submitted material to Zion's Advocate accordingly, then the editorial policy of this publication, and, ultimately, some of the greater responsibilities of the Church of Christ in these last days, will have been met.

#3 - Update to ZA Staff Needs Regarding Format of

Submitted Material: As I use the new computer hardware more and more, I have discovered some more difinitive guidelines for the format and readability of submitted material. Please keep in mind that these are established in the hope of becoming as independent as possible from the world in the publication of Church of Christ literature and publications:

FIRST - Typewritten material should be on plain bond type paper (not shiny or of the "eraseable" variety), and should be in Letter or Near-Letter Quality type using a good, fresh medium or dark ribbon or ink. An older ribbon on a dot-matrix printer in anything less than Near-Letter-Quality is totally unreadable by the Church's computer scanner. A fixed-font spacing type is a must, as any proportionally-spaced type (such as in most publications and many modern word-processors) is mostly unreadable and has to be retyped or returned. Any standard typewriter has good readable type as long as the ribbon is relatively fresh.

SECOND - I want to re-emphasize that handwritten marks, underlining, use of italics, and most other non-standard markings or typing on a page is confusing to the computer.

If only these two guidelines were met, especially the first, my job would be a lot easier. Thanks!

THIRD - ATTENTION COMPUTER BUFFS! For those of you having access to an IBM (or compatible) computer, send your material to me on a 5 1/4" floppy disk along with one hard copy. This is, far and away, the best way to submit material. Indicate the word processor you use. ASCII format is fine also - just let me know which. I use PFS Professional Write, which can re-format to and from most major word processors. I also have a modem.

Incidentally, if there are some enthusiastic typists out there, I could use help typing articles that the computer scanner can't read accurately. All you have to have is access to a computer and do as I described above. Please let me know if you can be of assistance in this area.

Conference Report 1989

The Conference minutes record the business of the Church but the purpose of this article is to share with the body of Christ the spiritual aspect of all services held during the Conference and the Solemn Assembly.

Our Solemn Assembly opened on Friday morning, March 31st at 9:00 a.m. Apostle Marvin Ely was in charge of the service with Elder Jim Yates Sr. assisting. Brother Ely read from Ephesians 6:10-20. He explained that by putting on the whole armor of God we can stand firm in these last days. Brother Ely also read the purpose of the Solemn Assembly, and after several other comments he led the congregation in a season of prayer. The service had three seasons of prayer and several hymns were sung. At the close of the service Brother Ely read a letter from John Schut of the Netherlands

The second service began at 2:00 p.m. Elder Eugene Gould was in charge with Elder Gale Brantner assisting. Brother Gould read from Alma 17:71-81. These verses talk about the liahona which worked for Lehi and his family when they exercised their faith and diligence. This scripture speaks to our day. We must be diligent in keeping the commandments of God. With this counsel, the saints entered into a season of prayer.

Friday evening we gathered together with Elder Leslie Case in charge and Elder Loren Bryant assisting. The song "I Know Whom I Have Believed" was sung as one of the opening songs. Singing this hymn tuned our hearts to the sovereignty of God. The meeting was filled with many sincere prayers.

At 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 1st, we met at the Temple Lot local for our second day of fasting and prayer. Elder Jay Moser was in charge with Elder Ken Oar assisting him. Brother Moser read from Matthew 23:37, 3rd Nephi 4:55, and the Book of Commandments 29:2. He spoke about how the Lord wants to gather the children of men into ther kingdom of God. After two seasons of prayer, Teacher Ron Temple read several scriptures about faith and the gifts of the Spirit. Brother Moser counseled us to strengthen our faith by making use of the opportunity to pray. We had another season of prayer before the end of the service.

Saturday afternoon we convened for our last service of the Solemn Assembly. Elder Allen Kauffman was in charge with Elder Leslie Case assisting. Brother Kauffman admonished us to remember charity and he read from Isaiah 55.

During this service Elder Samuel Gould read to the congregation a revelation he received on November 5, 1988:

Thus saith the Lord, your redeemer, Jesus Christ. Behold, I stand at the door knocking, knocking, ready to come unto thee, O, my people. Harken unto my words with all your hearts in consecrated service. Ye are of one faith, one baptism, and one purpose; united in desire to build up and es-

tablish my Zion. This is pleasing unto me, the judge of all the earth, but ye must give more diligent heed unto my commandments which have been delivered through my servants, that ye may be freed from the bondage of Babylon, that exceeding cunning plan for thy utter destruction. I will be your deliverer if your obedience to my gospel is sustained through mighty prayer out of a broken heart and contrite spirit, that your desire for my return be perfect. Now, I am pleading, pleading, that I may stand in your midst saith the Lord.

Apostle William Sheldon stood and witnessed to the truthfulness of the revelation. Elder LeRoy Wheaton told of a vision he had. He saw Christ would not come into our midst because we were not prepared.

Saturday night many Church members were blessed to hear a special presentation by Priest Brian McIndoo. He gave a sermon dealing with toys, games, and cartoons that can adversely effect our children. He shed light on the subtle, dark influences behind some of the toys and cartoons. We want to give Brother Brian special thanks for his efforts and his willingness to share them with us.

The sweet music of a cello and classical guitar, played by Brother Dan and Sister Manon Lawrence met us as we entered the Town Hall for our sacrament service on Sunday morning.

Apostle William Sheldon was in charge with Apostle Roland Sarratt assisting. Brother Sarratt read Matthew 26:26 and 1 Nephi 6:37,38. He reminded us that the sacrament has no meaning unless we think upon Christ and his sacrifice. After the sacrament was passed, Elder Sam Gould performed the ordinance of the blessing of a baby. The baby was Joshua Sedlack. He is the son of Mike and Nita Sedlack.

We had a full meeting with a season of prayer and eighteen testimonies. Sister Joyce Harris began the testimonies with a beautiful testimony of praise. She thanked everyone for their prayers during her recent bout with cancer. She told us she did not fear death. She feels it will be a joy to meet the Lord when that time comes.

Apostle Robert Jensen gave a similar testimony. He told us that it had been three years since his heart attack. Six times the doctors had thought his life had ended. The Lord has spared him and given him a work to do. The Lord has a work for each of us and we can begin by helping others.

Priest Bob McCubbin shared a testimony of God's miraculous power. His young son once suffered with labored breathing and swelling of the joints. The child was administered to and immediately healed. The theme of many of the testimonies was that though we experience trials we can have the joy of Lord. Each testimony glorified

God and uplifted all who attended the service.

Sunday evening the Independence choir, directed by Sister Martha Bruner, sang a cantata. It was called, "Though None Go With Me, I Too Will Follow." The singing and the message of the piece were beautiful.

Apostle Don McIndoo preached after the choral presentation. The cantata was an appropriate introduction to Brother McIndoo's sermon. He specifically addressed the Church members between the ages of I0 and 30 years old. He challenged them to make a commitment to follow Jesus Christ.

To make this commitment and stick by it you may have to say no to a high paying job that does not leave time for God. You may have to say no to romantic interests if they go against God's laws. Brother McIndoo read from Jacob 3:136-140, and he encouraged us to labor with all our mights.

Brother McIndoo outlined these things that will help the youth build the kingdom of God: 1) pray about your profession, 2) serve others, 3) learn Spanish, 4) pray over every aspect of your life, 5) study the word of God, 6) learn to sacrifice your time and money for God's work.

In closing, he asked young and old alike to serve and sacrifice and be the Church of Christ today.

Our next service was Monday evening. Apostle Robert Jensen was the preacher of the hour. Brother Jensen's sermon dealt with the beauty, the power, and the purpose of the word of God. Some of the scriptures he read that exemplified this were; "... man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God.", "... the word of God is quick and powerful, and sharper than a two edged sword ...", and "... Feast upon the words of Christ ...".

Brother Jensen admonished us to cherish God's word and read it and dwell on it every day. He encouraged us to pray before we study and the Holy Spirit will guide us to truth.

We were also counseled to give heed to revelation. He reminded us of the scripture that says it is upon the rock of revelation the Lord will build his kingdom. Brother Jensen read from the Book of Mormon where we are told not to harden our hearts to revelation. We must be careful not to pray with idols in our hearts.

Brother Jensen ended his sermon by encouraging us to seek to bring forth Zion by studying the scriptures and learning and learning the commandments. We must remember, "This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it." Each day is a gift from God and we must use it wisely.

Tuesday morning, April 4th at 8:00 a.m., we met for a prayer meeting that precedes the morning business session. Elder Ken Oar was in charge with Priest Robert Dewaele assisting. The service was blessed with many heart-felt prayers and testimonies.

Tuesday evening Apostle Roland Sarratt spoke. He began his sermon with this poignant question, "How well do you know Jesus Christ?" Brother Sarratt brought to our attention that we not only need to know about Christ, but we need to know him personally. We need to feel God's Spirit and have it work with us and counsel us. He read from John 17:3-14 and explained that to know Jesus Christ is to know the Father who sent him.

Brother Sarratt offered us hope and opened up these truths: 1) Christ overcame the world, 2) we need to humble ourselves as little children, 3) the Book of Mormon is true, 4) we must lay up treasures in heaven, 5) the most important treasure is love, 6) we must seek God's will and not our own.

Brother Sarratt's sermon was akin to Brother Jensen's. He reminded us that Jesus is the bread of life and that we must look to the scriptures to find truth. In closing, he told us of a dream he had. The dream again made him ask the question, "How well do I know Jesus Christ?" Brother Sarratt told us that we can gain a greater understanding of Jesus Christ by reading and studying his words.

Wednesday at 8:00 a.m. Elder Hubert Yates opened the morning prayer service with Elder Emery Pinder assisting. Brother Yates brought us words of soberness. He spoke of love and our desires to be one body. There were many prayer requests. The service consisted of prayers for those who stood in need, as well as prayers for the Conference.

Wednesday evening the saints gathered for the last service of the 1989 Conference. Apostle Marvin Ely was our preacher. He told us he felt compelled to speak about humility. He rehearsed what Brother Sarratt had said about laying our treasures up in heaven, and that Jesus is the bread of life.

Brother Ely brought to our attention some of the false teachings of our day. There is an emphasis on self, riches, and power. He pointed out that this is not God's way. His way is to be humble and submissive. It is a great challenge to serve the Lord in this trying time, but with God all things are possible.

Brother Ely read from Matthew 18:1-5, 11:29-30, 3 Nephi 5:52. These scriptures stress humility. He also read 3 Nephi 3:10-16 and 2 Timothy 3:1-2. Both these scriptures parallel our day and age. The world is filled with pride, sin and inequality. We cannot be lovers of ourselves and riches and accomplish God's work. Ephesians 5:8 tells us that if we want to serve the Lord we must walk in the light.

In closing, Brother Ely read Ether 5:28, "I give unto men weakness, that they may be humble; and my grace is sufficient for all men that humble themselves before me; for if they humble themselves before me, and have faith in me, then will I make weak things become strong unto them." I know if each of us will do this throughout the coming year, that when we meet for our next Solemn Assembly and Conference the Lord's Spirit will be with us.

A TIME TO CONSIDER AND STUDY ZION

s some of you are aware, a committee to study Zion was organized during the April 1989 Ministers Conference. The purpose of this committee was to study and examine the many spiritual and temporal requirements present which need to be considered before the successful establishment of Zion can take place.

As is evident from what is transpiring in the world today, the establishment of Zion will be absolutely necessary as both a place of refuge and worship. We will need a place to be apart from the world. The society in which we live is becoming increasingly dangerous and unfit. As is indicated in prophecy we can expect the many perils that we are now facing to increase in number and intensity.

Spiritually, we are admonished to seek to bring forth Zion. We need to look to I Nephi 3:187-188 to confirm this, "And blessed are they who shall seek to bring forth Zion at that day, for they shall have the gift and power of the Holy Ghost; and if they endure unto the end, they shall be lifted up at that last day, and shall be saved in the everlasting kingdom of the Lamb."This passage of scripture should be a great incentive for anyone who is discouraged in these last days. What a wonderful promise ... if we endure to the end and are obedient, we shall be saved from the awful destruction about which has been prophesied.

There are numerous scriptures which point toward the establishment of Zion, and there is ample evidence in these passages indicating we should begin studying Zion and

start applying the commandments given 🧲 to us. One source on this subject should be 3 Nephi 9:54, 58-59, "And I will gather my people together as a man gathereth

sheaves unto the floor, for I will make my people with whom the Father hath convenanted, yea, I will make thy horn iron, and I will make thy hoofs brass. . . And behold, this people will I establish in this land unto the fulfilling of the covenant which I made with your father Jacob; and it shall be a new Jerusalem. And the powers of heaven shall be in the midst of this people; yea, even I will be in the midst of you."

One of the ways which the above commandment can be obeyed is to begin studying and preparing for Zion. We first need to look to the scriptures, then approach this matter with a prayerful and discerning attitude. We must learn to apply these commandments to our lives. We will need to have a pure heart and true desire before we can enjoy the benefits of Zion. There will need to be a singleness of purpose in heart and mind.

After consulting the scriptures, we need to explore possible methods of working toward better cooperation. This can be accomplished through sharing our knowledge and skills with those of like-minded beliefs. Some of these skills will include food production and preservation, and the manufacturing of goods for our daily requirements. Another good place to begin would be to establish a storehouse to collect our abundance and share it with those who are not so fortunate. If we begin working towards these goals, a very productive and solid foundation will be laid. I find the thought of acting upon these first steps both challenging and exciting, and I hope others will as well.

Testify to the Truth of the Book

Editor's Note: Due to my own error, last month's "Part Five" in this series was published with a five-word final line accidently cut off. The last full sentence of that article (p. 85) should have read: "Their fellow countrymen called them 'children of the gods.'" Sorry!

Part Six

Zealous Spanish friars certainly did untold damage to our understanding of the American Indian as they methodically destroyed and burned the great libraries of the ancients such as that of Mani, Yucatan. However, this is not to say that there is no written record of the Indian people. Several ancient codices have been preserved and many treatises were written by intelligent Indians who had been educated by Catholic priests who had an interest in history and a regret for the cultural loss of a great civilization. These Indians were instructed to write of their history, traditions, origin and the travels of their people as could best be remembered. Though they wrote in their native languages they used the Spanish script.

One such Indian historian, Ixtlilxochitl, in his book, *Obras Historicas*, stated that the king of Texcoco gathered together all the records of the Toltecs in a "Divine Book" which contained "...the legends of the creation of the world, the emigration from Asia of these peoples, the stops on the journey, the dynasty of their kings, their social and religious institutions...and so on."In another ancient manuscript, this one from the Quiche Maya of Guatemala, the author identifies himself in this manner:" I...first Ahzib Quiche, write here on this paper of the coming of our fathers and grandfathers from the other side of the sea whence the sun rises.

"Bishop Diego de Landa, who bears the responsibility for the destruction of the Mayan libraries, later tried to undo this immense damage by recording himself the history of the Maya as recounted by the Mayan nobles who survived the great purge at Mani. As he listened to accounts from them, similar to those just noted concerning their first migration from across the sea, he wrote in his book, *Relacion de las Cosas de Yucatan*, "If this were true, it must be that all the inhabitants of the Indies are descended from the Jews..." (p.38)

Among the foremost of these ancient documents is one written by an anonymous Indian shortly after the conquest of Guatemala and is called the *Popol Vuh*. This book contains a creation account that is a poetic counterpart to the opening chapters of Genesis:

The surface of the earth had not appeared. There was only the calm sea and the great expanse of the sky. There was only immobility and silence in the darkness, in the night. Only the Creator, the Maker, Tepeu, Gucumatz, the Forefathers, were in the water surrounded with light. Then Tepeu and Gucumatz came together; then they conferred about life and light, what they would do so that there would be light and dawn... Thus let it be done! Let the emptiness be filled! Let the water recede and make a void, let the earth appear and become solid; let it be done! Thus they spoke. Let there be light, let there be dawn in the sky and on the earth. After that they began to talk about the creation and the making of our first mother and father...

This book also carries the story of a great migration of these people, imprinted upon their memory for more than 1500 years.

A final note about the written records of the Indian is of interest to believers in the *Book of Mormon*. Goetz and Morley in their introduction to the *Popol Vuh* cite many references to the chronicles of the Indians. They refer to the early Spanish priest who discovered the *Popol Vuh* and translated it into the Spanish. This man, Father Francisco Ximenez, tells that "...in the province of Peten, to the south of Yucatan, the Spaniards, during the expedition of 1696 against the Itza, found some books written with characters which resembled Hebrew characters..." (p. IO).

ADDENDUM TO THE PUBLISHED TREATISE IN ZION'S ADVOCATE REGARDING THE FALL OF BABYLON

Babylon derives from ancient Babel, meaning confusion, because the Lord confused the language of the nations. So Babylon, modern Babylon, as depicted in Revelation 18, from which we must strenuously seek to free ourselves, is a system of confusion, idolatry, human exaltation and greed, which is leading the nations to economic oppression, a form of slavery.

It is synonymous with the church of the devil as described

in the Book of Mormon (1 Ne 3: 220-222), which is both spiritual and secular; spiritual, because it is motivated by that evil spirit, the devil, and secular, because it is carnal - it is the world. By "world," I mean spiritual degradation, a decline of spiritual values, or the prevalence of carnal desires over holy, spiritual desires; by "world," I mean a lust for power, money and possessions or "things;" in a word, I mean, "mammon" which is worldly riches (Luke 16:13). We cannot serve God and mammon, said the Master. By "world," I mean care for self with but little, if any, care for others.

Babylon must - it will - fall, and mammon be destroyed, the mammon of unrighteousness; therefore the time to begin the exit from Babylon is NOW. Following, I present ten steps as my suggestions for this exit, which is balanced by my ten suggested steps on the road to Zion.

EXIT FROM BABYLON

- 1. Rule out of the mind a belief that other churches are equally acceptable to God as the Church of Christ; that all churches claiming a belief in Christ are in fact His church. Joseph Smith was instructed by the Lord to join none of them, for their creeds were an abomination in His sight.
- 2. If the choice is ours, then refuse to break the Christian sabbath, which is the Lord's day (or Sunday) by indulgence in labors and activities which will not produce rest to the body and mind, or be acceptable as worship of God. Do not thine own pleasure on His holy day (Isaiah 58: 13,14).
- 3. Do not engage in social activities, or pleasures of any sort which, as matters of personal preference and frequent occurrence, separate us from the body of Christ and breaks the bond of fellowship and service to each other.
- 4. Shun association of a personal basis with those who have little or no moral direction in their lives, as judged by the gospel of Christ, except as it may assist them to come up higher.
- 5. Refuse to watch or permit our children to watch suggestive programming of sex on television and the theater; programs of loose moral and marital standards; programs which foster use of alchohol and drugs as acceptable stimulants; programs devoted to violence and bloodshed, even in so-called "cartoons." In a word: Being quite restricted in the viewing of the TV, etc. Many today are not sensitive to loose standards.
- 6. Restriction in literature or music which is immoral or suggestive toward sex, drugs, or the gratification of other carnal desires.
- 7. "But fornication, and all uncleanness, or covetousness, let it not once be named among you, as becometh saints; neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient: but rather giving of thanks. For this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God. Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience." Ephesians 5: 3-6.
- 8. Let fighting by physical or mental force, or by the

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tongue, as a means of conquest be put away.

- 9. Narrowing of financial credit obligations to only essential needs, with the purpose of ultimate elimination.
- 10. If possible, do not trust in stocks, bonds, the interest system in any way, or economic means other than that produced through honest labor of body and mind to sustain your livelihood; and this only with the mental reservation that our real trust must be in God.

ON THE ROAD TO ZION

- 1. "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength." Mark 12:30. The light of the body is the eye (or mind), if, therefore, thine eye be single (fully devoted to God), thy whole body shall be full of light. Matthew 6:22.
- 2. "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Mark 12:31. All things common. 4 Nephi 3, 4, 17-20.
- 3. Love your enemies. Matthew 5:43-48. Forgiveness. Colossians 3:12,13. Forgiveness is the fragrance the violet sheds on the heel that has crushed it.
- 4. Consecration. Read hymn 175, verse 3 (Zion's Hymnal). Sacrifice. Joseph Smith said:

Let us here observe that a religion that does not require the sacrifice of all things never has power to produce faith necessary unto life and salvation; for, from the first existence of man, the faith necessary unto the enjoyment of life and salvation never could be obtained, without the sacrifice of all earthly things. It was through this sacrifice, and this only, that Cod has ordained that men should enjoy eternal life; and it is through the medium of the sacrifice of all earthly things that men do actually know that they are doing the things that are well pleasing in the sight of God. When a man has offered in sacrifice all that he has for the truth's sake, not even withholding his life, and believing before God that he has been called to make this sacrifice because he seeks to do his will, he does know, most assuredly, that God does and will accept his sacrifice and offering, and that he has not, nor will not seek His face in vain.

- 5. Pay tithes and offerings (Malachi 3:7-12); reaffirmed by Christ to the Nephites in 3 Nephi 11:10-15.
- 6. Possess humility (no self-exultation); not proud; unpretentious (1 Peter 5:5-7). Meekness (Numbers 12:3; Matthew 11:29-30). Signifies obedience, a yielding of the will (read Helamen 2:29-31).
- 7. Fast (Isaiah 58:6-12) and pray (2 Nephi 14: 11, 12, and Alma 16:219-222)
- 8. Service to God (3 Nephi 11: 17-21) and to man (Mosiah 2: 43, 44).
- 9. Visit and pray for the sick (Alma 16: 223-224), the

widows and orphans (James 1: 27).

10. Covet faith, hope and charity until filled (Moroni 7: 35, 45-53). Charity is the pure love of Christ. By it, we die to self: self-will, self-expression of importance, self-reliance of ability (or independence from God). Awake, awake; put on thy strength, O Zion ... Isaiah 52: 1. What is the strength of Zion? Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee. Trust ye in the Lord forever: For in the Lord Jehovah is everlasting strength (margin: the Rock of Ages). Isaiah 26: 3, 4.


Tri-State Reunion

REFORM VERSUS TRADITION

From the late 1950s through the 1970s a noticeable change took place in the United States, and possibly other nations, which has effected the way people think. An attitude of rejecting the established or commonly accepted way of life suddenly appeared almost as a planned reformation. A person who felt to assert himself/herself seemed to have an unquestionable right to challenge any claim of an absolute.

Speaking one's mind on a given subject became more than just a right; it was often regarded as one's duty. There was a deliberate disregard of authority and "the establishment." Casual opinion challenged conventional knowledge and experience. The former generation (1920s through 1940s) of which I am a part, was raised in quite a different atmosphere. The old school of thought and practice was that children were to be seen and not heard; they were not to speak unless spoken to. A distasteful experience for our parents and grandparents was the interruption of adult conversation so "little Johnny" could express his views on the topic of discussion.

Admittedly, there has been certain merit in breaking with the old ways of the past especially when people had become subjected to incorrect traditional thinking. It is very easy for people to become settled into the way of life in which they have been raised without any motivation to question the validity of what they were taught. In that

consideration reform seemed necessary for growth. But our unfortunate reform brought radical rejection without a true sense of direction, leaving our young to "do their own thing" without proper guidance. Many of Our moral standards were considered foolish and unnecessary, and most efforts to defend them were ignored by the reformists.

In retrospect, this nation has more recently begun to judge its misguided actions of reform and it is recognizing the need for legal and moral restraints to be reinstituted in our society. How utterly pathetic are the ways of man! He arrives at the end of an over-emphasized cause and wakes up to discover that he is the victim of his own folly! The "little Johnnys" are now leading us in an open forum society. The expressed opinion of the man on the street, talk shows, counsellors probing their patients to unleash their pent-up feelings and employers inviting their employees to speak their minds about their jobs, are among some of the more noticeable changes in our society today. Of course all of these have merit and can be considered to be major improvements.

The fact still remains, however, that, as a people, we still don't seem to know where we are going and by whom we are being led. Are we learning some valuable lessons? Are we establishing recognizable standards or guidelines which we can look to in the future? Do we have worthwhile goals that we can confidently strive to accomplish?

Or are we yet uncertain about anything that has a claim to be absolute? Do we merely find comfort in expressing our frustrations without actually experiencing the cure of frustration? Are we allowing ourselves to be guided into a world of relativism with never-ending open ends and no stable conclusions by which we might judge a thing to be right or wrong? Are we, as Paul prophesied, "Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth"?
