Understanding Yucatan

The title is a little deceptive because we are still trying to understand Yucatan. We work in Yucatan with a people that are culturally different from their brothers and sisters in the United States. In this article I will try to explain some of what little I know about Yucatan and its people, I will use the description of an inauguration service that Brother Don McIndoo and I attended in November of 1989.

Our goal is to make us one fold with one shepherd. Many of the things that occur there in Yucatan would never happen in one of our services here in the States. They would not understand many of the things that we do in every day life. Some examples would be vacations, honeymoons, purchasing car insurance, dining out often, keeping food cold in a refrigerator, flying to a reunion, buying a book whenever you want, going to a shopping mall, saving for a college education, and maybe the most important, the ability to determine our own lot in day-today life. People in the United States are accustomed to controlling their lives and their environment. There are still people living in Yucatan that were born and worked in slavery. When we are cold we push a button, add a log to the fire, or put on more clothes. When they get cold their options are always fewer, sometimes they're just cold.

Let's begin our adventure into a Mayan church service.

A Church of Christ Service in Yucatan:

he day is Saturday the 8th of November, 1989. The place is Kancabchen (kon-cob-chain), Yucatan, Mexico. The service is the inauguration of the new church building. Don and I were asked to pose for pictures in front of the church building at 7:45 p.m. Pictures of their special events are very important to them. We find ourselves posing often at weddings, special birthday celebrations, and inaugurations. The building had not been used before this

night even though it was finished a few days before.

The brothers asked Don to cut the ribbon on the walkway in front of the church. Then more than 125 people from four locals - Kancabchen, Motul, Kopte, and Yobain - all walked into the

building double file singing the Spanish version of "America" accompanied by 3 guitarists.

The service began with a prayer by the pastor and the singing of Song #92 in the Spanish hymnal (# 276, Zion's Hymnal). We then listened to two specials from the Motul group. That was followed by "una Lectura" or a scripture reading: Psalms 78: 1-9. In Mexico the custom is for the entire congregation to read the Lectura aloud in unison. Next we listened to two more songs sung by 4 children from Motul, ages 8-10. They were accompanied by three guitarists and one young man 12 years of age using a maraca to keep time. I call him a young man because he is no longer able to go to school due to his family's financial condition and, therefore, works now with his father cutting henequen, a type of yucca used in making burlap and hemp.

I am sure you are wondering about the maraca. Most of the churches do not use this type of instrument, but we have one that does. One of our greatest needs is in the area of music. I am no help in this area and Don does not have time with everything else that he is teaching. They have asked that someone from the church in the United States come and teach them how to read music and play their instruments with greater skill. Perhaps someone will

> be able to do that some day. It would be easier, however, to send some ambitious young person that lives there to music school.

Next on the "programa," I was asked to say a prayer for the infirm and the afflicted. I prayed in English. The "programa" is a list of activities that the pastor writes at the beginning of each service that tells them what is going to happen next. This is quite honestly something that we would like to see changed to allow more for the leading of the Spirit.

We then listened to two special songs. Five girls, ages 13-16, from Kancabchen sang two songs. Four of them were dressed in matching outfits: black skirts, peach blouses, and black neck ties. The other wore a glossy red dress and a large pink bow in her hair. This was followed by two more specials, one by the pastor's oldest daughter (age 13) and the other by his younger daughter (age 9). Then the pastor and his wife sang "Jesus Loves Me" from a notebook. Everyone in our church in Mexico uses these notebooks to copy down songs that they like. You will often see them copy a song from someone else's notebook. His wife wore the traditional Mayan camisa, or shirt, that really is a long dress. It was embroidered around the neck and the hemline with orange flowers. The pastor (Jeremias) read a dedication prayer that his son had written down for him.

Jeremias had read from a few books and found some thoughts that he liked and asked his son to write them down for him. Education is a luxury. Most of the men that have the burden of the work in Mexico have little or none: Jeremias had less than a year of formal schooling so his son, who is now in high school, helps him. The people that we rely on have Earned their learning from determination and hard work. We have men in our little church that can match wits with the most knowledgeable of preachers or write poetry and song worthy of publication and they have one year or less of formal education. However, there is a new generation of young adults assisting now in the church. Many of these have high school educations.

Still, when they talk of their knowledge, which is admittedly lacking, they express their shame. Do not feel too badly for them because many of them are hungry for knowledge now that they have had a taste of it. I believe there were conditions like this when Abraham Lincoln was a boy. Often, great things are produced from deprivation. A brother named Evelio made a little speech of gratitude to God for His help, and to the brothers and sisters in the U.S.A. for the help that they gave toward the construction of this building.

The pastor opened the service up for any volunteer specials. Isidro from Motul came forward and sang. The song was very well liked so every one sang with him.

They took up a volunteer offering next. We always keep a pocket full of change for this. 200 to 1000 pesos is a normal offering for them. We are careful to make our offerings look like theirs. 200 pesos was worth about 7.6 cents in U.S. currency on November 4, 1989.

Another of their problems is the economy. Jobs are scarce. The parks are always filled at almost any hour of the day except for the very early morning hours with men, young and old, just standing around talking. This contributes to a high percentage of alcoholism in Mexico. We dodge drunks in the streets nearly everyday but especially on the weekends.

The four girls from Kancabchen that were dressed alike sang another pretty song with two guitars in accompaniment. There were two men standing in the front of the church against the wall during all of this. One is a member and one was not. In many of the churches here you might see this. One, two, ten or more men standing in front like that. I do not know why, I can only guess that it is a reflection of their culture. Men at the head of the tribe, a desire to be seen or be in some sort of a position of importance. If that is the case then they are not much different from men anywhere, it is just more obvious. I would not be doing them justice if I did not say that often there is no place to sit, as was the case on this night. Perhaps that is the reason for this behavior. After this song the treasurer was invited to ask for a blessing on the offering.

The pastor then rose to make the announcements for the week. Afterward, at 9:14 p.m., Don was introduced as the speaker for the evening. Not to be rude, but while Don is getting warmed up I would like to describe the church building. You would not be able to understand his sermon anyway as it is in Spanish.

There are 9 rows of chairs. 12 chairs to a row and 6 to a side with an aisle in the middle. Don has in front of him a flat table painted blue to rest his books on. There is a white cloth embroidered with pretty flowers draped over the front of this table. The floor is covered with concrete tiles. Some are green flowers on a green background and others are blue flowers on a white background. The walls and ceiling are stucco painted white. Above the podium is a white paper lace work hanging across the width of the church. Over the heads of the congregation are 18 strings of multicolored craft paper flowers slid on individually between plastic straws cut in half. On the wall between each end of these are

draped more flowered strings. There are two metal-framed louver windows without screens on each side of the church. There is a double metal door at the front and a single metal door at the rear. The windows are 1 meter square and each door is 1 meter wide and 2 meters high. They are all painted blue. There are 2 fluorescent single tube light fixtures each 4 feet long mounted on the ceil-

ing, one in the center rear and one in the center front.

Now back at the pulpit, Don reads #15 from the Articles of Faith and Practice. He explains our present problem with a shortage of ministry and also tells them that the pastors and general church officials do not have the power to command the congregation.

He then read Article #14 and Matthew 28:18 and admonished them to spread the gospel. He referred to the pastor's prayer of dedication in which he prayed that this house would be used for that purpose. Colossians 4:2-3 was read and Don stopped to shake off a moth that perched on his glasses. He read Matthew 9:36-38 and then admonished them to pray that the Lord would soon send more laborers in Yucatan. 3 Nephi 5:61-63 was used in closing (page 636 in the English version and page 646 in the Spanish version). Don announced the reunion in Merida to be held the next day and invited everyone to attend. It is Yucatan's first reunion. The time is now 9:52 p.m.

We sang #67 (301 in the Zion's Hymnal), however, there are no notes in the Spanish hymnal, and few can read music as I said. They all

memorize the tunes when they are young. Three guitarists are playing, two in front and one in the first row. Jeremias offers the last prayer. It is now 10:02 p.m.

Many of the services we attend are very similar to this one. I hope that you were able to see differences. Some are obvious and others are quite subtle. I have come to realize that some of what we do here in the States is based purely on custom. What we would call proper they would call improper and vice-versa. This is not to say custom is wrong, only that it is important to know when it is God's way or just a custom.

Youth Camp Memories

Yes, it's true I've been short sheeted again. Stranger yet, pine cones and leaves are stuffed in my sleeping bag. Of course I've been on the other end of the pranks and pulled many a trick from my bag for campfire skits.

It's really a help to be a little crazy and yet flexible enough to know when to move from silly songs to serious singing.

I spent seven years as a camper and about twenty-five as a campfire director, W.S.I. waterfront director, and camp director, and I've enjoyed all of it and learned many spiritual values. After leaving the RLDS Church and joining The Church of Christ I greatly missed and longed for those fun filled days of camp and the spiritual heights, which increased my faith in the Lord. So I'm thrilled to be part of this years Camp Challenge.

I want to also share the fact that I made many wonderful friends, and one of them is now my husband and it's a blessing that we share the same faith in Christ.

Several years ago while I was leading a campfire at a Junior Camp in Illinois, it began to rain as we were starting into the spiritual songs. I stopped for a minute or two an ask

the young people if they would rather finish our campfire indoors or if they would like to exercise their faith in God and pray that the rain would be stopped, so we might finish our campfire there. They all agreed we would pray. Before the "Amen" was said the rain stopped. We finished our campfire on a very spiritual high. It was the faith of the youth and the power and love of our heavenly father that brought about such a miracle.

I am thankful for the many rich blessings I have received through my youth camp experience.

A TIME FOR PREPARATION FOR ZION

e are living in the time of the end just before the return of the Lord Jesus. Let us, therefore, walk in preparation for the time when the Lord's people must be gathered together in that Zionic era which shall be a sacred covert for them. Consider a few of the many scriptural passages that contain a focus on our generation.

"Blow ye the trumpet in Zion, and sound an alarm in my holy mountain; let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the Lord cometh, for it is nigh at hand;" (Joel 2:1)

"So shall they fear the name of the Lord from the west, and his glory from the rising of the sun. When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him. And the Redeemer shall come to Zion, and unto them that turn from transgression in Jacob, saith the Lord." (Isaiah 59:19-20)

"Therefore my people shall know my name; therefore they shall know in that day that I am he that doth speak; behold, it is I. How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace; that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation; that saith unto Zion, Thy God reigneth!" There is an inherent physiological and psychological mechanism within each of us divinely designed that will bring an unparalleled satisfaction and pleasure from producing something with our own hands for our own or another's supportive use. Confirmation of the thrill in such a delightful experience only awaits application of our thoughtful effort to that end.

A GIFT WRAPPED IN AFFECTION

Teresa Emidelfi, known to her friends as Emi (pronounced as Amy), is a young woman of 20, newly married to a young minister of the Church of Christ named Placido Kovoc. She comes from a Catholic background and her parents were strongly opposed to her relationship with the Church of Christ. Shortly after her marriage her mother sought the assistance of a sorcerer to break up the relationship. Thus began a series of dark and terrifying experiences for this young couple. They and the family began to fast and pray to the Lord. Many of our brethren here joined them in their appeal for Divine assistance at the time of the Phoenix Reunion. This is her testimony of what followed:

Dear brothers and sisters, please receive a cordial greeting on my part. It is a pleasure for me to share my testimony with you.

For some time I had been bothered with doubts and disturbing spiritual problems. Then, one day, I had a vision during a communion service. I saw a viper which was climbing rapidly toward the pulpit and upon seeing it I began to cry out, but Placido told me to have no fears. Slowly I drew near the deadly snake and I stepped upon its head. Then I saw that the viper began to dissipate until it disappeared completely.

After this experience I found myself with many doubts for I had never had a vision nor even thought to have one some day; moreover, I asked myself, "What could be the reason for such a vision and what did it signify?" I talked to my husband about the vision and he explained to me that this vision was very important to my life. He told me that the viper which I saw signified my spiritual problems and now that I saw these problems which I was having, they could be resolved. As I saw the

snake dissipating, even to its disappearance, even so could my problems be resolved.

Several days later I had a dream, I dreamed I saw a beautiful church. Raising my eyes to the sky, I saw the heavens open and there appeared a very white hand, and with one finger it was writing in brilliant, golden letters the following words: "Go into all the world and teach the gospel to all men." "The Church of Christ"

After these last words were written I heard a voice which told me. "Be baptized! If you do so all your family shall be blessed and someday you will have to share with others this dream." This same dream was given to me several times. perhaps because I had doubted the reality of my experience in the beginning, but then I made the decision to do what this person had told me. From that moment Placido

and I were

fasting and praying that God would help me in this decision which I had made. Several days later. I had another dream in which I found myself on the beach with a person dressed in white, but I was not able to see his face. He was baptizing another person also dressed in white and I knew it was Jesus he was baptizing. Then I saw the same individual was baptizing me. As always, I discussed my dream with Placido and he told me that with this dream Jesus was teaching me that baptism is a commandment of God, showing me that Jesus had to be baptized in order to teach us the way. This dream served to reaffirm my decision.

A few days later I had another dream in which I saw myself wandering alone in a desert where there were many dangers. Finally, I arrived at a place where there was a house.

In the entrance I met a person dressed in white and, as before, I could not see his face. He told me that this was the punishment that awaited me unless I obeyed, and I began to beg him not to punish me. He answered that he loved me much and would not punish those who were obedient. Then I felt something very rare had come to pass in my life. I felt as if I might have known real happiness for the first time. At this time Placido and I were carried to a very beautiful place: It was like a gar-

red and someday e with this en red and someday be ours.

Following this beautiful dream I was praying often to God that He would help me and show me the day when I was prepared to be baptized. The Lord let me know that the day was to be the following day, January 21, 1990, but because of some problems I was not able to be baptized until several days after this.

During my baptism I prayed to God that I would always be faithful to my covenant. When we came out of the water we all knelt in the sand on the beach. Placido offered the closing prayer for the covenant I had made. In this moment I had a vision. First I heard a very strange noise like thunder. This noise was heard as well by one of the sisters who accompanied us. Upon hearing the noise I opened my eyes and saw the Lord standing over the waters and He was blessing me.

THE LORD JESUS CHRIST WAS HERE

Prologue: Roger Can is an Elder under General Church appointment. He is the Pastor of an active church in Motul, Yucatan, and ministers to three other congregations where they have no resident ministry. This means he must travel by bus or crowded taxi about twenty times each month. Roger has been sorely afflicted with spurs that have grown on several vertebrae and is in constant pain, especially when he must travel. This is his testimony:

I would like to bear witness of a dream I had on December 14, 1989. Being in my bed at 2:00 A.M., I saw the wall of my home open near my bed. The room began to brighten with a glowing light until it was brighter than the sun at noonday. I saw an extremely white cloud and from this cloud I heard the sweetest voice which told me,

"Be at peace, for you shall soon be healed; just trust me." "Lord," I said, "I have always trusted in Thee." "Your ailment," came the voice, "shall soon depart. Continue in my work, and fear not, for I am with you." I said, "Lord, I thank Thee. I believe in Thee. Forgive me my faults and sins. I am not worthy to see Thee, nor hear Thy voice."

In this moment, when I awakened, it was 2:00 A.M. and my wife awoke also. She told me, "The Lord, Jesus Christ was here. I heard what He told you and I saw the bright light and the white cloud from which the words came." We began to pray and give thanks to the Lord for all He had

done for us, because my wife also was suffering an ailment in her back as was I, and in that moment we no longer had the affliction and are free from it until this day.

We bear testimony that the Lord, Jesus Christ, is with us wherever we may be. This same sweet voice spoke to me twelve years ago when I was in the hospital. My appendix had ruptured. Before the doctors operated, the ruptured appendix poured its venom over my intestines and I was overcome almost to death. The doctors said that it would be better to carry me to my home for there was no cure for such a case - - no one could be saved in such a condition, but my wife did not wish to take me home and told the doctor, "I know that you are able to cure him because God is with us."

This doctor told the other doctors to leave me in the hospital and that he was going to operate again and they again operated upon me. On this same day Brother Leon Yates with Brother Donald McIndoo came to my bed and prayed for me. In that night I saw a vision and I heard the voice of the Lord, Jesus Christ, for the first time. He spoke almost the same words with a voice so sweet and full of love.

And now I write this as the testimony of my life that the Lord, Jesus Christ, fulfills His promise to heal the sick. I testify of what He has done for me in my life and my wife is a witness as well.

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Testimony of the American Indian and the Stick of Joseph

According to the Book of Mormon, Christ, when he made his appearance, came to the temple in Bountiful. The Book of Mormon also records that the land Bountiful was an important geographical area to the Nephite nation. In addition to this we are told that there were two Bountiful lands - the one on the coast of Arabia where Nephi and his brethren embarked for the New World and the one here in America not far from Land Zarahemla. Are there any traditions among the Indians of America to substantiate this account of the Book of Mormon? And did the bearded white God come to a land known as bountiful when He made His visit to them?

"Quetzalcoatl was esteemed and loved as God and he was adored in the old times in Tula" (Bernardino de Sahagun, Historia de Las Cosas de Nueva Espana, Libro 10, Capitula 29, sec. 1 and Libro 3, Capitula 3, cited in Hunter, Christ in Ancient America, p. 27).

"This Quetzalcoatl, according to true histories, was the Great Priest of the city of Tula..." (Juan de Torquemada, Monarquia Indiana, vol. 2, pp. 40-50 (1723), cited in Hunter, Christ in Ancient America, p. 29).

Hunter and Ferguson in their book, entitled, "Ancient America and the Book of Mormon", pp. 149-153 tell us that, according to lxtlilxochitl, the headquarters of his ancestors in 132 B.C. was Huehuetlapallan. Hunter and Ferguson go on to say that Huehuetlapallan means "ancient Bountiful land." Huehue (from the Nahua tongue) means "old, old" or "ancient" and according to Professor Marcos E. Bercerra of the Mexican Society of Geography (in his book)

on the native geographical names of the state of Chiapas, Huehue-tlan means "bountiful place of the ancients." He goes on to show that many of the place names of Chiapas include the important name Tula or Tulan or Tlan, meaning "bountiful" or "abounding."

Bernardino de Sahagun in reference to ancient Tulan states that it was called Tullan meaning place of fertility and abundance.

According to H. DeCharencey the root "Tul" means "abundance, excess," and that the Maya term Tutul is a double "Tul" (or Tul-tul). This double use of the term makes it plural in the same way that Hue-hue "old-old," means "ancient" or "very old." Titul is Mayan for "very bountiful."

Tlapallan sometimes appears as Tulapan meaning "Bountiful-land Capital."

Heuhuetlapallan is a shortening of the term Huehue-tule-pallan meaning ancient bountiful land capital.

Also of interest to us is the Maya place name of Tutul-xiu which according to Hunter and Ferguson (ibid., p. 151) was also applied to the ancient "seat of the kingdom."

Tultul we have already learned is the double or plural form of the word "Tul" (as in Tula) meaning "abundance, excess." The new Mayan element here, "xiu" means "herbs" or plants." Tultul-xiu thus means "Bountiful-plantland" or "abounding in herbs."

Brasseur de Bourbourg in his writings pointed out that "the petticoat men," of the Tabasco-Chiapas region of southern Mexico called Tula, their capital city, "Great City of Herbs."

Hunter and Ferguson point out that Zarahemla is composed of two Hebrew terms, "Zara" and "Hemullah" meaning "Bountiful plant land" or Abounding, overflowing, with seed plants or grain." Zara means "grains" or "seed" or "plant" and Hemla (short for Hemullah) means "fully," "overflowing," "abundance" or "bountiful" (ibid., p. 151-152).

Garcilasso de la Vega, who was the son of an Inca royal mother and a titled Spanish father, makes the statement that the Incas called maise sara. (See Royal Commentaries of the Ynca (1600), 1869 edition, edited and translated by Sir Clements R. Markham, vol. 1, pp. 49, 189, cited in Hunter and Ferguson, ibid. p. 152).

According to the Book of Mormon there were two Bountiful lands, one in the old world, and one in the new world. Consider the following remarkable quotations.

"Thus, then, we were four families who arrived at Tulan, we the Cakchiquel people, oh, our sons! So they told us.

"'From four (places) the people came to Tulan. In the east is one Tulan; another in Xibalbay; another in the west, from there we came ourselves, from the west; and another is where God is. Therefore, there were four Tulans, oh, our sons!' So they said 'FROM THE WEST WE CAME TO TULAN, FROM ACROSS THE SEA; AND IT WAS AT TULAN WHERE WE ARRIVED, to be engendered and brought forth by our mothers and our fathers.' So they told us.

"This passage is sometimes interpreted as meaning that there were of old four places called Tulan. Omitting the Tula where God is and the Tula of Xibalbay, the dominions of Heaven and Hell, would leave two centers from which the Meso-American races originated. Historical documents, nevertheless, mention only one city of this name" (Footnote, The Annals of the Cakchiquels, p. 44-45).

There were two earthly Tulas, one in the west from whence they came and one in the east. There was only one city of Tula because no city was built in the Bountiful land of the coast of Arabia.

ALBERT VIRGIL RUDD

Albert Virgil Rudd, Sr., was born March 3, 1906, in Independence, Mo., where he resided throughout his entire life of 84 years and 24 days. He passed from this life on March 27, 1990, at the Independence Regional Health Center.

His parents, Joseph and Alice Rudd, three brothers and two sisters preceded him in death. In 1930, he was united in marriage to Silva Jane Bressie and they celebrated 55 years of marriage before she passed away 5 years ago. To this union, was born one son, Albert Virgil Rudd, Jr.

He entered the waters of baptism, taking upon him the name of Christ, in October, 1950. He was confirmed a member of the body of Christ, becoming a member of the Church of Christ, Temple Lot. He remained a faithful member of the Temple Lot local congregation throughout his life. He worked as a tool crib and machine operator for the Allis-Chalmers Co. for 25 years, retiring in 1966. Earlier, he was a milker for dairies in the area. He also worked for the Gas Service Company for several years. He was a member of

the United Steel Workers Union.

Brother Rudd enjoyed carpenter work, and in his spare time, built his own home, and assisted his son, Virgil, in building his two homes. He was a quiet man, who enjoyed his family and the simple things of life, such as gardening, camping and fishing.

He was always quick to assist those in need with his substance, and helping when needed in providing transportation and doing home repairs for the elderly of the Church and many others.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his son, Albert Virgil Rudd, Jr. and his daughter-in-law, Grace; a grandson, David V. Rudd and wife, Becky; a granddaughter, Denise (Rudd) Evans and husband, Greg, and three great granddaughters, Courtney and Lindsey Rudd, and Ashley Evans, and many other relatives and friends.

Services were held on March 29, 1990, at the Speaks Midtown Chapel, with Elders Leslie P. Case and C. Leroy Wheaton, Jr. in charge. Music was provided by Sr. Mary Lois Bryant, organist, and a quartet, composed of his grandchildren, who lovingly sang "Near to the Heart of God" and "Beyond the Sunset." Burial was in Woodlawn Cemetery, in Independence, Missouri.
