

Let's "Simply" Do it Together

aving been asked to write an editorial concerning the building and progress of our General Church Headquarters

Editorial . . .

Building and Temple Lot Local I have prayed for guidance and considered with man's intellect. limited as mine happens to be! The phrase, "complexity

is of our making simplicity is of God" has been impressed on my mind. Complexity and Simplicity. How does man make plans complex or complicated?

There are plans to be made: architects drawings, fire and safety guide lines, building permits, materials to be ordered, workers to be paid, bills to be paid and money to be raised. These are steps to be followed and hurdles to be scaled in the building process. These may seem complex or complicated but are necessary and are not of our individual making.

God has set each of us within this body of Christ as it has pleased him (I Corinthians 12:12-27). We each have responsibilities, works to perform and talents to use serving God and our fellow man. As members of the body we are individuals with our own opinions, likes, preferences and choices. But when the body moves under the direction of God or has chosen by the voice of the people, each member's opinions, likes and preferences should be secondary to the body. If we shirk our responsibilities, allow others to perform our work, or hide our talents we choose complexity not simplicity.

I am not advocating that you or I blindly follow man but that we earnestly seek to build God's Kingdom. This is an opportunity to physically work together as one, to

spiritually draw closer to each other but more importantly draw closer to God. Each member contributing of their God given talents, being led not of self but of God.

> I believe God views the inner person. Our desires which may not be readily apparent to those around us

are very much before our Heavenly Father. God has an eye to the heart of the giver more than to the value of the gift! We view the gift, even sometimes the giver, and judge. But not righteously! Our intentions to help sometimes become excuses why we are not able to help. If it were not for my family, business, health, financial distress, lack of time, etc. I would be there to help. God knows the intent of the heart;

would or would not, can or cannot, should or should not. God knows the love we have for Him and others. We sometimes are able to discern inner love but God knows. If our desires, intentions and love are not right before God: If we do not

serve Him with all our heart, mind, soul and strength; if we do not love others as we love ourselves are we not choosing complexity over simplicity?

Losing our old church building, the comfort, memories, customs and traditions established there was a shock to all. To those who worked within its walls day after day, to those who met there each Sunday, to

those baptized within its shadow, to those who met there Conference Time, to each member of the Church of Christ, to friends of the Restoration and to strangers there was a sudden lose. Each shared that loss! As we begin to build again I pray and hope each will share and take part in rebuilding, The Book of Mormon states, "there must needs be an opposition in all things". Brothers, Sisters and friends let the opposition come from without and not from within our circle of friends and this Body of Christ. Choose that complexity stay without, with the opposi-

and testimony service, we find that one anothers prayers or testimonies are similar to a problem in our life and that this, collectively, can provide us the guidance and direction to resolving a particular problem that we have been contemplating and praying about.

I have come to the realization that God uses each of us in various ways to fulfill His purpose. It is, therefore, imperative that each of us constantly strive to make ourselves available for His direction and that we listen and allow ourselves to be used for His service.

Most Church documents, books, equipment, etc., were salvaged by the efforts of the local fire department and volunteers. This was accomplished in spite of the fact that

essential to you and you are essential to me." Each of us are essential in God's plan. As we go forward with our building project many items are still unanswered. However, it seems that each time it appears that we can't continue or we are unable to reach an agreement as to the required action, we have been blessed with the Lord's help.

Within only two to three months after the fire we had a proposed plan and budget to present at the April 1990 conference so that we might be able to proceed with the building. This plan and budget was approved

by an overwhelming majority of the members present. Since that time, detailed plans have been agreed upon and the final drawings are in process. The City of Independence Planning Board and The City Common Council have approved our site plans. For those of our readers who have had previous ex-


perience with this type of activity, you can most certainly realize that we have been blessed and have received prompt answers to many of our united prayer efforts on behalf of this project.

Although a budget was approved at the April Conference it is necessary that additional funds be raised in order to meet the budget. Through the individual and collective efforts of members and friends, funds are becoming available. To date we have \$247,000 in the

Historical Perspective ...

Concerns from the Last Time a Building was Erected on This Lot

From Volume 2, Number 2, March, 1900, issue of Searchlight (an early Church of Christ publication)

The first building to be erected on this lot was built in 1889, and destroyed in 1898 by fire. The second building to be erected was dedicated in 1902, and was burned to the ground on January 1, 1990.

FINISH OUR BUILDING

p. 54:

It is sincerely hoped that sufficient means will be raised at the coming conference to finish the Temple Lot building.

Remarkable progress has been made considering the financial ability of our people. We have no debt hanging over the building, and do not owe a cent on it nor the grounds. It has taken sacrifice to do this much and will take more sacrifice to complete the building; yet not so much but what it can be accomplished by our own people. All that now remains to do can be finished for less than \$300, we believe.

Let our people come to conference prepared to take the needed steps that shall insure the completion of this building, for the Lord undoubtedly has other work ahead of us; for if you remember, the building we are now occupying was to be built as preparatory for something else. It will not take a very long nor deep consideration to determine what that "something else" is, and when one realizes the possibilities that are now lying before us it should cause his heart to leap and his blood to tingle.

Do not let these golden opportunities pass, but be fully awake to the princely heritage that now belongs to the people of God and be ready to improve the chances that God seems to be throwing in our way.



The type, cases, etc, used some time past for the SEARCHLIGHT, have been moved into the west room on the ground floor of our new building, and doubtless the next paper printed by the Church of Christ will be issued from the Temple Lot. All we lack now is a press suitable to print on, and when that is obtained we will be very well equipped for printing a small paper.

It is not the purpose of our people to attempt the publication of anything elaborate in the way of a paper, but rather to print a small sheet and endeavor to make it as interesting as our limited abilities will allow. We feel sure that some day and perhaps not very far into the future, a paper will be printed and go forth from the Temple Lot that will bear glad tidings to many souls who have long fed upon hope. Of course we hope to be among the number who shall control and direct such a publication, yet willing to help hold up the hands of others should God choose to so direct.

It is hoped that sufficient money will be raised at the coming conference to finish the entire interior, which, when completed, will give us a building admirably adapted to our needs.


The Lord Can Turn a Trial Into a Blessing

he building of a new structure at the Temple Lot is a subject of much concern throughout the Church of Christ. And well it should be. The undertaking of such a project should not be entered into carelessly or without prayerfully seeking the Lord's guidance.

As we all know, the necessity of making such plans came upon us suddenly by the destruction of our

old building by fire. No one was fully prepared for such a tragedy except the Lord, and He guided the hands of some to prevent even greater loss. Therefore with the confidence that the Lord is with us we have



For the first six months of this year (1990) the Church of Christ has met a trial unlike anything most of us have experienced in our generation. The church has been without an official place to meet the public. This has always been an important aspect of our church activities inasmuch as we have a special message to present to the world and particularly to other "restoration" peoples.

Our presence at that "spot" of ground is necessary in the defense

of the truth as has been revealed to us by the word of the Lord. We are His stewards and caretakers of the designated place of His temple. Such a responsibility should not be taken lightly nor unwillingly.

Another part of this trial has been the necessary displacement of the Temple Lot Local Church whose presence at that location has played an important part in meeting the world with the fullness of the gospel for many years. The dispersion of general church offices and records

> into our various homes has been a great concern and inconvenience as well. We can say that the total effect of this tragic event has been somewhat detrimental to the gospel work.

However we have learned from experience that the Lord can turn a trial into a blessing in the end. This is our hope, that we will soon be able to resume our rightful place in the community and that we will have a building even more adequate to our needs than before. More im-

portant than that however is the hope that through the attention we have received as a result of the unfortunate loss that we will be able to shed our light to this community and to the world with greater effect. Our determination to not let this loss deter us in this gospel work is indeed a light to others.

We are aware that the Lord has already blessed us and compensated for much of our loss. He has shown His hand in the preservation of our lives and the church records. He has given us a sense of direction and a course of action to take. Our view of the future is generally optimistic in that we know that the Lord is watching over us.

Lest we forget too quickly let us remember that we are facing destructive forces today just as in times of old that can come against us in varied ways. We are subject to confront both physical and spiritual powers that threaten us with acts of violence or influence us deceptively. Our efforts to reestablish ourselves on that property will only be possible with the help of the Lord. It behooves us to be prayerful over every act we make in that effort.

The building of a structure is not in any sense equal to the saving of souls, but for the purpose of having an official presence in the community as we have been afforded in years past, a building for church business and church activities seems necessary.

Although this is not the most important function or act of the church, it is nonetheless important enough for us to seek the Lord for His continual guidance and His protection over this project from beginning to end. Also it is an honorable and worthy cause for the church to unitedly pursue. Perhaps little needs to be said in this regard as voluntary efforts and support has come from all over both from within and from without the church. Already the Lord has touched many hearts for this cause.

As we rally round this worthy cause let us remember to keep our personal ambitions and wants in check that the building may reflect the sacredness and simplicity that would be compatible to the Lord's purposes. We are not to compete with other churches nor pattern ourselves after them. Modern conveniences and adornments are not necessarily practical for long range plans.

Dedication and sacrifice in this project is only a small part of what the Lord's people will experience in the future.

Temple Lot Church To Break Ground

Excerpts from a news release given to local press:

The Church of Christ "Temple Lot" will have a ground-breaking ceremony on Saturday, August 18th, on the familiar Temple Lot property at the southwest corner of River and Lexington streets in Independence, Missouri. The service is to be held at 10:00 a.m. and will be conducted by Robert H. Jensen of the Council of Apostles, from Bellevue, Nebraska. William A Sheldon, who is Secretary of the Council, and Lesley P. Case, who is Secretary of the General Bishopric, will break ground. These two officials are from the greater Kansas City area.

The new building, which is ex-

pected to be started in September, will be the General Church's head-quarters, and will also serve the needs of the local congregation as before. The former building had 3000 square feet on two floors, while the new structure is to have nearly 10,000 square feet on two floors.

The new building is designed for walk-in access to both floors to accommodate the handicapped. Various offices, kitchen and dining facilities, a visitor center and a baptistry will be on the lower floor. Seating capacity in the upper floor sanctuary will be for approximately 300 persons. Facilities for audio equipment and a nursery will be provided. Expanded car-parking space will be on the North and West sides of the property.

The "Temple Lot" property is significant as the place where Joseph

Smith, Jr., who was the founder of the Church of Christ, placed a stone to mark the Northeast corner of a Temple on August 3, 1831. It is believed that this was done because of a revelation from God pointing out the exact spot. This stone was found in 1929, with original inscription thereon, and is on display in a temporary visitors center on the grounds. The Temple Lot property is registered as a National Historic Site.

Addendum (not part of the news release): The Temple to be erected some time in the future, as may be further revealed, is expected to be the seat of the government of the Kingdom of Christ upon His return to earth, and a focal point for the gathering of God's people. The expected area of the Temple will remain open for that structure.

That the scope of this ground may be largely increased, we believe can be demonstrated whenever those holding different views are willing to meet together for a proper discussion of the differences in faith, doctrine, etc.

Meeting together for the pur-

pose of arguing and displaying the learning possessed by each will have but little effect towards attaining the desired end....

To reach proper conclusions, all interested must possess profound humility, coupled with deep faith and the broadest of broad charity....let all who have the hope of Zion at heart, endeavor to promulgate a spirit of peace and good feeling towards all who have a common cause.

TESTIMONY OF THE AMERICAN INDIAN AND THE STICK OF JOSEPH

The Book of Mormon says that the people of God had peace and prosperity for 200 years following the coming of Christ to them. Then in the 201st year there began to be some who were lifted up in pride (4 Nephi 1:27) and by the 260th year secret orders began to be established again (4 Nephi 1:49-50). Then by the year 305 the whole land had become wicked (4 Nephi 1:54-56). In 321 a war broke out between the Lamanites and the Nephites, which war was the beginning of a series of conflicts resulting in the eventual destruction of the whole of the Nephite nation.

"It was 305 years since the sun and moon had eclipsed (at the time of the death of Christ, HES)...when Chalcatzin and Tlacamihtzin, very great gentlemen, descendants of the royal house of Tultecs, began to desire to usurp the kingdom, wanting to take it away from the legitimate successor, after having been for many years in quiet peace. They were exiled and had some wars, being driven out of the city of Tlachicalzincan, in the region of Huehuetlapallan, their country, with all their allies and families, men as well as women. There was a great number of them and they left during the year that followed the year Ce tecpatl - banished from all the land, as will be seen in what follows" (Works of Ixtlilxochitl, cited in Thomas Stuart Ferguson, One Fold and One Shepherd, p. 216).

"...there were two principal

leaders and five other minor ones" (Works of Ixtilxochitl, cited in Ferguson, ibid., p. 311).

The two principal leaders were the Nephites and the Lamanites. The five minor ones were the Lemuelites, Ishmaelites, Josephites, Jacobites, and Zoramites.

"And Matzin (Mormon, HES) went on to tell them that thus it was not convenient for them to stay there so near their enemies. Besides, he found in his astrology that the land toward the rising of the sun was extensive and prosperous, where the Quinametzin (the giants) had lived for many years, and it had been many years since they had been destroyed and it was unsettled."

"These and many other things Matzin declared and these two leaders and the other minor ones thought it good and agreed on it, carrving it all out. And Hue-Matzin told them that if they were different from the other and were good, they should remain a few days, supplying themselves for everything for what was ahead. At the time they left this land it had been eleven years since they left their country (339 A.D.), because they were near their country eight years, making war, until they were entirely driven out, and three years in this land which they called Tlapallanconce" (Works of Ixtlilxochitl, cited in Thomas Stuart Ferguson, One Fold and One Shepherd, p. 313).

The meeting of minds above was concerning the possession of lands toward the rising sun away from their enemies. Also that it would give them an opportunity for supplying themselves for everything that was ahead. They left their country in 339 A.D. and it had been eleven years since, making it in the year of 350 A.D.

when this decision was made.

The Book of Mormon says, "And in the three hundred and fiftieth year, we made a treaty with the Lamanites and the robbers of Gadianton, in which we did get the lands of our inheritance divided. And the Lamanites did give unto us the land northward; yea, even to the narrow passage which led into the land southward. And it came to pass that the Lamanites did not come to battle again until ten years more had passed away" (Mormon 1:60-63).

Ixtlilxochitl continues to relate the forced flight from the year 350 on down to 385 A.D., men women and children, all loaded. They traveled for many days at a time. Each country they came to was named after one their captains. Our final quotation shows the state of things toward the conclusion of that time.

"And then they took their road and travelled 18 days journey, which must have been some 80 leagues in different parts, until they arrived at Zactlan. The discoverer was Hactzin, likewise one of the two principal leaders. And the first year they arrived here was the year Ce Acatl (378 A.D.), at which year they counted a Ziuhtlalpilli since they had begun their wars against their kindred nation (which was in 326 A.D.).

"And there was born at this time a son of his and because it was such a significant year they named the son after the land and he was called Zacapantzin. At that time it was 52 years since they had begun to have wars one with the other. And they stayed here 7 years (385 A.D.)" (Works of Ixtliixochitl, cited in Hunter and Ferguson, pp. 360-361).

The House Of The Lord

Part Two

In the first part, devoted to this subject, I gave only brief highlights of the history from 1831 through the 1930s, for the purpose of reiterating to the Church membership, especially for those of our younger generation, having united to the Church in succeeding decades. From the 1940s to the present, the ministry in the Church have concentrated their teaching upon the fundamental principles of the gospel of Christ - and rightly so - but the guest for the establishment of Zion and a continuing for the building of the temple dwindled significantly so that, to the present, only occasionally is reference made to the gathering of the saints to the "center place" of Zion, and almost nothing said of the temple. Consequently, it seems that but few of the saints today have this awareness, to say nothing of a vital concern for fulfillment of these objectives, which were dear to the hearts of former "latter day saints".

Evolutionary trends develop in human society, inevitably it seems, and usually for the intention of improvement, but in many instances the direction of change is degenerative (downward) rather than upward. Never is this more evident than in the field of religion, especially the faith of Christ. It will be acknowledged that God does things right; that the Son of God built His Church correctly; but how quickly has man changed the divine provision, ostensibly to improve his own relationship with God, and to gain divine favor. The result has been a proliferation of churches of men, while the divine institution has declined by the same degree. This was true with the ancient Church of Christ, both in the Holy

Land and upon the American continent, and is easily discerned by the few earnest seekers for truth, subsequent to the restoration of the fulness of the gospel of Christ, shall we say, in the 1820s and into 1830. How guickly after the Church was organized on April 6, 1830 did it begin this downward trend; and yet, elements of the truth have remained: and the Lord yet works with whom He may, or who will remain true in their hearts to basic or fundamental concepts. Just so with the vision of Zion and the by Apostle William A. Sheldon Lord's temple.

With the driving of the saints in the 1830s,

first from Independence and Jackson County, and then from other counties of Missouri, they soon forgot the Lord's direction that, despite the human frailties evident in the Church, and for which reason the Lord had permitted their enemies to have power over them, the Lord was to "contend with Zion and plead with her strong ones, and chasten her until she overcomes and is clean before me; FOR SHE SHALL NOT BE REMOVED OUT OF HER PLACE". D&C 87:8.

The center place of Zion was specified as being in Independence, Missouri (D&C 57:1). It was to be filled up "until the day cometh when there is found no more room for them; and then I have other places which I will appoint unto them, and they shall be called stakes, for the curtains, or strength of Zion" (D&C 98:4). What was true concerning Zion applied also to the temple in Zion.

If we accept that this was a true revelation from God, its provisions still apply, for certainly, the center place of Zion has not become filled with the saints of God, neither a holy temple built to the glory of God. But, as formerly stated, the Church in Joseph's day forgot this direction, and soon made other provisions, thinking the Lord was slack in His promises and requirements; and they sought to improve upon God's design. A single temple in Zion, the House of the Lord, was felt to be insufficient, for lo, plans were sent from Kirkland, Ohio, calling for 24 temples, incorporated in a plat for the city of Zion, and which included a

This was in 1833. In this same year was the saints driven from Jackson County, and by 1838-39 from the whole state of Missouri. Failing in this attempt to build Zion and to erroneously include the several temples, the Kirtland temple was built in 1837. With the Church's decline there and the Missouri expulsion of 1838-39, the center of activity shifted to Mauvoo, Illinois, and therein, another temple built, but never fully com-

pleted.

temple for the

presidency, etc.

Temple building had become an obsession, especially with the introduction of the false doctrines of baptism for the dead and the celestial wife doctrine, which developed into polygamy. These ordinances were to be performed in temples. And thus, after the death of Joseph Smith in 1844, and the expulsion of the Church from Nauvoo, we find the main body of the Church following Brigham Young, to ultimately settle in Salt Lake City, Utah. Here, another temple was built, and others elsewhere, as they spread throughout Utah and other western states. And so was fulfilled an ancient prophecy, at least in part:

"For Israel hath forgotten his Maker, and buildeth temples." Hosea 8:14.

All of this has placed a damper upon the idea of building a temple, but as is so often the case, overindulgence satiates. Food taken in moderation is good and healthful, but even good food in excess of bodily need is harmful; much more so, the absortion of doctrine not given of God leads to spiritual destruction.

Latter day revelations through Joseph Smith, once accepted almost without question in the early Church, have come under close scrutiny since his death and the breaking up of the Church into facitons; and this scrutiny has brought denouncement in part by some to total rejection by others. These revelations included directions concerning the gathering of the saints, the establishment of Zion and the building of the temple, as previously noted. With declining acceptance and even a rejection of the revelations, came a spirit of doubt concerning the temple.

The realization in later years that the early revelations as published in the Book of Commandments were drastically changed as they were incorporated into the Doctrine and Covenants, has added to the disbelief in latter day revelations. Nevertheless, human interjection into the revelatory process of God's relationship to man, deplorable as it is, ought not to besmirch the truly divine communication. There must needs be a separation of the wheat from the chaff, so to speak, and this requires

at least these elements:

- (1) A conviction that a living Church cannot survive except through a process of continuing revelation from God; hence, a need of the gifts of prophecy and revelation.
- (2) A diligent search of the word of God as found in the scriptures of the Bible and the Book of Mormon, reconciling the one to the other as a means of determining the mind of God in matters relative to His kingdom, in points of doctrine, the organic structure of the Church, and in any attempt to interpret the word of prophecy.
- (3) A true spirit of discernment from God, without which an understanding of the truth or the ability to detect error in any of the above areas is impossible; this can come only through humble consistent prayer to God, through the very fountain of light and life, our Lord Jesus Christ.

If Joseph Smith was not a true prophet of God, despite his human frailties which at times injected human thoughts - yes, errors - into the recorded revelations coming through him; if the only revelation of God through him was the translation of the Book of Mormon, a record of ancient inhabitants of America, then there has not been a living, vibrant Church of Christ upon earth in these latter days. We reject such a thought! True, there were others during his time, and from then to the

present, who have been moved by the spirit of revelation, who have spoken the present word of God; in this we rejoice. But is it not absurd and presumptuous to suppose, even unwittingly, that God has revealed himself to me (and others of our time), but did not do so to Joseph Smith! Should we not beware of rejecting the prophets, even as our forefathers of ancient Israel rejected those whom God sent to them? Could it be possible that any of us may be guilty of denying the revelations of the Lord (see 3 Ne. 13:59)? And could this be a reason why that some of the spiritual gifts are not so prevalent, or are practically non-existant, by comparison to our recorded history in which it is seen that these gifts were abundantly given from the beginning of this latter day work?

My purpose in all this is an attempt to reinstill a belief in the fact of divine revelation having occured from the inception of this restored gospel and Church of Christ, and that at least some of those early concepts were true, including that of Zion and the building of a holy temple unto the Lord.

In my next presentation, I hope to justify such latter day revelation by an appeal to prophecies in the scriptures as contained in the Bible and Book of Mormon, especially as related to a temple in Zion, or the New Jerusalem.
