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

WHY DID JESUS HAVE TO DIE?

"Daddy, why did Jesus have to die?" The sincere look in the small child's face told the father that the question needed a complete explanation in simple terms. So with his child held closely in his lap, he answered her question with a story, a parable if you will.

A long, long time ago, in a far away land, lived a king, a very good king indeed. He had untold riches and loyal subjects without number, but his most prized possession was his son. The prince was a bright happy child of five. The king found great joy in playing with the lad in the castle's great courtyard.

One day after playing, the king returned to the throne room to his kingly duties, leaving his son in the care of servants who quickly became bored with babysitting. The servants began talking together under the shade of a large maple tree and left the little chap to chase butterflies. The child, spotting one particularly large butterfly, followed it into the forest and was soon lost.

When the two careless servants realized the boy was missing, they frantically called his name and searched the grounds. But their efforts were in vain. Fearing for their lives, they were forced to go before the king to inform him of the terrible circumstances. The king commanded all of his knights and servants to comb the forest. But, as darkness

fell upon the deep woods, one by one, the king's men returned to the castle without success. Alas, the prince could not be found.

As for the young child, he had raced deep into the woods, chasing the butterfly. Realizing he was lost, he had spent his first fearful night crying alone in the forest. The next two days, he ran in frantic confusion further into the seemingly endless forest. Finally, at the point of total exhaustion, he stumbled upon a large village. Spotting a group of men, he found his last ounce of strength and ran to them, exclaiming. "I'm the king's son!"

With hoarse laughter, the men slapped their knees, "Sure you are, you dirty brat."

The frightened lad shrank from the mocking laughter of one group after another as he tried in vain to find someone who would believe he was the king's son. For days, the prince told his story over, but no one would believe such a story from a dirty, tattered urchin. He began to wonder himself if it really had been just a dream and he really was just a dirty little street urchin.

Weeks became months, and months turned into years, and the king's son grew strong and wild. He lived in the streets, forced to steal in order to eat. He became a leader of a band of thieves, for in his veins ran royal blood, and he was a leader by nature. They stole and plundered and killed for pleasure. The king's son finally became the most feared and the most wanted man in the whole

kingdom. A few of the bravest knights had made efforts to capture him and bring him to justice, but he always escaped them.

Finally, after much planning, six knights did capture the king's son. Bound with strong cords, they led him back to the castle, to the city where he was born, to his kind father, the king. As they walked through the city, he began to remember the sights from his childhood. As he recognized the castle, all the memories of childhood rushed back, and he knew of a certainty HE WAS THE KING'S SON!

He began to shout, "I'm the king's son!" But the knights ignored him. They only led him on to the king's courtroom, and there they presented him to the king as "The Most Dangerous Man in the Kingdom."

When the good king's eyes met his son's, he exclaimed, "My son! My long, lost son!" Turning away, he began to weep. Finally, he faced his son once more and said, "Son, when you were young, I did all that a father could do for his son. I cared for you. I played with you. I loved you. But, you have done wrong, and have stolen and killed, and plundered, and terrified my people. You have fallen. Therefore, by the laws of the kingdom, you must die. If I should set you free, justice would not be served. I wish I could give you a second chance. But if justice is not executed, the laws will have no meaning, and all of my people will become rebellious."

With tears in his eyes, the broken-hearted king turned and ordered the guards to take his son and cast him into the dungeon. A date was set and preparations were made for the execution of the king's son. As he awaited his punishment, the young prince's anger grew and hatred ruled his heart.

Finally, the night before his execution, the kind old king made his way down into the dungeon to the cell where his son was held. The good king unlocked the cell and went in. He sat down by his son and said, "After much thought, I have decided what I shall do. I shall set you free tonight. You may go, for it was in ignorance that you fell into a life of evil. Now you must make a choice. You may return to your fallen state and then reap the rewards of evil, or you may change your ways, do good to the widows and orphans, give to the poor, and love your fellow man. If you do so, you shall inherit my

kingdom. My son, I love you." With that, the royal king stood and walked out of the cell, leaving the door unlocked.

The son laughed at the stupidity of his father, and said in his heart, "He thinks he can shame me into being obedient. Ha!" He quickly raced through the door, up the stairs, out of the castle, and into the night.

A few days later, the king's son rejoined his gang of thieves to renew his life of violence. It was then he learned from his friends of the price by which he had gained his freedom. For on the morning that he was to be executed, justice had been carried out so that the law would not be destroyed. There was only one other who could pay for the crimes the king's son had committed, and that was the man who had put the laws into effect. And so, on that morning, the king had taken his son's place and had paid the price for sin. It was the good king who died at the gallows.

"And so it is," the father concluded his story for the young child on his knee, "mankind has done evil in the sight of our Heavenly Father. The punishment for sin is that we cannot go to live with God after we die on earth. The Lord, in his love, desired to give us a second chance. For this reason, he came to earth as Jesus Christ, and died on the cross to pay the price for our sins. He died for us. We are like the king's son, and we must now make a choice. If we choose to continue on in sin, we will receive the most awful punishment, never being allowed to live with God. If we choose to repent and live a life full of God's love, we will inherit the Kingdom of our Heavenly Father, and live with Him forever. The choice is ours."



This past month it became my duty to begin searching through old *Zion's Advocates* looking for articles or sermons that had been written concerning a subject planned for future publication. I must confess that as I looked at the boxes upon boxes I began to feel my ambition wane.

As I looked at the boxes all I could see was the time I would consume on this paper puzzle, gleaning at best only a very few articles that might suit our purpose. My mind told me to give up; it would be foolish looking for "a pin in a haystack"! Fortunately I listened to my heart, which told me to begin and see what would happen. What happened was that I found not only several pieces that would be useful to our effort but I found much more than I had hoped.

Leafing through these pages I found baptisms, weddings, "And the sun shines through Life's

dark storm clouds, From its home of blue," announcements of children being born and blessed, anniversaries, ordinations, "Twill be ever new, For the Savior walks, All the way with you," sorrows, sickness, healings, "Are my friends most dear, And I walk with them, With the angels near," death, hopes, desires, "Shadowed vales between, Yet I fearless walk with the Nazarene." I found within these time-yellowed pages, "The Old, Old Path."

It was informative and at times very amusing to read of events and circumstances in each of your lives as you grew up spiritually and physically within these pages, within this Church of Christ, within this old path. Some of you, reading this article, I had never thought of as being young and foolish; vulnerable to the world and straying from the path. Why are we not satisfied?

SIGNS OF JESUS' COMING

Text: Luke 21:24-38; Revelations 6:12-13

Read the passage. Jesus is coming. He is going to come to Independence,

Missouri, at the Temple Lot, and it will be called "Zion." We will know he is coming by some signs that we will see.

"Signs" are things we see that tell us something is going to happen. If we see a stop sign, what do we know is com-


ing? We will come to an intersection. What are some signs that tell us summer is coming? What are some signs that tell us that it is time to go to bed? The signs that Jesus is coming are the sun will be darkened, the moon will be as blood, stars will fall from the sky, and people will be worried because there won't be enough to eat, and there will be lots of wars, and people stealing and killing each other, even more than usual. If we obey God's commandments, then God will take care of us. but we will see others that are afraid. And that is a sign that Jesus is coming.

When you see a sign it means you need to do something. A

stop sign means you have to stop at the road intersection that is coming. What are you going to have to do when mom says it is time to go to bed? When we see the signs that Jesus is coming, we know that he will come

to Zion.

There are things we need



We should pray that we can act in the way he wants us to act, even though some boys and girls you know might not be doing the right thing. What are some ways that God wants us to act?

PROJECT: You will need for each child, four octagon (eight sides, like a "stop" sign) shapes of paper, and a bigger piece of paper with a car shape on it. Have the children color in the signs of Jesus coming on the sign shapes, then glue them to the bigger paper.

The car represents our lives, and the children are to draw things they can do to prepare for Jesus' coming — praying, and being good and thoughtful some way.

AS IT WAS

"Likewise also as it was in the days of Lot; they did eat, they drank, they bought, they sold they planted, they builded: But the same day that Lot went out of Sodom it rained fire and brimstone from heaven, and destroyed them all. EVEN THUS SHALL IT BE IN THE DAY WHEN THE SON OF MAN IS REVEALED." (Luke 17:28-30)

What was the sin of Sodom? Was it not Sodomy for which the city was named? The Lord is telling us that the society that was prevalent in Sodom will also be prevalent in the last time. Is this so today?

Consider: It hasn't been very many years since homosexuality was a closet sin and only mentioned in mocking or disparaging terms (as it should be). People were ashamed to own up to it and kept it hidden because society frowned upon it. It was not at that time an accepted practice. But what has happened since?

A complete reversal of attitude concerning this gross sin has occurred. Now they talk of the homosexual community, apparently to give it respectability. They speak of homosexual rights, alternative lifestyles, domestic partnerships, homophobia (a disparaging term to describe those still holding to traditional values) and gay pride. They have become a formidable political power in this country and blatantly demand, without shame, public approval, not just tolerance of their aberrant lifestyles. They demand, among a host of other things, that schools offer sex education courses depicting all such lifestyles as being normal, that school libraries be stocked with books extolling homosexuals while books espousing a contrary view be banned, that schools establish homosexual clubs and counseling services that take a positive view of homosexuality. Because of new laws which are now being written, business, churches, and schools may not be able to discriminate against homosexuals in their hiring practices.

Enough has been said to illustrate that the prophecy in Luke 17 has been sufficiently fulfilled to identify the time in which we live. God is not pleased with this and no doubt the plague of aids is a retribution for this filthy sin, though even greater judgments are coming.

Perhaps the statement in Romans 1:27 is a part of that recompense now being poured out in the form of AIDS:

And likewise also the men, leaving the natural use of the woman, burned in their lust one toward another; men with men working that which is unseemly, and receiving in themselves that recompense of their error which was meet.

That God, indeed, does punish by such means is shown in Deuteronomy 28:58-61:

If thou wilt not observe to do all the words of this law that are written in this book, that thou mayest fear this glorious and fearful name, THE LORD THY GOD; Then the Lord will make thy plagues wonderful and the plagues of thy seed, even great plagues, and of long continuance, and sore sicknesses, and of long continuance. Moreover he will bring upon thee all the diseases of Egypt, which thou wast afraid of; and they shall cleave unto thee. Also every sickness, and every plague, which is not written in the book of this law, them will the Lord bring upon thee, until thou be destroyed.
