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

I,_____, take thee,_____, in the presence of these witnesses, and God, to be my lawful wedded husband, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for

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
better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death do us part. Thereto I seal our marriage vows.

EVIDENCES MORMON BOOK OF

Testify to the Truth of the Book

Pephi told his followers in America of ancient prophecies concerning the crucifixion of the Messiah who would come: "Yea, the God of Abraham, and of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, yieldeth himself...as a man, into the hands of wicked men, to be lifted up according to the words of Zenock, and to be crucified, according to the words of Neum, and to be buried in a sepulcher, according to the words of Zenos, which he spake concerning the three days of darkness, which should be a sign given of his death, unto those who should inhabit the isles of the sea" (1 Nephi 5:240-243). Do traditions and legends of the Indian people show they were aware of such prophecy? We shall see.

Alexander¹ quotes an early Spanish historian familiar with the traditions of the pre-Conquest Indians: "Las Casas, quoting a certain cleric, Padre Francisco Hernandez, tells of a Yucatec trinity. The Son, Bacab ...being scourged and crowned with thorns...was tied upon a cross with extended arms, where he died, but after three days he arose and ascended into heaven to be with his father."

Warren and Ferguson² also quote an early Spanish historian, the Bishop of Chiapas, who arrived in Yucatan in 1545: "About the Son, they say that he was killed and lashed and a crown of thorns put on him, and that he was placed on a timber with his arms stretched out. They did not understand that he was nailed, but rather they thought that he had been tied. and there he died. And he was dead for three days, and on the third day he came to life and went up to heaven, and that he is there with his father."

From the writings of these two early historians it is evident that the Maya Indians of Yucatan had traditions of the cruci- | 3. *Ibid.*, p. 35.

fixion of the Savior that paralleled in detail the prophecies narrated by Nephi. Zenos also referred to three days of darkness which would be the sign of His death. Many years later Samuel, the Lamanite prophet (see Helaman 5:75-82), would repeat this prophecy and tell of great geologic changes which would affect the face of the land at the time of the Lord's crucifixion.

The Aztec historian, Ixtlilxochitl³, wrote as follows: "It was 166 years since they had adjusted their years and times with the equinox, and 270 since the ancient ones had been destroyed, when the sun and moon eclipsed, and the earth trembled, and the rocks broke, and many other things and signs took place.... This happened in the year of ce Calli, which, adjusting this count with ours, comes to be at the same time when Christ our Lord suffered...."

Dare 70 Do Right

September 1992 Sermon By Elder/Bishop Alvin Harris

"Stand by your conscience, your honor, your faith. Stand like a hero and battle to death."

Zion's Hymnal #162

In Alma, chapter 21, there is the climax of a story. Helaman has accepted responsibility for the people. Alma, his father, blessed him and his other sons. They'd had many wars. Alma was old and left Zarahemla. We don't know what happened to Alma, but we know he left Helaman in charge. Helaman was distressed because of the wars and dissensions. It was necessary that the word of God be declared, and that a regulation be made throughout the church.

They'd had success, reestablished the church, and appointed priests and teachers throughout the land. But, after success, something happened: complacency. It's human nature—it happens today. We "rest on our laurels." Everything's going well. We "take a breather," and say, "I'm going to ride the tide a while." That might work for those who "Dare To Do Right." but others may take opportunity to seek power or influence. That's what happened. They had a polarization, a division into two opposites.

Helaman noticed, on one hand, after all Alma's teaching, after all the blessings, that they became lax and he had to remind them of God's word. Amalickiah, on the other hand, wanted to be king. He was a flatterer, who could tell a good story. He went out stirring up trouble, to drum up a following, causing a need for decision from the people. Who will we follow? Helaman, who teaches about God, or Amalickiah, who wants to be king?

The affairs of the people were "precarious and dangerous," in spite of victory over the Lamanites and great rejoicing, because of deliverance by the Lord. How quick men forget God. How quick to sin, and to be led away by the evil one, and what great wickedness one very wicked man can cause to take place.

Moroni, commander of the armies, saw the dissension. He was angry with Amalickiah. He rent his coat and took a piece and wrote on it,

IN MEMORY OF OUR GOD, OUR RELIGION, AND FREEDOM, AND OUR PEACE, OUR WIVES AND OUR CHILDREN No matter how well things are going, we have to stop, take stock, "rend our coat," and say, "Wait a minutel I'm going to stand for right. Here's the way it is."

He fastened it on the end of a pole, and put on his headplate, breastplate, shields, and armor. He took the pole with the piece of rent coat, and he called it the Title of Liberty. He prayed for the blessings of liberty to rest on his brethren, so long as a band of Christians remained to possess the land

Life's like that: there's always a decision time. No matter how well things are going, we have to stop, take stock, "rend our coat," and say, "Wait a minute! I'm going to stand for right. Here's the way it is." That causes consequences. But, Moroni was not "wimpy." He told it the way it was: not overbearing, contentious, or "stirring up trouble," like Amalickiah, for power. He stood for right, used might, and said, "This is the way it is."

A similar story is in Chapter 24 of Joshua. Moses led Israel out

of Egypt, then leadership was given over to Joshua. Moses went to his reward and did not go into the promised land. Joshua led them in. He gathered the tribes together and

reminded them of their story. Joshua told them that their fathers. who lived on the other side of the flood, served other gods. He took Abraham, from the other side of the flood, led him through Canaan, multiplied his seed, and gave him Isaac. He gave Isaac, Jacob and Esau, sent Moses and Aaron, plagued Egypt, and brought them out of Egypt to the Red sea. The Egyptians pursued them. When they cried to the Lord, He put darkness between them and the Egyptians, and brought the sea upon them, and covered them; and they saw what He did in Egypt: and they dwelt in the wilderness.

Joshua reminded them God was forever "saving their day." They'd lull back, get in trouble, and He'd save them again, through the entire old testament. God brought them to the land of the Amorites.

He gave the Amorites into their hand, that they might possess their land. Balak warred against Israel, and sent for Balaam, to curse them. But God would not listen to Balaam. He blessed Israel and delivered them. When they went over Jordan to Jericho, He delivered the men into their hand.

But, Joshua was old and about to die, like Alma and Moses. He was worried. He knew what would happen, that they'd slip back into their old ways, that he had to revive a "Dare To Do Right" attitude. So, he did something like Moroni did. He said, "If it seems evil to you to serve the LORD, choose you this day whom ye will serve; the gods your fathers served, or the gods of the Amorites: but,

AS FOR ME AND MY HOUSE, WE WILL SERVE THE LORD.

They said, "God forbid that we should forsake the LORD, to serve other gods," and argued, "you know we will never leave the Lord." Joshua knew better. "If you forsake the LORD, and serve strange gods, then He will turn and do you hurt, and consume you, after he hath done you good." The people said, "Nay; but we will serve the LORD." Joshua said, "Ye are witnesses against yourselves that ye have chosen you the LORD, to serve Him." They said, "We are witnesses."

Joshua told them to put away the strange gods and turn their hearts to the LORD. They said, "The Lord our God will we obey." Joshua made a covenant with them, wrote the words in a book, and set up a stone, a monument to remind them of their promise. Joshua wasn't "wimpy" either. When it was time for a decision, he made one. He wasn't afraid: he had right

on his side.

In Revelation, the letters John wrote the "angels of the churches" encompass most sins or situations we encounter today. They warn us, as well as those pastors, but they also go along with the stories of Moroni and Joshua. John wrote God's words in Chapter 3: "These things saith the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of the creation of God; I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou were cold or hot. So then, because thou art lukewarm, neither cold nor hot, I will spew thee out of my mouth."

The letters talk about riches, a complacent attitude, and comfortableness. They didn't want to make decisions, "make waves," or disrupt their lives. They were happy. Why, when someone presents a challenge, should we acknowledge it and get in trouble, when we're getting along all right? We might lose financially or get hurt. But, the Lord doesn't want "fence riders." Make up your mind! Choose!

Act! Don't be "wimpy!"

The church has a history of problems, dissensions, trials, and troubles. They often came from within—not without. Even

ministry are "human." People have different ideas. Acts, Chapter 15 details the first "Conference." The ministry disagreed on how a subject should be taught. They came to Jerusalem; were received of the church, the apostles and elders; and reported all things God had done with them. The apostles and elders consider the matter. They had "much disputing." Each made speeches, like we do at Conference. Then, they prepared their missionary outreach. "Then pleased it the apostles and elders, with the whole church, to send men of their own company...and they wrote letters by them after this manner." There the problem started; because, as men will be, they had preferences about who they wanted to travel with. A small thing. After they waited there, they left in peace, but Silas preferred to stay. Paul and Barnabas went to Antioch. Paul said to Barnabas, "Let us go again and visit our brethren in every city where we have preached...and see how they do." Barnabas decided to take John (Mark), but Paul didn't want to. The contention was so sharp between them, that they separated. Barnabas took Mark. Paul took Silas and left. Yes, even <u>Bible</u> ministry had dissension and had to make daily-life decisions.

Like <u>Bible</u> missionaries, our ministry has to make travel arrangements, buy airline tickets, and check their bags, just like you and I. It's "real life" out there—it's work to make a missionary trip. "The church," the people and all the ministry, have things to do in addition to studying or worrying about doctrines.

"Religion" is not just coming to church, sitting in a pew, or singing. "Religion" is our relationship with God in day-to-day living, practicing things the Bible and Book of Mormon tell us beyond coming to church on Sunday. We didn't build our new building coming to church on Sunday. Committee meetings; weekend work; time sacrificed to lift a shovel, drive a bulldozer, mix concrete, plant trees and grass, and paint, even though contractors did the major work. These things, with the Lord's help, built the building.

In IV Nephi, chapter 1, several burned cities were rebuilt; they had survived calamities, and they had success again, like in Moroni's time. They grew strong, multiplied quickly, married and were blessed according to God's promises. They did not perform ordinances of the Law of Moses, but followed commandments received from God, fasting, praying, and meeting together often, to hear the word of the Lord.

We do this today in preaching, sacrament, and prayer services;

baptism classes; study groups; United Workers; the C.A.R.E. group; Sunday School; Choir; and youth meetings. Why? To rehearse our belief to each other

and the children. To ask questions and give answers. To remind each other what God said. To gain strength, because we will meet those who say, "You don't really believe that stuff, do you?" We stop and think, "Well, yes, I do." Friends and loved ones back us up and say, "Of course we believe that!" We are a big support group.

In Mosiah, Chapter 13, the people wanted a king, because it's easier when one person tells us what to do, we do it, and decisions are made for us. Mosiah knew that was wrong—easy—but a trap, because one person can make wrong decisions. If we follow, we will be in trouble. Mosiah wanted democracy. "Choose you by the voice of this people, judges, that ye may be judged according to the laws which hath been given you by our fathers, which are correct, and

which were given them by the hand of the LORD. Now it is not common that the voice of the people desireth anything contrary to that which is right; but it is common for the lesser part of the people to desire that which is not right."

Remember Amalickiah? Everything was going great. Everyone was prospering. One man wanted to be king. One person's idea would get them in trouble. Moroni rent his coat and told them, in today's words, wait a minute, no you don't! "Therefore this shall you exert, and make it your law, to do your business by the voice of the people, and if the time comes that the voice of the people doth chose iniquity, then is the time that the judgments of God will come upon you."

Our church follows that plan today. We have Conference, local business meetings, Apostles' and Bishops' planning meetings, priesthood meetings. United Workers meet to socialize and plan projects to support the church. Young people meet for fun or study, in an organized support group, a place of their own, where they can talk among themselves.

In II Nephi, Chapter 11, Nephi warned, "When the Spirit ceases to strive with men, then cometh speedy destruction, and this grieveth my soul." Mormon, Chapter 1, tells one time when that happened. "Wickedness did prevail upon the face of the whole land, (322 A.D.) in so much that the Lord did take away His beloved disciples and the work of miracles and healing did cease, because of

the iniquity of the people, and there were no gifts from the Lord and the Holy Ghost did not come upon any

because of their wickedness and unbelief. I did endeavor to preach unto this people, but my mouth was shut and I was forbidden to preach unto them, for behold they had willfully rebelled against their God and the beloved disciples were taken away out of the land because of this iniquity. I did remain among them, but I was forbidden to preach unto them, because of the hardness of their hearts.

Things are going well. Finances are stable. The building is complete and paid for. We've had record crowds at recent reunions and Conferences; however, because we are doing well, we could forget to look from left to right or be careful where we step. We could stub our toe or step in a pothole.

Sunday morning services are well attended, but Sunday and Wednesday evening are not. If everyone came to business meetings, the pews would be full. They aren't. It's disappointing when a minority vote for the

majority of things. I commission each of you to be an emissary, to tell someone "We really need to be at local business meetings, prayer meetings, and April Conference. Abstinence is a vote. When "Amalickiah" comes along, and we are not there, we have cast our vote and given up our right to complain.

Dare to do right, like Joshua, Moroni, and Nephi. responsible. Have fun, sing, and be gracious - the shining side of religion; but, the other side of religion is hard work. We can't have one without the other, or an "Amalickiah" can rise up and get us. I'm proud of our progress in the church, but we really need grit to keep it going. We have workers, talent, and time. Even if you think you don't have time, you do. Find it. Then we can put it together and make it work. We don't all do the same thing and shouldn't expect each other to. We need to organize. I'll do this and you do that, together. Love your neighbor.

Please read the scripture stories this article summarized. It will give your heart a tingle and put you on the right track. "Dare To Do Right," in the name of the Lord.



Evalena Pearl Sills

February 1899—January 1993

Evalena Pearl Sills was born on February 7, 1899-in a dugout under an overhang: dirt floor and walls, natural sod roof. Her mother, Lily, had two young children already and felt perfectly capable of giving birth with only the help of a midwife. Her father, James E. Yates, was a young minister in the R.L.D.S. church. They lived in Seiling, Oklahoma.

She and her brothers and sisters helped with the family budget by picking cotton there in Oklahoma between school times. She often told of the family sharing missionary trips camping on the Indian reservation during the hot summers.

In 1914 her father was assigned by the church to a missionary tour—in Arizona. She was just fifteen when the family climbed aboard a wooden wagon, its canvas covers flapping in the occasional breeze as they started for "the west!" She became a real Arizonan.

She had no children, but that didn't keep her from nurturing needy loved ones: her mother, her father, two stepmothers, two husbands, and a mother-in-law! By the time she reached her sixties, most of this caretaking was over and she decided to make her dream of higher education come true. She finished a two-year course in an Arizona Community College and graduated—with distinction!

She died in Phoenix on January 6, 1993, approximately a month before she would have turned ninety-five. An informal and very loving memorial service was held in the Phoenix Local Church at 2:00 p.m. four days later. Most appropriate to her life, this was on a Sabbath day. Apostle Don McIndoo officiated and several who had loved her shared memories with the capacity congregation.
