

The Modern Stumbling Block

Part III Continued from May

The second coming of Christ is now a theme in almost every popular pulpit, and the more venturesome ones among our preachers are vying with each other in trying to emphasize their faith in this glorious event. Scarcely a man of note among the Churches will now seriously question the probability of it. The press has fallen in line, and the popularity of the theme is already assured. Not only this, but scores of pamphlets and leaflets of various sizes are being published and circulated by the authority of popular Churches, through chosen committees, setting forth the Scriptural warrant and reasonable ground for belief in the doctrine of healing the sick by faith, including prayer and the anointing with oil and the laying on of hands. Thus, one by one, the points of doctrine embodied in what the world denounced as heresy seventy-five years ago are being incorporated into the systems of the present, and are being hailed with delight as evidencing the progress of intelligence and piety in the Church.

As we enter these institutions where theology is prepared for the masses to suit the growing demands, it is at least interesting to be able to step up to the tables on which these doctors of divinity have been dissecting the old creeds, and to pick up a discarded fragment of Calvinism, or a dismembered branch of Arminianism, or a number of abandoned points of Protestantism, around which once clustered a devotion of worshippers a generation or two ago, and for the preservation of which the fagots were piled high and the torch applied, and to be told by the men who hold the scalpel that these are damnable heresies, and unfit to be taught and unworthy of place in the theology of this enlightened age. Our interest changes to gratification when we learn that the places from whence these offensive dogmas have been carved have been filled with framents of what we recognize at once as being part of the doctrine proclaimed by Joseph Smith three quarters of a century ago. When he "piped" "they would not dance;" when he "mourned" they "would not lament." When he preached the above items of doctrine, or denounced the creeds, he was derided and persecuted, and slain as a dangerous and damnable heresybreeder; but now that the despicable "mustard seed" has become a tree, and the tottering creeds are seeking shelter in its branches, or plucking twigs therefrom to cover the deformity discovered in themselves, they all enter for the dance. But who among them all has ever given credit to the young man who first faced the fire and endued the obloquy that these doctrines invited or provoked?

The second part of our text tells of a poor wise man whose wisdom delivered the city, but who was not remembered by those who enjoyed the benefits of his service. Religious history of this and the past generation, if faithful, should tell of the divine wisdom given a young man by which provision was made seventy-five years ahead of the exigencies of Christendom. It should tell of the curses that were heaped upon him by those who should have loved him best. It should tell how, after denouncing his doctrine as infamous, they finally pilfered from that doctrine the points requisite to deliver their creeds from disaster. It should tell that, notwithstanding this was done and Christendom reveled in the temporary advantage thus secured, and the deliverance of their citadels from dishonor and ruin, they failed to even remember the same young man, but boasted in the advancement they themselves had made under the wise direction of hired theologians, and skilled revisers.

Reader, if these doctrines, now becoming popular, are true, they were no less true seventy-five years ago, and the clergy who denounced them were not the servants of God. If the religions of that time were the standards by which the religion introduced by Joseph Smith was measured when they pronounced him an imposter, what shall be said of the men who are now patching their "fleeces" or philosophy with pieces taken from his system, which was so utterly unholy and impious then as to invite upon it their most terrible imprecations.

Joseph Smith introduced his doctrine by God's command, and never

attempted to don any fleece then known to religious bodies in order to gain favor with the flock. For this boldness they denounced him as a false prophet. Since then the God who authorized him has been supplementing his work and the work of his colaborers, and what is the result? Simply that the world is rising to endorse his utterance. If he voiced an untruth when he said the Churches were wrong and the creeds were an abomination in God's sight; if he was guilty of blasphemy in this, what shall be said of the wise men who are now revising a certain creed, and some of whom declared that specific features therein were damnable heresies, that they did not believe in and ought not to be held by them, and should not extend the infamy and disgrace of them to their children? In short, let us ask you to remember that the points referred to a few paragraphs back were no part of the creeds seventy-five years ago, and insofar as they may be now, they justify us in pointing to the men who use then in connection therewith, and asking you to "beware of false prophets, who come unto you in sheep's clothing." These doctrines belong not to the creeds, but to the gospel proclaimed by Joseph Smith, and for which he was denounced as a false prophet by the admirers of the very systems that have been repaired by material first declared in this generation by him. If it is now being discovered that he alone wore the genuine sheep's garment, then all those unlike him were false.

Hence, we submit finally the fact that "by their fruits ye shall know them." The fruit of a prophet is prophecy. If the prophecy is fulfilled, then he was a true prophet. If not, then he was a false prophet. This is the only legitimate test; but enemies misapplied this scripture, as they did the other part, and traduced his reputation, as the Pharisees did that of Christ. He was charged with various crimes against the law, including immorality, and these charges were held up as evidence that he could not be a prophet of

God. Those who thus vilified him were reckless of the fact that even were their charges true, such judgement as they passed thereupon would destroy the testimony of Moses, and David, and Solomon, and even Abraham and Peter, and numerous other Bible worthies. If they could show in Joseph Smith's life lapses from virtue, and

these could prove that God had never chosen him as a prophet, and his revelations and testimony were false, then to be consistent, they would have to strike out all of the Bible that contains the testimony of the others, for they certainly lived wide of the mark appointed by God as a guide of moral conduct.

This will not do, however; for should I prophesy today in God's name of the coming of a pestilence one week hence, and it should come as predicted, it's coming would confirm me a true prophet, even though I fell into sin before it came and perished by it when it arrived. By the fulfillment or failure of the young man's prophecies alone we determine him a true or false prophet, and we submit the foregoing evidences in support of the claim that he was sent from God. Much other evidence is at hand, but we forbear introducing it, as we have already passed the limit of our intended space; hence, we conclude with our humble testimony to the truth of the gospel delivered to Joseph Smith by an angel of God and by him proclaimed to the sons of men. Of his character we only know what those who had opportunity to learn have said of him, and from that

we have always believed and do now believe him to have been a good man. If he lived by the doctrine he published, he must have been very good. Of the message he brought we ask no man's opinion. Its divinity is self-evident; its potency for good in the human character we have abundantly proven: its adaptation to human necessity is witnessed by its effects within the Church that has closely adhered to its principles. If an increased love for Christ and humanity, a closer communion with God, a more intense dislike for iniquity, and a more complete consecration to the cause and interest of holiness and heaven are the fruitage of heavenly sowing, then the claim for divine origin for the doctrine he published is fully vindicated, and we expect to lay these evidences at last, together with the testimony of the Bible, at the feet of God and His Son Jesus Christ, as reasons for our adhering thereto. To us this later revelation is a treasure of untold worth, and we rejoice in its possession, though to others it has proven to be "THE MODERN STUMBLING STONE."

The Kettle of Soup


I'd like to relate just one of many experiences where the Lord has provided for us at an instant's notice, perhaps even anticipated our need.

Learning Center

Jesus Christ in the Land Bountiful

Grade Level: 3rd or 4th grade

- **OBJECTIVE:** To promote (enhance) an interest in reading by doing a variety of creative activities related to a particular text.
- In this case, the specific text is the Book of Mormon, 3rd Nephi, Chapter 5.

Materials needed to construct the learning center:

- 2 colored poster boards
- Stencils
- Black marker
- 3" x 5" index cards
- Glue
- Envelopes to hold the index cards
- 2 folders; 1 for worksheets and 1 for answer sheets
- Basket to collect completed work
- Book of Mormon

The Center needs to be in an area of the classroom that has room for a work table, a bulletin board to display the student's work, and throw pillows on a rug for comfortable independent reading and/or writing. The poster board assembly needs to be attached to a wall or secured to a table.

Directions for Constructing the Center:

1. Obtain 2 colored posters. Cut them in half vertically. You will need only 3 of the sections.

- 2. On one of them, using the stencils, write "ACTIVITIES." Attach to this 3 envelopes, one labeled "A," one "B," and one "C."
- 3. On another piece of poster board, stencil the word "DI-RECTIONS." Type up the directions and tape or glue them on the poster board. (A copy of the directions is included.)
- 4. On the third piece of poster board stencil the title of the book, "BOOK OF MORMON." If you would like, draw a picture of the book.
- 5. Attach the 3 poster boards together with the title of the book in the middle, the directions on the left, and the activities on the right.
- 6. Type the selected activities on 3" x 5" cards and place them in the appropriate envelope on the activities board. (A copy of the activities is included.)

Materials the Students will Need at the Center:

- Notebook paper
- Pencils
- Book of Mormon
- Worksheets
- Construction paper
- Colored chalk, crayons, markers
- Shoeboxes or paper milk

cartons

- Scissors
- Play-Doh/Clay
- Paint/Paintbrushes
- Old magazines
- Glue or tape
- Felt
- Posterboard scraps
- White fabric remnants
- White yarn

What The Child Will Do At The Center:

The students will go to the Learning Center and read Chapter 5 of the 3rd book of Nephi, from the Book of Mormon. After reading the chapter, they will select two of the four activities from Group A that interests them and then complete them. Then they will select two of the four activities from Group B. After completing group A and B, the student will select one activity from Group C to complete.

After completing each assignment, the students will place their papers in the basket provided. Two of the activities in Group A allow the students to correct their own work. Thus, when these activities are chosen, the students will correct their work before turning it in.

The activities are meant to be fun and creative. They are devised with different ability levels in mind.

Evaluation Of The Student:

Evaluating will be done by checking the work the student hands in. Also, observe the students thought processes and interest while working. Two of the activities are self-correcting so the students can get immediate results. Some of the activities do not have right or wrong answers. They are designed to stimulate their imagination and get them interested in their reading. The activities promote a fun approach and a positive attitude toward reading.

Evaluation Of The Center:

To evaluate the Center itself, I would listen to the comments made by the children. By observing them while they are at the center do you notice them enjoying themselves or grudgingly doing the tasks? It would also be beneficial to have a miniconference with the students when they have completed an activity.

A final step to the Learning Center would be for the teacher to gather all of the student responses to each creative activity and place them in a binder. These would be sitting on the reading table for all the students to read. This allows them to see how other students answered the same questions.

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Read the THIRD BOOK OF NEPHI, CHAPTER 5.
- 2. Pick two (2) activity cards from envelope A that interest you and complete the activity listed on the cards.
- 3. Pick two (2) activity cards from envelope B that interest you and complete the activity listed on the cards.
- 4. Pick one (1) activity card from folder C and complete the project listed on the card.

All of the materials you will need to do each activity are provided in the Center. The materials you will need to do each activity are listed in each specific activity card. After finishing each task, place them in the basket provided. Make sure your name is on your paper.

The answers to the crossword puzzle and the cloze question worksheets are in the "AN-SWERS" folder. If you choose to do either of these activities, check your answers after you have completed it, and then place your paper in the basket provided.

1993 Conference Report

"We've had a peaceful waiting for the Lord this day," Apostle William Sheldon said, describing the first service of Solemn Assembly, April 2, 1993. Those who gathered for the Friday morning service shared in a quiet spirit of concern for the work of the gospel, the conference, and the desire to humble themselves in prayer and fasting. Apostle Sheldon and Elder Charles Brantner presided over the service.

Brother Stephen Gould stood, following a season of prayer, and sung a song he'd received through inspiration. "For your hearts are heavy laden with the trials you must bear. But take courage now my children for your trials I will share," was the encouragement that was sung.

Elders Marvin Case and Joel Yates led the afternoon service. A special season of prayer was held for our sister Doris Rattaree concerning her immediate need for a blessing.

During the evening service of Solemn Assembly Elder Roger Bruner and Priest Aaron Heath presided. Priest Heath reminded us that the great responsibility of the church is to bring the Gospel to every nation, kindred and tongue. "Before we do anything we should consult our God for his guidance. That is what Solemn Assembly is about." The prayers that followed were after that pattern of praising God and asking for Him to make His will known.

On Saturday, April 3, we gathered in prayer again. Elders Nicholas Denham and Leslie Case presided over the service and we were asked, "How serious are you in seeking the will of the Lord? We have the promise that if we come in the right attitude, appealing to the Heavenly Father, He will reveal it."

After a break, our prayers and fasting continued into the afternoon service. Elder Joel Yates and Priest Randy Sheldon were in charge. Elder



Yates reminded us that as children, most of us, when faced with a problem, trusted God to answer our prayers. "As grown ups we tend to forget those simple things," he said. "We need to return to the old paths."

After several seasons of prayer, the 1993 Solemn Assembly was brought to a close. Elder Yates had told us that even though we felt closer to each other after two days of prayer and fasting, we had not gathered for that purpose. We had gathered to draw close to God. As we sang the last song we felt He'd blessed us and had prepared us for the meetings ahead.

Saturday Evening, many returned to the Chapel for a presentation by the CARE Group. The program included three skits portraying conflicts and resolutions. The first conflict was between a husband and wife; the second, between a parent and child and child against child; and the last was a conflict between employees. In each skit a practical, scriptural resolution was demonstrated. From the response during and after the program, those attending could relate to the situations and had been encouraged to find better

solutions.

Voices sang in unity, "Come ye apart, It is the Lord who calls you," as the Sacrament service began Sunday, April 4. Apostle Marvin Ely presided and Apostle Don McIndoo shared his thoughts.

He read Christ's prayer from III Nephi 9: "I pray unto thee for them, and also for all those who shall believe on their words, that they may believe in me, that I may be in them as thou, Father, art in me, that we may be one."

Apostle McIndoo then added, "That is the prayer of Jesus Christ for us today, that we may be one. He calls us to unity, to love. He calls us to one purpose."

The Lord's supper was served, and testimonies and prayers followed. In the beginning, Elder Dick Wheaton challenged us: "Put your faith in the Lord, and you will be staggered by the answers He provides."

The testimonies that followed proved his statement to be true. Brother Romey and sister Nancy Harris shared with us how the life of their son, Chad, had been spared, and how Chad's heart had been turned to God. Others stood as witnesses to that Miracle.

Several shared spiritual dreams they'd had; others testified of God's intervention in their lives or their loved one's lives during operations and disasters; or how He'd enlightened their minds in study and prayer and in their efforts to take the gospel to those in need of it.

We were encouraged, challenged and chastised. Elder Bill Zabrisky, who serves on the Mohawk Reservation, pleaded with the congregation for his family and all those who are left behind: "Don't fall asleep in Zion. Don't let Satan steal them by

taking away their desire to worship together. Don't let him steal your vision of Zion. You're the ones that are here. You'll have to pick up the torch. Get committed. Don't lose the vision."

At 3:00 p.m., the music program began with a special arrangement of "Let Us Pray for One Another," sung by the Temple Lot Choir, led by Janice

Welch.

Manon Lawrence then directed the Senior and Junior Choirs through songs of praise and prayer. The older group, ages 12-17, sang "The Lord is Lifted Up." Then the Jr. Choir, 7-12 year olds, continued in praise, singing "I will sing of the Mercies of the Lord, Forever," "Jesus you are King of My Heart" and "Make Me a Servant."

Following their presentation, the Conference Choir sang a cantata, "Easter Song," an inspiring mixture of scripture and song, telling the story of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

"Who are we and what part does our little group of people have in God's plan?" Answering those questions was the focus of Apostle Jay Moser's sermon on Sunday evening, April 4.

He felt that if Christ stood before us today He would say the same words He said to another people long ago: "Take up your cross and follow me." Christ would remind us that we are to be a light to the world, "That they may see your good works and glorify your father which is in heaven."

"This is our Mission. It has not changed," Brother Moser reminded us. "It's time we consider opening our hearts to all races, all people across the face of the earth and to learn to love all men as ourselves."

Sometimes we feel ill-equipped

as a church and individuals to do God's work. Brother Moser encouraged us though: "We are equipped. We are better equipped than any people on the earth."

He asked us to draw upon our heritage, comparing our role to that of the early pathfinders of the American wilderness. They had to find the best paths to their destinations, whereas we are confronted with finding the most effective ways of bringing the Gospel to those who need it.

He spoke of the challenges before us: the great mission of taking the gospel to the Indians; reaching out to other Restoration groups who feel lost; and ministering to our own discouraged members.

"Sometimes we are at a loss of how to get the gospel to them. This is who I feel we are—modern day path finders, looking for a way to accomplish this work."

Brother Moser read from Ether 1:60-68, where the Brother of Jared asked the Lord to touch the sixteen stones so that his people would not be in darkness during their sea voyage. He continued, "Our lives are like those stones. They must shine in a dark world. Try to keep your lives clean. He will touch you. Find ways to take the Gospel to those you know need it. Blaze the trail."

Apostle Smith Brickhouse preached a sermon of thanksgiving on April 5. After reading about the plan of salvation from II Nephi 6:105, he said, "What a marvelous blessing and promise, the fact that He died willingly to atone for the sins of the world, that we might be redeemed and brought into the presence of our Heavenly Father. We have to keep before us that hope of life eternal with our Father and with that hope we can endure."

Apostle Brickhouse reminded us of the prophecies of old that told of an apostasy and a restoration. "I'm thankful that our Heavenly Father saw fit to bring to us the restored gospel, the coming forth of the restoration of the church, that authority, His presence among us."

He also expressed thanks for the scriptures, for an increase in the church, for the work among the people in Yucatan, and new locals in the United States.

Apostle Brickhouse held up a jar partially filled with water. "Is it half full or half empty?" he asked. The visual aid was a familiar one, but

Apostle Brickhouse had a new point to make. "We have the tendency to look at all our blessings and say Boy, we don't have all the blessings we used to have." Apostle Brickhouse turned to the jar again, "The jar is full!" He went on to explain that some blessings, like the water, are evident. We see them quickly. Some, though, are like the air, less obvious, but blessings that touch our hearts.

He then read the account of Christ's response when questioned about what the greatest commandment was, and said, "If we can practice those two simple commandments (to love the Lord thy God and to love your neighbor as yourself) we will be blessed beyond our comprehension; and our ministry will speak with power and authority. Hearts will be opened."

He reminded us of our responsibility of supporting the church financially and with our prayers, and of upholding the ministry on a daily basis.

The conference began early for some on Tuesday and Wednesday as we gathered for the 8:00 a.m. prayer services. On those two mornings, we heard testimonies telling of healings through administration, lives which were spared, the Lord's work in Yucatan, and the miracle of changed lives. If each was written here, the hearts of readers would be strength-

ened as ours were then. Following are a few statements from those early mornings.

"When the righteous cry, the Lord hears and delivers."

"I couldn't see ahead then, but I can look back now, and see his hand. Be calm. Trust him. He'll show the way."

"...I feel we are...modern day path finders, looking for a way to accomplish this work."

A husband shared his dying wife's final request of her family, "Read the Book of Mormon."

"We felt like God had a hold of us."

Evangelist Hubert Yates lifted a warning voice to the church, on April 6, as he preached Jesus Christ. "The blood of Christ was shed to cleanse us, to bear hope within our bosoms, to develop a strength and power against the evil one, to give us the courage wherein we can look expecting the blessing of our God to be poured out upon us when we have set our course, and plotted our direction to be near to the heart of God."

Often, he said, the church lacks discernment. "We are like a horse turning our head back and forth, running the course we set instead of falling on our knees and telling our God, 'We must run the course you have set. Your paths are straight."

Elder Yates reminded us that the world was full of what it calls fun, but that lasting joy and peace came from Christ and his gospel. He talked of the word of God, as contained in the Bible and Book of Mormon, as the measuring stick, as the rod of iron that would "either condemn you or save you at the last day."

"Is that all there is? No, God continues to reveal himself to the chil-

dren of men. Revelation, by the power of God, must be very much alive in the body of Christ."

He warned us that he sees more sin entering the body of Christ and that when we are willing to turn our head and ignore it, we are making the church weaker.

"The gospel has a way to alter lives, to turn them away from the desire to sin and to single their eye to the glory of God." He believes the world is making it harder to know and follow Christ, even in this nation. "We must be a light, a voice crying repentance."

Elder Yates made Satan's desire to capture our souls a reality through his warnings, and pleaded with us to rely on the Holy Ghost and strength from God to make a commitment to Christ and to be doers of the word and not just hearers.

"There is a difference in bearing a cross and hanging on it. He asks us to bear our cross, that the heathen will know He has a people. Prepare yourselves for the coming of the Lord, for we are indeed in the last days. Maybe our forefathers had time to drag their feet, but you and I don't. This is our day of probation. Support the body of Christ, the work that must go out. If you want to increase your faith, serve him."

On Wednesday evening, preceding the preaching service, three young people were baptized. Debby Cobb, Melissa (Chance) Seibel and Matt Rooney were baptized by Priest Randy Sheldon. The Hand of Fellowship was extended to them following their confirmations.

The final conference sermon was preached by Elder Sam Gould on April 7. He began by questioning the congregation concerning our response to the previous sermons, "Is your life changing at all because of what you've heard? Are you going to change?"

He preceded to read from Psalm 19 and Colossians 3, explaining the worth and purpose of the law of the Lord, and bore his testimony of the law as found in Latter-day Revelation. Elder Gould suggested that many of us

are stubborn about turning from false doctrines, being like a man "chained to a big old stone," daring us to move him

heart, to be read by all mankind?"

Then Elder Gould reminded us with a comparison from the Book of Mormon that the commandments of God are like the Liahona. "They will tell you where to go; how to pray; how to overcome your frailties; how to crucify yourselves that you may be strengthened in the Lord."

He concluded by admonishing us from Psalm 141:5. "Let the righteous smite me; it shall be a kindness." How do your respond when chastised by the word? Do you take offense and harden your heart? Do you take the insult and allow it to stay within, not having enough faith to pray about it? Or do you consider the insult, pray about it and allow it to be a "kindness" that will draw you to change and draw even closer to God?

We have to get serious about the gospel of Jesus Christ, Elder Gould said, encouraging us through II Nephi 15, that if we believe in Jesus Christ, we will believe in his words, and they will teach us to do good.

With that scripture's bold challenge, the 1993 conference ended. In 1994, many of the same brothers and sisters will gather for another conference. That we might be more faithful when we gather again, let us continue to ask ourselves Elder Gould's question, "Am I going to change?"
