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Editorial...

Questions Remain Unanswered

Tempting to resolve many differences of opinion and of belief for more years than I have existed. Unfortunately, that statement can be fairly made by people much older than myself. I know that every active church member has prayed and fasted, to different extents, for the answer to some or all of these questions. To enumerate all the questions or even one would waste space and more important detract from the subject to be covered here.

Many years ago one of the Apostles, now gone from this life, gave instructions from God that directed the church to fasting and prayer for a year before the answers we sought could be given. The first year passed with some sporadic activity following this instruction but there was no general response and so... the questions remain unanswered. We do discuss these things in private and the August ministers' conference spends much time and effort on them each year, but the fact remains that we are deeply divided on each topic.

I have been impressed for some time with the thought that our attentions are somewhat misdirected. That God had intended the period of fasting and prayer as a time for attitudes to change in each of us so he could answer our questions. Each day has been overshadowed with that thought and more detail has filled my thoughts with each passing day.

St. John 6:28-66 rehearses an episode in Christ's life that applies to this discussion. Let's read;

Then said they unto him, "What shall we do, that we might work the works of God?"

"God had intended the period of fasting and prayer as a time for attitudes to change in each of us so he could answer our questions."

Jesus answered and said unto them, "this is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent."

They said therefore unto him, "What sign shewest thou then, that we may see, and believe thee? what dost thou work?"

"Our fathers did eat manna in the desert; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'"

Then Jesus said unto them, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Moses gave

you not that bread from heaven; but my Father giveth you the true bread from heaven.''

"For the bread of God is he which cometh down from heaven, and giveth life unto the world."

Then said they unto him, "Lord, evermore give us this bread."

And Jesus said unto them, "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst."

"But I said unto you, That ye also have seen me, and believe not."

"All that the Father giveth me shall come to me; and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out."

"For I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me."

"And this is the Father's will which hath sent me, that of all which he hath given me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day."

"And this is the will of him that sent me, that every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on him, may have everlasting life: and I will raise him up at the last day."

The Jews then murmured at him, because he said, 'I am the bread which came down from heaven.'

And they said, "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? how is it then that he saith, I came down from heaven?"

Jesus therefore answered and

said unto them, 'Murmur not among yourselves.''

"No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day."

'It is written in the prophets, 'And they shall be all taught of God.' Every man therefore that hath heard, and hath learned of the Father, cometh unto me.''

"Not that any man hath seen the Father, save he which is of God, he hath seen the Father."

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me hath everlasting life."

"I am that bread of life."

"Your fathers did eat manna in the wilderness, and are dead."

"This is the bread which cometh down from heaven, that a man may eat thereof, and not die."

"I am the living bread which came down from heaven: if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever: and the bread that I will give is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world."

The Jews therefore strove among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?"

Then Jesus said unto them, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink his blood, ye have no life in you."

"Whoso eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day."

"For my flesh is meat indeed, and my blood is drink indeed."

'He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, dwelleth in me, and I in him.''

"As the living Father hath sent me, and I live by the Father: so he that eateth me, even he shall live by me.

"This is that bread which came down from heaven: not as your fathers did eat manna, and are dead: he that eateth of this bread shall live for ever."

These things said he in the synagogue, as he taught in Capernaum.

Many therefore of his disciples, when they had heard this, said, "This

is an hard saying; who can hear it?"

When Jesus knew in himself that his disciples murmured at it, he said unto them, "Doth this offend you?"

"What and if ye shall see the Son of man ascend up where he was before?"

'It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life.''

"But there are some of you that believe not." For Jesus knew from the beginning who they were that believed not, and who should betray him.

And he said, "Therefore said I unto you, that no man can come unto me, except it were given unto him of my Father."

From that time many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him.

Our father in heaven does not wish to repeat this type of episode for any of the questions which currently dominate so much of our time and energy. He calls on us to remember the first and great commandment, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment" (Matt 22:37-38) We must be ready to follow him with no reservations as to opinions, beliefs, or desires.

Now let us look at ourselves and view our choices once God gives us the answers to these questions. The two obvious choices are to accept or reject those answers. What will we do if the answer is in opposition to the belief we hold? Will we submit to the statement of God or will we cry foul, or worse? Maybe a more difficult question is how will we act if the answer is in favor of the beliefs we hold? How will we deal, work, or labor with those that are struggling to release ideas that have been held tightly for nearly a lifetime?

In the wild, some creatures respond to a wound by attempting to bite it out. If the creature cannot make peace with the wound and allow time for healing, infection will set in and the creature will become sick and die. Will we rise above our baser instincts or will we behave as the creature in the wild and tear at each other?

Maybe now is the time to return to Matthew 22 and read verses 39 and 40. "And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." These two verses with a

quick review of verses 37 and 38, above, give a complete, short view of what our God wants for us and wishes from us.

We have a great need to view ourselves as is depicted in I Corinthians 12. The church is one body, and as in the practice of medicine a member is not removed until it proves to be a threat to the survival of the whole body. Each person reading this article knows of a personal weakness in themselves. It may be as simple as a knee that has been injured or eyes that do not see well without the aid of glasses. It may be a more subtle thing like a mind that wanders. For each situation there is a remedy that first takes realization of the problem and then acceptance of aid.

The act of aiding another member of the body of Christ may take the form of physical assistance, teaching, encouragement, or even refusing to give up as long as there is room or time for hope. All do not have strength for hard labor,

and all do not see the future, and all do not have the same talents before God. Yet, all can and must learn to work in the strength that can only be gained through the common effort of the whole body..., the whole church, striving to be ever closer to God.

Now the time swiftly comes to face something much more difficult and, yes, much more awesome and frightening. We are nearing the time to unite for the common good and the privilege to call ourselves Saints. I am sure there are many who realize that when we have the answers we seek, the responsibility to banish ignorance of God and his ways from this world will be more urgent than ever before.

Let us learn and pray for the ability to love our God and our neighbor so that we may stand before our Father in heaven ready to receive and teach the answers he gives to his disciples..., his Church of Christ.

SUFFER LITTLE CHILDREN

"When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things—." (I Cor 13: 11).

"And Jesus called a little child unto him, and sat him in the midst of them, and said, verily I say unto you, except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoso shall receive one such little child in my name recieveth me." (Matt 18: 2-5).

We live in a time when many adults have not matured in humility and wisdom. Children are being raised by parents who have not put away childish things. Parents who find children to be a hindrance to their own pleasure seeking and self development. Parents who do not know how to humble themselves in obedience to God as a little child humbles itself to its parents. In other words: parents who refuse to suffer little children and receive them in the name of Christ- in his pure love. These parents do not give their children the time, love and training they need to become upright, confident citizens of God's kingdom. "But Jesus said, suffer little children. and forbid them not, to come unto me: For of such is the kingdom of heaven." (Matt 19: 14).

In many homes children grow up surrounded and emotionally con-

sumed by anger, abuse and neglect. They consider the things that happen around them to be normal, having no basis for comparison within their experience. The reactions and behavior they learn while trying to cope with lack of love or with physical or emotional abuse do not fit the situations they face in later life. They are left emotionally crippled, not knowing how to respond appropriately to properly expressed love and kindness. Normal human experiences will stimulate excessively defensive or aggressive responses from them or cause unexplained withdrawal. They may be unable to react to others with charity and genuine caring. As a result abuse and neglect commonly pass on from generation to generation. God spoke to Moses concerning the gods the children of Israel had put before him. He said "-for I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me;" (Exodus 20: 5).


Does this mean that God wants family dysfunction to go on from generation to generation? Of course not. But God has given mankind freedom to act for itself. With that goes the freedom to suffer the consequences. What God's statement to Moses tells us is that if parents do not love the Lord and put God first in their lives the idols they worship (the attitudes and desires they put in the place of godliness) these same idols, will be worshipped by coming generations as well. How will this chain be broken? If the exist-

ing hate for godly things is replaced through obedience to his commandments, charity (the pure love of Christ) and application of the indwelling Spirit of God the chain can be broken. Even with these things it takes time and the diligent application of prayer to break the chain and guide these hurting souls out of emotional bondage.

It behooves those of the Church who are parents and grandparents to soberly consider the plight of the children and the hurt that is being passed from generation to generation even within the church family. Abuse and neglect of children always coexists with marriage problems and abounds when the adults they depend on (including grandparents) ignore them to pursue their own pleasures and aspirations. These children do not learn the pure love of Christ having no personal demonstration of it in their daily lives. Little children equate time and attention given them with love. They need time and attention from the important adults in their lives; time and attention that singles them out and builds their individual sense of worth and responsibility. They need adults around them that are willing to teach them from an early age about God, his creation and the gift of his Son; adults willing to demonstrate a godly, responsible life to them.

Testify to the Truth of the Book

In a previous article in this series (August 1989) we read that 'Ouetzal-coatl...is the greatest figure in the history of the New Worlds" Historians and anthropologists have long been intrigued by this ethereal figure from Mesoamerica's remote Past. We who believe in the Book of Mormon have no difficulty equating the white, bearded God of ancient America with Jesus Christ who, the Scriptures tell us, visited His people in the New World after His resurrection.

Like our Lord, Jesus Christ, many volumes have been written about this epic hero of the Americas. One of the latest treatises to be published comes from Rudolfo Anaya², a professor of English at the University of New Mexico. This accomplished writer sets forth the legends and traditions which come down to us from his Native American ancestors. In this article I shall quote but ten of Anaya's descriptive excerpts from among the dozens presented about the life and ministry of Ouetzalcoatl. Then, be-

neath each selection quoted there appears an analogous Passage from the Scripture that helps us place this legendary figure of American antiquity in Proper perspective.

ADDED TESTIMONY FOR THE BOOK OF MORMON

I have noticed here of late quite a few articles in the Zion's Advocate proclaiming the truthfulness of the Book of Mormon. I like that for it is a beginning, as I see it, that we as a Christian body are all going back to our roots as true believers in Jesus Christ, the only begotten of our Heavenly Father. That there was a complete restoration of the Gospel, not as some religious creed, but as God's way of life for His people.

I would like to add my testimony as to the truthfulness of this dear sacred record by telling a few of the experiences given me as a young woman traveling with my parents, Apostle and Mrs. B. C. Flint, among the Indians in Ontario, Canada. The opening was made possible by an old Indian by the name of O. Joseph coming to Independence, Missouri and stating that he had a message to deliver to the church. While in Independence he requested my Dad to baptize him, not in the font on the Temple Lot, but in Douts' Lake. The font was too man made, he declared. After he was baptized and ready to go back home, he invited my parents and I to come to the reserve where he lived and tell his friends and neighbors the Gospel story. These good people had not heard the Gospel in it purity. Although we found that the elders of another restoration church had given out a lot of Book of Mormons, it had not been read. Those elders had not been moral men and had foolishly defiled their teenage girls. Thus the Indians wanted nothing to do

with the Book of Mormon, but for some reason they had kept those that had been given them. When we went there and they saw that Dad was a moral man and had his family with him, the ice was broken and they began to open up and talk with him.

Mr. Harry Loft, where we stayed, had a big old fashioned farm house and a large table in the dining room. I can see yet in my mind's eye us setting with a group of those Indians and Dad telling the gospel story. They began asking questions, first one then another, and Dad tried to have them tell their tradition concerning the events they spoke of then answering them by reading from the Book of Mormon.

One day in particular comes to mind when a Mr. Frank Lickers was present and he turned to Dad and asked, "Mr. Flint, is there anything in that book you claim is the Indians' bible about three good men who never die?" Dad asked for the tradition and this is what was said: An old Indian chief lay dying and Indians believe it is bad luck for the family to look upon death so they left him in one part of the long togan or teepee and went to the far end, away from the dying Indian. They heard him mumbling and soon he appeared among them and told them he was not going to die. As he lay there three young warriors came and cared for his needs. They fed him fresh fruit and vegetables and blessed him saying he would not die. When Mr. Lickers finished, Dad picked up Mr. Lickers' Book of Mormon and read the story of the three Nephities. All exclaimed, "That's the story and told better than our tradition." There were several such incidents, but that was the one that made the biggest impression on me. The childlike faith those strong men showed and the spirit present when Dad preached to those people was just the thing for me to firmly cement my faith in for the Gospel. I saw for myself God working among His people and it was wonderful.

One other time a young man asked Dad about Jesus the Christ and told this story. It seems a young virgin (Indian Maiden) gave birth to a man child. Her grandmother, feeling that her grand daughter had dishonored the family, tried three times to drown the babe but each time the babe had power of itself to come out of the watery grave and she was made to know what her granddaughter had brought forth was a God and would do much good among the people. Dad read to him the story of Christ's birth and I can still see that young man yet with tears running down his face thanking Dad for making the birth of Jesus Christ beautiful, not a sad story as what he had been told.

The words of this verse so often spoken to help a loved one celebrate his birthday, took on new meaning for me when my father, passed from this earth July 24, 1993, and celebrated his first birthday in heaven.

As I pondered how to share with others what kind of person my father was, and the kind of love we feel for him, I felt unequal to the task. It seemed words could not express that kind of love. But then, one word came to mind. "Charity, the pure love of Christ." Please, let me explain, for in using that phrase, I do not want to lessen the preciousness of the scripture, or the love of our Savior, but dad had charity.

My dad was a quiet man. Unless you stayed in our home, or came for a visit, you may not have had opportunity to know him very well. Since I can never remember a year without church guests staying in our home, many have come to know my dad.

Dad wasn't a preacher, and yet many people know of his kind gentle nature. I've never known dad to be unkind in word or deed to anyone. Dad wasn't a scholar, but yet he was wise. He would always say, "The Nast name has never known shame." With those few words, we knew we would always live up to that simple code of ethics because we could never be the one to break that quote and thus his heart. I never knew dad to deliver a lecture and yet he taught us so much during our life. He was always a hard worker and often talked with pleasure about completing a particularly hard job. We learned the satisfaction that is felt from a job well done. Dad gave each of us a gift that I wish all children could have. Every child wishes to be someone's favorite. I was dad's favorite. Of course, so was Carol, Jennifer, Belinda and Michele. The way dad explained it was "Well, you were my favorite, at the moment." There was never any doubting his special love for each of us. In fact, I never knew a child that dad didn't love. And children loved him.

Dad's love of family was great. Growing up in a rather dysfunctional family, made him all the more aware of how precious a close family is. He was proud of his children, son-in-laws, grandchildren and great grandchildren. This was one area he was never hesitant to tell about.

Dad never served in the armed forces, but he deserved a medal for bravery above and beyond the call of duty. He suffered and endured much, for the love of his family. He had three heart/open chest surgeries. He was on a diabetic diet and for the last 2 years, suffered kidney failure and was on dialysis three times a week. It was in one of our last discussions that dad said, he only had the last surgery and the kidney dialysis because we (the family) didn't want him to leave us, so at 79 he endured major surgery and still 8 more months of dialysis.

Dad wasn't vocal about church, and yet he loved the Lord, acknowledged his blessings, and loved all his church family. It often seemed as if dad knew that it came easier for mom to stand and give a testimony, and he was content to let her be the spokesperson for them both. Dad loved mom. He always showed it, but his last compliment to her was that she was "perfect."

During the week that we knew would be dad's last, it was he that opened up and spoke of all the things that he'd felt and known for years. He spoke of God's love and how very very blessed he felt. He'd hold our hand and tell us not to worry. He told us he was not afraid, that he knew that God had a place for him. He longed to see his two other "favorite" girls waiting for him there. It was he who comforted us. He was overflowing with praise and thanks to our Heavenly Father, not once ever wavering or doubting. When he was too weak to eat, or hardly swallow, small whispers of wonder still escaped from his lips, marveling even then, at his blessings.

No, dad was not a preacher, or a teacher, but he taught us how to live with dignity, that honor is something within us. That no matter what, it cannot be taken from us, but can only be lost if we give it away. He taught us how to enjoy hard work. He taught us how to walk uprightly before God and mind our mother. He showed us how to die, with full trust in God, doubting nothing. But most of all, he taught us how to love. Give love. Show love. Teach love ... Charity?

Good-bye dad, till we have our birthday in heaven. We'll miss you, but for now, we have a lot of loving to live up to.

I had been reading various things about the establishment of Zion and as my thoughts were on this, I was praying about it - more just a talking to the Lord about Zion and asking if I would be able to have any part in the building of Zion in these last days. This was on the evening of December 1, 1992. In answer to my ques-

tions, I received the following:

"Margaret, I would that all my people - all those who sincerely seek me and seek to serve me - would take part in the establishing of my Zion, that Zion might be that place of refuge to which my children can be gathered as the storm clouds gather and the storm rages throughout this land; my cleansing storm. The hearts of my people are far from me. The hearts of my people are weighed and burdened by the cares of this world. Each heart, I call to come to be healed in me that each might be freed from worldliness and made whole in me. Only then can I use my people to establish my Zion in these last days before I come with vengeance to cleanse my land of the wickedness which ascends as a great stink to heaven.

Oh, my people, how they flounder in the wickedness of the world. I hardly know my church anymore, which calls itself mine, for it is so polluted and filled with the world that in name only is it mine. Yes, there are those whose hearts still turn ever to me, but many of these are so weak and broken and filled with fear that they behold my face only dimly and have lost the understanding and the belief of who I, their God, really am. Gird on the armor of righteousness and join the ranks of my army that I might use you in the fulfilling of my purposes; in the establishing of my kingdom on earth. Would ye build my Zion? Would ye dwell in my Zion? Come out of your comfort, believe, and arm yourselves for this great battle against the wickedness that would devour you before it is too late and you are eaten up and no longer my sheep."

When will my people look within themselves and see the shattered, sick condition of their own hearts and souls and know I speak to them - to each one, not to the one who sits beside them, whose faults they can so readily see?

Give this message to my people. If only one looks within to see I speak to him, then I have not spoken in vain. And the angels in heaven will rejoice over even one who comes weeping before me to be made whole that I might use even that one to help establish my Zion. Fear not to do as I say for if this is rejected by all, it is me, their God, they yet reject again, not you."
