
And this is but the beginning—for we must raise up

OUR VITAL HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS: PART 3 DUTIES OF WIVES

"Behold, the Lamanites, your brethren ... are more righteous than you; For they have not forgotten the commandments of the Lord, which were given unto our fathers, that they should have, save it were one wife: and concubines they should have none; and there should not be whoredoms committed among them. Behold, their husbands love their wives, and their wives love their husbands, and their husbands and their wives love their children "

(Jacob 2:54, 55 and 57).

GOD'S PLAN FOR THE CHRISTIAN HOME.

God's plan for the home is that it be a haven, a special place where husband, wife and children live with a sense of security and acceptance, a place where love and peace abound. Jesus spoke of our time in history saying,

"because iniquity shall abound the love of many shall wax cold" (Matthew 24:12).

In a world increasingly characterized by stress, tension, self-interest and hostility, the Christian home was designed to be a refuge, a place of emotional safety, where each person is valued, a place where laughter and conversation are treasured, where a person's most intimate longings and needs are met.

But a happy, stable home doesn't just happen because two believers marry. Loving

and living together in this kind of atmosphere require determination and practice. It requires the giving of oneself for the good of the other partner and the family. Most importantly, it requires a willingness to understand and obey the counsels of the Lord given to both husbands and wives.

Admitedly, the single life is easier. The single person has our common responsibilities to God and to the body of Christ. Beyond that one's duty is to career, community and oneself. But when a Christian man and woman stand before God and make their marriage vows, they are really agreeing voluntarily to give up that easier single life and to live for one another. I admit, as well, that most of us, when that day came, were ill-prepared to assume all those responsibilities God has placed upon us. It's a risky business, but then marriage was always a risky business. And today with our new concepts of a liberated society and individual, the emphasis on looking out for #1, self-assertiveness and an in-your-face attitude, the risks are far higher than ever before.

As a teenager I remember reading Adm. Richard Byrd's book, Alone. I can't remember all the details of the adventure. but I was forever impressed by his description of the decision made about the first yearround expedition in Antarctica. As the days grew on toward winter, most of the team had to leave for Australia. There were not sufficient supplies to see three people through the long winter, so just two persons, or a solitary individual, would remain behind. It was decided that it was too dangerous to leave two people in these small quarters and in such close contact for six months, so Byrd remained alone for the long winter night. Recognizing the truth in what Paul stated in that all of us are sinners and fall short of the glory of God, they decided that two people alone in a stressful environment, living so closely together would

make too many opportunities for conflict and trouble, possibly fatal.

Yet God places two sinners together in a little home, often with inadequate resources and with no special training, with dozens of problems to face daily and expects them not only to survive for six months, but to thrive, to exhilarate, to rejoice and thank Him for that opportunity given to them. This is more apt to be the scenario if husbands and wives recognize and abide by the terms God has established for marriage partners. Now we shall examine some specific duties of wives which God has imposed upon His people. In the next issue we shall look at the responsibilities He has placed upon husbands. Remember, I have already acknowledged they are not easy, but the results of obedience bring us marvelous dividends while ignoring them is to live in a lesser condition of contentment and peace than God wishes for His people.

SPECIFIC DUTIES OF WIVES.

When discussing the roles of the Christian wife, the term, submission, always comes up because of its inclusion in the Bible texts of Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3. Some specific duties of wives are set forth in these passages. Let's read them, and then examine all the ramifications of these teachings:

"Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in everything. Nevertheless let every one of you in particular so love his wife even as himself; and the wife see that she reverence her husband" (Ephesians 5:22-24, 33).

"Likewise, ye wives, be in subjection to your own husbands; that, if any obey not the word, they also may without the word be won by the conversation of the wives; While they behold your

chaste conversation coupled with fear. Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; But let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price. For after this manner in the old time the holy women also, who trusted in God, adorned themselves, being in subjection unto their own husbands: Even as Sara obeyed Abraham, calling him lord: whose daughters ye are, as long as ve do well, and are not afraid with any amazement" (1 Peter 3:1-6).

The very first duty of the Christian wife is identified in each passage as submissiveness to her husband. The minister in 1995 America who would suggest that such an archaic term is pertinent to wives today would be hotly criticized along with the two antiquated apostles. But we who believe that all scripture is inspired by the Holy Spirit I pause in mid-sentence to say that this is something you

must each come to grips with: either you do, or do not, believe that the writings of the early prophets and apostles were inspired by the Holy

Spirit of God. Jesus said,

"My doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me" (John 7:16).

And Peter told us that

"holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21).

And so I say, we who believe all scripture is inspired by the Holy Spirit realize that the apostles were not writing out of any animosity toward women, but from the earliest words of God to mankind. Do you remember what He said?

"Unto the woman he said, I will greatly multiply thy sorrow and thy conception; in sorrow thou shalt bring forth children; and thy desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee. And unto Adam he said. Because thou hast hearkened unto the voice of thy wife. and hast eaten of the tree, of which I commanded thee, saying, Thou shalt not eat of it: cursed is the ground for thy sake; in sorrow shalt thou eat of it all the days of thy life; Thorns also and thistles shall it bring forth to thee; and thou shalt eat the herb of the field; In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread. till thou return unto the ground: for out of it wast thou taken: for dust thou art, and unto dust shall thou return"

(Genesis 3:16-19).

Just as natural and predetermined as weeds, sweat and death to man are childbirth and submission to wives - not by some decree of Paul or Peter, but by God Himself. If you have a real problem with this concept, you must take it up with Him who, in His infinite

wisdom, determined it for our good. But first, let me explain some important aspects of the scriptural definition of submission, and let me later describe the kind of Christian man to whom you wives are to be submissive.

First of all. Christian submissiveness does not denote blind obedience or some type of slavery. All of us are commanded to submit to God (James 4:7), to rulers (1 Peter 2:13), to the laws of the land (2:13), to our employers (2:18) and to one another (5:5). Authority has been given in a limited degree by God. To the State He has given authority to protect the citizenry. To the Church He has given authority to preach the Gospel. When the State went beyond their limits of given authority and forbade the apostles to preach, they replied,

"We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

In like manner in 1 Peter 3:6 it says, (permit me to paraphrase) "wives should be obeying God and afraid of no intimidation."

The Lord would never expect a wife to do that which is contrary to His commandment just to be submissive to her husband.

In every institution there is one recognized authority: in the church it is Christ. In the nation it is the president, who surrounds himself with advisors. In the military it is a Chief of Staff who is also surrounded by advisors. In the classroom it is a teacher who is surrounded by resource people. In the Christian home the husband was to be that authority. His responsibility is to make the final decision about spiritual matters, the management of the family affairs, the delegation of responsibilities, finances and discipline. And where is the wife in all of this? Remember, she was never intended to be a passive by-stander: she was to be the helper to her husband in all things. Her insights and input into the decision- making is a necessary, vital role that must not be neglected.

Think of the Bible story of the young wife, Esther. In giving her counsel respectfully to the ruler of the known world, this young wife changed the course of history and saved the Jewish people from certain extermination. In my own life, I can certainly remember how my wife's advice about more effective ways of discipline helped me greatly, both at home and at school, and that is not to say that her advice and insights about many other aspects of life were any less important.

After all the discussion; after all the intuitive, feminine insights of the wife have been considered - and I shall state that the man who doesn't consider them is a foolish man indeed - and a final decision has been reached, the wife's role is to respect that decision. Especially is it important in front of the children; they must know that there is one united authority in the home and just one set of limits which they are to respect.

We often have to take God's word on faith, but that is not to say there is no body of supportive evidence to establish the validity of it. Landis, in his book, *Making the Most of Marriage*, tells us that polls show that in those fami-

lies where women play the dominant role, less than 50% were happy households; whereas, in those homes where the father had the dominant role more than two thirds of them were happy. Where the family acted in a real partnership in decision making, 90 % reported themselves as happy.

Certainly after major decisions have been reached, the wife's role should not be a passive one. She may prove to be better at making purchases, keeping the books, and so forth. A man who has no great talent or interest in such things should thank the Lord for providing just the right helpmate for him. Without a doubt the wife has the greater responsibility for the early training and discipline of the children, but the final responsibility is the husband's. When you find a household where the children are disobedient, rebellious or disrespectful to their mother, chances are good that a husband has been neglectful of his duties. Listen to this counsel in Proverbs 6:20 of a father to his son:

"My son, forsake not

the law of thy mother."
Here we see a husband performing his duty in reinforcing all the family's rules and discipline.

Law makers and peace officers are now recognizing that the violence and delinquency which is inundating our nation is, in many instances, a direct result of weak or absent fathers. Sociologists today also are aware that the absence of fathers in the home constitutes a prime factor in the growing rate of teenage pregnancies. Believers do not find it strange that the Creator knew such things from the very beginning of time and gave counsels to help His people avoid such problems.

A man can have no greater help than a good wife, nor greater hindrance than one who shows disrespect for his leadership. Solomon, the great and wise ruler of Israel, described an honored man of the city; one who was entrusted with great responsibility. And why? Because he was married to a good wife. He gives an excellent description in Proverbs 31:11-28. As you read this beautiful description

of a godly woman and loyal wife, you will see that she is a strong and active person, extending her talents and personality into every aspect of a dynamic and fulfilling life.

We will summarize by painting a word picture of the scriptural wife. She is an active partner and helper of her husband; she shows respect for him; she is modest and chaste; she demonstrates a gentle and quiet spirit; she is obedient to God and fearless of all else; she is a willing worker who provides well for her family; she makes good use of the family's resources, and she is a woman who has accepted on faith that God's commandment of submissiveness to her husband is for her good, the good of the family and society.

In this day of growing selfishness and willfulness, of increasing turmoil and violence, of escalating excesses and iniquity, may the Lord bless and increase the scriptural wife that our nation and our church be blessed.




