

A Study in Mosiah

The book of Mosiah presents us with some remarkable insights of the deep spiritual nature and understanding that was given to the Nephite people living in the city state of Zarahemla. King Benjamin was a wonderful ruler of this people, reverent and God-fearing, with a love for his people that stands out in the Book of Mormon as an example that we could well hold up as being near perfect.

The story opens in the first chapter at the close of the life of this righteous and holy man as he prepares to give over the kingdom to his son, Mosiah. He gathers his people to hear his voice in testimony to his faith in God and his understanding of the gospel of Christ. For truly he had received a remarkably deep and abiding faith and knowledge of the Lord.

King Benjamin recalled to the people the facts of his life of service to them, calling attention to the fact that he had supported himself by his labors, not by the taxation of his people. He recognized that the principle of love and service to God was found in service to others. He taught them that God requires obedience to the commandments and all should be thankful to God for our lives and the many blessings coming from the God who has created us.

He had in his time put down contentions and evil; with justice and mercy had brought a period of peace and prosperity for the people. He now warns against contention and relationship with the spirit of evil. He understands how contentions are most often self-serving, unjustified by sound doctrine and love of our fellowman. as well as how the relationship with the Spirit of the Lord is cut off if we follow and obey such spirits. Read verses 73 through 75. as well as verses 79 and 82.

King Benjamin had the visitation of an angel from God who gave him the knowledge of the coming of the Son of God, Jesus Christ. He was given the knowledge of the ministry and work of Jesus, of His death by crucifixion, and the resurrection the third day. He was given the understanding of faith, repentance for sin, and the atonement for sin through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ.

Now these people were still under the law of Moses, but he called their attention to the fact that "...the Lord God hath sent his holy prophets among all the children of men to declare these things to every kindred, nation, and tongue, that thereby whoso-

ever should believe that Christ should come, the same might receive remission of their sins, and rejoice with exceeding great joy, even as though he had already come among them" verse 109.

This has made the gospel of salvation through Jesus Christ available to every generation of people. It was the stiffnecked (unbelieving-AGS) people of Israel that Moses led out of the captivity in Egypt that "... $God...appointed\ unto\ them\ a$ law, even the law of Moses. And yet they hardened their hearts. and understood not that the law of Moses availeth nothing, except it were through the atonement of his (Christ's—AGS) blood." Read carefully these scriptures in verses 110 and 113.

Paul was well schooled in the law of Moses, the history of the people of Israel, and all their traditions and customs. "If therefore perfection were by the Levitical priesthood, (for under it the people received the law,) what further need was there that another priest should rise after the order of Melchisedec, and not be called after the order of Aaron? For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change also of the law" Hebrews 7:11-12.

We also read in Paul's writing to the Galatians, "Wherefore then serveth the law? It was added because of transgressions, till the seed should come to whom the promise was made; and it was ordained by angels in the hand of a mediator" Galatian 3:19. Also he continues in verse 24, "Wherefore the law was our schoolmaster to bring us to Christ, that we might be justified by faith."

This raises the questions, changed from what? Or to what? What law or ordinance was in effect before Moses gave them the law that God sent to these people from Mount Sinai? There had been numerous holy prophets and holy people before the law of Moses was given. Noah found favor of God and was saved with his family from the flood. Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob had not yet been born. Think upon this and see if you can explain it better than Paul. No wonder that we refer to the message of Jesus Christ as the everlasting gospel—it has been known among mankind from the beginning, and not just since the advent of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

King Benjamin was fully aware of the true mission of Moses and the mission of the Son of God who was to come. "For behold, and also his blood atoneth for the sins of those who have fallen by the transgression of Adam, who have died, not knowing the will of God con-

cerning them, or who have ignorantly sinned. But wo, wo unto him who knoweth that he rebelleth against God; for salvation cometh unto none such, except it be through repentance and faith on the Lord Jesus Christ" Mosiah 1:107-108.

Continuing to quote from this scripture, we read, "And even if it were possible that little children could sin, they could not be saved; but I say unto you, they are blessed; for behold as in Adam, or by nature they fall, even so the blood of Christ atoneth for their sins" verses 114-115. "For behold. judgeth, and his judgement is just, and the infant perisheth not, that die in his infancy..." verse 117.

King Benjamin preached to the people that they should be humble as little children, have faith in God, and be believing in the atonement of Christ that brings us salvation. He taught them that they should become saints under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

"For the natural man is an enemy to God, and has been, from the fall of Adam, and will be, for ever and ever; But if he yieldeth to the enticings of the Holy Spirit, and putteth off the natural man, and becometh a saint, through the atonement of Christ, the Lord, and becometh as a child, submissive, meek, humble, patient, full of love, willing to submit to all things which the Lord seeth fit to inflict upon him, even as a child doth submit to his father. And moreover, I say unto you, that the time shall come, when the knowledge of a Savior shallspreadthroughout every nation, kindred, tongue, and people. And behold, when that time cometh, none shall be found blameless before God, except it be little children, only through repentance and faith on the name of the Lord God Omnipotent..." verses 119-122.

King Benjamin prophesied and saw our time when the knowledge of Christ would spread throughout the world. He had an understanding of the coming day of judgement when all would stand before our God to be judged according to their works, whether they be good, or whether they be evil.

We who live in these latter

days are blessed above measure as we hold these records in our hands, the Bible and the Book of Mormon. They hold a mighty testimony to our God and His endless mercy and love for all mankind. They have been preserved by the will of God that none should be denied the truth, that all should have the same right and privilege to obey or disobey, that none shall be judged as unworthy of salvation except they have the opportunity to know the truth.

The gospel of salvation is the same yesterday, today, and forever. We are called to be saints today as they were in the days of old. The promises are as eternal as is the Lord, Jesus Christ. To those of us who hear the words of our God through these testimonies and obey, the promise is life eternal. The ones who reject this gospel shall stand before God and receive a just and lasting punishment for their deeds.

The testimony of King Benjamin does not stand alone. Amaleki was witness of this man of God as recorded in the book of Omni, chapter 1, verses 43 through 47:

"And it came to pass that I began to be old; and, having no seed, and knowing King Benjamin to be a just man before the Lord, wherefore, I shall deliver up these plates unto him, exhorting all men to come unto God, the Holy One of Israel, And believe in prophesying, and in revelations, and in the

ministering of angels, and in the gift of speaking with tongues, and in the gift of interpreting languages, and in all things which are good: For there is nothing

which is good, save it comes from the Lord; and that which is evil, cometh from the devil.

"And now, my beloved brethren, I would that ye should come unto Christ, which is the Holy One of Israel, and partake of his salvation, and the power of his redemption. Yea, come unto him, and offer your whole souls as an offering unto him, and continue in fasting and praying, and endure to the end; and as

the Lord liveth, ye will be saved."

Oh, that we might take this admonition to our hearts and truly become the saints of God in these latter days; that He may find us faithful servants in His kingdom, when Jesus Christ returns to the earth to receive His Bride, the church.

CHRISTIANS AND THE GOVERNMENT

"Tell us therefore, What thinkest thou? Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar, or not? But Jesus perceived their wickedness, and said, Why tempt ye me, ye hypocrites? Shew me the tribute money. And they brought unto him a penny. And he saith unto them, Whose is this image and superscription? They say unto him. Caesar's. Then saith he unto them. Render therefore unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's; and unto God the things that are God's" Matthew 22:17-21.

This problem seems more prevalent today, for professed Christians have become as the wicked hypocrites which Christ was addressing. On July 28, 1996, we opened our newspaper to the headlines, "Month of Terror changes America forever." The article reflects the new America under siege by terrorism from within its own borders.

Within a short period of time we have read the headlines: "Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, Oklahoma City, bombed April 19, 1995"; "Am-

trak derailment act of sabotage, Sept. 1995"; "Militia accused of bomb plot," where twelve members of the Viper Militia were arrested July 1, 1996, for planning to bomb at least seven government buildings and one TV station in Phoenix; "TWA flight 800 explodes, July 23, 1996," further headlines report flight 800's fate was the act of a terrorist; "Blast rips Olympic Park, one reported dead scores injured July 26, 1996," post headlines to read, "Bombing called act of domestic terrorism"; and "Ex-gang member reveals anti-U.S. plot July 31. 1996," reporting a gang hoped to overthrow the government.

"I think terrorism has come to America," said Martin Medhurst, a presidential scholar at Texas A&M University. "It has been going on in Europe for two decades or more. This is not the end. This is just the beginning."

So often these anti-government groups claim their motivation of protest from behind the facade of religion, as did David Koresh in Waco, Texas. Other anti-government groups deny any government authority, claiming they are only exercising their rights afforded them by the Constitution. One such

group calls themselves, "The freemen." In their delusion they fail to file or pay income tax, refuse to obtain driver's licenses or vehicle registration, and refuse to acknowledge local law enforcement officers. The more extreme factions of antigovernment groups stock-pile arms and ammunition to battle their own countrymen, and even sometimes resort to terrorist acts of defiance and destruction.

Fearing the United States is subject to indiscriminate terrorist attacks, coming from within or abroad, could also change our basic right of free movement and access to public places. We may have to relinquish our basic right of freedom for security. Martin Medhurst said, "It will impose additional cost on us in a lot of different ways, but perhaps the greatest one is the potential loss of liberty," he said. "There is a great likelihood of overreaction. Perhaps too many people will too willingly give over their right of privacy and liberty and trade it in for security."

Having such freedom of movement, constitutional rights, respect of our expectation of privacy, public safety, right to prosper, own property, bear arms and vote are a rarity and not the normal way of life. If one was to travel in other countries they could easily see how blessed we are, and how deprived of freedom others are. Our government makeup, which includes paying taxes, makes this all possible.

But what about Christians and government? Certainly there are many aspects of government with which we Christians probably do not agree. I shudder when hearing my tax dollars are supporting "pornographic material" under the pretense of grants for art. My heart sickens when I hear our politicians speak about "freedom of choice" and give grants to abortion clinics. What are Christians to think about government; should we comply or rebel?

The Bible reports a new beginning for man upon the earth. God had seen the world had become corrupt and every vain imagination was had by its inhabitants; thus, He cleansed the earth by water. Noah and his family were the only ones spared. When Noah disembarked from the ark, God said to him, "...Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth. Every moving thing that liveth shall be meat for you; even as the green herb have I given you all things. And surely your blood of your lives will I require; at the hand of every beast will I require it, and at the hand of man; at the hand of every man's brother will I require the life of man. Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man

shall his blood be shed: for in the image of God made he man" Genesis 9:1, 3, 5-6.

Noah was instructed to replenish the earth with inhabitants, authorize a new diet, and a human government was established even as the word "require," reflects a judicial term. It comes from a Hebrew word: darash (Pronunciation: dawrash) meaning: "usually to follow (for pursuit or search); by implication, to seek or ask; specifically—ask, care diligently, inquire, make inquisition."

In this instruction of establishing governments, God is the Judge exacting judgment upon those who take the life of another. If a beast takes the life of a man, it must be put to death. If a man willfully kills another man, then he too must be put to death.

The instruction states the penalty is to be carried out "by every man's brother." This is not intended to infer family vengeance. It does mean the surviving population is responsible to insure that justice is executed and carried out according to God's decree. In the day this was delivered, all men were literally brothers. Since we all come from the progeny of them we are, in a sense, all brothers.

Human government exercised under God's direction is not a case of vengeance. The emphasis is on justice and recognition of the sacredness of man's life which was created in the image of God. God has delegated the authority to man, re-

quiring him to carefully investigate, judge, and carry out His command. This authority was reaffirmed in Moses' day, and the Law was given to the people who stood accountable not only to God but to each other.

In New Testament times church leaders such as Peter acknowledged government as God's plan; submission was required and rebellion "Submit yourdeemed evil. selves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake: whether it be to the king, as supreme; Or unto governors, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers, and for the praise of them that do well" 1 Peter 2:13-14.

We may not always agree with our government, but we can not resort to using the tools of Satan, which are anger. wrath, malice, blasphemy, violence, deceit, and overbearence. 2 Corinthians 10:3-4 tells us. "For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: (For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;)..." Our weapons against the adversary are truth, righteousness, the gospel of peace, faith, salvation, the Word of God and prayer, according to Ephesians 6:12-20.

Violent protest is contrary to God, and shows a great lack of faith that God is mighty to deliver. Those who trust in their own wisdom and strength will be counted as evil. Peter said, "The Lord knoweth how to deliver the godly out of temptations, and to reserve the unjust unto the day of judgment to be punished: But chiefly them that walk after the flesh in the lust of uncleanness, and despise government. Presumptuous are they, selfwilled, they are not afraid to speak evil of dignities" 2 Peter 2:9-10.

Anti-government attitudes are becoming more prevalent daily, but it should not be found in our midst. I may take government protests personally, possibly because I have reported to work for the past ten years at two of the buildings targeted to be blown up recently by the "Viper Militia." I can see no just cause or good that would have come from such conduct.

On the subject of innocent victims being murdered in the line of such violent protest, as the Alfred P. Murrah Federal building in Oklahoma City, and Government buildings in Phoenix, local radio host, John Dayl contributes to this violent behavior. Dayl says, "These people are not innocent victims. If they work in the Federal Building, they're the very people that are typing letters, that are making phone calls, that are getting your land taken away from you. That are calling you up on the Internal Revenue Service. That want to confiscate all your They're all involved, guns... every one of them. I don't care whether they're any more than a clerk...these people are not innocent victims. These are people that operate and move the system against you and I.

These are people that have sold out the system. These are the people that are against you and I."

Professed Christians displaying anti-government attitudes have lost Christian values and need to change their ways. Any organized group, including churches, who voice anti-government sentiments across their pulpits or in their publications will quickly be classified as dissenters and a threat to national security. Such recognition would hinder us from effectively witnessing the gospel of Christ.

God has made a promise to the Gentiles that possess this nation, accurately describing the freedom we cherish: "And this cometh unto you, O ve Gentiles, that ye may know the decrees of God.... Behold, this is a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven, if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things which we have written" Ether 1:34-35.

We are here abiding in a land of freedom only because a remnant of Christians remain. Maintaining our Christian values is an important prerequisite in maintaining our freedom. The Apostle Paul wrote that orderly government is a part of God's provision, and no ruler exercises control except God permits. We, as Christians, need to be obedient to the laws of the land, for this is God's law.

Those who resist, also resist God and shall be damned.

"Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same: For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake. For for this cause pay ye tribute also: for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing. Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honour to whom honour" Romans 13:1-7.

testimony to you.





OBITUARY


Isaac B. Brockman, Sr.

Lider Isaac B. Brockman, Sr., son of the late August and Pearl Brockman, was born September 8, 1925, at Sparta, Wisconsin, and passed to his eternal reward August 11, 1996, at Trinity Lutheran Hospital, Kansas City, Missouri, at the age of 70 years 11 months.

He is survived and will be greatly missed by his wife of 52 years, Ruth, of the home; a son, Isaac, Jr. (Bick), and his wife, Diane; a daughter, Cheryl, and her husband, David Taylor; four grandchildren: David Taylor, Cherish Cochran, Michelle Oldham and Aimee Brockman; and two great-grandchildren: Sadi Cochran and Trenton Oldham; a sister-in-law, Betty Olson, all of Independence; and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in passing by an infant brother, a sister, Viola, and a great-granddaughter, Kelsey Oldham.

A memorial service was



held Wednesday, August 14, 1996, at Speaks Suburban Chapel, with Elders Charles W. and Charles A. Brantner officiating, with interment at Oak Ridge Memory Gardens, Independence, and with Apostle Robert H. Jensen voicing the committal prayer. Martha Bruner was the soloist, accom-

panied by Grace Rudd, the organist.

Isaac was baptized July 19, 1938, into Christ and the Church, attending Sparta and Black River Falls, Wisconsin, where he pastored the local there after being ordained to the eldership on August 5, 1960.


