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

PEACEMAKERS

"Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God." St. Matthew 5: 9.

I have often read this verse of scriptures and so have you many times. At the same time I have considered how this could be applied to our conduct in life. How do we become peacemakers? We are surrounded daily by controversy, quarreling, arguments, and sometimes disagreeable people who make up our world at school, work or play. In order to function and get along in our daily lives we struggle to protect ourselves, and who we really are; to maintain control of our feelings, emotions, and sometimes our physical well being.

In our society today we have an enormous crime problem and it seems there is no solution in the laws of the land. It is not only a problem here in our country but world wide. In of violence, killing and injuring others wholesale, and it is not only adults, but children committing violent acts against other children, even to their parents. All the modern tools of communication are used by Satan to educate our cultures how to destroy ourselves both physically and spiritually.

Most often when we are confronted with some controversy, difference of opinion on different viewpoint we are confronted with the unpleasant necessity of making a choice, taking a position, or quietly declining to commit ourselves. A good many of us take an active part and voice our opinion as a personal right and our privilege. Often these are matters of no great consequence and no harm is done to any of the parties. There are times when it is of great importance to make the right choices and stand for the truth and for what we believe to be right. "But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to anger persons commit crimes | be intreated, full of mercy and | of contention, is not of me, but

good fruits, without partiality. and without hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace." James 3: 17-18

Obviously, to have that wisdom from above we need the Holy Spirit, for wisdom is a gift and we cannot be a peacemaker without first being at peace with God. As the prophet Amos wrote," Can two walk together, except the they be agreed?" We have to walk with God to enjoy the gifts of the Spirit. To be a peacemaker is then a high calling that when exercised will bear the fruit of righteousness with God's help.

In the message that Jesus gave to the Nephites on this continent we read with respect to our conduct as a people of God the firm instruction, "And there shall be no disputations among you, as there hath hitherto been; neither shall there be disputations among you concerning the points of my doctrine, as there hath hitherto been. For verily, verily I say unto you, He that hath the spirit is of the devil, which is the father of contention, and he stirreth up the hearts of men to contend with anger one with another. Behold, this is not my doctrine, to stir up the hearts of men with anger one against another; but this is my doctrine, that such things should be done away." Third Book of Nephi, 5: 29-31. Again Jesus spoke to them about contentions after giving some instructions of how to handle certain people who come into the church. We read, "And I give you these commandments, because of the disputations which hath been among you beforetimes. And blessed are ye if ye have no disputations among you." He would that we have peaceful agreement and no arguments especially about his doctrine and practices in the church. Unfortunately we often find ourselves confronted with such circumstances because of our human weakness being prone to be selfishly motivated. Apostle Paul wrote. "But if any man seem to be contentious, we have no such custom, neither the churches of God." I Cor. 11: 16. He perceived that there were divi-

sions (opposing opinions with strife. A.G.S.) among the church people at Corinth and he praised them not, clearly stating this is not an acceptable practice. What can we do when we find ourselves confronted with errors in teaching or practice? Are we to keep silent and concede to the opponent just to keep the peace? Jude wrote we should contend for right, "-that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints." (verse 3). We would be careful to note that there is room to contend for the truth without anger as Paul wrote to Timothy. "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, in meekness instructing those that oppose themselves:" 2 Timothy, 2: 24.

I am thoroughly convinced that if we as a people who claim to be the Church of Christ would attend strictly to the business of preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ as so plainly outlined in Third Book of Nephi, chapter 5, verses 32 through 44, that we would experience the power of the Holy Spirit among us. It is the propensity among us

to argue and contend about things that are in some sense questionable and marginal to the doctrines of the soul's salvation that is the source of much contention and disputation among us. I am thrilled in my heart when I remember the real purpose and the message of the ministry and the doctrine of our Lord. Why He came into this wicked world and what He did to provide salvation for my soul and yours is the greatest love story of all time. It needs to be told over and over again. I am also convinced that it is this teaching that will bring peace to the world, to our country, to our neighborhoods, to our families, and most of all to the Church of Christ. To become peacemakers we need only to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek. (And it is promised to you and I of this age. A.G.S.) For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, The just shall live by faith." Romans 1: 16-17.

Doris Geraldine Ratterree

Doris Geraldine Ratterree was born to Elmer and Laura Long on September 16, 1912 in Lamoni, IA. Her father was a preacher and missionary and her mother, whom he married when she was 18, was an adopted daughter of Thomas and Louisa Stuart.

The following entries were found in Thomas McKee Stuart's Journal. Thomas McKee Stuart was Doris's grandfather who lived with the Long family in his later years and kept a personal journal from 1842 until his death in 1922.

Monday, September 16, 1912, cold and damp, temperature 56, a little baby girl came to us at 11:50 a.m. to live here. Mother and baby doing well at 6:00 p.m. Mrs. Laura Long brought forth a big girl weighing 9 lbs. Mrs. Dr. Gareer assisted.

Wednesday, September 18, 1912, sister Case is working here with us. She is a fine cook and housekeeper and takes good care of Laura and the new baby. It was lucky that E. E. Long got her to attend to his family, at this critical moment. He has been repairing a cistern every day since he came back from Saskatchewan and has almost run his feet off with the new baby girl.

Sunday, Sept. 22, 1912, Temp. 47, Mrs. Joanna Case is doing fine for us, cooking and attending to Laura and baby, while Laura is in the straw. E. E. Long is going to preach at the brick church tonight.

Friday, September 27, 1912, Temp. 48. Mrs. Case has gone home after 10 days attending Laura and baby Victoria. . .as I call her.

Doris was child number 4 in a family of six born to Elmer and Laura. Wilbur, Rogenne, Louella, Doris, Margaret and Elmer. All have passed on except for Margaret and Elmer. Her father, Elmer E. Long, was a missionary for the Church and was gone for long periods of time on mission work in places like Ontario and Saskatchewan in Canada

the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints September 19, 1920. Doris came into the Church of Christ (Temple Lot), by transfer May 25, 1929.

The family moved from Lamoni, Iowa to Independence, Missouri when Doris was 9 years old and she lived in Independence and surrounding area most of her life. She grew up in a house on East Walnut Street and was graduated from William Chrisman High School in 1930. The yearbook described her as,"...as having a wonderful brain and runs it herself."

Shortly after High School she married James A. Hedrick, great grandson of Granville Hedrick, one of the founders and leaders of the early Temple Lot Church. Jim and Doris became farmers and lived on several farms in Eastern Jackson County. Among the things they grew were children. They had 5 children in 7 years.

In 1942, they moved to a Doris was baptized into I farm near Schell City, Missouri and continued farming until 1945 when they were separated and then divorced in 1946.

Doris then moved with her 5 children back to Independence. Having married young, a housewife and mom most of her adult life with no real employable skills, this was a particularly difficult time in her life. Now, on her own, a single mom with 5 children, the oldest just 12 years old, was an overwhelming prospect. But, the thing that sustained her and gave her the courage and strength to go on was an uncompromising faith in the promise that God would provide. And, she believed he would. . . and, He did.

She took each new day as it came, threw herself into a life of supporting her family as best she could, making whatever personal sacrifices were necessary to keep food on the table and clothes on our backs. It appeared little thought was given to her personal needs and desires, but kept focused on her family, her work and frequent prayer. Friends and family helped with much needed encouragement and support particularly

her two sisters Margaret and Louella. Help came from many other sources, individuals and groups, and often at moments help was most desperately needed.

The late forties fifties was spent raising her family and helping to get them started in a life of their own. 1962 brought a new phase into her life. Doris at 50, was faced with the prospect of an empty nest, and alone for the first time since she was a 18-yearold girl. During this time she worked as a bookkeeper and office manager for several printing companies in Kansas City and when she retired at 62, she soon began working as secretary at the Church of Christ (Temple Lot).

In 1963 she married Raymond Ratterree. Mr. Ratterree, a widower, was married to Doris's older sister Rogene who passed away some time previously. He had known Doris since she was 12 years old. They started corresponding by mail since he lived in Arizona and eventually, courted and were married. This was a very happy time for Doris having a devoted and loving husband. But it was

short-lived. Ray died of a heart attack after a short 5 months of marriage.

In the years following, Doris lived at her home on South Logan Street in Independence staying active in the church and spending as much time with her friends and family as she could. She found great joy in being with her grandchildren and great grandchildren who lived locally and traveled frequently to where the others lived. They were her delight and she never wearied from seeing them or being with them. She enjoyed her many close friends and was very active socially with them.

In the last four years of her life, she suffered a serious fall, diagnosed as having Alzheimer's disease and was not able to live alone again. She required constant care. Resthaven is truly an outstanding home and in every way, as they claim, a loving, Christ-centered facility. The Family cannot say enough good things about her care at Resthaven.

Doris was a quiet, simple woman requiring very little personally. Soft-spoken and capable of great love, but stubborn and quietly uncompromising on the things she believed in. Her unquestioned courage was supported by her firm trust in God and the promise of Jesus Christ through faith as her personal Savior.

Among the many memories of my mother, there are two things about her that are most memorable for me. One is her remarkable, unyielding faith. The other is the miracle

that occurred every time she smiled. With each smile every tissue, muscle, crevice and wrinkle in her whole face lit up and the whole world became happiness. A virtual explosion took place on her face. She loved to laugh and be happy. Every wrinkle testified to it, and every wrinkle, she earned.

Doris had 39 descendants. Five children, Mary Margaret Ackenhausen, Alma (Al) Hedrick, Geraldine

Elizabeth Adams, two sons now deceased, James A.. and Granville Robert, 15 grand-children and 19 great grand-children. She was 84 years, 2 months and 9 days old on November 25, 1996, when she passed away peacefully.
