

beings with a conscience to guide us in choosing between good and evil. This is why we are capable of sin. Sin is never a mistake; it is a choice that we are always responsible for. To covet is a sin as great as the more familiar forms of evil behavior.

Romans 7:7: "Nay, I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet."

Romans 13:9: "...Thou shalt not covet; and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

In the world around us to-

day we see the evils that are overwhelming humanity, and in many cases the first sin of covetousness is followed by more violent and destructive evils. The lust for power over others and wealth or property belonging to others is first of all a self-ish expression of the heart.

Luke 12:15, 21: "And He said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth. So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

The basic law of the gospel of Jesus Christ is love, wholly and without exception, unselfish giving. This is unquestionably the greatest expression of love: God sent His Son, Jesus Christ, to save us from our sins.

love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

The story of Lazarus and the rich man is interesting to consider. Wealth, or the lack of wealth, was not the issue. Lazarus was a beggar who had no possessions. We are not told why or how he fell into this predicament, but it is evident that his heart was right with God. He was not covetous of the possessions of others, only asked to

be given crumbs from the table of the rich man. The rich man had made great wealth his goal in life and coveted his possessions. They both died. Lazarus

was comforted in Abraham's bosom (a phrase to express the state of paradise). The rich man was in the torments of hell; he had not kept the law that said, "Thou shall not covet." He was a sinner; he could have done more than give Lazarus crumbs from his table.

Jesus emphasizes the need for faith in God for our common needs as they will be provided. Our natural human inclination is to covet the material earthly things and ignore the spiritual needs of life.

Jesus said, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" Matthew 6:33.

Again Jesus said, "...The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head" Matthew 8:20.

No one would say that He

was a person who didn't believe in work; He had worked with His father until he was near thirty years old as a carpenter, helping to support the family.

So this surely doesn't mean that we are not to work if we are able-bodied for our daily needs. In the beginning Adam was told he had to work the soil for his food by the sweat of his brow.

Paul wrote in 1 Timothy 5:8, "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel."

With faith in God we can work to provide for ourselves and others as we may have opportunity, and God will bless us with the talents, skills and abilities we need.

There is no way that we can escape the temptation to covet, which can lead us into many errors. The common social problems that so often cause us great concern are not new; they are as old as human history. The first murder was a case of jealousy out of control that raised the question that Cain asked of the Lord, "Am I my brothers keeper?"

Riots, strikes and destruction of property follow the sin of covetousness, often seen as the struggle between the "haves and the have nots." The sin of covetousness are on both sides in most cases. Each of us have talents, skills and abilities that allow us to function in life and work at occupations and trades

that yield different recompense and reward. We are expecting a fair reward in our efforts to use these talents. We are all different to some degree and unequal

in many. Our Lord was wise in His observation: "For ye have the poor with you always, and whensoever ye will ye may do them good..." Mark 14:7.

It is how we deal with the problem that is presented to us that will make a difference. If we are generous and caring, there is no sin implied or imputed to those who have 'more' than a brother. Abraham was perhaps more wealthy than his nephew Lot. They migrated from their homelands together, and were herdsmen that shared a love of each other. There is no mention of jealousy between them. Abraham went to the rescue of Lot when he was attacked by four kings in the land where he lived. It must have been a costly enterprise for Abraham to save his nephew and his family. Love and generosity are the opposite values in the heart to covetousness.

Social and material equality was not demonstrated in the kinds of socialism that some governments in our day have tried. Communism has failed in Russia, and we see the Cuban people suffering greatly. Political or religious zeal has not, and will not, produce a change of heart based only on possession of earthly things, or the lack of material wealth. No laws or rules can be written to compel the heart to answer the need of love for our fellow man. We have our free agency to choose to love our fellow beings, or disobey the commandment of God. The last commandment that our Lord gave to the disciples was to love one another.

St. John 15:12: "This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you."

The term sometimes used to show a need for an exchange of wealth or possessions are somewhat misunderstood. To have "all things common" is one such phrase that is found in Acts. It is not saying that they had "all thing in common." That would mean something entirely different. There were things that were common, or alike, among them. At the same time they did not covet their possessions, nor boast of what they had. They voluntarily shared their properties with those who had a need. No other rules or laws were needed. They answered the law of love. Read carefully Acts 4:32, as well as verses 34 and 35. The same

phrase or term is found in the Book of Mormon relative to similar circumstances, in III Nephi 12:11.



Some of these things we could do without, or something less would fill our needs for food, clothing, and shelter. We are admonished to be careful to remember that we came into this world with nothing, and we will leave it with nothing.

"For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. But thou, 0 man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness" I Timothy 6:10-11.

There is the role that the Kingdom of God will play when our Lord returns and "brings again Zion" to the earth (Isaiah 52:8). Most of us will agree that this will resolve all problems, for those who will participate in this government will be the pure in heart. There will be no covetous being to bring sorrow, anger, jealousy, hatred, envy, and violence to the family of God.

"Be ve therefore followers of God, as dear children; And walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweetsmelling savour. For this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God. Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience. Be not ye therefore partakers with them. For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light..." Ephesians 5:1-2, 5-8.

WHAT WAS RESTORED IN

hen Christ began His ministry nearly 2000 years ago one of the first acts of that ministry was to call out twelve men to be special witnesses of him whom he named apostles. Besides these He appointed other seventy also and sent them out two by two before His face into every city and place whither He himself would come. twelve were called apostles and were elders. The seventy, no doubt, were elders also, and were sent out as evangelists to prepare the way before the Lord. In Acts 14:23 we are told that, "...when they had ordained them elders in every church, and had praved with fasting, they commended them

to the Lord...." "Then pleased it the apostles and elders, with the whole church, to send chosen men of their own company to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas; namely, Judas surnamed Barasabas, and Silas, chief men among the brethren..." (Acts 15:22). Later we read. "And from Miletus he (Paul) sent to Ephesus, and called the elders of the church. And when they were come to him, he said unto them..." (Acts 20:17). "And God hath set some in the church, FIRST APOS-TLES, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers..." (1 Corinthians 12:28). "Now therefore ve are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints, and of the household of God; And are built upon the FOUNDATION of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone..." (Ephesians 2:20). "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers..." (Ephesians 4:11).

This was the pattern of the church established by the Lord when He walked in the flesh on this earth. In Hebrews we learned that Christ was to be our great and last High Priest, called after the order of Melchisedec. A similar pattern was also established among the remnant of Joseph in this land. These twelve, however, were called disciples. These disciples, like the apostles above. were elders, who in turn ordained priests and teachers.

Two other identifying marks of the early church were its name and its doctrine. The Book of Mormon pointedly tells us that the name of Church must be the Church of Christ. The other requirement is that it must teach the doctrine of Christ. Otherwise, the Father will not show forth his own works in it. (See 3 Nephi 12:22.)

Says Christ, "Verily I say unto you, that whoso repenteth of his sins through your words, and desireth to be baptized in my name, on

this wise shall ye baptize them: Behold, ye shall go down and stand in the water, and in my name shall ye baptize them. And now behold, these are the words which ye shall say, calling them by name, saying: Having authority given me of Jesus Christ, I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen. And then shall ye immerse them in the water, and come forth again out of the water. And after this manner shall ye baptize in my name, for behold, verily I say unto you, that the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Ghost are one; and I am in the Father, and the Father in me, and the Father and I are one. And according as I have commanded you, thus shall ye baptize. And there shall be no disputations among you, as there hath hitherto been; neither shall there be disputations among you concerning the points of my doctrine, as there hath hitherto been; For verily, verily I say unto you, He that hath the spirit of contention, is not of me, but is of the devil, which is the father of contention, and he stirreth up the hearts of men to contend with anger one with another; Behold, this is not my doctrine, to stir up the hearts of men with anger one against another; but this is my doctrine, that such things

should be done away. Behold, verily, verily I say unto you, I will declare unto you my doctrine. And this is my doctrine, and it is the doctrine which the Father hath given unto me; And I bear record of the Father, and the Father beareth record of me, and the Holy Ghost beareth record of the Father and me, and I bear record that the Father commandeth all men, everywhere, to repent and believe in me; And whoso believeth in me, and is baptized, the same shall be saved; and they are they which shall inherit the kingdom of God. And whoso believeth not in me, and is not baptized, shall be damned. Verily, verily I say unto you, that this is my doctrine; and I bear record of it from the Father: and whoso believeth in me. believeth in the Father also: And unto him will the Father bear record of me; for he will visit him with fire and with the Holy Ghost; And thus will the Father bear record of me; and the Holy Ghost will bear record unto him of the Father and me; for the Father, and I, and the Holy Ghost, are one. And again I say unto you. Ye must repent, and become as a little child, and be baptized in my name, or ye can in no wise receive these things. And again I say unto you, Ye must repent, and be baptized in my name, and become as a little child, or ve

can in nowise inherit the kingdom of God. Verily, verily I say unto you, that this is my doctrine and whoso buildeth upon this, buildeth upon my rock; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against them. ANDWHOSO SHALL DE-CLARE MORE OR LESS THAN THIS, AND ES-TABLISH IT FOR MY DOCTRINE, THE SAME COMETH OF EVIL, AND IS NOT BUILT UPON MY ROCK..." (3 Nephi 5:24-42).

The Lord then followed these words by His sermon on the mount in which He greatly expands on His doctrine; that is, in essence, the keeping of the two great commandments: that of loving God with all our might, mind, and strength, and the second, like unto it, of loving our neighbor as ourselves.

But as we well know from prophecy and history, the church in both lands fell away and went into apostasy. In the old country the apostles and elders were replaced by bishops and cardinals, the chief bishop being the Papa or Pope over all. The great and abominable church was characterized by a one man leader, a personage who sat in the temple of God showing himself that he was God. He usurped the place of Christ in the church. The cardinals replaced the apostles and the bishops supplanted the eldership of the ancient church. Additionally, the pure doctrine of Christ was replaced by the ancient idolatrous teachings and practices of ancient Babylon. The name of the Church was also changed by entirely deleting the name of Christ; thus, it became the universal church. The saints were to be given into this man's power for a set period of time, that of 1260 years. The result was that during this period of time the authority of the priesthood, the pure doctrine of Christ, the organizational structure of the church, and the name of the church were all removed from the church and the whole world was plunged into the time of darkness known as the dark ages.

But light was again to spring forth at the conclusion of that period, and all that had been lost would be restored once again to the earth. Did this happen in 1829-30? Most assuredly! We know from history that this did come to pass, and with mighty signs accompany-The prophetic image of Daniel stood complete for the first and only time in history, and the little stone kingdom was cut out of the mountain without hands. The angel had flown as prophesied by John. A little while later the former and latter rains returned to Palestine after an absence of 1800 years, as proclaimed by the prophet Isaiah. The year 1829-30 marked the date of the coming forth of the church out of the The Church of wilderness. Christ was again restored to the earth, along with the power and authority of the priesthood to administer the ordinances of

His church. The gospel of the kingdom was restored again to the earth in its purity (the fullness of the gospel as contained in the Book of Mormon). The organizational structure also was provided for as commanded by revelation, though due to lack of obedience, the quorum of apostles was not then put in place. Thus, there were to be Apostles, Elders, Priests, and Teachers, etc., as well as prophets. All this was accomplished and in place by April 6, 1830, (except for the full quorum of apostles) and the foundation was laid for the upbuilding of Zion and the work of the gospel among the nations. All had been restored by that precise date in fulfillment of the prophecies that the dominion of the man of sin, the beast of Revelation, and the little horn of Daniel, were to have an end on that date and judgment would again be given to the saints and they would possess the kingdom. But because of the weaknesses of men the work was caused to falter, and apostasy soon entered into the little flock, and the seeds of a false church began again to rear its ugly head, first by setting up a one man leader, second by dropping the name of Christ from the name of the church, and third by adding to and subtracting from the doctrine of Christ. The rest is history as God broke off the offending mass by removing it to a salt land, while leaving behind a far more pure remnant in Illinois, not a part of Nauvoo, but which continued

the true line of His church as originally established in 1830, thus fulfilling the prophetic statement that it would not be left to other people but that it would stand forever.

What was restored in 1830? The Church of Christ, the organizational structure of His church, the authority of the priesthood, and the gospel of the kingdom. This is what was restored because this is what had been lost during the wilderness period of the church.

What had not and could not be restored, since such had no antecedents?

- 1. The Prophet Presidency
- 2. The Office of High Priest
- 3. Polygamy
- 4. Masonry
- 5. Baptism for the Dead
- 6. Marriage for Time and Eternity
- 7. The concept: As God is, man shall become, and as man is, God once was
- 8. The Father having a body of flesh
- 9. The Adam God Theory
- 10. Spiritual Wifery
- 11. Secret Temple Rites
- 12. The Plurality of Gods
- 13. Blood Atonement to save souls of apostates
- 14. The use of water in the sacrament of the Lord's supper.

All these were added to the gospel of Christ following the restoration of His gospel and church in 1829-30. These had no prior existence in the church of 2000 years ago either here or in the old country. And it is noteworthy that none of the above teachings have any counterparts in the word of God as

recorded in the Bible and Book of Mormon.

The innovations coming forth subsequent to 1830 were additions to the gospel, a thing not admissible since we were told by revelation in 1829 that in that which had been written, i.e.: the Book of Mormon, ARE ALL THINGS...concerning 'my church, my gospel, and my rock.' Since this was so, then the restoration of the church, gospel and rock were already complete for in the same revelation (BC 15) the command was also received to seek unto the twelve which, unfortunately for the church, was not obeyed. Yet everything was prepared for the upbuilding of Zion in these last days.

But instead of apostles, Joseph was made prophet and seer, with the instruction that he was to be the sole spokesman to the church. This was done on the very day that the church was officially organized. Then in September of that same year Joseph was made the head of the church. Work on the Inspired Translation commenced. In 1831 High Priests were first ordained, the first two of which were immediately seized by Satan, and bound. In 1832 Joseph was ordained to the Presidency of the High Priesthood by Sidney Rigdon. The United Order was established by revelation. Strange names were employed along with Adam-ondi-Ahman. Those possessing such names were to be bound together by a covenant that could not be broken except judgment follow im-

mediately. In 1833, Sidney Rigdon and F. G. Williams were made equal with Joseph in holding the keys of this last kingdom. In this year provision was made for the building of 24 temples in the city of Zion. In 1834, the High Council composed of twelve high priests was organized. Shortly after this Joseph was named Commander-in-Chief of the armies of Israel, or Zion's Camp, for the redemption of Zion. Later still the United Order of Enoch was established for the salvation of men. One month later the name of the church was changed to the Church of the Latter Day Saints, leaving out the name of Christ entirely. In 1835, a revelation was given, revealing that Adam is Michael the Archangel. Work was done on the Book of Abraham and the Doctrine and Covenants, with numerous changes made to the revelations. In 1836, the covenant of avenge is sealed unanimously, which proclaimed that if any more brethren are slain or driven out by the mob, that they would not rest until they were avenged of their enemies to the uttermost. In this year the Kirtland Safety Society Bank was founded. In 1837 a revelation was given in which Joseph was given the keys which should not be taken from him till Christ comes—further, that whose receiveth Christ receiveth the First Presidency. In 1838, the Hosts of Israel was organized at Adam-ondi-Ahman, along with another organization called the Danites (the destroying angels).

In 1839, Adam was declared to be Michael the Archangel and also the Ancient of Days, while Noah was declared to be Gabriel. In 1840, Joseph delivers a discourse on 'Baptism for the dead.' In 1841, the saints were told that the Nauvoo temple was to be built so there might be a place for the Son of Man to lay His head. In 1842, Joseph officiated as grand chaplain at the institution of the Nauvoo lodge. He stated that the church was not fully organized and could not be until the temple was completed. In 1843, Joseph prophesied that Christ would not come until he was 85 years old. He also stated that except a man and his wife enter into an everlasting covenant and be married for eternity by the power of the priesthood they would cease to increase when they died or have any children after the resurrection. In this same month the revelation on polygamy was given. In 1844, Joseph became a candidate for the U.S. Presidency. In his King Follet funeral sermon he stated that God was once as we are now and is an exalted man, etc. Joseph ordered the destruction of the Nauvoo Expositor.

God removed the most grievous of these errors from His church when he removed the offending part as already stated. However, there are still some things remaining that should be considered very seriously and prayerfully before embracing them as part of that which was restored from the beginning.

The isolated are those who have the experience and adventure of being separated by a number of miles and/or other obstacles without a local enjoying fellowship. I do call it an adventure because of the many challenges and opportunities there can be to our journey in life. My family and I can relate closely to this subject. For ten years we lived a good distance away from our nearest local.

Now there are many ways to be connected and committed to your church. No matter your

condition, you are a vital member in Christ's Church, and He knows exactly who and where you are, and is mindful of you and your needs.

Each of us knows our individual situations, and whether or not it is possible to pick up and move to an active local. There are many things we can do to strengthen our families and ourselves if staying isolated is the only option. First, we need to let our church know right where we are by some correspondence to the missionary covering your area. Let minis-

ters, friends, and acquaintances in the church know that they are welcome in your home when they can visit your area.

There's an emerging amount of young people that love to write back and forth via e-mail. It is easy for isolated young people to get connected to the e-mail group that has so many things to share; besides fellowship, you can keep up to date with news and make your own contributions of personal testimonies. If you don't have a computer with enough capacity, I'm sure your library does and can help you get hooked up with our group. When a person is isolated encouragement is very necessary.

The time we spend in church listening to the minister is encouraging and recharges our spiritual batteries. We have an audio-visual ministry in the church that will send you cassette tapes of current services with sermons. I have used them many times and believe them to be a real valuable source of strength and information. A

person can certainly play them after a Sunday morning study with family and friends. We can even be a source of enlighten-

ment to others by loaning them out to interested friends and acquaintances, spreading the truth of the restored gospel message.

Frances Dexter Yates


January 1, 1908~August 1998


