

"It would be peculiarly improper to omit, in this first official act, my fervent supplication to that Almighty Being, who rules over the universe, who presides in the councils of nations, and whose providential aids can supply every human defect, that His benediction may consecrate to the liberties and happiness of the people of the United States... No people can be bound to acknowledge and adore the invisible hand which conducts the affairs of men more than the people of the United States. Every step by which they have advanced to the character of an independent nation seems to have been distinguished by some token of providential agency... We ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right, which Heaven itself has ordained."



The Signs of the Times

nother year has passed, and with it all the attendant evils which are steadily increasing around us. We are about to enter a new millennia and still the gospel "of the kingdom" has yet to be carried to every nation, kindred, tongue and people. Zion also awaits redemption. The power of the heathen (mentioned in Joel 2 and Ezekiel 30) is upon us, as is clearly evident by the increasing paganism we see about us, and the accompanying New Age Movement and its attendant humanism.

The love of many shall wax cold. Today the instinct to love and nourish up little

suffered children has Paralleling tremendous lapse. this is a vastly increased immorality for the sake of selfish gratification. The desire not to accept responsibility nor the consequences of such a lifestyle is reflected in the tremendous worldwide abortion rate, which is given at 60 million yearly, or 166,000 daily, according to The Kansas City Star. In the U.S. alone more babies have been killed since 1973 than the total population of Canada, Alaska and several of our western states. (For scriptural reference see Matthew 24:12, 2 Timothy 3:1-4 & 13.)

The scriptures warn of false Christs, instructing us not to believe such reports that He is in the desert or in the secret

world, that fact having been announced to the whole world in banner headlines in the *USA Today* newspaper. (See Matthew 24:23-27.)

The time of the end was also to be marked by other signs: for many shall run to and fro and knowledge shall be increased. The chariots shall be with flaming torches in the day of His (God's) preparation...the chariots shall rage in the streets, they shall jostle one against another in the broad ways: they shall seem like torches, they shall run like the lightnings. (See Daniel 12:4 and Nahum 2:3-4.)

"Knowing this first, that there shall come in the last days scoffers, walking after their own lusts. And saying. Where is the promise of his coming? for since the fathers fell asleep, all things continue as they were from the beginning of the creation. For this they willingly are ignorant of, that by the word of God the heavens were of old, and the earth standing out of the water and in the water; Whereby the world that then was, being overflowed with water, perished. But the heavens and the earth, which are now, by the same word are kept in store reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men" II Peter 3:3-7

were to be drunken with iniquity. This is certainly true today more than ever before, even to exceed that which we have ever known.

that time, and even now it is upon us. The whole world is fast ripening in iniquity, and, yes, it will increase even further for a time.

And so what is now at our doorstep? The fulfillment of every remaining prophecy. Harry S. Truman Remembered

s we near the end of the century the world will be giving us a progress report on the last hundred years. If we wait until the year 2000 the spiritual progress may be lost in the ballyhoo of space travel and a myriad of scientific wonders. So let's consider this now.

First off I believe the single greatest prophetic event to occur in this century was when the Jews living in Arabian Palestine rose up and took Jerusalem and the surrounding country and claimed themselves to be the new State of Israel in 1948. Three years before this time the United States had proven itself the most powerful nation on earth by winning a war on two fronts, one in Europe and the other in Asia.

In chapter 2 of Isaiah it says: "For out of Zion shall go forth the law." Those of us who know where Zion is will understand how Isaiah's prophecy came to pass. In a revelation given July 1831, Joseph Smith brought forth: "Behold the place which is now called Independence is the center place, and the spot for the temple is lying westward upon a lot which is not far from the courthouse."

Also not far from the courthouse is the home of a man named Harry Truman. He was President of this great nation just after the war ended, and when the new State of Israel was seeking recognition as a nation.

Harry Truman, known to the world as the man from Independence, but known to us as the man from Zion, in his rush to make certain that the United States was among the first to recognize the new state of Israel pushed the idea into law without consulting most of his advisors. The ones he did consult, notably George Marshall, Secretary of State, were angered and infuriated by the idea. While Harry Truman rushed through a law to recognize Israel, other nations debated the issue. But with the approval of the United States, other nations were compelled to follow. On Friday, May 14, 1948, Israel became a nation.

That night on the radio, Lowell Thomas, a well known newsman, said, "Americans in every part of the country would be turning to the Bible for some historical background for this day of history." I believe that the law went forth out of Zion at that time.

Truman was not an elected president, but a succeeding vice president. His political position was shaky at best. He had created so many enemies in Washington that no one thought he could win the election. Most of his advisors, and especially George Marshall, the most powerful influence in his retinue, had

opposed the way he handled the Israeli issue. Even some of his friends wanted him to step down and not run for office for the good of the party.

But God was not through with Harry Truman. Truman had caused the law to go forth out of Zion, but Israel was a new weak nation who needed to be nurtured by a big ally like America. Then in November of that year another miracle occurred. Harry Truman, against all odds, against the best political advise, and contrary to all major polls, won the election.

By the time he left the White House Israel was well established as a nation, and the details of its existence had been worked out. Moreover, while Truman was President he established precedents which still affect us today.

Not all that comes out of Zion is good. Those laws that come out of Zion will be a curse to those who disobey God. They will bless only the obedient. So be careful how you treat the privilege of living in Zion.

Statement for the 1999 Solemn Assembly

The Council of Apostles recommends the return of the original purpose of the Solemn Assembly as given at the time that it was established in 1967:

Whereas, By numerous prophecies we know that the day of the Lord is nigh at hand, and

Whereas, We know that great destruction will come upon all people before the great and dreadful day of the Lord, and

Whereas, The Lord commands the Church of Christ today, as recorded in Joel 2:15-17, "Blow the trumpet in Zion, sanctify a fast, call a solemn assembly: gather the people, sanctify the congregation, assemble the elders, gather the children, and those that suck the breasts: let the bridegroom go forth out of his chamber, and the bride out of her closet. Let the priests, the minis-

ters of the Lord, weep between the porch and the altar, and let them say, Spare thy people, O Lord, and give not thine heritage to reproach, that the heathen should rule over them; wherefore should they say among the people, Where is their God?"

Therefore, Resolved, That the whole membership of the Church of Christ, from the youngest child to the oldest member, be called to a solemn assembly, that a period of fasting may be sanctified unto our God.

Resolved, That this period of fasting and prayer be held on the Temple Lot.

Resolved, That we seek to lay hold on the promise recorded in Joel 2:32, "And it shall come to pass, that whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be de-

livered: for in Mount Zion and in Jerusalem shall be deliverance, as the Lord hath said, and in the remnant whom the Lord shall call."

Resolved, That all members of the Church of Christ, who are hindered by circumstances bevond their control from assembling on the Temple Lot, will dedicate the same period to fasting and prayer in their locals or in their homes, that the whole church may be united in one heart and one mind, that the guidance of the Lord may be made known to us, and that the power of Pentecost may cover us as the waters cover the sea, that the servants of the Lord might go forth in boldness and power and speak the word without fear unto the utmost ends of the earth.

In closing, some quotes from sermons:

- Sometimes when we ask for a sign, God may say: What about so and so's testimony? What about the sermon that you heard last Sunday? What about what your mother taught you?
- What really matters in life? Nothing but to be prepared to meet God.
- As God comforts us we need to represent God and serve God by doing that for the fellow members of the church. It's important for the strong to hold up the weak.
- Inside each of us there's that fear of confrontation if you tell someone that you believe in the Book of Mormon. Take that extra step and tell them that you believe in the Book of Mormon. It may present a situation that can bring one more soul into the gospel of Christ.
- Unless you allow time for the Lord to speak to you, He may be speaking but you're not hearing.
- DIAGNOSIS: Sickness of sin. PRESCRIPTION: Rest with the family of God, Support Group (church), worship, study, endure to the end. FOLLOW UP: Full armour of God.
- The Church of Christ is not full of hypocrites, but it is full of sinners. Knowing something is right and desiring to do it and failing is not being a hypocrite; it's being a sinner.
- If we have charity, we're going to have the fortitude to endure the pains of life with courage.
- We're strengthened by our trials. We can see where our sin is. God forces us to make a choice.
- Don't be unequally yoked with things of this world if you want to be part of God's work.

Bertha Matilda (Stade) Case

September 15, 1900~January 14, 1999

Bertha Matilda (Stade) Case was born the fifth child of John and Mary Elizabeth (Snider) Stade on September 15, 1900, in East Chilliwack, British Columbia, Canada, and passed from this life January 14, 1999, at the age of ninety-eight years, three months, and thirty days. At birth she weighed about three pounds, and was kept in a shoe box on the oven door of the wood cook stove.

In 1907, Bertha's father and mother and seven children, Maud, Fredrick, Mary, Charles, Bertha, Daniel, and Frank, moved to Cameron, Missouri, where they located on a farm one and one half miles east of town. There two more daughters, Alice and Dorothy, were born.

Bertha attended school in Cameron, Missouri, where she completed twelve grades, graduating in 1920. She worked in a garment factory making overalls until her marriage to James Maynard Case on August 2, 1923. To this union was born three sons, Robert Charles, Leslie Paul, and Marvin Maynard, and one daughter, Mary Emma.

Maynard and Bertha resided in Cameron, Missouri,

where Maynard worked for the Burlington Railroad and operated a filling station and store for a while. In 1929, when the depression hit, Maynard was dismissed from the railroad because of an accident that left him crippled. The three sons were born while they lived in Cameron.

In 1932, Maynard and Bertha with their three young sons moved to Independence, Missouri, where they made their home at 1106 East Gudgell. While there Mary was born and made their family complete.

Bertha's health was poor during those years, and with the depression, health care was not readily obtained. By faith in God and help from their church family and neighbors the little family survived.

Maynard worked where ever he could and at whatever opportunity gave. The children give their thanks to God and appreciation to their mother and father for their labors, sacrifice, love, and dedication that provided the necessities of life, and an example of faith and dedication to God, to prepare them for the road that lay before them.

Bertha and Maynard became members of the Church of Christ on June 30th, 1929, and attended the Church of Christ in Hamilton, Missouri, until they moved to Independence, Missouri, in 1932.

Bertha was dedicated to Maynard, helping him with his needs because of his disability. She traveled with him in his service to the Lord. She was chairman of the United Workers women's group for a while, and helped start the Vacation Church School for the children at the Temple Lot Church. She also taught a children's Sunday School class.

Bertha was preceded in death by her mother and father, seven of her brothers and sisters, and her husband, Maynard, who passed from this life on February 3, 1989. Bertha remained in the home until her afflictions forced her to move to the Independence Chateau, an assisted care facility, in July 1993. On November 22 of 1998, because of a stroke, she was in the hospital until November 27th, when she was moved to the Independence Health Care Center, where she passed away.

Bertha is survived by one sister, Alice Stubblefield of Odessa, Missouri, the four children: Robert and Joy Case of Bartlesville, Oklahoma; Leslie and Irene Case of Kansas City, Missouri; Marvin and Edith Case of Lee's Summit, Missouri; and Mary and Warren Johnson of Higginsville, Missouri; fifteen grandchildren, thirty-eight great-grandchildren, two greatgreat-grandchildren, and a host of church family and friends.

Services were at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, January 16, 1999, at the Speaks Midtown Chapel with Elders Roland Sarratt and Rodger Bruner in charge. Eulogies were given by Brother Leslie Case in behalf of the children, and Brother James Case in behalf of the grandchildren.

Music was provided by the grandchildren, with Sister Martha Bruner as organist. Interment was at the Salem Cemetery in Independence, Missouri.

On December 21, 1950, their son, Merlin Lyle Eddy (Spike) was born.


On April 4, 1952, their daughter Verna Grace was born, but she lived only ten days.


