

AN EYE SINGLE

"The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light. But if thine eve be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness! No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other: or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon" (Matthew 6:22-24).

"Be ye therefore perfect,

even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). And, "Seek ve first the kingdom of God and his righteousness" (Matthew 6:33). For. "They that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts" (Galatians 5:24). Therefore, "put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof" (Romans 13:14). Again, "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth" (Colossians 3:2).

These are all admonitions and commandments of our Lord, yet because we inhabit a tabernacle of clay we often find ourselves being double minded: our eye is not always single to the glory of God and His righteousness. So we, like Paul, must die to sin daily in order to retain a remission of sins. We must endure unto the end of our lives, struggling against the natural proclivity of our flesh to sin, for it is the flesh which gives Satan power over us if we are not careful. And so the Lord

warns us to work out our salvation with fear and trembling. and to take heed when we think we stand lest we fall. Even Paul wrote, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway" (1 Corinthians 9:27). In speaking of his flesh he wrote, "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" (Romans 7:24). We can never relax our vigilance, for the adversary is ever present to take advantage of our fleshly weaknesses, or the sin nature which we have all inherited from Adam and Eve. And though we have buried the old man in the likeness of the death and burial of Christ through baptism, yet we must be constantly on guard not to resurrect the old man, for that man is an enemy to God and ever will be. Christ is our propitiation for sin and also our advocate with the Father.

If we do not walk in the Spirit, we shall find ourselves filled with the spirit of fear, and such are in transgression, and if not repented of, shall be numbered among those (the fearful)

who will have their place in the lake of fire. But, "God hath not given us the spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind" (2 Timothy 1:7).

Paul often made mention of this struggle between the flesh and the spirit, and thus his statement above about his own wretchedness and deliverance from his body of death. Listen to the words of Nephi, a man who was highly favored of God and who walked in righteousness. One would suppose he was relatively free of the sins and temptations which plagued his rebellious brothers. Says he.

"...O wretched man that I am; yea, my heart sorroweth because of my flesh. My soul grieveth because of mine iniquities. I am encompassed about because of the temptations and the sins which doth so easily beset me. And when I desire to rejoice, my heart groaneth because of my sins: nevertheless, I know in whom I have trusted. My God hath been my support; he hath led me through mine afflictions in the wilderness; and he hath preserved me upon the waters of the great deep. He hath filled me with his love, even unto the consuming of my flesh. He hath confounded mine enemies, unto the causing of them to quake before me. Behold, he hath heard my cry by day, and he hath given me knowledge by visions in the night time.

And by day have I waxed bold in mighty prayer before him; yea, my voice have I sent up on high; and angels came down and ministered unto me. And upon the wings of his Spirit hath my body been carried away upon exceeding high mountains. And mine eyes have beheld great things; yea, even too great for man; therefore I was bidden that I should not write them. O then, if I have seen so great things; if the Lord in his condescension unto the children of men, hath visited me in so much mercy. why should my heart weep, and my soul linger in the valley of sorrow, and my flesh waste away, and my strength slacken, because of mine afflictions? And why should I yield to sin, because of my flesh? Yea, why should I give way to temptations, that the evil one have place in my heart, to destroy my peace and afflict my soul? Why am I angry because of mine enemy? Awake, my soul! No longer droop in sin. Rejoice, O my heart, and give place no more for the enemy of my soul" (2 Ne 3:31-47).

"Do not anger again, because of mine enemies. Do not slacken my strength, because of mine afflictions. Rejoice, O my heart, and cry unto the Lord, and say, O Lord, I will praise thee for ever; yea, my soul will rejoice in thee, my God, and

the rock of my salvation. O Lord, wilt thou redeem my soul? Wilt thou deliver me out of the hands of mine enemies? Wilt thou make me that I may shake at the appearance of sin? May the gates of hell be shut continually before me, because that my heart is broken and my spirit is contrite? O Lord, wilt thou not shut the gates of thy righteousness before me, that I may walk in the path of the low valley, that I may be strict in the plain road? O Lord, wilt thou encircle me around in the robe of thy righteousness? O Lord, wilt thou make a way for mine escape before mine enemies? Wilt thou make my path straight before me? Wilt thou not place a stumbling block in my way? But that thou wouldst clear my way before me, and hedge not up my way, but the ways of mine enemy. O Lord, I have trusted in thee, and I will trust in thee for ever" (2 Nephi 3:48-61).

It seems we have the tendency to go along with society and often make compromises, being caught up in various activities which may not always be edifying to the soul, but more gratifying to the flesh. I think of Alma and Ammon whose whole lives, after their conversion, were dedicated to the saving of souls. Their whole focus was that none should suffer the pangs of hell, but that all should experience the joy which they

had experienced in Christ. They had no time for lesser things. And this should be our focus today, especially now that time is so short. It is difficult to maintain an eye single to the glory of God in the face of television, movies, magazines, sports, the Internet, computer games, music, fashion, etc., etc. These things draw our focus away from the righteousness of Christ and fixes our attention on the things of the world. These pleasures appeal to the flesh and unless we are exceedingly careful we are in danger of becoming lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God. And what effect do these influences have on our children, the upcoming generation? Further, what are our desires on awakening in the morning? What is foremost in our thoughts for the new day that the Lord has granted unto us? Are our minds set on worldly cares and desires. or do we think more on the things of the kingdom of heaven? It is a difficult thing, because we always have the world before us, but the things of the kingdom are seen only with our spiritual eyes. Which has the greatest impact on us, or which becomes our driving motivation in life? What do we seek for the most?

I have come to the realization, more so than ever before, of the importance of prayer. Without daily prayer we cannot hope to stand before the onslaughts of the adversary. It is no wonder that Satan tells us we must not pray, for he knows that

if we neglect prayer, his task is so much the easier. But there is another matter. We must keep the commandments of the Lord. In fact, prayer and the keeping of the commandments are tied in together. This was the very point that Nephi made to his wayward brothers.

"And I said unto them, Have ye inquired of the Lord? And they said unto me. We have not; for the Lord maketh no such thing known unto us. Behold, I said unto them, How is it that ve do not keep the commandments of the Lord? How is it that ye will perish because of the hardness of your hearts? Do ye not remember the things which the Lord hath said, If ye will not harden your hearts. and ask me in faith, believing that ye shall receive, with diligence in keeping my commandments, surely, these things shall be made known unto you?" (1 Nephi 4:9-13).

If we do not or are not keeping the commandments of the Lord, our prayers will be an abomination to Him. We must be careful that our minds are not more on the things of the world than they are on the things of God, or else our prayers will not be very much availing. Our hearts will be lacking in that strong sincere desire we would otherwise have. Enos did not seek the Lord halfheartedly when he prayed all day and into the night for a remission of his

sins. "For he that diligently seeketh shall find" (1 Nephi 3:29).

"But behold I say unto you, that ye must pray always, and not faint; that ye must not perform anything unto the Lord, save in the first place ye shall pray unto the Father in the name of Christ, that he will consecrate thy performance unto thee, that thy performance may be for the welfare of thy soul" (2 Nephi 14:12).

"Wherefore ye must bow down before him, and worship him with all your might, mind and strength, and your whole soul, and if ye do this, ye shall in no wise be cast out" (2 Nephi 11:56).

"Wherefore, I, Nephi, did strive to keep the commandments of the Lord, and I did exhort my brethren to faithfulness and diligence" (1 Nephi 5:83).

"And Alma said unto him again, Will ye keep my commandments? And he said, Yea, I will keep thy commandments with all my heart" (Alma 21:6).


Finally, "If there be one among you that doeth good, he shall work by the power and gifts of God" (Moroni 10:20).

Reuban Santiago

take this opportunity to update you on the condition of Reuban. ▲ Just yesterday, we made the return trip to Knoxville, Tennessee, to the hospital where Reuban received his first care and operation for the broken back. After a complete set of x-rays and consultation with the doctor that did the operation, Reuban was told that everything looked good in his back; the steel plate was secure; the healing was almost totally complete. He was told that he could discontinue wearing his external back brace at the end of February (Reuban had been required to wear this external brace anytime he was sitting up) and to come back in mid-March for another evaluation. Reuban was asked if he was getting any return of feeling, to which he responded, "None in the legs, but some in the stomach area." The doctor seemed to take this as a very good sign, and thought his progress was going very well.

As I was typing this message, I could hear a news report in the background from the other room. I heard a report of an NFL player, from the KC Chiefs, who had been in a car accident several days ago, who was paralyzed from his chest area down (similar to Reuban's); the report continued that this man, Derrick Thomas, had an operation to repair the damage, and things looked good for a couple of days, when suddenly he died. This brought to my mind of how thankful we all must be for Reuban. HE DID NOT DIE!! The Lord DID answer prayers in his behalf in those first few hours after the accident, and He can and will continue to answer the

prayers of the faithful; but we must ask!!

Please continue to remember Reuban. He stands in need of prayers, not only for his physical needs and return of feeling and movement, but also for spiritual and moral strength over things relating to the trials and temptations of any and all youth of the present age we live in.

A little background or history of Reuban might help you know him a little better. He has an older and younger sister. Amanda has been at Youth Camp three times, so some of you will remember her. Hannah will be coming in another year when she is old enough. They do not know where their father is; he left the family about 14 years ago.

Their mother was killed in a car accident about six years ago. Since that time Reuban is being raised by his widowed, maternal grandmother, Inez Wolfe. Amanda and Hannah were taken in and are being raised by their maternal Aunt Vicki. All three children are church members.

I ask for prayers for Inez (Granny) also, and will tell you a little about her to help you understand the need for prayers. Inez is "Granny" to every Cherokee attending our local, except for Sallie Bradley, who is probably the one most responsible for bringing Inez into the Church about 20 years ago. Inez has seven children: two are members, two are deceased. She has 21 grandchildren: six are members, three have been blessed, one is deceased; and she has 11 great grandchildren, 4 of whom have been blessed. Here comes the rub: Granny has legal custody of three grandchildren, one of whom is Reuban, now a paraplegic; the others are ages eight and six. She also provides home and shelter for about six others, children and grandchildren, on a nearly constant basis. That is about ten people most of the time, in a small three-bedroom house. By the way, as a closing thought: Sister Inez will be 65 this month, works full time as a cook in a child care center, has no plans for retirement, and carries this load with dignity and grace.

Please remember the family in your prayers.

reetings from Phoenix! We saw in the year 2000 at church with food, games, looking at old slides of when we were all a little younger and a lot skinnier, songs and a prayer service. Elections have been held and Gordon McCann remains our Pastor, with Priest Glen Orsted and Elder Bob Hedrick elected to serve as Assistant Pastors. Bob and his wife Liza are the proud parents of Phoenix's first Millennium baby, Travis James Hedrick, born January 11.

In September of this year Apostle Joel Yates and Elder Bob Hedrick made a missionary trip to Oregon. They met with some of our regular members there and some young people who have been studying the gospel. At the end of October and early November Apostle Yates was accompanied by Priest Dewayne Ely to Palmer, Alaska. They held services there with the "Old Saints" group, a group composed of Church of Christ members and people from other groups of the Restoration who are searching.
