

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

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

# COMPLETE BELIEF IN GOD'S WORD

he small country of Kenya is located on the equator along the East Coast of Africa. By the scientific community, it is said to be the Cradle of Humanity where life began for Homo-sapiens or modern man. In Kenya's capitol city the Nairobi National Museum has on display the fossils and life-sized models of

ape-like creatures said to be our ancestors. But an irrefutable truth is asked by the Lord Himself: "Who is this that darkeneth counsel by words without knowledge?" Job 38:2. Many words have been written. Maybe the most well known are the writings of Charles Darwin and his Origins of Species, but by what evidence are such conclusions and journalism based? The Lord asked:

"Where wast thou when I laid the foundations of the earth? declare, if thou hast understanding. Who hath laid the measures thereof, if thou knowest? or who hath stretched the line upon it? Whereupon are the foundations thereof fastened? or who laid the corner stone thereof..." Job 38:4-8.

The fact remains that no person was present to ob-

serve the universe when it was brought into existence. It was God who laid the foundations of the earth and created the first man. Therefore the problem of origins cannot be solved by observations or experience but only by hypothesis and theories. Most of you do not prescribe to this popular theory known as evolution, but opt to believe in God's word, which says man is a special creation, created in the very image of God. As

Paul said to the Ephesians, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works..." Ephesians 2:10.

cripture admonishes us to use wisdom in our doings:

"And see that all these things are done in wisdom and order: for it is not requisite that a man should run faster than he has strength" Mosiah 2:44.

So let us ask ourselves, how shall the Church of Christ go about such a momentous assignment as preaching in all the world, for we know there are numerous places we have not yet been. and we are but few? There needs to be a plan. So often men make plans, expend great amounts of effort and money, but see no fruit come forth. Sometimes the plans of man fail, and when we endeavor to move out in our own strength often little or nothing is accomplished. All too often this causes discouragement and promotes the idea that we are not really supposed to reach out to others but be satisfied with preaching in our congregations and letting conversions come from within by raising our children in the gospel.

There are two principles I would like to put forth on how the Church of Christ can accomplish this commission before us. First, we must be sent according to God's plan. We find in the Bible the workers were sent. "Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto you: as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you" John 20:21. Even after Jesus' day, we find the Apostles Paul and Barnabas being sent.

"As they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Ghost said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them. And when they had fasted and prayed, and laid their hands on them, they sent them away. So they, being sent forth by the Holy Ghost, departed unto Seleucia; and from thence they sailed to Cyprus" Acts 13:2.

This is not to mean we should cease to reach out and testify to all those around us, for the believers are told to be a light of Christ in all places and at all times. We should not let discouragement overtake us, but be in tune to the leading of the Spirit to direct us.

# AN UNCHANGEABLE

e know and use the scriptures that teach our God is unchangeable.

"For do we not read that God is the same yesterday, today, and for ever; and in him there is no variableness neither shadow of changing. And behold I say unto you, He changeth not; if so, he would cease to be God; and he ceaseth not to be God, and is a God of miracles" Mormon 4:68, 82.

However, much of the world today is fighting against the divinity and power of God, claiming He no longer works in power among man as He once did. Even among strong believers, in a time of discouragement, the words or thoughts surface that God has changed His manner of operation in our day from the time of the Bible or even of the early church in the 1830's. A prophecy was given in the Book of Mormon that in like times of disbelief and discouragement God would bring forth a "marvelous work and a wonder" and restore His church on earth.

# GOD'S PLAN SET INTO MOTION

n the fall of 1998, while I was still employed with the City of Phoenix Police Department, I sat at my desk one morning doing paperwork when I had an unexpected experience. In my mind I had a perfect understanding of a great work in Africa of which I was involved. I distinctly could see a large number of people coming from every direction out of a tropical jungle to a gathering place. These people came with great enthusiasm to hear the gospel taught to them by the Church of Christ. After a few moments the experience ceased, but a vivid recollection of the event remained. I pondered the scene for some time then tried to dismiss the experience, knowing full well we had no plans or contacts in Africa. I reasoned within myself that I must have been thinking about the work in Honduras, Honduras being a tropical area where people seem to be eager to hear the gospel preached.

The memory of this event never seemed to fade from my mind. I would occasionally mention to my wife how I would be going to Africa some day, which was usually met by a response that questioned my sanity. During the following months the Lord unmistakably revealed it was time for me to retire, and since it was not a financially sound concept I would have to put my trust in Him.

In the town of Kisii, located in Kenya, lives a young mother named Margaret Moraa Osaka. Margaret had been praying and searching for a church which taught the gospel according to Christ's doctrines and not man's. As close as I can estimate, in the fall of 1998, Margaret also had an experience, which I will relate.

During the night the Lord spoke to her and directed her to go to her father's home where she would find a particular book in his library. She was to contact the church on the inside cover. Margaret recognized

the book from seeing it in her youth. She tells when she was young and lived at home her father would get her up in

the mornings to help him read and study Christian Margaret did not books. want to get up and study with her father because she wanted to grow up and be a policewoman or a nurse, so she did not need to know all this. Her father was a Methodist Bishop who desired to do much studying and needed her to help him read these books printed in English. Margaret's father, Brother Osaka, had been given this book in the 1960's by a traveling missionary named Ripley, whom we suspect belonged to the Church of Jesus Christ, (Bickertonites). When Margaret opened the book she found on the inside cover that it had been published by the Church of Christ (Temple Lot), in Independence, Missouri. Margaret spoke to her father about the experience, and he encouraged her to do as the Lord had directed and contact this church.

Margaret composed a letter asking for information on the beliefs of the Church of Christ, (Temple Lot), and mailed it off to the P.O. Box listed in the book. Apostle William Sheldon received the letter at the Visitors' Center and responded to the request by sending several church tracts, including The Articles of Faith and Practice. Margaret learned from these tracts of our belief in the Book of Mormon. She knew her father had one in his library and the two of them got the book out to look it over. Brother Osaka began to read the Book of Mormon and found many wonderful and comforting words in it. Then he began to share scripture from the Book of Mormon with others in the Kisii area. This enraged the people of his village, who believed the Book of Mormon to be a devilworshipping book. One night the Lord revealed to him that there were people laying in wait to kill him when he left his house. This revelation was true: inasmuch as a band of men divided into four groups had surrounded his



home so he could not escape. He went out of his house with only a torch (flashlight). The men threw a spear and a knife and shot an arrow at him but all missed. He shined the light at them and they ran in fear.

Back in America, William Sheldon had given Margaret's name and address to Apostle Smith Brickhouse, secretary for the Council of Apostles. Apostle Brickhouse began writing Margaret and sent a letter telling her he was sending a copy of the Book of Mormon.

Meanwhile the persecutions in Kisii were getting worse for those using the Book of Mormon. Margaret was afraid to pick up the package containing the Book of Mormon, since the Post Office there opens all packages to examine their contents. Her father told her not to

worry, but to go get the book and they would read it together. So she got the book and they read it and found it taught the gospel of Christ, not devil worshipping. Further communications were made and the Church of Christ was invited to Kisii to teach them the gospel.

We sent notice that the Church of Christ would accept the invitation and come to Kenya. Margaret went to the villages surrounding Kisii, telling the leaders of independent groups meeting together and worshipping that they needed to hear what the Church of Christ was bringing to Kisii, and how the Lord had directed her to contact us. With some reluctance, because we believed in the Book of Mormon, they agreed to meet us.

On May 7th, 2000, Brother Smith Brickhouse

and I attended the first service in Kisii, Kenya. We met with Margaret, her husband Samwel, her father Osaka and mother Nina in the village of Kababe. We walked out across a field cleared out of a tropical jungle, to a congregation of about a hundred people who came from their villages located in all directions around Kababe. I marveled, as I now looked upon the very image I had experienced and had ingrained in my mind since the fall of 1998

ost of these villages have regular services which are con-

ducted by one man they call their pastor. Some of the pastors are self-appointed while others have attended seminaries. Several of these pas-




tors who met with us at the first service in Kababe attended a series of meetings we conducted during our first week. In this series we taught: the Organization of the Church of Christ; the coming forth of the Book of Mormon; the need for the Book of Mormon; a comparison of the doctrines in the Book of Mormon and the Bible; the doctrines of the Church of Christ; and priest-hood authority.

It would be safe to say that every day while in Kenya we could see the hand of God at work, but I would like to tell of one particular instance. While we were conducting our classes during the first week, the other churches in the Kisii area were continuing to tell their members we were there to bring in devil worshipping and they should avoid us. During the second week there, we were taken to a funeral service. As is customary in Kisii, everyone from a village and neighboring villages go to a funeral, as does a representative from each denomination. Although we did not know this, Margaret did, and she took us there as ministry of the Church of Christ. We were seated on the front row of ministry facing a congregation of more than 300 people. Each one of the denominations would be

allowed to take a few moments for comments, but one minister would be selected to speak and comfort the family. and another would give the funeral service. Much to the displeasure of the other denominations' ministry and most of the deceased family, I was given time to comfort the family and Brother Brickhouse preached the funeral service. The Lord had provided us the opportunity to preach the gospel and hope in Jesus Christ to these people, in the presence of our false accusers, negating the idea we were devil worshippers.

During our time in Kenya we preached seven sermons and two funerals.





Seven days of our trip we held all day classes. We set one day aside for fasting and prayer with a good attendance from those who had been meeting regularly with us. On our last day we held a Sacrament service with every member of the Church of Christ in the country in attendance, as well as eighteen non-members. We conducted five administrations, and held three separate baptismal services, wherein we baptized and confirmed twentysix people, four women and twenty-two men. We also had two meetings with an elected committee of representatives from the various villages in order to plan and arrange for meetings and the continuation of the work in our absence. We conservatively estimate we ministered to more than 1500 people while in Kenya, and many of them we ministered to several times. Most all are waiting for our return so they can receive further teachings.

There was a group of about twenty that followed us and attended almost every meeting, class and service we conducted. We hired a compact pick-up truck to pick them up at the main road and bring them to the meetings. We found that many of them had to walk between two and five miles, usually in the mud, to get to the main road to

meet the truck. At the end of the day they made the same walk back home from the main road where the truck dropped them off. Often walking home was done in the rain, and on some occasions they never made it all the wav home because of the adverse weather conditions. It was inspiring to see many of these men and women present at every service, class or meeting in spite of the extreme difficulty they endured to get there.

nent which gained independence from Great Britain in the 1960's. There are 42 tribes in Kenya. The Kisii tribe is the largest, and they live in what is called the Kisii highlands, which cover about 50 square miles and has a population of 3.6 million people. The Kisii tribe speak the Kisii language first and Swahili second. English is the third language and not all are able to speak it. All of our meetings were conducted with one of them acting as an interpreter to give the message in the Kisii language. Most everyone has their own small farm of one or two acres where they raise food to eat. They have no other employ-

ment so to get cash they sell part of their crop along the sides of the roads. It goes without saying that these people live in poverty, living in small mud huts with grass or tin roofs, with no electricity or running water. Their only income is from selling part of the produce grown on their small farms. These few shillings have to pay for all their children's education, beginning with the first grade until they no longer go to school. All their medications and hospital bills, clothing and anything they can not grow on their farm come from these few shillings they make along the roadside.

Sickness is frequent and

often times terminal because medications are expensive—if even available. Hospitals are rare, and sometimes four people are placed in a bed. Again, the cost is prohibitive. Our brother Moses had to sell his cow to pay his wife's hospital bill, and now his child is sickly because of the lack of milk. The most serious health problem is malaria. An article found in the Daily National paper of Nairobi reported in 1998 that there were five times as many malaria cases reported as tuberculosis, AIDS, measles, and leprosy combined. Mosquitoes spread malaria, and bites are frequent from lack of mosquito nets, insecticides and repellents.

Most travel is done by foot, but taxis (small pick-ups with camper shells, used to transport about 25 people at a time) are available on the main roads, once they walk the one to five miles necessary to get to the main roads. Taking a taxi from an outlying village into Kisii or to another village could cost 30 to 100 shillings one way. rent a vehicle for a day costs 5000 shillings (about \$70 U. S. dollars). If one is walking or driving anything but a four-wheel drive vehicle there is a race to get to and from the destination before about 3:00 p.m. Each day at mid-afternoon heavy rain rolls in, causing their red clay roads to become rutted rivers so slick that vehicles slide off the road. Transportation is very difficult for these people and proved to be our biggest expense on this trip.

# HOW YOU CAN HELP

s I took my flight home I had occasion to sit next to a young lady returning from Rome. We engaged in conversation as to where we had been, and what I had been doing in Kenya. She asked me the question that weighs heavily

on the minds of so many people of this generation. "Why does everyone want to save their souls? Don't you think

they would appreciate a plate of food to eat more?" Her philosophy is a very popular one: take care of the physical and material, which gives immediate gratification, while at the same time making one feel good about themselves and admired by others for being so charitable.

The temporal aspect of life should not be overlooked, but contemplate the profound words of Christ about the priorities of our existence:

"For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Matt. 16:26.

Saving souls is the primary function of God's servants, and it is the utmost desire of God that His creation have eternal life. However, after we have spiritually fed them with the food that saves the soul, then we must also have charity. As King Benjamin said:

"I would that ye should impart of your substance to the poor, every man according to that which he hath, such as feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick, and administering to their relief, both spiritually and temporally, according to their wants, And see that all these things are done in wisdom and order: for it is not requisite that a man should run faster than he has strength. And again: it is expedient that he should be diligent, that thereby he might win the prize: therefore, all things must be done in order" Mosiah 2:43-45.

Since Brother Brickhouse and I returned home from Kenya we have had several opportunities to share our experiences with different groups and congregations. We have often been met with inquiries of how they can help the work and the people in Kenya. I will take this opportunity to tell you some of the needs and show how you can help if you so desire.

After the baptism of twenty-six brothers and sisters, Margaret's grandfather, a Seventh Day Adventist, stood and told us how he had heard that the Book of Mormon taught devil worshipping. He had come to our first week of classes and heard us teach the true doctrines of God. He testified that we were doing a good work in Kenya. He also stood to testify before the Seventh Day Adventist church, which had been teaching their people that we were devil worshippers, and that the missionaries of the Church of Christ and the Book of Mormon were not the devil's tools, but that we were teaching the gospel of Christ and God. He then donated the large spot of land in the village of Kababe where we had held our first meeting on May 7th for the building of a chapel for the Church of The enthusiastic Christ. members have since drawn blueprints and begun to donate sand, timbers, food and

labor, and are ready to begin building. They still lack funds to purchase some of the materials, and there is a need for financial help in that area.

We found transportation to be our largest expense in Kenya, but even with the amount we spent it was still inadequate to be able to minister to everyone that we could have. It seems that purchasing a suitable vehicle for the work in Kenya would be a better use of money and would help in improving the work. We are looking for a way to be able to accomplish this.

Health care, medications, precautionary health aids and materials could greatly improve the quality of the people's lives in Kenya. Many items, such as mosquito nets, sprays and mosquito coils are available in Kenya but unaffordable to most.

We are going to research the feasibility of bringing other items, such as clothing, medications, glasses, etc. into the country with us. As of now, we do not know if the government will allow us to do this. The government does support churches coming into Kenya, but they do monitor their activities closely and we desire to be in

complete compliance with their rules.



# A Book of Mormon CRITIQUE



# Part 2

The prophecies of the Holy Bible are full of the mysteries of God concerning His ancient people, the house of Israel.

Eternal book, thou art hidden
In Cumorah's lonely hill;

"PLATES...REVEALING THE STORY OF THE PAST." The prophecies of the Holy Bible are full of the mysteries of God concerning His ancient people, the house of Israel. Jacob, father of the twelve tribes of Israel, spoke to his sons, one by

one, about the things "which shall befall you in the last days." To his son Joseph he prophesied in this manner:

"Joseph is a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well; whose branches run over the wall: The blessings of thy father have prevailed above the blessings of my progenitors unto the utmost bound of the everlasting hills: they shall be on the head of Joseph, and on the crown of the head of him that was separate from his brethren." (Genesis 49:22 and 26)

The tribe of Joseph shall be as a fruitful bough; its descendants shall multiply and extend themselves over a "wall." What would constitute such a wall? This word, figuratively, signifies something that separates or isolates. The house of Israel was isolated from other nations of the world by the great deserts to the east and by the ocean to the west. In order to understand what "wall" over which Joseph would pass, we turn again to the scriptures. In Psalms 80:11 we find the answer to this enigma. Once again, speaking of the tribe of Joseph (see verse one), it says, "She sent out her boughs unto the sea...." By this we understand that the "wall" referred to the sea, and that the descendants of Joseph would cross over the sea.

Another question immediately assails us. To what place would they travel when they crossed the sea? Jacob spoke of the "everlasting hills." Ah, we have encountered another enigma. What is the significance of this expression, the everlasting hills? The prophet Moses also spoke of the house of Joseph and the land that his people would inherit:

"And of Joseph he said, Blessed of the Lord be his land, for the precious things of heaven, for the dew, and for the deep that coucheth beneath, And for the precious fruits brought forth by the sun, and for the precious things put forth by the moon, And for the chief things of the ancient mountains. and for the precious things of the lasting hills...." (Deuteronomy 33:13-15)

Now we are able to understand that the distinguishing feature of land of Joseph would be its ancient mountains and everlasting hills. The prophets understood that great mountains are not eternal, for they are reduced by the elements and the erosion caused by them. For this reason the prophet Habakkuk wrote, "He stood, and measured the earth: he beheld. and drove asunder the nations; and the everlasting mountains were scattered, the perpetual hills did bow: his ways are everlasting." (Hab. 3:6)

From this we understand that the prophet was not speaking of mountains and hills that exist eternally, so his use of the word "everlasting" must have another meaning; hence, a chain of mountains and hills that ran from one end of the land to the other would distinguish the land of Joseph. In the entire world only the Americas fits this description, with a chain of mountains beginning in Alaska, to the north, and extending to the southern tip of Argentina. America, a land of everlasting mountains and filled with natural riches shall be the inheritance of Joseph.

This remnant of the house of Israel that journeyed to America was not to be forgotten by God. They were guided by the Holy Spirit and blessed throughout the ages. The Book of Mormon is the history of this ancient people of the

house of Israel that left Jerusalem about 600 years before the birth of Christ and arrived here in America. It also contains the history of a group from the house of Judah that arrived in America after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Chaldeans shortly after 600 B.C. There is a third short history of some of the refugees from the ancient tower destroyed by God some 2000 years before the birth of Christ. The Book of Mormon informs us that these groups of pilgrims crossed the great oceans to arrive in the Americas. One of these groups crossed the Atlantic Ocean, while the other two crossed the Pacific.

Many critics of the Book of Mormon oppose this history, saying that all the ancestors of Native Americans came by way of the land bridge at the Bering Straits between Asia and North America some 10,000 years ago. They tell us that during the subsequent centuries there occurred a gradual development and evolution of the tribes as they moved farther and farther southward. In reality, these critics do not take into consideration the histories, nor oral traditions, of the Maya and other tribes. We also see that many times they often seem to ignore the new discoveries of other archaeologists.

Where are we going to place our confidence—in the theories of scientists that op-

pose the Word of God in the Holy Bible, or in the written histories of Native Americans and their ancient leaders? Let's consider a few of the records and traditions of the ancient Maya:

- a. "I...first Ahzib Quiché, write here on this paper of the coming of our fathers and grandfathers from the other side of the sea whence the sun rises."
- b. "Now on the 28th of September we sign this attestation in which we have written that which by tradition our ancestors told us, who came from the other part of the sea, from Civan-Tulan, bordering on Babylonia." <sup>2</sup>
- c. "Together these tribes came from the other part of the sea, from the East, from Pa Tulan, Pa Civan. These, then, were the three nations of the Quichés, and they came from where the sun rises, descendants of Israel, of the same language and same customs." 3

According to the traditions of the Maya, these people are of Israel and crossed over the sea to arrive in America. Such traditions of Native Americans are identical to the story found in the Book of Mormon. Are such traditions to be counted only as myths?

This has been the case most often in the past, but perhaps a new attitude is now dawning.

There are also many discoveries made by men of science that provide evidence of the truthfulness of the history revealed in this ancient book [the Book of Mormon].

On December 11, 1997, the Canadian Supreme Court ruled that native claims to vast areas of Canadian territory are more valid than the current laws recognize:

"One of the most important aspects of the judges' opinion is the way it clears up a long-standing dispute over traditional claims....

"The Supreme Court specifically rejected a lower court ruling in which native claims to land in British Columbia were denied. In the course of those proceedings, native people came to court to perform traditional ceremonies, chanting and dancing in ancient ways to relate the histories that had

been passed down for untold generations about how they came to be on the land. Thursday, the justices made it clear that the lower court had erred in rejecting the oral evidence." 4

There are also many discoveries made by men of science that provide evidence of the truthfulness of the history revealed in this ancient book. Consider this Maya tradition: "The Mayas claimed that their ancestors came from distant regions in two bands. The largest and most ancient immigration was from the East, across, or rather, through the ocean. The second band less in number and later in time came from the West...." 5 This story supports the narrative of the Book of Mormon concerning the Nephite people and the people of Zarahemla.

As we have mentioned, the critics of the Book of Mormon argue that the ancestors of the Maya and other tribes came from the north about 10,000 years ago and their cultures evolved gradually as they traveled southward. The discoveries of many archaeologists indicate something quite different, for they uphold the story as found in the Book of Mormon.

According to the noted Americanist, A. Hyatt Verrill, the coming of the Maya was

"an abrupt and entirely revolutionary order of things, exactly as though the laws, customs, arts, sciences, industries and social organization of the new regime had been brought, ready-made and fully developed, from another sphere or unknown land." 6 According to the words of this archaeologist, we can see this people arrived with their civilization fully developed, not in a state of gradual evolution. This is what the Book of Mormon records. And what do the archaeologists say about their time of arrival?

"With their calendarial system already in working order the Mayas appear on the threshold of history 600 years before the Christian era...." Here we find the same time frame identified in the beginning of the narration of the Book of Mormon.

New discoveries continue to support this time frame. Richard Hansen of UCLA began excavations of the ancient Mayan city of Nakbé in 1989. His findings created a stir among scholars. I quote the results of his study: "The discovery, described by scholars as surprising and exciting, puts the emergence of an elaborate Mayan civilization with large cities back to at least 600 BC." 8

Interestingly, such studies caused one scholar, David Freidel, to write, "Maya civilization banged into existence in its own way and time.... It is unsettling. For it violates the tacit rules of diffusion, and, even worse, the tacit rules of gradual evolution espoused by modern archaeology."

For just such reasons we are able to say with all confidence, as did the poet, that the Book of Mormon contains
"Plates of immortal wisdom,
Revealing the story of the
past."



# Charles Robert Ballantyne

December 21, 1908—July 4, 2000



harles Robert Ballantyne, 602 E. Locust, Rogers, Arkansas, passed away July 4, 2000, at St. Mary's Hospital in Rogers. He was 91 years of age. He was born on December 21, 1908, in Monona City, Iowa, to C. R. and Josephine LeSeur Ballantyne.

Charles was baptized into the R.L.D.S. Church by his father on December 25, 1916. On March 29th, 1936, he transferred his membership to the Church of Christ. He was a faithful member of this church throughout the remainder of his life.

Charles graduated from the University of Iowa with his masters degree in 1931.

Charles accepted a teaching position at Tarkin college in Tarkin, Missouri, until the depression closed his department. Charles accepted a position in Iowa working in the Department of Agriculture in soil and water conservation, serving for 15 years. Iowa State University contacted him and asked him to help with their adult education and agronomy department. 1953 he became an Associate Professor of Agronomic and was instrumental in the pioneering of Soil and Water conservation. He also helped develop new teaching techniques used in the public schools today in Iowa. Charles retired in 1968.

Charles married Dorothy Evans in 1971 in Florida and they made their home in Ames, Iowa. Charles moved to the Rogers area in 1973 from Ames, Iowa. In 1977 Charles founded the Wood Carvers of Northwest Arkansas.

He is survived by his wife, Dorothy, of the home.

Charles was cremated and interred in Ames, Iowa. Local arrangements were by Callison-Lough funeral service of Rogers, Arkansas.
