

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
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

His Mysterious Ways The Amazing Son of God

ARTICLE

n the distant beginning before the creation of the heavens and the earth a singular event took place. The Father brought forth His Son. He was His only offspring. This fact is confirmed by reference to Revelation 3:14:

"And unto the angel of the church of the Laodiceans write; these things saith the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of the creation of God." Christ Himself was the beginning of the creation of God. Thus He, and He alone, was called the Only Begotten Son of God.

It was through Christ that all the rest of creation was accomplished, for the Son created the heavens and the earth and all things that in them are. Then when we, who are His offspring, take upon us His name (the name of Christ) through the waters of baptism, we are spiritually begotten of Him as His sons and daughters.

"For behold, this day he hath spiritually begotten you; for ye say that your hearts are changed through faith on his name; therefore, ye are born of him, and have become his sons and his daughters" Mos. 3:9.

I once wondered how this could be, since Christ alone is the <u>Only</u> Begotten Son. Then it was that I realized that Christ *is*, *indeed*, the Only Begotten of the FaChrist Himself was the beginning of the creation of God. Thus He, and He alone, was called the Only Begotten Son of God.

ther, but the rest are begotten through Christ who both created and saved us. Such is the mystery of Godliness.

But think of the wonder of Christ. He appeared in the plains of Mamre to Abraham along with His Father. Abraham, lifting up his eyes, looked and beheld three men standing before him. And he went and bowed himself to the ground before them. God then revealed to Abraham what he was about to do, both by way of the promised offspring to Sarah, as well as His mission to Sodom and Gomorrah.

Abraham entertained them with food and drink, after which two of them departed for Sodom. Lot also recognized these visitors and refused to allow them to remain in the street, later offering his daughters to the men of the city in their stead. The next day the LORD called down fire from the LORD upon those wicked cities. It was the Son calling down fire from the Father. This thought is confirmed as the term *Elohim* is used, showing that the plurality of the Godhead was involved in this judgment.

Christ also appeared to Joshua as the captain of the Lord's hosts. Jacob wrestled with him all night when he was journeying to his homeland. He also appeared to Moses and wrote the ten commandments on tablets of stone with his own finger. He appeared to the Brother of Jared when the Brother of Jared was beseeching God to touch the stones to give them light. He also led the children of Israel for 40 years as he abode in the cloud.

But the most marvelous thing was yet to transpire. It was the will of His Father that He come and offer Himself up as a sacrifice for His people. What an amazing thing this was and how extraordinary. It was the very thing that caused the Jews to look beyond the mark. The mystery of Godliness is thus hid from the wise and prudent of this world, but re-

Imagine the wonder of the God and Creator of the universe coming to this world as a mere babe in the womb of a mortal woman. Can you think how Mary must have felt knowing she carried the Creator of the heavens and the earth within her own body? What a paradox that she should give birth to the very One who created her.

After His birth, brothers and sisters were also born to Mary. These were in fact half brothers and sisters to Jesus. Imagine how they must have felt when they realized that their sibling was the God of the whole earth.

The God of creation was born in humble circumstances and raised as a carpenter under His earthly

(step) father. Of course when Mary heard the words of the shepherds, she pondered them in her heart, remembering no doubt that the angel had previously told her that the Holy Ghost would come upon her and she would bring forth the Son of God. Then later in the temple Simeon came and uttered marvelous words concerning this child that caused Joseph and Mary to marvel at those things which were said. This was followed by the words of Anna. Still later when Joseph and Mary made a trip to Jerusalem, the child Jesus was left behind. Upon finding He was missing they returned to search for Him and after three days found Him in the temple astonishing the doctors with his understanding and answers. To His concerned parents He said, "How is it that ye sought me? Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" But Joseph and Mary did not understand this saving. So Jesus grew up being subject to His earthly parents until he arrived at the age of about 30. By this time John the Baptist was preaching and baptizing, telling the people of One who was to come after him whose shoe latchet he was not worthy to unloose. When the Lord came to him to be baptized, John deferred to Him saying that he was not

worthy, but rather that he should be baptized of Him. Herein is the awesome mystery of Godliness that a mere mortal man, a seed of Abraham, should be called upon to baptize his God, his Lord, and his Creator, yes, the Mighty God of the far flung universe. Christ thus humbled Himself before His Father to fulfill all righteousness, setting the example for all mankind to follow. Baptism is a simple thing that even a child can understand, but like the foolishness of preaching, the world treats it lightly at best. or else mocks it as of no worth.

When Christ entered his ministry the Pharisees and others were offended by Him, but the poor came to hear His words.

Then the day of His passion arrived. Could Judas have known the full significance of what he was doing when he gave his Lord the kiss of death?

Then as Christ stood in the judgment hall could His interrogators have known to whom they were directing their questions? Would they not have been humbled to the dust had they known He was God of the universe and the One to whom, one day, every knee should bow and confess as Lord and His judgments just?

Then those zealous ones

bore it all. And then stripes were administered as if He were a common criminal. leaving his back bloody and painful. How ashamed and mortified they will be when they come to realize that it was their God and their Creator that they had spit upon. How ashamed they will be when they remember how they whipped the God of the Universe and pressed that crown of thorns upon His brow in mockery of His claims. What a horrifying rebuke this will be to their unbelief. The Roman soldiery may have done it ignorantly. But as for the wicked Pharisees and others who plotted this deed, Christ Himself said they had no cloak for their sin. These will receive a just recompence from God in the day of judgment. But for the others Christ prayed, Forgive them, for they know not what they do. Yet, nevertheless, they will certainly sorrow that they had, through force of circumstance, been caught in time and place to be made unwitting participants in this great drama.

After this Christ was taken to be crucified, it having pleased the Father to bruise Him. The soldiers who drove in the nails could not have known through Whose hands they were driving them. Had they known they would have shrunk from the deed. One day they will stand before their Lord and ponder how fate could have so consigned them. So He hung on the cross for six long hours, taking upon Himself all our sins, suffering the chastisement of our sins in our stead, and this after having, a short time before, plead with God that this cup might pass from Him, in great agony sweating drops of blood, that He might not undergo that fiery trial. But He vielded to the will of His Father in all things, even to death on the cross. Had it not been so all would have been lost.

And then that trial ended, and He descended to the depths of hell. His disciples were scattered and all seemed hopeless, yet on the third day came a glorious dawning and the Lord of all came forth triumphantly and victoriously from the tomb. Death had been defeated and he became the firstborn of them that believe. To Mary he said, Touch me not for I have not yet ascended unto my Father. But her report was as wives' tales to the disciples. Nevertheless he appeared to them, ate fish with them and finally ascended into heaven, promising that as they had seen Him go so would He also return. And while the rest of the world lav in ignorance of these marvelous things. Christ went on to fulfill the remainder of His Father's commission, and over the next 3¹/₂ years visited all the rest of the house of Israel.

What of the future? We know that He is coming back to claim all that is His own. But more than this we will have fellowship with the God of our salvation, the One to whom all power in heaven and earth has been given. And then we, if we have endured unto the end, will live and reign with Him for a thousand years, and after that for an eternity on the new earth. What a conclusion it will be for those who have endured, for a moment, the trials and tribulations of this

"For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory" (2 Corinthians 4:17). In truth we cannot even imagine what the Lord has prepared for them that love Him. What a glorious prospect that lies before us.

In view of these things let us be found worthy (not wanting) of this high calling, for we are all called to be saints. Let us therefore bring forth fruit meet for this calling.



arly the morning of Sun-L'day, January 28th, our eight-year-old daughter Kaitlyn woke us from a sound sleep. She was yelling out in great pain. She'd been awake for about an hour in agony and it finally got to her. I wasn't very patient with her; I told her to try to go to the bathroom (she had), to eat something (she couldn't get into the kitchen), and then I noticed where she was holding her abdomen: lower right side, just above her hip.

Jim checked Kaity out. She couldn't lay down flat; she had to be curled up, walked hunched over, was unable to raise her right leg, her abdomen was tender throughout, but the pain always referred back to her right lower guadrant (the Daddy/RN is dictating this part) and she seemed to be running a little temperature. In short, she had EVERY symptom of appendicitis! We got her ready to go; Jim got dressed and then called for the elders.

Andy Brown and Joel Yates came and administered to Kaity. When they were done, they took our older children with them so we could go to the hospital, but a radical

change had come over Kaity. She was laid out flat and had no more pain except that she was hungry. Jim had seen patients with fewer symptoms than Kaity's sent to surgery, so we went ahead to the hospital.

I'm sure you know the rest. Two hours and a bunch of tests later we were sent home with a healthy, normal eightyear-old girl. Later I tried to explain away what happened to Kaity—maybe it was gas or extreme hunger; after all, she hadn't eaten since noon the previous day. Jim and Kaity set me straight: Kaity was healed. We thank God for immediately answering the prayers of His faithful servants and worried parents. He showed us once again that we are held in the hollow of His hand.

"LET'S LEARN TOGETHER THE SIX PRINCIPLES OF THE GOSPEL"

In Hebrews 6:1-2, God outlines His doctrine for us so nice and neat: Faith, Repentance, Baptism, Laying on of Hands, The Resurrection, and Eternal Judgment.

Do we know what these principles are? It's time to take them one by one and "Learn and Grow Together!"

FAITH—the First Principle

"Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). For example: it is like a child believing that his mother will always love him and take care of him. Another example is: a farmer believing that the seeds that he plants will take root, grow and bear fruit. We all have a faith in tomorrow, a belief that it will be.

We must hear and learn about God for *"without faith it is impossible to please Him; for he that cometh to God must believe that He is..."* (Hebrews 11:6).

God plants that seed of faith in each and every one of us, and as we learn more about Him our faith takes root and grows. We do not need a perfect knowledge of God to have faith in Him (Alma 16:149). We all see and learn, every day, of God's works and wonders.

Question: How much faith do we need? Jesus said: "If ye have the faith as a mustard seed, ye shall say unto the mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you" (Matthew 17:20). 'As' means 'like' a mustard seed...a growing faith, a faith that begins small, with a tiny grain, and grows so large that nothing shall be impossible to do.

Faith is our first step on our pathway to God. His scriptures direct us to do His will and follow His commandments. He has faith in us that we can do this, even if we are not perfect. He has given us the avenue of Repentance (our next principle) for when we error. We must try and try to make ourselves as perfect as we can, not for our own glory, but for His.

A Teaching Example: Have each student plant a seed in a foam cup filled with soil. Marigolds work well and sprout quickly. Add just the right amount of water and sunshine, and by the next class our "faith" will have sprouted. As the plant grows, it gets stronger and stronger with proper care (as our spirits grow with proper nourishment of God's Word), and will soon blossom! (as we will as we grow in the knowledge of God).

After breakfast, a study session was held in the main room of the church. Both Ken and Joel orchestrated the discussions. The topic was marriage (those not, those engaged, and those married). The first discussion was about why we marry; using prayer as the beginning of the search for our mate. Also discussed were fornication, adultery and the commandments concerning these. Palmyra Excursion

Hello from the Akwesasne local! On the weekend of April 28 -29, 2001, each family in the Akwesasne local was represented and joined by other church members to comprise a group of 29 for a trip to Palmyra, New York, to visit the site where the Restoration began. Church members from five locals attended this outing. It was an impressive group, as we were told several times. We met on Saturday at a motel in the Palmyra area. The weather was perfect for all the time that we spent outdoors. We first visited the Hill Cumorah site. We toured the visitor's center there that was run by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, listening to several audio tapes and a video about the Book of Mormon. It astounded the tour guides that we were all one church "family" from different locations on two continents. After the tour of the visitor's center, we climbed the Hill Cumorah. At the top is a monument and garden. It is an impressive sight. After we wandered around the monument, we all found a place to rest before we made our descent. During this time, Brother Ken Oar asked some questions about the things that we heard in the

visitor's center, and how they differed from what we believe.

At 7:30 p.m. Bro. Brian McIndoo was our speaker. On the overhead projector he showed us pictures of the work and the people in Kenva, and illustrated by some of their stories what they had overcome in their lives to dedicate themselves to God. He asked us to consider what our priorities are in life. Are we looking for instant satisfaction, or do we understand what is necessary to be sure we are headed for eternal life? Brian illustrated the physical laws of God by dropping a rubber ball, showing the force of gravity. He then noted that very few people deny these laws of God, but choose to deny the Spiritual laws God has put into his books of Scripture. People are forever wanting to change the Spiritual laws of God but they do not try to change the physical laws He has established. No one has been given the right to change the Spiritual laws of God. II Nephi 6 contains the four points that must be accepted for eternal life: Repent, believe, be baptized and endure to the end. We are joint heirs with Christ, children dependent on God for all things. As stated in Ephesians 4, we must "walk worthy." This is the job of the Church of Christ.

On this Saturday morning (June 9), about 75 people were assembled in our little white church to partake of the goodness of God's Spirit at 9 a.m. Bro. Robert Oldham asked us to sing a favorite song, "Stretch Out Your Hand" to begin our worship service. We were then asked to kneel with him to pray for those so desperately in need of help, such as those with cancer. Also, he asked that we focus on glorifying God for His mercy. "The effectual, fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." In another session of prayer, we were asked to especially give thanksgiving for the blessings we have already received. The testimonies were varied, relating help from God for problems in the workplace, opening up opportunities in the Kenya missionary work, and many of healings.

After the noon meal, we had some time to relax and visit with those from far away. We have visitors from Arizona, Idaho, Missouri, Michigan, and some from other areas of our own state that we don't see very often.

At 3 p.m. the speaker was Bro. Roland Sarratt. As he enjoyed the morning meeting, he thought how we really are a peculiar people. He and his wife drove nearly 1,000 miles to spend three days going to church. Now, isn't that odd? Our traveling and visiting is important. It gives us a good way of life, showing we value each other and the gospel.

Bro. Roland quoted from Proverbs 14, wherein it says that there are ways that seem right to men, but the end is death. The way of the "natural man" is the way of death. We are called to struggle toward the way of life, and we can thank God that we can be strengthened to this end.

There is an anti-Christ, but we don't always recognize it. Reading from John 3:16-18, our speaker asked if we are really different than those around us. Do we believe enough to do something about it? Indulging in worldly pursuits is not a part of believing. We must try to influence others to bring them to God. Avoid those whose deeds are evil, for they hate the light. Remember this: we are not at the bargaining table, for we must beg God for His forgiveness. What do we have to offer to the world? We have a gospel that is being rejected. We are more successful at making converts in those parts of the world where they have few worldly possessions. Patience and trust will give us chances to do many things for God. As outlined in Moroni 7, we must have hope to be raised to life eternal, cleaving unto charity to be purified with our Lord.

After an evening meal, we assembled to have a song service at 7 p.m. We enjoy the talents of many volunteers on these occasions in the musical selections and group singing.

At 7:30 p.m. Brother John Case was our speaker. He chose his opening text from Romans 12, wherein we are admonished to present our bodies as a living sacrifice, giving reasonable service to God at all times. When Christ chose His apostles, in Mark 1. they didn't know much about Him. but left their work and followed in His footsteps to do much good. As humans, we don't always know what we would do in threatening situations. There are many examples of steadfastness of God's servants in the scriptures. In I Kings 18, Elijah taunted the idol worshippers and proved what the true God could do. In Alma 12, Ammon stood for the right before King Lamoni.

Look at the promises we have made to God. The sacrament is not a tradition; it is a remembrance of the covenant we have made to serve Him. One of the ways we serve God is to be in the service of our fellow man, as related in Mosiah 1:48-51.

The end of the day finds us refreshed in Spirit, but we must seek rest for these human frames.



April 6, 1912~June 9, 2001


