
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

EDITORIAL

Flee from dolatry

ince the beginning of time man has placed idols between himself and God. worshiping strange gods, images and items created by man rather than our Creator. Time and time again God admonished Israel for this sin, bringing punishments and woes upon them. The Ten Commandments forbade the worship of idols, while the Old Testament witnesses and bears promises of the punishments that have been and will be brought upon those who fall into idolatry.

Webster's dictionary defines an idol as: any object of ardent or excessive devotion or admiration. Excessively placing things (idols) between us and our fulfilling the commandments of God may result in a sin.

1 John 5: 17-21 states: "All unrighteousness is sin: and there is a sin not unto death. We know that whosoever is born of God sinneth not; but he that is begotten of God keepeth himself, and that wicked one toucheth him not. And we know that we are of God, and the whole world lieth in wickedness. And we know that the Son of God is come, and hath given us an understanding, that we may know him that is true, and we are in him that is true, even in his Son Jesus Christ. This is the true God, and eternal life. Little children, keep yourselves from idols. Amen."

Scripture teaches that we are to "be as little children," humble, submissive willing to do the will of our Father. We are to "keep ourselves from idols" (items that we might adore or allow excessive devotion to), that may keep us from fulfilling the commandments of God. Mosiah 2:48-50 instructs us:

"I can not tell you all the things whereby ye may commit sin: for there are divers wavs and means, even so many, that I can not number them. But this much I can tell you, that if ye do not watch yourselves, and your thoughts, and your words, and your deeds, and observe to keep the commandments of God, and continue in the faith of what ye have heard concerning the coming of our Lord, even unto the end of your lives, ye must perish. And now, O man, remember, and perish not."

We must with great care be diligent and search within our daily lives for activities, objects and expenditures which have become excessive, and therefore idols, and which keep us from fellowship, worship, study, service and giving of our tithes, offerings and time as required as His children and heirs to His Kingdom. We must continually be mindful that Satan desires to devour us and therefore places the pride of the world before us, enticing us to seek those things rather than the commandments of God. Galatians 6:1-9 instructs:

"Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted. Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ. For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself. But let every man prove his own work, and then shall he have rejoicing in himself alone, and not in another. For every man shall bear his own burden. Let him that is taught in the word communicate unto him that teacheth in all good things. Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption: but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

Let us remember the words of Christ:

"...Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather added unto you. Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof" Matthew 6:25-34.

ove is a feeling of deep affection and concern for the well-being of others. It is the benevolent affection of God for His children or the reverent affection that we must have for God. Love is caring and seeking the highest good for another person without motive for personal gain. It is a self-denying, self-sacrificing, Christ-like love.

"Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" Matthew 22:36-40.

If we truly love God we will follow all of His commandments and serve Him to the best of our ability. We must first love God, but we must also love our neighbors as ourselves. The Power of Our God

Before you begin to read this testimony I will warn you that I remember the following incident with the memory of a 13 year old. So if some of the details are not perfect I beg your apologies, but I believe that the importance of the message remains unchanged.

I feel the need to apologize to everyone as well as to God. I have delayed much too long in sharing this testimony. It has been ten years now since the Lord placed His hand of protection over myself and my family in such a miraculous way. Many of you may already know what happened to my family on the roads of Honduras ten years ago, but for those of you who are not aware I will start at the beginning.

Ten years ago my family and I

started out on yet another trip to Honduras. The only thing different about the trip is that our brother Darin Crull (recently ordained as an elder) was coming with us. So we set out in the van heading south and hoping to make Honduras by Christmas. By the time Christmas came we were in southern Guatemala and very ready to make our destination. Well, as you may know from your own experience when you are on the last legs of a long trip you tend to do whatever it takes to push to the end as quickly as possible and so we found ourselves a couple days later driving through what we hoped to be the final night of the journey.

We were about 15 minutes north of Tegucigalpa (the capital city of Honduras which is located about 2-3 hours from our destination) when my father saw a truck crashed against the side of the mountain. By this time we were all in various stages of sleep and I had made myself a bed on the floor of the van just behind the front seats. I remember waking up and hearing my father leave the vehicle and then I dozed off again.

I woke up again when I heard the driver's door open and listened to what my father would say about the situation. I was very surprised (as was my mother who was in the front passenger seat) to hear the voice of a stranger. I heard my mother ask him where my father was, but he did not respond. He started the van and was trying to put it into gear when I was moved to action. I say that I was moved to action because I honestly do not know how I did anything at all. I am typically a scaredy-cat who prefers to cower until danger passes, but somehow in that moment I felt an overwhelming anger with this man. How dare he enter our vehicle and try to hurt us?

I do not remember planning anything, I just remember wanting to stop him. So I reached up and grabbed onto his arm and sunk my nails into it as hard as possible while pulling back on it. At that instant my mother reached forward and pulled the key out of the ignition and threw it on the floor.

Now, I do not know what the man was thinking but I doubt that he was expecting anyone else to be in the van because he pulled away and began to lean against the driver door and point a gun at my mom. He was yelling at her to give him the keys and she just kept asking where my father was and what had happened to him. The man swung the gun to my face and told my mother he would kill me if she did not give him the keys. I honestly have no idea what my mother said next. All I remember is looking at that gun and knowing that in a moment my time could be up. I remember asking God to help me be ready if it was my time and to forgive me for my wrongdoings before Him. I remember being at peace.

The next moment my father (who had been beaten up by the man's cohorts and left on the side of the road) opened the door that the man had been leaning on. As the man tumbled out my father jumped in and locked the door. Now, we could not leave because the keys were on the floor somewhere and the men were just outside of the vehicle banging on the doors and windows.

By this time everyone was awake and my mom told us to pray as loud as we could that God would be with us and keep us safe. And you'd better believe we all prayed at the top of our lungs.

The men finally threw a rock through the driver door window and shot into the van. The bullet hit my father. but since it was dark we could not tell where he had been shot. My mother cried out, "Murderers, you have killed my husband, you have killed my husband!" The men then tried to reach in and unlock the door so my mother told us to give her everything within reach and she began to stuff it out the hole in the window. Books, water jugs, covers, pillows, backpacks, food, everything was being tossed out to keep them from being able to reach in.

About this time a semi truck drove by honking and flashing its lights and the men drove off in their own vehicle. From this point on I get a bit fuzzy on the details because my job was to care for my brother John Michael who was considerably shaken and not speaking. I just held him and sang to him as my mother, Tommy and Darin looked for the keys. I do know that my brother Tommy helped take my father into the back of the van and tied a belt around his leg as it was determined that that was where the wound was.

When they found the keys my mother jumped in the driver's seat and began to head down the mountain towards the closest hospital (about 20 minutes away). Halfway down the mountain we met an ambulance that was heading our way (it seems that the semi driver had called for help over his CB). We stopped and began the transfer of my father only to find that the ambulance had overheated and we had to use our vehicle anyway. When the medics got settled and we were on our way they realized that Tommy had tied the belt around the wrong leg. So the medics told him to untie it and raise the leg to let the blood that was trapped in that leg circulate to my father's heart and organs.

When we finally arrived at the hospital Darin administered to my father and they took him in for x-rays of the wound. Upon the first examination the doctor could see that the bullet had gone through my father's main artery in his leg and he believed that an operation might be necessary. We were very worried about having an operation or a blood transfusion, because one never knows how trustworthy the blood supply is in a country that does not have health codes that are as strict as they are in the United States. While my father was being examined we all had a season of prayer for his welfare and for the lives of those men who had accosted us on the highway. We found out in about an hour or so that the artery was in perfect condition and that a transfusion was not necessary. The very next day my father was released from the hospital, sore but on the mend.

We found out later that the truck that had crashed into the mountain was caused by the same men that accosted us. It was a band of men who were going about attacking people on the highway in order to steal from them. They operated by riding in a pickup with two guys in the back with guns. They would pass a vehicle, shoot the driver and passenger, and come back to steal their belongings. When my father went to investigate the accident he found the driver of the vehicle dead and the passenger nearly so, but he was beat up and passed out before he could get back to the van. What if those men had chosen to shoot us off the road? What if the ambulance had not been on its way up? What if my father had needed surgery? There are just too many what-ifs.

Each time upon remembering this testimony I am humbled by the awesome power and grace of our loving God. Had He not been with us that night I am confident that I would not be here today—maybe no one in that van would be. But He was with us; He saw fit to spare our lives and to shower us with His miraculous power. That my father would be so wounded and not need surgery or even a blood transfusion? This is a miracle from God. I have been told that when someone is shot in that main artery they have about ten minutes to live. God gave my father much more than ten minutes. He indeed gives us our every breath. My prayer is that I would use that gift of life to ever praise Him for His abundant mercies.

As for the passenger in the other vehicle, she did live. That is another testimony that I would be happy to relate to you at any time. Do not ever doubt the power of our God. He is indeed great and greatly to be praised.

Womens Retreat 2006

riday, September 29th, a group of 54 women gathered in a small lodge tucked in a pastoral valley amongst the hilled landscape of Excelsior Springs, Missouri. A handful had spent the afternoon in the antique district of the quaint Missouri River town of Lexington; the others trickled into Lake Mauer's Pettit Lodge and were greeted with warm embraces and joyful salutations. In a flurry of excitement, reminiscent of sleepovers of their girlhood, each woman found their room and their bunkmates, tucked away their

overnight bag and then, slipper-clad, joined the group in welcoming the next arrival.

The women quickly gathered in the central meeting room as the weekend's activities and theme of the Proverbs 31 virtuous women were introduced. As the scripture Proverbs 31:10-31 was read, the daunting challenge of God's standard of virtuousness became apparent. As though anticipating our reaction, a skit, performed by Debbie Vogel and Caroline Hedrick, was offered. In a hilarious dialogue Debbie's character spoke for the skeptic-in-us-all as a young wife bewildered by the impossibility of attaining the life and skills of the Virtuous Woman. "What's with the wool, flax and working willingly with her hands...l can't sew a straight line without raising my voice." Guided by her wise friend, the young skeptic slowly abandoned her sarcasm and defiance and began to realize the true applications that can be gleaned from this ancient scripture. Her transformation revealed to the audience the relevance and wisdom of the Proverbs text.
