

Five Kernels

"Behold, this is a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven, if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things which we have written" (Ether 1:35).

"And I looked and beheld a man among the Gentiles, who was separated from the seed of my brethren by the many waters; and I beheld the Spirit of God, that it came down and wrought upon the man; and he went forth upon the many waters, even unto the seed of my brethren, who were in the promised land. And it came to pass that I beheld the Spirit of God, that it wrought upon other Gentiles; and they went forth out of captivity, upon the many waters. And it came to pass that I beheld many multitudes of the Gentiles upon the land of promise; ...And I beheld the Spirit of the Lord, that it was upon the Gentiles; that they did prosper, and obtain the land for their inheritance; and I beheld that they were white, and exceeding fair and beautiful, like unto my people before they were slain. ...And I. Nephi, beheld that the Gentiles that had gone out of captivity were delivered by the power of God out of the hands of all other nations. And it came to pass that I, Nephi, beheld that they did prosper in the land; (1 Nephi 3:147-156).

hanksgiving will soon be upon us. There have been many times of Thanksgiving throughout the scriptures, but the roots of our holi-

day are founded in that first Thanksgiving in the early 1600s here on this land. When we compare what we have to be thankful for this day to that which they had, I doubt those early settlers could scarce imagine what has resulted from their meager beginnings.

The Pilgrim fathers who landed at Plymouth Rock over 300 years ago knew nothing of the affluent times which you and I enjoy today in this great country of ours. The next time you and I are tempted to complain about inflation and the state of our economy, remember the following:

During that first long winter at Plymouth Colony, seven times as many graves were made for the dead as homes for the living.

Touching indeed is the picture of William Brewster, rising from a scanty Plymouth dinner, consisting of a plate of clams and a glass of cold water, to thank God "for the abundance of the sea and the treasures hid in the sand."

The Pilgrims didn't have much, but they possessed a great gratitude, and it was upon this very thing that America was built. These stalwart people, strong, devout and sincere were the timbers upon which our nation was founded.

A custom developed from those early years which continues in at least some families to this day. It is referred to as the Five Kernels of Thanksgiving, or the Five Kernels of Corn. Before the Thanksgiving meal, a plate with five kernels of corn is placed on the table. This is in remembrance of the dire straits from which this nation emerged, as at one time that was the ration for each person – five kernels of corn per day. Each person at the table takes a turn and picks up a kernel of corn and says what they are thankful for.

We certainly have many temporal things to be thankful for, but in Psalm 103 by David, we can find five things to be thankful for, regardless of our temporal condition. Can you identify them?

"Bless the LORD. O my soul: and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases: Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies; Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's. The LORD executeth righteousness and judgment for all that are oppressed. He made known his ways unto Moses, his acts unto the children of Israel.

The LORD is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and plenteous in mercy. He will not always chide: neither will he keep his anger for ever. He hath not dealt with us after our sins; nor rewarded us according to our iniquities. For as the heaven is high above the earth, so great is his mercy toward them that fear him. As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us. Like as a father pitieth his children, so the LORD pitieth them that fear him. For he knoweth our frame; he remembereth that we are dust. As for man, his days are as grass: as a flower of the field, so he flourisheth. For the wind passeth over it, and it is gone; and the place thereof shall know it no more. But the mercy of the LORD is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children; To such as keep his covenant, and to those that remember his commandments to do them. LORD hath prepared his throne in the heavens; and his kingdom ruleth over all. Bless the LORD, ve his angels, that excel in strength, that do his commandments, hearkening unto the voice of his word. Bless ye the LORD, all ye his hosts; ye ministers of his, that do his pleasure. Bless the LORD, all his works in all places of his dominion: bless the

LORD, O my soul" (Psalm 103:1-22).



1. The Kernel of Forgiveness

Verse 3: "Who forgiveth all thine iniquities;"

Through Jesus Christ, we may be forgiven of our sins. They are tossed into the depths of the sea, or as verse 12 says: "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us."

Do you ever think about why the east and west, rather than the north and the south? The north and south meet. If you go north long enough, you will be going south. If you go south long enough, you will be going north. BUT, if you go east, you will always be going east and if you go west, you will always be going west. THEY NEVER MEET!

This is the forgiveness of the Father, through his son Jesus Christ.



2. The Kernel of Redemption

Verse 4: "Who redeemeth thy life from destruction;"

Governor Neff, of Texas, spoke to the assembled convicts of penitentiaries of that state. He finished by saying that he would remain to listen if any man wanted to speak with him. When the meeting was over, a large group of men remained, many of them lifers. One by one

they each told the governor that he was there through a frame-up, injustice or a judicial blunder. Each asked to be freed.

Finally, one man came up and said, "Governor, I just want to say that I'm guilty. I did what they sent me here for, but I believe I've paid for it. If I were freed, I would do everything I could to be a good citizen and prove myself worthy of your mercy."

The governor pardoned this man. Why? Because, he admitted his guilt. So it is with us if we are to be redeemed from the awful sentence we're under. But there is a difference. We can't say that we've paid for any of it because as the old hymn says, "Jesus paid it all, all to Him I owe; sin has left a crimson stain, He washed it white as snow." If we will plead His blood, God will redeem us.

The Lord redeems not only our souls from hell, but He also redeems our lives from the clutches of the devil. Satan is bent on damning our souls and destroying our lives. But thanks be to God who redeems our lives from his power. All one has to do is take a look at our penitentiaries, sanitariums, hospitals, and half-way houses. They are filled with people whose lives are being destroyed by our enemy. Jesus said in Matthew 7:13-14,

"Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." 1 All healing is divine healing and all recovery from sickness, injury and surgery

All healing is divine healing and all recovery from sickness, injury and surgery is the result of the healing properties that God has built into our bodies.

But we praise God today with the Psalmist who said,

"He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings. And he hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God: many shall see it, and fear, and shall trust in the LORD" (Psalm 40:2, 3).



3. The Kernel of Healing

Verse 3: "who healeth all thy diseases;"

When first considering this passage of scripture, I was reluctant to use it because it is difficult to reconcile it with the fact that God doesn't heal everyone who has an "incurable" disease. But I believe the Holy Spirit can help us to see three important truths contained in this verse.

is the result of the healing properties that God has built into our bodies. Medicine, surgery and therapy are merely extensions of God's healing ministry.

This verse doesn't say that God heals everyone's diseases, but that He heals all diseases. There is no disease or sickness which lies beyond His healing power—not even what we call "incurable." He is the Great Physician.

The main truth I learned is that the Psalmist is speaking to his soul. "Bless the Lord, O my soul," he said, "who heals all your diseases."

The diseases of the soul emanate from the virus of sin. Jesus identified this virus and its symptoms and disorders in Matthew 15:19-20:

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies: These are the things which defile a man: but to eat with unwashen

hands defileth not a man."

Just as some disorders of the body can be cured by medicines and surgery, so the soul of man can be cleansed, purged, purified and made whole when God through the Holy Spirit is allowed to possess us completely.



Verse 4: "who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies;"

A man gave the following remarkable testimony: "I got off at the depot one day as a tramp. For a year I begged on the streets for a living. touched a man on the shoulder and said, 'Mister, please give me some money so I can have something to eat.' As soon as I saw his face, I recognized him as my father. 'Father, don't you know me?' I asked. Throwing his arms around me, he cried, 'I've found you! I've found you! All I have is yours!' Think of it! That I, a tramp, stood begging my father for a few cents, when for 18 years he had been looking for me to give me all he was worth."

How similar this is to the loving kindness and tender mercies of the Lord which accompany our lives every day.

Verse 13: "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the LORD pitieth them that fear him."



Verse 5: "Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's."

This reminds me of the words of Jesus, given in the Sermon on the Mount:

"Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled" (Matthew 5:6).

There's a great paradox here. We're satisfied but never satisfied. Imagine tasting your very favorite desert and this time it is the best ever! You eat until you are full and can't eat another bite, but you want more because what you have experienced makes you want to taste it again and again. So it is with righteousness. We're filled and the filling is so sweet and so rich and full that we want more.

But that's not the end. Verse 5 also says that God will renew my youth like the eagle's. The eagle is known for its size and strength.

This is the result of living a fulfilled, satisfied, spiritual life. I am constantly being renewed, refreshed, and revived in my soul and God is doing it all!

No wonder then that the Psalmist said, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name!"

"And it came to pass, as he went to Jerusalem, that he passed through the midst of

Samaria and Galilee. And as he entered into a certain village, there met him ten men that were lepers, which stood afar off: And they lifted up their voices, and said, Jesus, Master, have mercy on us. And when he saw them, he said unto them, Go shew yourselves unto the priests. And it came to pass, that, as they went, they were cleansed. And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, and with a loud voice glorified God, And fell down on his face at his feet, giving him thanks: and he was a Samaritan. And Jesus answering said. Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine? There are not found that returned to give glory to God, save this stranger. And he said unto him, Arise, go thy way: thy faith hath made thee whole" (Luke 17:11-19).

Ten lepers met Jesus and had a life changing encounter with the Lord. When you break this story down to its simplest elements, it describes every Christian. We were outcasts from the Kingdom of God, on our way to certain death, but then we had a life changing encounter with Jesus. While we should never look back on the pleasures of sin, we should never forget where the Lord has brought us from. The Old Testament prophet Isaiah said:

"Hearken to me, ye that follow after righteousness, ye that seek the LORD: look unto the rock whence ye are hewn, and to the hole of the pit whence ye are digged" (Isajah 51:1).

In other words, look at where God has brought you from. Remember what God has done for you. Visit again in your mind the place where you first met God and His mercy and grace. However, what is so significant about these lepers who were healed is that out of the ten, only one returned to say thanks. There were nine who did not take the time to say thank you. If you were to infer the truth of this story on general humanity, we could say that nine out of ten people never really pause to give thanks for what they have.

A Christian commentator suggested some possibilities as to why the other nine never returned to give thanks. Keep in mind that these are only suggestions, but they reveal a whole lot about human nature.

- One waited to see if the cure was real.
- One waited to see if it would last.
- One said he would see Jesus later.
- One decided that he had never had leprosy.
- One said he would have gotten well anyway.
- One gave the glory to the priests.
- One said, "O, well, Jesus didn't really do anything."
- One said, "Any rabbi could have done it."
- One said, "I was already much improved."

And then there was one who returned to give God thanks. I want to share with

you several truths from this passage of scripture that I hope will cause us to truly give God thanks for all He has done for us.



Most of us have heard sto-

ries of the horrors of hav-

ing leprosy in Biblical times. It was a horrible disease to have. Not only was there the pain of the disease itself, but there was also the stigma that went with having the disease. The Mosaic Law pro-Inounced a leper as being "unclean." They were not fit to enter into the tabernacle, or later, the Temple to worship. They could no longer live with their families, but the law required them to live outside the city (Numbers 5:2-3). The Law required that they rend their clothes as a sign of extreme sorrow, that their faces be covered and that they cry out "unclean" whenever anyone came close to them. Their

To be a leper meant no intimacy with anyone, no friendship with anyone; you were isolated and a total outcast. Leprosy was regarded as a disease which the Jews supposed to be inflicted for the punishment of some particular sin, and to be, more than other diseases, a mark of God's displeasure. If you were a leper, you essentially lost everything: your family, your job, and your money.

A Note that verse 12 of Luke 17 describes these lepers as standing "afar off." Rabbinic tradition said that they had to stand at least 100 paces from anyone else. They could not even come close to Jesus.

The reason I have spent so much time in describing leprosy is because it is a picture of sin and what Satan wishes to do to every single one of you. Eaton's Bible Dictionary says of this disease, "Leprosy was 'the outward and visible sign of the innermost spiritual corruption; a meet emblem in its small beginnings, its gradual spread, its internal disfigurement, its

dissolution little by little of the whole body, of that which corrupts, degrades, and defiles man's inner nature, and disease.

We like to think that we are sufficient, that we are capable of handling life, but

renders him unmeet to enter the presence of a pure and holy God."

I'm not going to equate leprosy with sin, but there are important similarities between them. Like the leper, we too were isolated from true intimacy. Like the leper, we too were outcasts (from the Kingdom of God). Like the leper, we too were in the process of losing everything to sin. And like the leper, we too were being destroyed by that which was in our bodies, the law of sin and death.

II. NOTICE THE LEPERS' CRY.

In verse 13 we are told as Jesus was about to enter into the city that these lepers, who had to stand afar off, began to cry, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us."

2 That was all that they could do. No physician could heal them, no medicine could cure them. They were completely helpless before the onslaught of this deadly

the truth is we are born helpless into this world, and we are helpless to stand before sin and Satan. We stand condemned by sin and we are totally helpless.

Grace is getting what you don't deserve and mercy is not getting what you do deserve.

They are begging the Lord to have compassion on them, to help them in their time of need.

Their only hope was placed on this man Jesus. Everything had come down to this moment, to this encounter with Jesus. Aren't you glad that when your only hope is placed on Jesus, He will be more than enough. Jesus had compassion on them and told them to go and present themselves to the priests. as the law commanded. The priest would inspect them and give them a clean bill of health so they could rejoin their communities and families (Leviticus 14:2).



We are told that as they began their journey to the priests, they were cleansed or healed. What is significant is that out of the ten, there was one who reacted differently than the rest. The Bible says that he saw that he was healed, he turned back and glorified God and he came to Jesus and gave Him thanks.

Why did this one react differently? Here is the meat of the message. This is a sermon within a sermon. There are three distinctions between him and the others.

1 Note the perception of gratitude.

a) The Bible says, "And one of them, when he saw that he was healed." The Bible says that he saw he was healed. Now the others no doubt knew that they were healed, but there was something different here. He took the time to note that he had been blessed. He realized that something wonderful had happened to him. He was sensitive to the power of Christ working in his life. His perception had entirely changed.

b) There is an old Jewish story that illustrates this point. There is a man who goes to the rabbi and complains, "Life is unbearable. There are nine of us living in one room. What can I do?" The rabbi answers, "Take your goat into the room with

you." The man is incredulous, but the rabbi insists. "Do as I say and come back in a week." A week later, the man comes back looking more distraught than before. "We cannot stand it," he tells the rabbi. "The goat is filthy." The rabbi then tells him, "Go home and let the goat out. And come back in a week." A radiant man returns to the rabbi a week later, exclaiming, "Life is beautiful. We enjoy every minute of it now that there's no goat — only the nine of us." The situation was the same as at first, but now his perception had changed. He realized that he was blessed to begin with.

- c) Do we really perceive the ways that God has blessed us? Not a one of us is starving, not a one of us is naked, but most importantly, if you are a Christian, you have been given everything through Christ Jesus our Lord. The devil will do his best to keep your mind off the blessings of God. He will constantly tell you how bad you have it, of how everything is wrong in your life. You see, it's when you begin to realize how much you have in the Lord that you will truly begin to be thankful, and when you are thankful, your heart will abound with love for the Lord that has so graciously given all to you.
- d) An unthankful Christian is a defeated Christian, for he/she has lost their joy.
- Note the priority of gratitude.

command to go to the priest, but he delayed, he turned around and went back to the Lord. Why didn't the Lord rebuke him for this? The reason is because this man realized the priority of gratitude and worship. I believe that this man fully intended to obey what the Lord had told him to do, but he realized that he had a higher calling that must come first. If you don't give God thanks, it won't be long until your obedience just becomes a job to do, you lose the meaning of what God is wanting you to do. You become unthankful. It is fitting and proper to give thanks and praise to the Lord for what He has done in your life.

Note the perfection of gratitude.

a) As he drew near to where the Lord was, he glorified God. The Greek means that he made the Lord glorious, he manifested the worth of the Lord. He came to Jesus and fell down before Him in perfect submission and gave Him thanks. The Lord asked the question, Were there not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? Then note what He told

b) This was something that the others did not receive. Ten were "healed", but only one was made "whole" – the thankful one. Only one was complete.

Remember: Throughout time the majority of mankind has been in slavery. At minimum wage in the United States, you are at the 50% mark for the world for income and in the top 10% for history of mankind.

If you lost all your possessions, you still have a loving God and Savior that laid down his life so that you might be forgiven, redeemed, healed, loved and renewed – and be complete in this life and dwell in eternity with our Heavenly Father.

Thanksgiving – remember the 5 kernels of corn; be thankful and "whole."
