

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

EDITORIAL

he word *critic* and its derivatives, *criticism* and *criticize*, are not found in the scriptures. The exception is the word *critical*, which is used twice in the Book of Mormon. We Our dislikes can result in a witch hunt, resulting in exposing and humiliating the sinner as a self-righteous act on our part.

usually think of criticism as being unwanted fault-finding. However, the term *constructive criticism* has been used for a good purpose in bringing about needed correction.

The dictionary says *criticism* is the act of making judgments; analysis of qualities and evaluation of comparative worth. It is also defined as the act of finding fault; censure; disapproval.

Plain and simple, fault-finding can be nothing more than putting someone down. It is an effort to vent oneself of what a person doesn't like. There are many things in this world which we don't like or approve and we have our freedom and agency to express ourselves. The problem occurs when we focus on someone we don't especially like. Our dislikes can result in a witch hunt, resulting in exposing and humiliating the sinner as a self-righteous act on our part.

On the other hand, we might consider constructive criticism in our personal desires to improve ourselves and our loved ones in righteousness if we do it the right way. In fact, that is what the gospel of Christ is all about—bringing ourselves in line with the commandments of Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, our experiences in self-improvements haven't always brought the desired result. For instance the preacher might get a little carried away and the constructive criticism may turn into destructive criticism. The people end up being offended and tune him out. If he gets too judgmental and chops them off at the knees, so to speak, they go out the door little, short people. In other words, he has discouraged them by an overload of criticism.

Aren't we supposed to give constructive criticism? Yes, but we must edify and strengthen, not destroy. This is actually a two-way matter: the preacher speaking the truth in an effort to bring correction in our lives where we need it, and the willingness of the listeners to hear the truth without becoming offended with the preacher. We are talking about a basic function in the church: speaking the truth and receiving the truth.

It has been said that it is as big a sin to be offended as it is to offend. If we are easily offended we are apt to be offended when the offender doesn't intentionally offend. Or we might say it this way: if a person has a chip on their shoulder they will likely get it knocked off by someone who just happens to get a little careless about how they talk or act. A person can be entirely too sensitive and ready to be hurt at the least remark or act that someone might say or do. Also, if a person is easily offended they will likely hold a grudge and repeatedly relive the incident, justifying their reason for being offended.

In our religious endeavors, we have developed a certain standard of righteousness as our personal goal. We know it as our integrity or self-esteem. Our fault is in the fact that we think of this standard as good enough, but it has not yet taken us to the perfected state of Zion. As one preacher said, our best is not good enough.

We often depend on our integrity to keep us from falling into gross sin. It is a matter of self-respect more than a conscience based upon being obedient to God. We construct our idea of right over wrong and place it where it might be a convenient guide. We make judgments based upon our own image of right and wrong and occasionally check our views against that which the Lord has given as a moral standard.

As for our personal attitude, we must be able to accept the truth ourselves and stand corrected, even if it offends us. We must realize that we are living in an environment of many evils. We are living in the day of the heathen. We are living in the day of great deception which was prophesied by Jesus himself (Matthew 24:4, 5, 11, 23, 24).

We are subject to be influenced by many humanisms, things that satisfy the natural man, which appear to be good and generally acceptable but will lead us into various paths of reasoning which are deceptive. Even our personal right to sin against the law of God is upheld in many of the laws of the nations today, but we must not depend upon them as our guides when they are openly against the teachings of Christ. Nonetheless, we are subject to the laws of the land wherein we reside or visit.

We as a people have received the fullness of Christ's gospel and we are accountable, inasmuch as we have made a covenant with the Lord in the waters of baptism. Because of the easiness of the way, we are apt be to inheritors of the truth more than defenders of the truth. We obtain a knowledge of the truth and often we think of our understanding as being evidence of personal righteousness. Our own personal defense of the truth may become based upon our personal views more so than upon our personal application of the truth. We may end up fighting a cause for righteousness while our personal lifestyles are grossly deficient in righteousness.

Paul said, "For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself. But let every man prove his own work, and then shall he have rejoicing in himself alone, and not in another" (Galatians 6:3, 4).

The evidence of the true knowledge of the gospel of Christ is in our personal lives. When we have accepted the truth by putting it to the test in our personal lives, we know the value of every principle. We cannot be a true light of this gospel unless we obey it to the fullness. We are nearing a time when all who profess to believe in this gospel must defend it with their own lives.

The SIGN of HIS COMING

fter Jesus taught the multitudes, denouncing the teachings of the scribes and Pharisees, He left the temple and went upon the Mount of Olives to pray. His disciples soon came But Jesus Christ has promised the righteous...that He "will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him" (Malachi 3:17)....

to Him privately looking down upon the city of Jerusalem viewing the temple courtyard and reflecting upon what Jesus had told them earlier in the day that "There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down." It had been disturbing news to His disciples, since they had lived during the period of time when the work of rebuilding the temple, the complex of courts, and buildings in Jerusalem had progressed considerably from

the time that King Herod had started the work which occurred prior to their birth. Jesus' disciples asked Him three questions "Tell us..."

- When shall these things be?
- What shall be the sign of thy coming?
- And of the end of the world?

Jesus proceeds to answer His disciples where we can read His words as recorded in the 24th chapter of Matthew. We have an advantage because of the passing of time where some of the events prophesied by Jesus have come to pass; thus we can have confidence in the words of Christ as we wait for the sign of His coming.

It is the following sign provided by Jesus to His disciples that I would like to focus your attention as it relates to the last days while we wait for the return of our Savior Jesus Christ.

"And because iniquity <anomia> shall abound, the love <agape> of many shall wax cold" (Matthew 24:12).

The word that Jesus used for *iniquity* comes from the Greek word *anomia* where a more precise interpretation of the word would be *unrighteousness*.

For the word *love* Jesus used the Greek word *agape* where we can find it defined by the Apostle John as the love of God found in the following text:

"He that loveth <agapao> not knoweth not God; for God is love <agape>.

"And we have known and believed the love <agape> that God hath to us. God is love <agape>; and he that dwelleth in love <agape> dwelleth in God, and God in him" 1 John 4:8, 16.

The phrase *wax cold* is actually the Greek word

psucho that was used by Jesus metaphorically in the sense of waning zeal.

Now with this understanding of the key words used by Jesus we can more fully understand the condition of mankind that would exist in the last days. If we apply this understanding along with the Apostle John's understanding of the word *agape* as Christ taught, the statement made by Jesus could be written today as follows:

"And because of unrighteousness, the zeal for the love of God will wane within the hearts of many."

Christ's goal for the believer is to become one with Him as Jesus is one with His Father. Jesus had and demonstrated zeal daily towards fulfilling the will of His Father in all things. This zeal is motivated by the love that Jesus has towards His Father who created Him (Revelation 3:14).

We understand through the scriptures that if we want to become one with Jesus and His Father we must obey the words of Christ, "If you love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15). By keeping those commandments we have accepted the premise that they are words of truth, thus allowing God's Spirit to work within our lives. Since we know that the words that Jesus taught were the very words given him of the Father (John 17:7-8), we are assured that by keeping the words of Christ we are also keeping the words of His Father, thus becoming one as Jesus so fervently prayed to His Father, *"that they may be made perfect in one"* (John 17:22-23).

We find in the writings of the Apostles Paul and Peter the word *charity* is used in the translation for the Greek word *agape*, which differs from the translation for *agape* in the writings of Apostle John where the word *love* is used in the text instead of *charity*, as previously referenced above.

Paul makes the case that if he did not have "charity, I am nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:2), as he wrote to the churches in Corinth. When he wrote to the church in Colossae he told them that they were to "put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness" (Colossians 3:14), and when he was writing to Timothy he told him that "the end of the commandment is charity" (1 Timothy 1:5). In the writings of Peter a progressive outline is taught to those who exercise their faith in Jesus Christ. The spiritual journey outlined by Peter would lead them to the beautiful gift of "charity" that would make them neither "barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 1:5-11).

The word "charity" is used in the Book of Mormon when it speaks of the love of God, which brings together the harmony of the teachings in both records, the Bible and Book of Mormon, concerning the commandments of God, the love of Christ, and His relationship with His Father. As can be found in the writings of Nephi and Alma that it is a commandment from God "that all men should have charity" (2 Nephi 11:107-8) so that they may "always abound in good works" (Alma 5:41). In the words of Moroni, that except we have, or posses and walk in charity we "can in no wise be saved in the kingdom of God" (Moroni 10:15), because we "can not inherit that place which thou hast prepared in the mansions of thy Father" (Ether 5:34). Moroni also provides us with a clear and concise definition for the word "charity" which is "the pure love of Christ" (Moroni 7:52), and that it "bringeth unto me the fountain of all righteousness" (Ether 5:29).

Given everything that has been scripturally noted above concerning "charity," one can safely conclude that charity is something that is not part of man's nature. Charity is something that must be obtained from a source outside of man's natural state. Thus we find the admonition found in the following scripture verse:

"Wherefore, my beloved brethren, pray unto the Father with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son Jesus Christ, that ye may become the sons of God, that when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is, that we may have this hope, that we may be purified even as he is pure. Amen" (Moroni 7:53).

Let us return to the statement made by Jesus to His disciples as to what they should expect to see as a sign of His coming: "And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold." Now the words of Christ can be more readily understood given our review of the word charity. Prior to the return of Jesus Christ the condition of mankind would be that they have lost their desire or zeal to possess the pure love of God, or charity. To understand how pervasive and perverse this condition would be

we can look to the Apostle Paul as he warned the Roman Christians concerning the folly of men who had "changed the truth of God into a lie, and worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator" and where "God gave them up unto vile affections" because "they did not like to retain God in their knowledge" so "God gave them over to a reprobate mind" to the extent that they were "without natural affection" (Romans 1:25-31). Noting that Paul was speaking of conditions that had taken place and that was prevalent in the Roman society of the day, but he did say "that in the last days perilous times shall come" when similar conditions would exist where men would find themselves "without natural af*fection*" (2 Timothy 3:1-3).

So, what does it mean to be *"without natural affection"* and how does it differ from the word *"charity"*?

The phrase "without natural affection" comes from the Greek word astorgos which is the negative of the inborn love for kindred, especially the love of parents towards their children and the love children have towards their parents. This inborn or natural affection is something that we come into this world with which can be lost, whereas "charity" is a transformation of that natural love to perfection by the power of God through Jesus Christ. This transformation can only be had by praying to God "with all the energy of heart, that ye may be filled with this love which he hath bestowed upon all who are true followers of his Son Jesus Christ."

A day cannot go by without seeing the evidence of the conditions that Jesus Christ spoke of in reference to the final days prior to His coming when He sat with His disciples on the Mount of Olives so long ago. One with a good respect for history could reason that there have been many good examples where natural affection failed the various societies throughout time. But there is one inescapable truth where faith in the Word of God is on the side of those who put their faith in and stand upon. No different from the days of Noah prior to the flood during the building of the ark "they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage" and chose to ignore the signs and warnings of the pending destruction awaiting them. I find the same conditions existing in America today where we have become a nation who are "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God" fast approaching the time that "because they received not the love of the truth ... God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: That they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness" (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12).

Jesus understood clearly the calamity that stood at the door for Jerusalem and her people Israel, and with that same clarity Jesus was able to view through the vista of time to our day. The pending warning of destruction and salvation is the same, "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only," where we have been instructed sufficiently by Christ to "Watch therefore: for ve know not what hour your Lord doth come...Therefore be ve also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh" (Matthew 24:36, 42, 44).


Jesus Christ's return will be far different from His first appearance as a babe in swaddling clothes where angels from heaven were heard of men saying, "*Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men*"

(Luke 2:14). Jesus will come this time with a "sharp sword to smite the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron: and he treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of Almighty God" (Revelation 19:15), when the unrighteous or wicked, in the words of Paul, "shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power" (2 Thessalonians 1:9). But Jesus Christ has promised the righteous, those who have believed in Him and have kept His commandments at His coming, that He "will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him" (Malachi 3:17), "to be glorified in his saints, and to be admired in all them that believe (because our testimony among you was believed) in that day" (2Thessalonians 1:10).


TESTIMONY

"The best thing I ever did in my life..."

God had a plan, He planted, nourished, and patiently waited.

hen I was little, going up the road to Grandpa and Grandma's house (George and Sarah Brantner) for church was very special to me. I have sweet memories of meetings in their basement which was set up for church. Sometime later the Cedar Springs (Michigan) Local purchased an old one-room country schoolhouse to hold services in; it was the schoolhouse I had attended for my third and fourth grades. Grandma was my Sunday School teacher when we went. I have been told it was not very many times, but they were special to me. I remember our family being visited by several of Grandpa's friends. I remember thinking old Brother Welch knew everything there was to know about the scriptures. There was another friend of Grandpa's that I liked a lot too,



an older man named Clarence. I thought he was funny; I learned many years later that he was Apostle Clarence Wheaton. The seed was planted.

My dad, Charles Brantner, began working seven days a week, so we didn't get to church much after that. My grandparents moved to Missouri shortly before I graduated from high school. I married and started a family of my own. My parents also moved to Missouri and became active in the church once again. Soon my dad was called to be an Elder, and Grandpa passed away suddenly. My parents made trips to Michigan to visit, and we talked of the gospel. The need that I had in my soul was being nourished.

There was one night when I felt the Lord calling me. I stayed up most of the night praying, and asking Him for His forgiveness and for His direction. I gave my heart to God. I asked Him if it was His will, would he grant me a desire—to have a daughter— and I promised I would raise her to know Him. Almost immediately my prayers were answered and God blessed me with a precious baby girl after having two boys...all gifts from God. knew of a surety that God heard and answered my prayers.

A short time later I began studying the scriptures with my uncle, Gale Brantner, who had once again become active in the church after many years away. I experienced the gospel on a grown-up level and I learned about the Holy Spirit. Before long I attended church at the Bradley Local with Uncle Gale. As soon as I walked into the old church building at Bradley I felt the same Spirit of God as I had when I was a child, and I knew I was home. I studied for some time and grew in faith, and soon I was filled with the desire to be baptized. The Lord had also placed a desire in my heart to have my dad baptize me, so I began to make plans. My baptism took place on a Sunday after church, in my grandparent's pond near

Warrensburg. After I had been baptized, and when the hands were laid upon me for the reception of the Holy Ghost by two other Elders, I felt the Spirit come into me from the top of my head and flowing down to my toes. I learned afterward that my dad had borrowed Grandpa's shoes to wear as he baptized me. I also learned later that my dad had been told by the Spirit months earlier, before my grandfather's passing, that he would fill Grandpa's shoes. He "filled" them, literally. I learned firsthand that God had a plan...and I could see how God's hand had been with me thus far.

Soon Uncle Gale was led to gather remaining church members in the Cedar Springs area for Sunday School classes. Later he was called into the ministry and became the pastor of the Ravenna Local of the Church of Christ. After years of gathering in members' homes we were blessed with a church building of our own. The Lord gave me a "safe harbor" in which to grow in the gospel. I learned how to be strong and rely on God for the next hurdle in my life...my younger son was hurt very badly in a bicycle/truck accident. The Lord gave me another proof that prayers are answered and miracles do still happen. I was blessed with knowing that God had been watching out for him, and He brought my son back when no one at the hospital thought he would make it. I knew a miracle had taken place.

Some time later, Ken and June Haines started attending the Ravenna Local. June's grandfather was Elder L. E. Welch, who was the instrument of the Lord in bringing my grandparents into the Church of Christ. Years later their son, Bruce, attended the Michigan Church Reunion there in 1995. He had been diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma and asked for administration. During that administration, the Spirit rested upon me and I knew he would be healed: I never doubted it. He began to attend occasionally, and the first time I heard him pray the Spirit rested upon me and told me that one day he would be called to the ministry. I did not know him at the time, I only knew who he was. Bruce went through chemotherapy and radiation treatments, still coming to church as often as he felt up to it. I remember being impressed with Bruce's strong faith, even through his illness. I saw another miracle take place in Bruce's healing.

The following year my marriage ended. It was a very difficult and trying time for me and my children as we picked up the pieces and started over. Bruce became a friend during that time. He began a new life of his own too, being baptized and moving in with his parents to help with his dad's care. We began to see each other, praying to the Lord, asking if it was His will. Happily, it was the will of the Lord, and that is another story, a beautiful one which I will repeat at another time. God had been patient with us, waiting until the right time. God knew all along that eventually we would both turn to Him...and then He could bring us together. We were married in October of 1999, and Bruce was called into the ministry in 2010.

Just a few years ago I learned more about my grandma's story: As she was raising her young family, she began studying the scriptures. God had placed the desire in her to know the truth. She learned in the Bible that there was a true church; it was to be a restored church, and she learned it was to look like the church that Christ Himself established. She knew the one they'd been attending didn't measure up, so she searched. One day in 1941, her brothers excitedly told her they'd found what she'd been looking for.


She and Grandpa went to hear a sermon and met Elder L. E. Welch from the Church of Christ. They began study classes, and later the same year they were baptized into the church. Before long Grandpa was called into the ministry and they worked together doing the Lord's work. Because of Grandma's desire to find the true church of Christ, God leading her to it, and her children learning of it, I was eventually exposed to it. I'm so thankful that when I was ready, it was there!

Last year, I was nudged by God to write Grandma's story to celebrate her 100th Birthday. I asked, "Grandma, what do you want to tell your grandchildren?" She answered. "Don't go to the city, stay in the country." Then she explained why: As a young girl she was sent to the city (Detroit) to live with her older brother; she didn't like it. When I asked her to tell me about how she met Grandpa, her eyes lit up and sparkled! It was so evident she still felt so much love! She went on to tell me how they had seen each other, and they both knew that the other would be "the one." Later on a blind date, being "fixed up" by friends. she knew for sure that he was the one for her. Grandpa told her the first time he had seen her that he knew she was the one he would marry someday. It was a wonderful afternoon.... The last thing she told me was— "The best thing I ever did in my life was to hear and accept the gospel."

I have often thought what if certain things hadn't happened, how much different my life would be today. I know the Lord had a plan for our family, for me, and for Bruce and I together. God knew all along what our choices would be; He even allowed us to make errors, so that He could bring us around to the path where He wanted us to be. I'm so thankful for His loving guidance over the rough places and to be right where I am today!

s I was rereading scriptures from a recent sermon, two words from Isaiah 1:19 flooded my mind. It says, "If ye are willing and obedient...." This brought to mind a testimony I want to share, to give strength to those who are seeking God's direction as to the path to take in life.


zle. The couple was long time sweethearts Don and Betty McIndoo in a gorgeous photo taken of them when they were first married many years ago.

Sarah Elizabeth Brantner

December 11, 1910~August 28, 2011

Sarah Elizabeth Brantner passed from this world to be with our Lord August 28th, 2011, at the age of 100, just a few months shy of 101.

She was the fifth of nine children born to John Wesley Hoskins and Fanny (Yates) Hoskins December II, 1910. She was born and raised in Algoma Township, Kent County, Michigan, near Cedar Springs. The family of II lived in a one room log cabin on a modest farm.

As a young woman she happened to see a young man working on the railroad. He caught her attention enough that she thought to herself that he looked like a man she would like to meet. That same young man would see a young woman in the post office wearing a large hat and a new homemade dress, and he thought to himself, "I'm going to marry that girl." Sometime later Sarah was to go on a blind double date with a girlfriend, when the boy she was supposed to meet suddenly cancelled. The 'replacement' date happened to be that young man she had seen working on the train. Sarah and George were married on January 4, 1929, and spent 55 years of marriage together.

George was a truck driver by profession, which took him away from home most of the time, so it was left up to Sarah to raise their children and tend to all the farm chores. Life was not easy in those years, and the hard work caused Sarah to miscarry several pregnancies. Then tragedy struck in 1944 when a kerosene heater exploded, catching the house on fire. Their youngest son was killed in the fire, and Sarah would always blame herself.

Sarah was a woman of faith, attend-

ing church regularly with all of the children. Her path crossed with L. E. Welch, and later she would work as his secretary. She followed George into the waters of baptism, becoming a member of the Church of Christ in 1941. Thus began the next phase of their lives, preaching the word of God to the flocks in Michigan and across the country. Sarah and George felt led by the Lord that they should take up residence in Missouri. When the farm in Warrensburg became available they were confident the Lord was providing for them. Sarah and George moved to Missouri in March, 1969, along with their daughter Jeanece and her family. Other family members later followed, including their daughter Jeanette and son Charles. Sarah always took an active part in the Church, and continued to teach Sunday school class until the end.

Sarah and the family quickly assimilated into the new community. She began to work for the District III Area on Aging, and with her efforts and a handful of people they established the SOS (Senior Opportunity Services) which became the Warrensburg Senior Center. She continued several years of service from being nurse and coordinator, Club officers, and volunteer. In 2008 Sarah was recognized by a proclamation from the State of Missouri and the City of Warrensburg for her more than 3 I years of service to the Center.

Like many people, Sarah had many interests, like collecting dolls most of her life, but at the age of 91 she decided to learn how to quilt. She began a mission to make a quilt for all of her grandchildren, which she accomplished, and then some, before her vision became too impaired with macular degeneration.

She was preceded in death by her parents, all her siblings, son Daniel in 1944, husband George in 1984, son Gale in 2001, daughter-in-law Jeanne in 2010, son Richard in 2011, two granddaughters and a great-grandson. She is survived by her daughter Jeanette Cunningham of Warrensburg, son Charles Brantner of Lone Jack, daughter-in-law Char Brantner of Eagle, Michigan, daughter-in-law Alice Brantner of Cherokee, North Carolina, and daughter Jeanece and husband Ross Stephens of Warrensburg. She is also survived by 19 grandchildren, 41 great-grandchildren and 50 great-great-grandchildren.

She touched and influenced so many lives along the way. She was loved, and will be missed by all.
