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

EDITORIAL

he word Freedom as defined is: the state of being free or at liberty:

- with the power to determine action without restraint;
- to be politically or nationally independent.

The word Liberty is defined as freedom from:

 arbitrary or despotic government or control • external or foreign rule

The Price o

- captivity
- confinement or physical restraint

These two words, Freedom and Liberty, are God-given rights to mankind from the beginning.

"And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth" (Genesis 1:28).

This did not mean that after mankind was given dominion over the earth that they were not given direction or commandments as to how they should live their lives. God, as a caring and loving Parent, taught them from the beginning. God walked with and nurtured mankind, giving them admonitions and expectations as to how they were to live their lives, which would bring them happiness, joy, and contentment.

"Therefore God gave unto

them commandments, after having made known unto them the plan of redemption, that they should not do evil, the penalty thereof being a second death, which was an everlasting death as to things pertaining unto righteousness;" (Alma 9:52).

However, the weakness of the carnal flesh was understood by God, and without a propitiation (1 John 4:10) mankind would be forever condemned. The blood of Christ became an everlasting atonement to satisfy the ends of the broken commandment, "...for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die..." (Genesis 2:17), where all mankind was purged or redeemed from Adam's sin.

"Behold, he created Adam; and by Adam came the fall of man. And because of the fall of man, came Jesus Christ, even the Father and the Son; and because of Jesus Christ came the redemption of man.

"And because of the re-

demption of man, which came by Jesus Christ, they are brought back into the presence of the Lord; yea, this is wherein all men are redeemed, because the death of Christ bringeth to pass the resurrection, which bringeth to pass a redemption from an endless sleep, from which sleep all men shall be awakened by the power of God, when the trump shall sound;

"And they shall come forth, both small and great, and all shall stand before his bar, being redeemed and loosed from this eternal band of death, which death is a temporal death;" (Mormon 4:71-73).

The judgment or condemnation of the sin which was unto death was commuted, reconciled by the blood or death of the Son of God in the flesh, allowing each one of us the freedom and liberty to choose life or death.

"See, I have set before thee this day life and good, and death and evil;" (Deuteronomy 30:15).

"...For I know that he granteth unto men according to their desire, whether it be unto death or unto life; yea, I know that he allotteth unto men, yea, decreeth unto them decrees which are unalterable, according to their wills; whether they be unto salvation or unto destruction;" (Alma 15:55).

The things with God are one eternal round where He does not change: *"I am the Lord, I change not"* (Malachi 3:6). We then find that the law given to mankind to *"Fear God, and keep his command-* *ments...*" (Ecclesiastes 12:13) prevails in Heaven as on earth, where when broken the punishment of death is affixed.

"And there was war in heaven: Michael and his angels fought against the dragon; and the dragon fought and his angels, And prevailed not; neither was their place found any more in heaven. And the great dragon was cast out, that old serpent, called the Devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world: he was cast out into the earth, and his angels were cast out with him" (Revelation 12:7-9).

"Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; And deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage" (Hebrews 2:14-15).

We find therefore an eternal law that where righteousness prevails there is freedom, liberty, and life; but where evil prevails there is captivity, bondage, and death.

"As righteousness tendeth to life: so he that pursueth evil pursueth it to his own death" (Proverbs 11:19).

The two, life and death, are in a battle one against the other, vying for our allegiance where we have been given the freedom of choice, each having an advocate at its head:

• Jesus Christ and eternal life

Satan and eternal death

With this thought there is found the common thread for life to exist and death to be defeated, which comes through the sacrifice by blood; to be free from bondage in this life (in the flesh) and in the life to come (in the spirit).

SACRIFICE BY BLOOD

- Greater Purpose than Self
- Given Freely for Others
- Necessary for Righteousness to Prevail
- Out of Love for your God, Family, and Country to Live in Peace

The Americas, described in the scriptures as the lands of the "*ever-lasting hills*" (Genesis 49:22-26), were set aside by God as a land of promise to all who would have an opportunity to call it home.

"...And that after the waters had receded from off the face of this land, it became a choice land above all other lands, a chosen land of the Lord;" (Ether 6:2).

This land (set aside by God) came with a commandment to those who would live upon it.

"And he had sworn in his wrath unto the Brother of Jared, that whoso should possess this land of promise, from that time henceforth and forever, should serve him, the true and only God, or they should be swept off when the fullness of his wrath should come upon them.

"And now we can behold the decrees of God concerning this land, that it is a land of promise,

and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall serve God, or they shall be swept off when the fullness of his wrath shall come upon them" (Ether 1:30-31).

No different from the land of Canaan that God gave Abraham and his descendants, this land came with a promise of freedom and life or bondage and death, predicated on serving the God who had given them such a blessed land to live upon.

GOD TO ABRAHAM

"And I will establish my covenant between me and thee and thy seed after thee in their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be a God unto thee, and to thy seed after thee.

"And I will give unto thee, and to thy seed after thee, the land wherein thou art a stranger, all the land of Canaan, for an everlasting possession; and I will be their God" (Gen 17:7-8).

THE BLESSING

"And it shall come to pass, if thou shalt hearken diligently unto the voice of the Lord thy God, to observe and to do all his commandments which I command thee this day, that the Lord thy God will set thee on high above all nations of the earth:

"The Lord shall establish thee an holy people unto himself, as he hath sworn unto thee, if thou shalt keep the commandments of the Lord thy God, and walk in his ways" (Deuteronomy 28:1, 9).

THE CURSE

"But it shall come to pass, if thou wilt not hearken unto the voice of the Lord thy God, to observe to do all his commandments and his statutes which I command thee this day; that all these curses shall come upon thee, and overtake thee:

"The Lord shall send upon thee cursing, vexation, and rebuke, in all that thou settest thine hand unto for to do, until thou be destroyed, and until thou perish quickly; because of the wickedness of thy doings, whereby thou hast forsaken me" (Deuteronomy 28:15, 20).

Our nation was founded upon Judeo-Christian principles and was built upon this choice land set aside by God. Our Forefathers put their faith in the God of this land Who poured out His blessings of freedom and liberty upon them because they endeavored to keep His commandments. They also understood clearly the cost of freedom and liberty, which was to confront and defeat evil. They knew that it meant even unto death, whereby others might have life, liberty, and freedom. The following excerpts from The Declaration of Independence clearly support the depth of their faith in God and conviction to prove their faith.

...We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. ...We mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

As a nation we have forsaken our true heritage. We refuse to teach our children of the faith our forefathers often exercised in all aspects of their lives, always being careful not to forget to give God the glory for His blessings and protection upon them.

There is a prophetic warning that is clearly directed towards our nation that was built upon this land of promise. Will we as a nation hearken to the voice of God and repent, or will we refuse, ordaining ourselves and our children to suffer the wrath of God in judgment against us?

"And this cometh unto you, O ye Gentiles, that ye may know the decrees of God, that ye may repent, and not continue in your iniquities until the fullness come, that ye may not bring down the fullness of the wrath of God upon you, as the inhabitants of the land have hitherto done.

"Behold, this is a choice land, and whatsoever nation shall possess it, shall be free from bondage, and from captivity, and from all other nations under heaven, if they will but serve the God of the land, who is Jesus Christ who hath been manifested by the things which we have written" (Ether 1:34-35).

It was a bright sunny day when we arrived in the village of Uayalceh in central Yucatán. We were greeted at the church by the local youth group, all dressed in blue shirts. The check in table was ready at the entrance and behind the church building the chairs were all precisely lined up facing the table where the guest forum members would be seated.

The food was being prepared in the kitchen and the microphones were being

tested as the fifty three young people began to arrive from all over the peninsula. Almost like clockwork, at the appointed hour for the forum to begin the sky filled with clouds and the downpour started. There were mixed feelings since it hadn't rained in two months, so everyone waited patiently for the storm to move The theme of the Youth Forum was introduced by Apostle Plácido Matú. MIDDLE SCHOOL/HIGH SCHOOL:

Lesson: Prayer and Modern History—Church History

In the hilly farm country of New York State lived a family with the very common name of Smith. Joseph and Lucy Smith had nine children; there were more large families than small ones in those days. The one we are most interested in is Joseph Jr. In 1820 he was just fifteen years old. The family had always been quite religious. The young ones were well taught by their mother and father.

During the same year the family's quiet life began to change drastically! To begin with, there were religious revivals taking place all over the country, and their little hometown of Manchester was no exception. Men started traveling all over the United Sates holding "revival" meetings. Perhaps these were a little like our church reunions. These people had no television, movies or any of the entertainments that we have today. They only had each other. Therefore, these meetings were the most exciting social event the town had seen in a long time and all the townspeople and farmers attended. The Smith family did too.

There was intense competition between different church groups. This, unfortunately, led to bad feelings. There were bitter battles of words and opinions between former friends and among families. The Smith family was no exception. Their mother Lucy and children Hyrum, Samuel and Sopronia were convinced that the Presbyterian group was the best, while Young Joseph was more drawn to the Methodist group. Due to the conflicting ideas constantly hammered into his ears, Joseph couldn't make up his mind as to which church he should join.

He began to study the Bible for himself. One day, while feeling particularly confused and troubled, he came upon a verse, James 1:5-6, which seemed to have been written especially for him. Eagerly he read it again and the words seemed to burn themselves into his heart and mind. *"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not and it shall be given him."* He knew at that moment that the words were true, and he knew what he must do to get the answer he needed.

A little way away from the Smith home was a small grove of trees, quiet and peaceful, where he could be alone. Very early one spring morning, with the birds just beginning to twitter awake, he walked out into the woods and knelt down under the shadow of leaves from a big tree. With the soft morning light brightening around him, he began to plead with God for the answer to his dilemma.

Suddenly, shockingly, he felt as if he was being snatched up! He couldn't see anything or anyone, but he felt that he was being held by a powerful force, full of hate and destruction. He was surrounded and weighed down by a heavy darkness. He could not speak or move. He thought he must be dying. The only thing he could think to do was to cry unto God with all his might against this unseen but very real threat which had him in a death grip.

After his pleading to the Lord, brighter than the rising sun there appeared a pillar of light. Instantly the terrible personage who held him faded away. The beautiful column of light came down until it surrounded the young man. Mesmerized, he looked upward and saw two Beings, bright and glorious beyond his wildest imaginations, standing just above him in the fragrant morning air. One of these pointed to other and said, "Joseph, this is My beloved Son, hear Him."

Hardly able to speak, he managed to stutter out his desire to know which of the various churches he should join. The second personage told him that he should join none, that they were all wrong. He said, "They draw near to me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; they teach for doctrine the commandments of men, having a form of godliness, but they deny the power thereof" (*Outline History of the Church of Christ (Temple Lot)*, page 16). Again He forbade Joseph to join any of them. Minutes passed. The young man found himself alone again, on his back, looking up at the empty sky.

FASTING & PRAYER The Way of Deliverance

"Yea, come unto him, and offer your whole souls as an offering unto him, and continue in fasting and praying, and endure to the end; and as the Lord liveth, ye will be saved" (Omni 1:47).

"Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke?" (Isaiah 58:6). The way of deliverance begins by disowning the sinful desires as belonging to the carnal man who died and was buried in the waters of baptism, and has no valid place within us anymore.

here are many wonderful promises in the scriptures. One of the most precious is that God promises the grace to overcome sin and temptation:

"There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it" (I Corinthians 10:13).

When we read the term "fasting" in the title, it is important that we recognize the essence of fasting as making the choice to deprive ourselves of some fleshly desires, for the sake of some spiritual good. The following discussion describes the fast which leads to deliverance from the bondage of sin.

Often the children of God find ourselves feeling trapped in sin or overwhelmed by weaknesses of the flesh, as described by Nephi:

"Behold, my soul delighteth in the things of the Lord; and my heart pondereth continually upon the things which I have seen and heard. Nevertheless, the great goodness of the Lord, in showing me his great and marvelous works, my beart exclaimeth, O wretched man that I am; yea, my heart sorroweth because of my flesh. My soul grieveth because of mine iniquities. I am encompassed about because of the temptations and the sins which doth so easily beset me. And when I desire to rejoice, my beart groaneth because of my sins; nevertheless, I know in whom I have trusted" (2 Ne 3:30-34).

We may feel trapped in sins and excesses. But notice the ray of hope that Nephi extends to us: "nevertheless, I know in whom I have trusted."

Therapists are paid a great deal of money to "help" people deal with the guilt, depression, anxiety and despair that can result from frequent failures in "trying" to dealing with such issues, but their therapy can be designed to make us comfortable with sin and failure, rather than to help us to overcome them. Whether the issues are addictions, or apparent failures at weight loss, or failure at removing some sin from our lives, the over-arching issues are the same, and all have a common cure. The cure is salvation, which is made available to us because of the suffering and death of our

Lord, Jesus. This is the *"way of deliverance"*:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, To preach the acceptable year of the Lord" (Luke 4:18-19).

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross. despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God. For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest ye be wearied and faint in your minds. Ye have not yet resisted unto blood, striving against sin" (Hebrews 12:1-4).

The snare which binds us may be maintained by our own mind-set: this deadly mind-set is perhaps best expressed by the phrase "I want to...but I can't, because it is sin." That is, when we view temptation

we may have a tendency to ultimately defeat ourselves by acknowledging the desire, and then continuing to own it as "ours." By saying "I want to, but I can't because..." we have set up an internal conflict of interest, and in wavs conscious and subconscious, subtle or not-so subtle, our minds begin the labor of removing the perceived roadblock from obtaining that thing that we lust after. The history of mankind and experiences of life teach us these two self-evident truisms: First: Nearly anything can be "justified" through self-deception. Second: Mankind's ability for self-deception is as boundless as is our imagination. It was due to clinging to sinful desires that caused the early saints to be chastened by God in allowing them to be driven out of Jackson County, Missouri, in the 1830s. As they were forewarned:

"Behold the Lord requireth the heart and a willing mind; And the willing and obedient shall eat the good of the land of Zion in these last days; And the <u>rebellious shall be</u> <u>cut off out of the land of Zion,</u> <u>and shall be sent away</u> and shall not inherit the land:" (Book of Commandments 65:44-46).

As what happened to

them of old:

"For behold, they have been a chosen people of the Lord; yea, the people of Nephi hath be loved, and also hath he chastened them; yea, in the days of their iniquities hath be chastened them, because be loveth them" (Helaman 5:90).

Generally we excuse the continued ownership of sinful desires by such thoughts as "I'm only human," and "No one's perfect." Consider, by contrast, those who are sanctified through the saving work of Christ described here:

"Now they, after being sanctified by the Holy Ghost, having their garments made white, being pure and spotless before God, could not look upon sin, save it were with abhorrence;" (Alma 10:4).

The way of deliverance begins by disowning the sinful desires as belonging to the carnal man who died and was buried in the waters of baptism, and has no valid place within us anymore, as the scripture says: "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of *life*" (Romans 6:4). Yet we must recognize our own

frailty and the need for the assistance of God to overcome the carnal nature that is in our flesh: *"For it is God* which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure" (Philippians 2:13). Thus the mindset of deliverance becomes: "I can sin if I choose to, but by the grace of God (to whom I belong and who has cleansed me from sin - may He be praised forever). I choose not to." The grace to maintain this mindset must be cultivated through continual prayer, as we are directed by our Lord:

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, Ye must watch and pray always, lest ye be tempted by the devil, and ye are led away captive by him" (3 Nephi 8:47).

Every successive victory by invoking this prayerful mindset of life and grace, instead of the failed mindset of excuses, will lead to a greater strength and closer bonding with the Spirit of God, and will increase our praise to God for the grace He gives us to overcome the flesh. This mindset becomes one of perpetual fasting, as we were directed in scripture:

"I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service" (Romans 12:1).

REPORT

2013 United Workers Business Meeting and Luncheon

Here we are in the middle of spring and my friends and family are still watching the snow fall while we in Phoenix are enjoying what I would consider has to be the best time of the year.


My question for you this month: How many members do we have in the Church of Christ (and) how many of those members reside in the United States?
